NO SLEEP FOR ANYONE

Sky Was Red and the Ground Trembled Under Unending Shocks.

intensity between 4 and 6 in the morning. It is safe to say that nobody in either army slept a wink that night, although they were accustomed to weeks of bombardment. During these two hours 10,000 shells were fired. Before dawn a scouting division Russians drove back the Austrians who were in occupation of the outlying positions, and, after a sharp engagement, occupied the Austrian trenches. Backing up this movement the entire Russian army facing the Austrians began to close in on them. DIAN DIVISION: We are about to ecupy and maintain a line of trenches. I have some things to say to you at this moment which it is well that you should consider. You are taking over good, and on the whole, dry trenches. visited some myself. They are intact and the parapets are good. Let me warn you first, that we have already had several casualties while you have been attached to other divisions. Some of these casualties were unavoidable, and that is war. But I suspect that at least a few—could have avoided. I have heard of been avoided. cases in which men have exposed themselves with no military object and perhaps only to gratify curi-We cannot lose good men like this. We shall want them all if we advance, and we shall want them all if the Germans advance. Do not expose your heads, do not look around corners unless for a purpose which is necessary at the moment you do it. It will not often be necessary. You are provided with means of observing the enemy without exposing your heads. lose your life without military necessity is to deprive the state of good soldiers. Young and brave men enjoy taking risks. But a soldier who takes unnecessary risks through levity is not playing the game, and the men who does so is also stupid, for whatever be the average practice of the German army, the individual shots whom they employ as snipers shoot straight and screened from observation behind the lines, they are always watching. If you put your head over the parapet without or-

ders they will hit that head. Warning to Men. "There is another thing. Troops new in the trenches always shoot at nothing the first night. You will not do it. It wastes ammunition, and it hurts no one. And the enemy "These are new and nervous is." No German is going to say that of the Canadian troops. You will be shelled in the trenches. When you are shelled, sit low, and sit tight. This is easy advice, for there is nothing else to do. If you get out you will only get it worse. And if you go out, the Germans will go in. Still thrilling like a lyre!" So sang the heart of great George Meredith as he tramped the bleeding earth of fair Lorraine after the close of the Franco-Prussian war. But that was forty years ago when men were only killed by men, and not by Krupps! To-MORROW no one but a blind poet, walking the plains of Marne, would pen such lines of HOPE—for at the end of the great world-war now raging, EVEN SHOULD IT HALT THIS HOUR there will be too little left of France, or Ger-SHOULD IT HALT THIS HOUR, there will be too little left of France, or Germany either, to thrill a note!

Dead men do no singing, and the lesses of life in this conflict have nothing even approaching a parallel in all the history of the world. For those an ocean away, to grasp at all the appalling slaughter that is reddening Europe, a comparison with the mortality in the American civil war,

In the four years of that great conflict only about 4,000,000 men altogethe were engaged, according to Livermore's figures-2,898,304 on the union side and 1,234,000 on the southern side. Of the union enrollment, according to Fox's "Regimental Losses in the Civil War," but 110,070 were killed in action or perished from wounds received in action during the whole course of the war!

And on the confederate side but 94,000 perished as a result of action, Liver-

There have been no total official lists of the killed and wounded in the present war compiled yet in any nation, but various unofficial estimates declare that in the first five months of the war at least 1,800,000 lives were lost! And

such estimates seem more or less borne out by the sporadic official estimates that have been given out from time to time in various countries. On December 19 Great Britain issued an official statement to the effect that 84,000 Englishmen had been lost since the British army took the field, but that these losses had been more than made good by the introduction of various

colonial contingents and home recruits. On November 19, a French document announced that 100,000 French soldiers had been killed in action up to that date, that 400,000 were sick and wounded

and that 90,000 were prisoners in Germany. On November 30, a statement issued at Petrograd, declared that the Austrian losses to that date consisted of 900,000 men and 19,000 officers, although this was probably an exaggeration. A semi-official statement; published November 4 in the North German Gazette, said that the Russian losses against the Austrians had been 420,000 and that the Russian losses against the Germans had been 340,000. The number of Russians lost at the Battle of the Mazurian Lakes alone was fixed, by the Germans, at 150,000!

The Prussian losses in dead alone were fixed by a Berlin dispatch to Copen hagen, Denmark, a neutral country, at the appalling total of 225,000. This total does not include the German losses sustained by the regiments from Bavaria, Wuerttemberg and Saxony.

No doubt the bloodiest battles of the present war have been the series still raging in the Yser region of Belgium. It is said that the Germans estimate their losses in actual killings there so far at 40,000 and the Allies' dead at 30,000.

PARIS France, - The Geneva correspondent of the Temps says that, according to the figures of the international bureau the number of prisoners of war held by various pelligerents now amounts to 1,179,800. Of this number 604,200 men were captives of the Allies and 575,600 by Germany and Austria.
