PORTE WANTS SACRED SPOTS IN ADRIANOPLE FORTRESS

In Reply to Balkan Allies' Latest Note Turkey Offers a Compromise Proposition-Not Acceptable, Says Chief of the Balkan Plenipotentiaries.

[Canadian Press.]

Not Acceptable. London, Jan. 30. - 'Emphatically the Turkish reply to the note of the European powers is not acceptable," was the comment made by Dr. S. Daneff, leader of the Bulgarian peace delegation here, when he was shown the terms of the Ottoman response. He continued:

"Speaking on behalf of all the peace missions of the allied Balkan nations, I state that the Turkish reply is not of a character to form the basis of fresh negotiations. We have said that the fortress of Adrianople and the Turkish islands in the Aegean Sea must be ceded, and without this the negotiations will not be resumed. Moreover, this cession must be made before hostilities are resumed, as the first shot will change our conditions."

Constantinople, Jan. 30 .- The Turkish Government displays a spirit of compromise in its reply to the note handed to it by the representatives of the European powers on Jan. 17. The response was presented by Mahmoud Shefket Pasha, the grand vizier, to sacred shrines, are then recapitulated Margrave Johann Von Pallavicini, the dean of the diplomatic corps in the lengthy document of four pages writturkish capital this morning.

The Porte stipulates for the retention by Turkey of those quarters of the fortress of Adrianople, in which the holy shrines are situated. It proposes to leave in the hands of the powers the disposal of the land on the right bank of the Maritza River, which runs through Adrianople.





WAR TO A FINISH?

He read to the House the bill which had been introduced in the British Parliament and which would be the model for similar legis-lation by the overseas dominions. This bill provided that any alien might be naturalized in the United Kingdom after living there for one year provided that he had lived for four out of the seven preceding years in any part of the empire. The Dominion Government had represented to the imperial government that the bill should not apply to Canada unless sanctioned by legislation of the Canadian Parliament and had been assured that the naturalization thus conferred would not be made effective in any of the selfgoverning dominions without the consent of that dominion. The plan was to have concurrent legislation by all the self-governing nations of the empire so that, through the operation of substantially similar statutes, an alien naturalized in Canada for example would acquire an imperial citizenship.

One Year's Residence.

At present an alien must reside continuously for three years in Canada in order to become naturalized here. The proposed statute would only require one year's residence in Canada, but at least five years' residence within the empire. Mr. Doherty was asked whether the present statute conferring restricted naturalization would also be retained. He said this point had not been decided by the Government, but his personal preference was for only one system of naturalization. He intimated that a bill might be introduced this session. Such a measure would, however, only come into effect upon proclamation after similar legislation had been enacted by the other




