Cephas Brainerd, and from that convention went forth clearer views of assorbation work, and ever since then the need has been regonized to keep constantly in mind that this is an association of men united for the work of extension of the king-dom of Jesus among young men. To-day the instructions given by the associa-tions in convention, do not recognize any work done, nor include in their report of the associations in the United States and Canada any work which is not ex-clusively for men.

On the over-throw of the Mercier Administration in December, 1891, he became a member of the De Boucherville Cabinet, and was returned for Gaspe on March S, 1892. When Mr. Taillon succeeded Mr. De Boucherville in 1893 Mr. Flynn vetain-ed his sent in the Cabinet as Commis-sioner of Grown Lands. 




