The charter was granted by the department of state upon the advice of the department of justice that it was for a lawful purpose, and could not be refused. The Globe, on the other hand, had on a previous occasion opposed an arplication for a similar charter, and a Conservative government had refused it. The Globe pleads that it could not consistently refuse to condemn the granting of such a charter by its party friends, in view of its attitude when the fate of a similar application was in the hands of its party opponents.

Mr. Murphy declares that he is in sympathy with the movement to banish race-track gambling. The amendment of the criminal code seems to be the remedy for the evil and Mr. Murphy and the Globe
