Only when attention was called through the press to the fact that the Mark 1 rifles, on which the whole advance was paid three years ago, have not yet all been delivered, and that the Company was two years in arrears on some later contracts, where the advances stopped. For three or four advances stopped. For three or four months there has been nothing doing in the way of payments. But om Sir Frederic Borden's return he immediately started in to assist the contractors in their finances. The Auditor-General and acting minister Sir Richard Cartwright had stopped the payments, and it is understood there were hot times before the new order in council was passed. If the Minister can now get his way the payments will go merrily on though the Company has received already about \$400,000 on rifles that have not been delivered. It may be repeated that the seventy-five per cent. advance amounts to \$18.75 per rifle, which is considerably more than the total price paid by the Government for the Lee Enfield weapon, and is several dollars more than either the British or the United States pays for the service rifle.



OIL MONOPOLY.

Standard Oil Operations.

New York, Aug. 13.—Another broadside for the Standard Oil Co. is contained in a report to President Roosevelt by Herbert Knox Smith, commissioner of corporations, on "Discrimination in Prices."

Abounding in invectives, the report pillories the Standard Oil Co. for selling its products abroad cheaper than at home, for maintaining the highest prices possible in those parts of the United States, where it has a complete monopoly, and cutting prices relentlessly where it meets competition, and for using its vast freight traffic as a club to compel railroads to pay high prices for lubricating oil. Then, as a him that the half has not been told, Mr. Smith closes his report with this passage:

"By your direction, in view of the proceedings of the Attorney-General against the Standard Oil Co., some of the more detailed evidence procured by the bureau regarding price discrimination is at present withheld from publication, and the same is true of other unfair practices, the most important of which are maintenance of bogus independent companies, espionage over the business of competitors, especially by bribing railway employes to disclose their shipments, and deceptions as to the quality of oils sold."



'TWAS A GREAT RACE

But the American Defender Sped in by a Mile.

Canadian Boat Led For a Considerable Portion of the Contest-Jarvis Again Got Over the Line First-Adele Was Troubled on the Return Journey With Her Sails-Start So Speedy Patrols Failed to Keep Up.

Rochester, Aug. 13.—Skipper Hanan and his crew of the defender, Seneca, drove another rivet into the fastenings that hold the Canada's Cup at the Rochester Yacht Club house, by sending Seneca over the finish line about a mile ahead of the Adele yesterday afternoon. It was the second of the series and both have gone to the Yankee defender; on Saturday, in a light breeze, that finally died down to a complete calm, and yesterday in winds that varied from 8 to 12 miles an hour.

hour.

The start yesterday was made early, a slight delay being caused in placing the buoys. They jockeyed for half an hour near the starting line while the buoys were being placed and when the whistle was sounded both were throwing spray on the imaginary line. Jarvis again got the windward position and the timers caught the challenger going past the line at 11.30. Five seconds later Hanan and the Seneca flashed over and they were off for a nine-mile frolic before the wind.

Almost straight out into the lake they went, the Adele seemed to realize she was sailing towards home and was daring the Seneca to catch her before she could get there. The dare was accepted and they rushed away so fast that the sailing craft in the fleet, although some of them are speedy, seemed to be dragging anchors and even the steamer that carried the judges and the patrol boats had to keep chug-chugging to keep along near the racers.

The Seneca gradually crept up and finally passed the challenger, but it was a merry race, with odds for none and when they made ready to turn the mark, Jarvis obtained the windward place and glowly the large sail of the Adele carried her past the Herreschoff boat.

They rounded the stake boat: Adele at 1.05.20. Seneca, 1.05.36. Then the Seneca was pointed towards the land of Uncle Sam and it was the Canadian's turn to play tag with the defender. Some trouble was experienced with the sails on Adele and her crew was kept, busy getting canvass out of the water. When her big sail caught the wind squarely she raced like a hawk, but when it got in trouble she dropped back very perceptibly. They were about an hour running out and it was figured that they would be about two hours coming back. These calculations were not far from the results, although the Seneca made the water fly faster as she neared the finish. The Seneca struck a lull when about half way home, and the Adele almost overtook her. But it was the Seneca all the way; on the last half of the run home, and she gradually widened the gap from 300 yards to half a mile and when she crossed the line she had a lead of a mile.

To-day the third of the series will be sailed over a triangular course. If the Seneca wins there will be no further races and the Canada's Cup will remain on the American side of the lake.

HARVEST HANDS NEEDED.

Over 20,000 Staiwarts Are Required to Garner the Northwest Crop.

Montreal, Aug. 13.—To harvest the northwest crop Manitoba requires 11,000 farm hands, Saskatchewan 7,000, and Alberta 3,000.
