St. Petersburg, April 27. . - While King Edward's move to restore peace between Russia and Japan has failed. it is nevertheless regarded as highly significant in diplomatic circles. It is the first tangible evidence of a change in the relations between Russia and Great Britain. The King, however, has never approached the Emperor, no matter how indirectly, on the subject of peace. If future attempts at mediation be made it is necessary, say the diplomats, that good relations between Russian and Great Britain be assiduously cultivated and they believe that no one appreciates this better than The attitude of the Emperor is thor-

BURIED TREASURE IN OXFORD COUNTY

Michigan Man With a "Dip Needle" After \$15,000.

WAS PLANTED BY HIS FATHER

The Latter Was Forced to Leave it Behind When Pursued by the Americans in 1812.

Woodstock, Ont., April 27.—Equipped with a Spanish "dip-needle," an intrument to determine the location minerals, James Ostrander, of Big Rapids, Mich., arrived in Woodstock resterday, and took the Port Dover train for the south at 11 o'clock, on a unique mission. He was unfortunate enough to be among those pur-sued after the defeat of the Canadians in the west, and with the others re-solved to bury his money possessions rather than run the risk of having them fall into the hands the Americans.
