Borden, K.C., leader of the Conservative Opposition, denied absolutely the story printed today in the Toronto World to the effect that he would resign the leadership at the caucus meeting in Ottawa on Friday. He was called up by long distance telephone at the residence of Mr. Jos. E. Armstrong, Petrolea, and in cenversation with The Advertiser denied that he would resign at that meeting.

Killed by an Indian While Looking Over Property in the Rocky Mountains.
