



immigrants coming to Canada from the United States, according to the state nent of J. Bruce Walker, commissioner for immigration at Winnipeg. Fewer are coming but they are bringing more with them, in the way of wealth to the country. "The immigration from the United

States" sair Mr Walker, "through the western boundary points shows a considerable decrease for the months of October and November, so far as number of immigrants are concerned, but a most gratifying increase in the wealth of the settlers in stock, effects and the number of carloads of goods which they have with them.

"For instance, the actual number of immigrants through the western boundary points, for the month of October was 2,040 less when compared with the numbers for the corresponding period of 1912. The increase, however, during that period of the wealth of the new settlers, as compared with the former period, in cash \$398,000 and in effects \$196,-000, while there was an increase of no less than 94 carloads of effects during the period.

"For the month of November the figures were 1,012 less in actual settlers, and \$125,000 increase in cash with \$65,734 in valued effects."
