## **College Board Formed**

FREDERICTON (CUP) - A college entrance board is being formed for Canada. The Canadian Council on Admission to College and University was approved in principle last week by the 10 provincial ministers of education. Committees from provincial education departments and the Association of Universities and Colleges of Canada are finalizing a draft constitution for the body. It is expected to be completed in time for a founding conference in January.

Exams could ready for high-school students by the spring of 1967 to determine university admission for the following year. The Ontario Institute for Studies in Education will probably receive the contract for English language exams. The Quebec department of education is expected to prepare the French longuage exams. Drawing upon the experience of the U.S. College Entrance Board the scheme could supplant departmental exams as a majoruniversity entrance criterion within several years. According to current thinking the student would write three papers during the winter or early spring of his final school year. One of these would test scholarly aptitude while the others gauged general knowledge in two subjects areas. The student would choose his test areas from among eight or nine choices.

At a meeting of the Maritim Intercollegiate Athletic Union in Sackville last spring, a new eligibility rule for varsity com petition was adopted.

The new rule states that that male athletes are permit ted four years of varsity com petition as was previously th case. However, the new rul adds that these four year must be used up during th five years following the dat of the individual's first regis tration at any college or un versity. Thus any athlete wh attended any institution gran ing a bachelor's degree, an junior college, or a teacher college prior to 1961 is no ineligible for varsity spor regardless of the number c years he has played at th varsity level.

UNB's Athletic Director, M Pete Kelly, states that UN opposed the adoption of th new rule. They were joined opposition by one other un versity. However, the oth nine members of the MIA voted for the adoption of the new eligibility rule, heavi

# SUB Committee Expects Large Attendance at Sod Turning Ceremony

The Student Union Building Committee announced last night that the plans for the new student-supported SUB will be on display at the site. These are not the final plans, they said, because there will be revisions after the committee holds student hearings later in the term.

The \$1.2 million building will be paid for out of student funds, ten dollars per student per year. The University has agreed to match the student contribution approximately dollar for dollar, footing half the expenses of construction.

Larsen and Larsen, the architects for the structure, have given the committee a 50% reduction in fees kecause "the students are supporting the building financially."

Discussions are now under way between representatives from UNB, Teachers College, and St. Thomas University, on the possibility of sharing the cost of the building on a per-student basis. Results of the talks will not be known officially for a few days.

In addition to the \$1.2 million for construction, \$300,000 will be required for furnishing the building. Half the cost of this will also be the responsibility of students.

Dick Oland, a member of the SUB committee, said last night, "We certainly hope there will be a large turnout for the sod turning. This is the biggest event for UNB students in a long time, and it is a matter of great importance to all three student bodies in Fredericton."

If Teachers College and St. Thomas University agree to contribute to the fund for construction, the building will be open for use by all three colleges.

In addition to office space for all three student councils, and space for meetings for all organizations, the committee has included a barber shop, hairdresser's, and a 'confectionery store' for the convenience of students.

The building is centrally located between the three institutions, a change in plans from last year's suggestion that it be an addition to the existing Memorial Students Centre. "It will be more convenient for all the students," one student commented. The University, Teachers College, and St. Thomas will be growing closer and C P Sto


