**TRAINS
COLLIDE**
Near Norton, Mo., on the Chi-
cago & Alton Road Killing
16 People

AND DANGEROUSLY WOUNDING OTHERS
Passengers Were Cooked by Steam
From Engines

MANY COMING TO DAWSON
Among Them Mrs. Frank P. Slavin,
Customs Officials and Several
Tourists.

Kansas City, July 10, via Skagway,
July 15.—Sixteen persons dead, two

fatally injured and a large number
seriously hurt is the result of a head-on
collision between a passenger and fast
livestock train on the Chicago & Alton
road near Norton, Missouri. Both en-
gines and one conductor were killed.
When the crash came the smoking
and dining cars telescoped and went
by the baggage and express cars and
the engine and down an embankment.
Few in these cars were injured. The
greatest number of fatalities were in
the tourist car which telescoped and
fell on top of the engine where the
passengers were scalded by steam. The
tourist sleeper and chair cars, also
baggage and a number of freight cars
piled up on and around the engines
and were burned.

An Appeal Must be Made to Min-

The confiscation of the bank roll

the legality of the seizure and the

handed down his opinion, which is to
the effect that the commissioner of the
territory has no power to act or in-
terfere in the matter. If defendants
desire to appeal from the acts of the
police and secure the restitution of the
money so seized, such appeal should
be directed to the minister of justice
at Ottawa and to him alone.

Elton McLaren Buried.

The funeral of Elton McLaren, the
8-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Robert
McLaren, who was drowned in the
slough a week ago, was held yesterday
at the Presbyterian church. The ser-
vice was largely attended by the chil-
dren of the Sunday school and friends
of the family, and many beautiful
floral decorations were placed upon
the coffin as a last token of the love and
esteem in which the lad was held by
all of his companions. After the ser-
vice at the church the children formed
into line and marched to the Hillside
cemetery where the body was interred.
Mrs. McLaren is said to be slowly
improving in health and is expected
to be up again in a few days.

Death of a Young Man.

Rollin Sholes a young man 23 years
of age died at St. Mary's hospital Sat-
urday of an acute attack of Bright's
disease. Mr. Sholes was a resident of
Tacoma, Wash., where his parents and
three sisters now reside. He had been
in Dawson only about three weeks, this
being his first trip here and he had
several offers of positions but his
health would not permit his accepting
any of them.

A wire has been sent to his parents
notifying them of his death. The body
is embalmed and will probably be sent
outside for burial.

Despondency and Suicide.

Syracuse, N. Y., July 8, via Skag-
way, July 15.—Fredrick D. White, son
of Andrew D. White, United States
ambassador to Germany, committed
suicide at his home in this city this
afternoon. Prolonged ill-health and
exhaustion of his nervous system is all
that can possibly be given as cause for
his rash act. He had been in his usual
health and spirits during the day and
had attended to business connected
with the White estate. He had re-
turned to his home early in the after-
noon. Mrs. White was out in the after-
noon and when she returned she found
her husband in the bathroom with a
bullet through his brain. Death had
been instantaneous. Investigation
showed that he had removed the bolt
from his right foot, placed the muzzle
in his mouth and pulled the trigger
with his toe.

Recounting Gold.

San Francisco, July 9, via Skagway,
July 15.—The federal authorities have
ordered a recount of the money in the
U. S. mint vaults in the hope that the
\$30,000 shortage may be found. The
amount to be counted is \$40,000,000
and a week's time will be required to
do the work. If the money was stolen
there is no trace of the thieves.

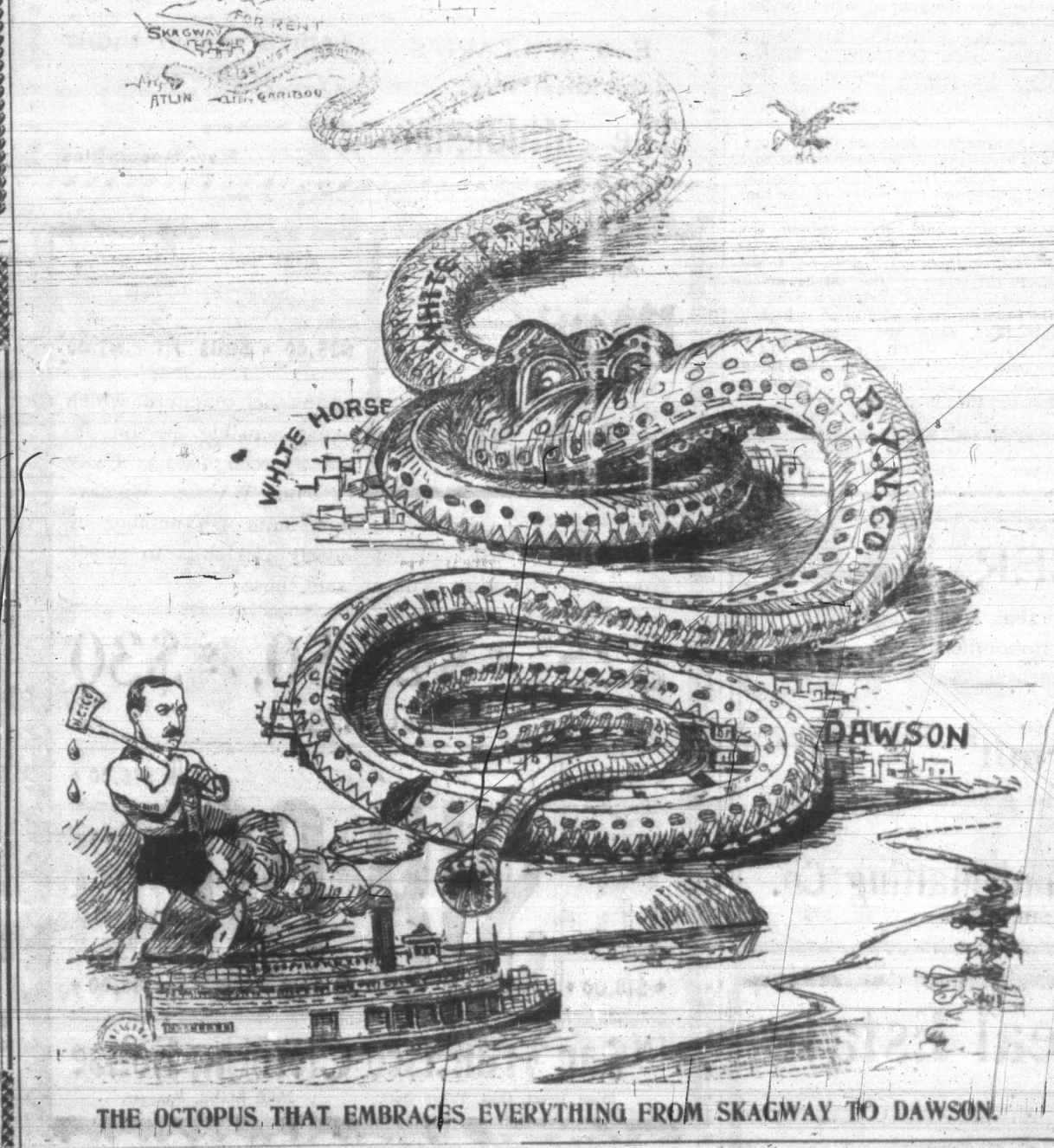

CONGDON
RESIGNS

Will Enter the Legal Firm of
Wade & Aikman.

Fred T. Congdon, legal adviser to
the commissioner and the Yukon
council, has notified Governor Ross
of his resignation and his desire to
have it take effect as soon as it is con-
venient for his services to be dispensed
with. This move on the part of Mr.
Congdon is due solely to a desire to
better himself. Immediately upon the
acceptance of his resignation he will
become a member of the firm of Wade
& Aikman, the new combination to be
styled, Wade, Congdon & Aikman.
During the absence of the senior mem-
ber of the firm Mr. Congdon will act
as crown prosecutor. His resignation
as legal adviser will also entail the
relinquishment of his seat in the Yu-
kon council. In speaking of the matter
today, Mr. Congdon said:
"It will probably be some little time
before I leave my present position as I
have promised Governor Ross to remain
until the legislation now pending in

the council is disposed of. No, I have
no idea who my successor will be. He
will be appointed by parliament upon
the recommendation of the minister of
the interior."

Mr. Congdon has been in Dawson
but a few months but has made a warm
personal friend of everyone with whom
he has come in contact. He is from
Halifax, Nova Scotia, is a graduate of
Toronto University, and is considered
one of the most able of the younger
barristers in the Dominion.

THE YUKON OCTOPUS.

Not content with charging three times a profitable rate on freight from Skagway to Dawson, the W. P. & Y. R. must go further and attempt to dictate the price that the miner and every other man in the Yukon must pay for a sack of flour, a pound of sugar and, in fact, every article he consumes. It is known that when the Northern Commercial company announced a sweeping reduction in prices recently the representatives of the octopus at once registered a vigorous protest, for it well knew that when goods are sold in Dawson at prices less than it charges for transporting them to the country that its support will be at once withdrawn. It is confidently believed that it is to register further protests against this general reduction in prices that officials of the company are now here or are on route.

This same squeezing policy toward the Yukon was pursued by the government until within the past few months and until the latter realized that its grasp must be released and the nurturing policy adopted if the country was to have a future. The result is well known: Rigid laws have been modified, the country has been thrown open to prospectors, the royalty has been cut in two in the middle, and so far as existing mining laws are concerned it is smooth sailing for the miner. But there are other obstacles in the way of the development of the country, and that is the cost of the necessities of life and of the machinery necessary in such development. The disposition of the merchants of Dawson is to remove this obstacle, but how can they succeed when they pay in some instances four and five times the original cost of the article to the octopus in transportation charges.

It is useless to talk of future

growth and development in the Yukon so long as freight charges are unaltered. Merchants cannot afford to long sell goods at the present reduced prices, as in many of the staples it is a losing proposition, and when the present stock in trade is disposed of there will be a shortage in those lines, for the reason that it is not business to import goods and sell them below cost.

It is a mistake to entertain the delusion that Dawson cannot free herself from the embrace of the octopus, for she can; in fact, is now doing it, as the empty box-cars and steamer decks now bear silent but irrefutable testimony. It is for the importers in the Yukon to stand pat and their demands will be conceded. Freight rates can be obtained that will permit of goods being sold in Dawson at good profits even at greater reductions than have yet been made. Windy Skagway to Mat...
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TO RELEASE KID WEST

Windy Skagway Lawyer Longed to Make a Reputation.

Below is the account as published in the Skagway Alaskan of the 11th of the attempt made there to release "Kid" West from the Canadian police who were returning him to the U. S. officials. The Lawyer Barnes mentioned is a newcomer in Skagway and evidently made the play as one effort to bring himself into prominence. The lawyer and the "Kid" seem to have been the only two people anxious for the latter's release. The article from the Skagway paper is as follows:

Yesterday noon Attorney Barnes demanded of Marshal Snook a copy of the writ upon which "Kid" West had been committed to his charge.

The marshal asked for time in which to copy the writ. West, who was advised by the marshal of Barnes' action, disclaimed having employed the latter, nor did he want to institute any proceedings in the courts. He desired to go to his destination quietly and not create a scene.

Constable D. Mayne, of the mounted police, however, tells a somewhat different story. The constable asked "Kid" West out of the jail for an airing and they together sauntered to the Fifth Avenue hotel. Here the bus was in waiting. When requested to enter West demurred but was jostled inside by the constable and they were rapidly driven to the steamship Hating, at the Moore wharf. West, according to constable Mayne, had certainly conferred with Attorney Barnes, who had been recommended to him by prisoners in the jail. Constable Mayne advances the theory that West had been planning to get away on some legal technicality when he arrived at Skagway. When they reached the Hating West was hustled aboard. Attorney Barnes, shortly afterwards, came upon the wharf and demanded to see the warrant or legal document empowering the mounted policeman to restrain West of his liberty. The constable accuses Barnes of using very lurid language. Barnes then attempted to board the Hating for a conference with his client, but desisted when told that if he boarded the boat he would be arrested and taken to Vancouver. The constable states that he, at this juncture, felt compelled, on account of Barnes' abuse, to tell the attorney that "if he opened his yap again he would slug him in the jaw." Barnes hereupon retired, threatening

to arrest the constable for kidnapping. The next act of the "Kid's" attorney was to file a petition for a writ of habeas corpus with U. S. Commissioner Schilbrede. The petition read at the title: "In the District court of the United States for the District of Alaska," and was "In the matter of the application of E. J. Barnes for a writ of habeas corpus in behalf of "Kid" West." It went on to say that "Kid" West was illegally restrained of his liberty on board the steamer Hating by one Jo Goss, an alien subject of Great Britain. The steamer Hating was tied to the wharf at Skagway, within three miles of shore. That "Kid" West is an American citizen and is not imprisoned or restrained by virtue of any order, judgment or process specified in section 567 of the code of civil procedure and that he is being forcible taken through American territory into British territory. Petitioner is an attorney regularly employed by "Kid" West. A demand by petitioner for warrant or process from these aliens was met by a threat that if petitioner set foot on the steamer he would be arrested and taken to Vancouver. That the legality of "Kid" West's restraint has not been adjudged by any habeas corpus proceedings and that it was the intention to take "Kid" West out of the district.

The petitioner finishes with a prayer that a warrant be issued to the marshal commanding him to produce West before Judge James Wickersham at Eagle to investigate the cause of West's restrained liberty.

The constables in charge of "Kid" West say that he made the play that he had a good sack in order to excite the cupidty of the legal fraternity and thus procure an attorney. As a matter of fact West has but little money.

While in the jail West behaved very jauntily and was sippant and mouthy. He seemed to thoroughly enjoy playing the grandstand act to the few people who watched him in the jail. Judge Schilbrede refused to act upon Mr. Barnes' petition, holding he had no jurisdiction in matters addressed to the district court.

Marshal Snook had placed the jail at the disposal of the mounted police pursuant to a letter from Major P. C. A. Primrose, commanding B. division at Dawson, notifying the marshal that "Kid" West was coming out in charge of constables of the force pursuant to an agreement between the two governments. A E. Snyder, commanding the police at White Horse, advised Marshal Snook when the prisoner would arrive, so that everything was in readiness for his reception.

Protest Sustained.
The following is the final decision of the judges re the protest of Mr. C. McLeod against Mr. Flannery's "Kid," for second place in the pony race. It will be remembered that "Kid" was second at the post, McLeod's "Barney Jean" being third but a protest was entered by McLeod stating that "Kid" was above the height scheduled in the program.

Decision.—We are of the opinion that the protest entered by Mr. McLeod against Mr. Flannery's "Kid" will have to be sustained. We think that "Kid" was improperly entered in the pony race, being above the schedule height, 14.3 hands. We do not believe, however, that Mr. Flannery entered his horse knowing that he was not eligible and we therefore hold:

1. That the entrance fee of \$10 paid by Mr. Flannery be refunded.
2. That second money be awarded "Barney Jean" the entry of Mr. McLeod.
