JOSEPH GRAY ACQUITTED

one who was unfit to appear, had been examined and cross-examined.

It was made painfully apparent before the case had proceeded any length that one side or the other was very much in error, as to dates, at least, for prosecution and defense were in direct contradiction to one

Mrs. Burton's Testimony. Mrs. Burton, the complainant, testified that on the afternoon of July 8 last she had been assaulted by Joseph

Gray, the defendant. The defendant, she said, had been hauling wooden paving blocks for the city from Clarence street to the Dundas street dump in the rear of her house. He had given a quarter to a man named Williamson, a former boarder of hers, with which to get a can of beer, and later the defendant and several of the men working on the dump had come into her woodshed and had drank the beer out of some of her cups, which had been brought out by Williamson, whom she admitted had washed the dishes for her that afternoon. Later all the men departed with the exception of the defendant, who half dragged and half carried her to the front room, and in spite of her struggles, and the fact that she appears to be at least 50 pounds heavier than himself, assaulted her, after inserting a gag in her

The Cross-Examination.

After he had departed the witness had crawled across the room, abstracted a bottle from a dresser drawer, and crawling back to within a couple of feet of the outer door had thrown the bottle through the window of the door.

Mr. Meredith, in cross-examination, elicited the fact that the room in which the alleged assault took place was just off Dundas street, and within hearing distance of people passing. "When you were within a few feet of the door, why did you not open it and call for help instead of throwing the bottle through the window as you did?" he asker.

"I was too weak," was the reply. Two young lads, Percy Sullivan and Percy Merrylees, testified to having heard the sound of the breaking glass and of having discovered Mrs. Burton lying on the floor with a gag in her mouth. REMOVE EMBARGO

English Agriculturists Agitating to Remove Ban Against Canada.

London, Oct. 9 .- The importation of store cattle from Canada is a question which is coming very largely to the front in this country. It is the subject of talk at harvest dinners which are now being held in differen parts of the country.

Much grumbling, too, is heard abou the lack of interest shown in agriculture by the Liberal party, who at all times have posed as the farmers' friends and especially just before the last general election. They have been in power nearly two years and they have not yet done-anything to benefit agriculture.

In the last 30 years the acreage in corn in Great Britain has lessened by over 3,000,000 acres. Green crops have lessened by three-quarters of a million and an enormous amount of land has passed from arable to pasture.

The stock of the country has on the whole diminished by something like 2,000,000 head of cattle, and farmers' capital has diminished by something like £200,000,000.

The consequence is that there has been less labor for workingmen to do, and the number of people cultivating land has decreased by over 600,000 the last 30 years.

As a result of the poor harvest this year, the position of agriculture in Great Britain is more precarious than ever before, the farmers saying that the only prospect of relief is to permit the English farmer and cattle dealer to purchase store cattle in the one cheap market in the world, the market of Canada and the United

Farmers' clubs and agricultural societies are organizing agitations for the removal of the embargo against the importation of store cattle from the United States and Canada.

It is contended that to continue to deprive Great Britain of the vast supply of cheap raw material and drive Canada deeper and deeper into the dead meat trade, is to drive also the very last nail into the coffin of the British farmers.

Spring after spring there is an increase in the scarcity of store cattle at the English fairs, this scarcity showing itself both in the famine rates farmers have to pay for their store cattle and in the grass lands which are positively unemployed for the want of stock. Agriculturists say that the result of the cattle diseases acts has been to cheapen raw material for American and other competitors, while

raising its price to British farmers. The Cattle Breeders' Association of Great Britain has asked the prime minister to receive a deputation next month on the question of removing the embargo on the importation of live cattle. They will tell the Prime Minister that the possibilities of successful agriculture in Great Britain do not lie in the direction of an increased corn area, and they will contend that had the country during the past fifteen years been permitted to stock her acres up to the hilt from the breeding herds of America, British farmers could have adapted their agriculture to assimilate these imports, and they would have become year by year less dependent for their meat supply on

foreign countries. These hopeful people make bold to forecast that if the embargo on imported live stock is removed they may in a few years produce all their beef at home, and possibly all their mutton.

It is complained that but for the restrictions of the cattle diseases acts the normal cattle export from the markets of Canada and the United States should be annually at least upward of 1,500,000 of live stock. It is contended that the export trade in live cattle, lean or half finished. is more profitable and economical than

the trade in fat cattle or dead meat. The great and growing danger to English agriculture is in the condition of the soil resulting from the everincreasing trade in meat fattened for foreign farms; also in the impossibility without large helfer importations from some new source of increasing at all considerably the British home stocks of cattle, the farmers being told to look to America as the one country which from the price of cattle and from the magnitude of its stock would supply British requirements very cheaply.

The most strenuous efforts are to be made to get the Government to remove the embargo so that Great Britain shall no longer be isolated by legislative enactment. Jam growing and hen ranching are all very well in a way, but the leading agriculturists



Cubs Were Outbatted, But Detroit Could Not Get Around.







THE HIGHEST LATITUDE

Kite Sent Up Over 23,000 Feet at Mount Weather Station.

Washington, Oct. 9.-The highest altitude ever reached by a kite in this country, according to Prof, Henry of Thursday at the Mount Weather station in Virginia, when an altitude of slightly over twenty-three thousand feet was attained. At that height a temperature of five degrees below zero Fahrenheit was recorded. It is Prof. Henry's belief that the kite will yet attain a higher flight.

For the past few days the Mount Weather bureau has been conducting experiments in kite flying with a view to determining the weather conditions at various altitudes. For instance, a temperature of forty degrees was recorded at the top of the mountains, at a height of one thousand feet the temperature was eight degrees warm-
