## BRANTFORD BOYS CAME HOME WINNERS

Lloyd Verity and Leslie Watt Won Two Ontario Championships.

Brantford has added to its laurels. The Y. M. C. A. sent down some swimmers to compete against Ontario's best and they have returned with two junior championships and a very creditable showing in the other events.

When Lloyd Verity carried off the junior 40 yards he fulfilled the expectations of his trainer, Geo. Mosley, and made the Toronto swimmers open their eyes. Leslie Watt, son of Mr. Geo. Watt, won the junior diving championship. He is only eleven years old, and he took the championship as his age gave him a substantial balance of points over his opponents. Jack Pollock made a good showing in a field of seven competitors. H. Ryerson made a splendid exhibition for he won his heat in the 40 yards, and only lost the semi-final by two feet. R. Smith was third man home in the 100 yards, senior, and will soon take some beating at the distance. Morrison Smith just missed his heat by a narrow margin. Deagle, in the back stroke lost his heat and he made a fine effort to win. He is considerably handicapped as he has no competitive work in the city.

On his time, Verity could have won the senior 40 yards, as he made the best time of the meet.

Instructor Geo. Mosley is highly pleased with the result and he is sure that when the locals get into their stride they will be able to take on the best in Canada and make them gasp. It should be remembered that he has only recently got his band of swimmers together and they have only practised the fastest strokes for about two months. When the team is in tip-top condition and the men have had more training, Mosley says there will be little to stop them.

## HEAVILY FINED BY JUDGE SNYDER

Constable Mounce and Supt. Smith Win Liquor Cases at Hamilton

HAMILTON, Feb. 16.—The sittings of the ninth division court Saturday afternoon were enlivened when Joe Johns, an Indian, was taken into custody by Provincial Officer Mounce of Brantford.

Johns was a witness in a "wage" case, and had come up from Burlington to testify on behalf of the plaintiff, Constable Mounce, who was acting in the liquor appeals, recognized Johns when he appeared in the box. He conferred with his brother officer in the court, and it was found that Johns was the man "that has been wanted in Brantford on a charge of aggravated assault against a woman. After Johns had given his evidence and got down off the stand he was on his way out of the court room when Constable Mounce walked up and placed him under arrest. He was lodged in the cells of the court house and removed to Brantford Saturday evening.

Constable Mounce said the police had been looking for Johns for the past two years. He had slipped out of the Telephone City on the eve of being arrested, and the officers had been searching all the time since, it develops Johns has been living near Burlington all the time. The woman Johns is accused of assaulting is now in jail herself.

After hearing all the evidence in the liquor appeals of Inspector Sturdy against the decisions of Magistrate Jellis dismissing the cases against John O. Carpenter, G. E. Gray and Harry Goldberg, Saturday afternoon and morning, Judge Snyder reserved his judgment in the cases against Mr. Carpenter and Mr. Grey, but fined Mr. Goldberg, of the New Commercial \$100 and costs for selling liquor to an Indian. In the other appeal that of C. Bremner, charged with selling to an Indian, A. M. Lewis took objection to the notice he had received from Inspector Sturdy's solicitors, and his honor reserved his judgment on the point.

In the Carpenter and Gray cases, Geo. S. Kerr, K.C., counsel for both parties, admitted that his clients had sold liquor to Martin, the Indian, but claimed that Martin had no resemblance to an Indian either in face or color. Judge Snyder said he would reserve his decision in order that he might look up the law in that regard.

In the Goldberg case it was shown that an Indian named Powlis, had been served with liquor, and his honor held that in this case there was a deliberate breach of the act, in that there was nothing to suggest that Powlis was anything other than an Indian. He assessed a fine of \$100 and costs.

In the Carpenter and Gray cases, T. Reg. Sloan, counsel for Inspector Sturdy, said there was no other construction that could be placed on the word of the act relating to Indians. Either the man was an Indian or he was not.

Supt. Smith made a rather significant charge on the stand, when he said he was given to understand that Martin and Powlis, the two Indians, were the men who had been supplying the Indians on the reserve with liquor for the past two years.

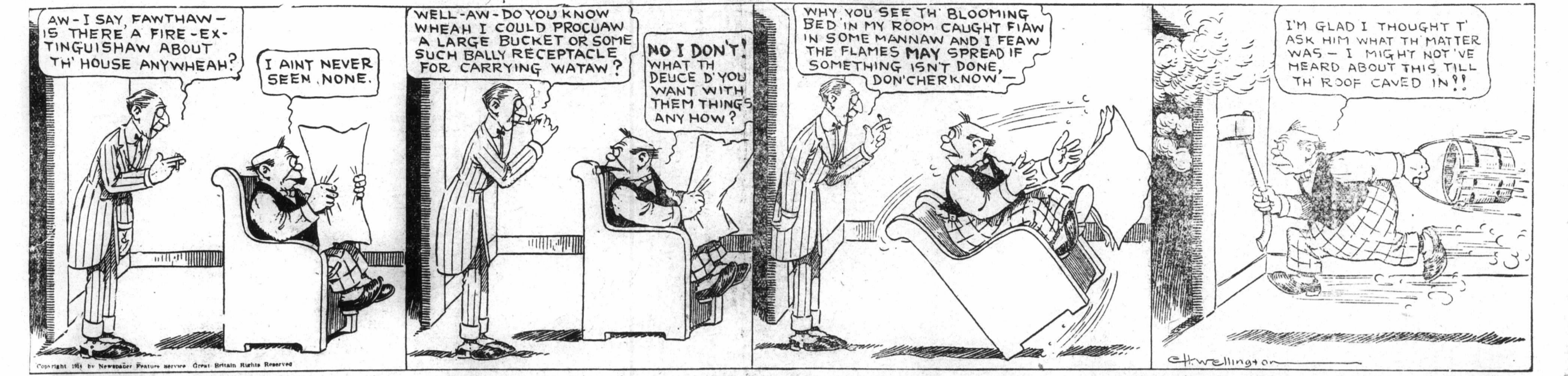

## STAGGERING BLOW TO THE LIBERALS

Effects of Report of Trans-continental Railway Commission.

OTTAWA, Feb. 16.—The Government has not yet considered any action, if such is possible, upon the report of the Transcontinental Railway Commission investigation. The report is now in the hands of the printer, and in a few days will be ready for general distribution. Doubtless it will be given the widest circulation as affording concrete and detailed examples of the waste and extravagance, as well as the numerous suspicious circumstances characterizing the whole undertaking. The contracts were so wide open, so to speak, while as to what was done under or outside of them was always authorized by the commission vested with proper powers in the premises, that it may be impossible to do anything. The report, however, has emphasized and justified what has long been anticipated, and places the responsibility squarely where it belongs. An examination of the evidence or exhibits would fully justify the investigating commission, in the conclusions which it has reached. The rumor has been current the past few days that realizing the effect upon the country the Liberal Senate may attempt to counter-blast enquiry of its own by way of attempting to neutralize the exposures of the commission's report. The futility of this is demonstrated when it is considered that the enquiry just concluded mainly out on the work itself where the conditions were seen first hand. No committee sitting at Ottawa could possibly attempt to cover a fraction of the investigation

## SHOULD LIMIT EXPENDITURE TO ESSENTIALS.

Sir Frederick Taylor, manager of the London branch of the Bank of Montreal, gives a comprehensive outline of the present monetary situation as viewed from the British standpoint. While in Montreal, Sir Frederick said: "All borrowers throughout the world that depend on the London market for their financial requirements have of late found, and are

now finding it not only wise, but imperative to restrict the size of their flotation to the smallest extent possible and also to limit their commitments to essential expenditures. Furthermore, owing to the money crisis, which, by the way, is still in progress, the terms to business borrowers have been on a steadily rising scale, and far more onerous than for many years past. These remarks apply to Canada with this addition, that the reputation accorded Canadian securities in London for several years past has vanished, and although our credit—I am speaking generally—continues good, and the Dominion as a whole will doubtless be able to continue to borrow in London, it will be with less ease, and consequently in smaller volume than in the past, besides which all offerings will be subject to careful scrutiny.

"It will, of course, be understood that my remarks do not in any way refer to the securities of the government of the Dominion of Canada, which are in a class by themselves. The British public have not lost confidence in Canada and Canadian institutions by a great deal," added Sir Frederick. "What I mean is that what might be termed the craze for Canada and Canadian investments is, let us say, in suspension."

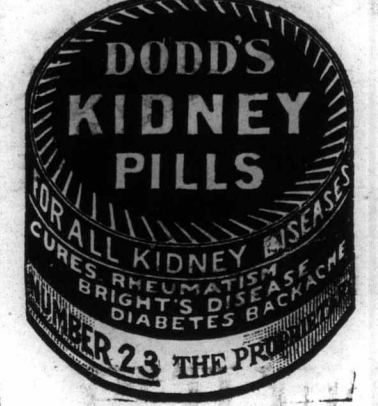
