

Growing Vegetables in Orchards.

In these days of ever-increasing food needs the fruit grower may make more money from his land and perform a patriotic duty by planting vegetables between his trees. Indeed, some of the most famous horticulturists agree that the patriotic fruit grower shouldn't think of extending his planting during the war, but should turn, his attention to truck and farm crops. Wherever possible he should plant inter-crops of beans, potatoes, cabbage and like vegetables in his orchards.

This doesn't mean that orchards should be abandoned or even neglected. But it does mean that the need for increased food supplies makes it imperative for every fruit grower not to extend his orchards, and to give less thought to them than to the growths of other crops that mean more in direct food value to the nation.

Several suggestions for increasing the use of potatoes have appeared in this column, but a good thing cannot be recommended too often. Here are further ways to make use of potatoes, of which you may not have thought recently.

How long is it since you have reasted a potato and eaten it, skin and all, with only sait? This is a most delicious way.

Serving Potato Biscuit.

Take a cupful of flour, four teaspoonful of sait, sifting them together. Add these to a cupful of mashed potatoes and with a knife work in a tablespoonful of butter and one of lard.





Industry, Thrift, Banking, Insurance, Investments

CANADIAN INDUSTRIAL SITUATION

Canadian industries as a whole continue to be active. Large orders are being received from the United States for army supplies, which with the orders received from the British Government and the European allies, will insure con-

tinued operation at capacity for many months.

The prosperity of our industries is evidenced by the character of the financial statements recently issued by a number of companies. Liberal amounts have been applied on depreciation and added to reserves, while bank advances and other current liabilities have been substantially reduced. It is quite evident, however, that many municipal and privately operated public services are finding difficulty in meeting the increased cost of labor and material. Generally speaking, public bodies hesitate to increase the rates charged by the utilities they operate, and those operated by private corporations are subj fixed rates. The result is, more particularly in Western Canada, that both public and privately-owned utilities are faced with deficits, particularly in the case of street car systems, wince difficulties are increased by the competition of jitneys and the general use of motors. The difficulties with which municipalities are thus confronted tend to modify the antagonism which has been felt towards private operators, and this change of attitude may aid in restoring the onfidence of investors. In Central and Eastern Canada shipping, power and other companies are, generally speaking, in a strong position, but the distribution of profits to shareholders has not been on a much higher scale than prior to the war. The gross earnings are substantially greater, but the margin over interest and operating charges does not permit the payment of dividends in proportion to the increased volume of business or to the increase in the cost of living.-Monthly Letter Canadian Bank of Commerce.

DIRECTORS WITHHOLDING PROFITS—IS IT GOOD BUSI-NESS POLICY?

There are symptoms of newly acquired wealth in the corporation The Standard Oil directors have preserved a pretty consistent reputation for onservatism. But the most conservative constructive period ever engineered by

John D. Rockefeller looks extravagant when compared with the policy being followed by some of the nouveau riche corporations. Three years ago if any prophet had told the directors of the Allie-Chalmers Manufacturing Company that in the year 1917, after unprecedented charges for depreciation, nearly \$25 would be shown in net earnings on each share of preferred stock, it is probable that steps would have been taken to put the prophet

in a sanatorium. Yet with such earnings an actuality the directors only paid up 3 per cent of arrears of back dividends. There is a strong feeling on the part of American investors, confronted with rising living costs, increased taxes and Liberty Loan exhortations, that they are entitled to a decent share of net earnings. Corporate heads who do not pay some attention to this phase of the general financial situation are likely to find

To be conservative in distribution of dividends is a good thing. To hoard nearly all the profits at a time like this is selfish and unpatriotic. Pay out some of the prosperity.

WHAT WOULD I DO IF I WERE TWENTY-ONE? BY DR. FRANK CRANE.

Money has a deal to do with contentment in this workaday world, and I'd have some of my own. There isn't a human being but could save a little. Every man, in America at least, could live on nine-tenths of what he does live on, and save the other tenth. And the man who can regularly save no money

And I would get my life insured. Life insurance is the most practical way a young man, especially if he be a professional man, or anyone not gifted with the knack of making money, to achieve financial comfort. The life insurance companies are as safe as any money institution can be. You are compelled to save in order to pay your premiums, and you probably need that sort of whip. And those dependent on you are protected against the financial distress that would be caused by your death. I believe life insurance to be the best way to save money, at least for one who knows little about money,

The people of Kenosha, Wisconsin, have hit upon a typical method of ducation in war patriotism, as charity, as distinguished from Government bond

ing. "Commerce and Finance describes this as follows:
"Each week half an hour before noon on Wednesday, the whistles blow in Kenosha, Wis., a town of 30,000 population, and it is expected that every man, woman and child will give his wages for that period to the patriotic funds, the Red Cross, the Y.M.C.A. and war charities More than \$11 per inhabitant has been realized already in this way, a total of \$350,000. This unique plan enthusiastically executed has given the Wisconsin town added distinction. Already before this idea had been adopted Kenosha had won widespread recognition for loyalty to the country's cause. The money thus given may not be used to buy Liberty bonds. They regard that as investment, the other funds as patriotic contribution. Business and professional men are assessed one per cent of their week's earnings, other workers giving a slightly lesser percentage. The allotment of Liberty bonds was oversubscribed more than 100 per cent. Kenosha's example might well be followed by hundreds of towns. Probably it would not be practicable in very large cities, but for those 100,000 or less it is in our opinion the most economic and workable plant yet devised. It saves the expense of campaigns of solicitation, and unifies the people."

1917 RAIL EARNINGS AND WHAT GOVERNMENT WILL PAY

"The railroads in 1917 earned about \$958,000,000, which is near the amount he Government will have to pay the roads this year as compensation under national operation, according to unofficial computation based on Interstate Comnerce Commission reports for eleven months and an estimate for Decembe The sum the Government will have to pay the roads under the bill pending in Congress, is estimated at \$945,000,000 by Chairman Smith of the Senate committee having the railroad bill in charge. Compared with the estimated income of \$958,000,000 last year, the figures for 1916 were \$1.087,533,000; for 1915, \$716,-476,000; for 1914, \$692,330.000, and for 1913, \$816,510,000.

"The reason for the decline in net income last year is shown graphically by he report. Operating revenues were ten per cent greater than the \$3,622,000,000 of 1916, but expenses ran more than 20 per cent above the \$2,373,000,000 mark of he year previous. Nearly all items of expense were higher. Wage increases are estimated at 20 per cent. Cost of coal and train supplies went up by bounds with which the immense receipts from freight and other revenues did not keep






