Loss of Valued Citizen

In Death of Prof. J. F. Tufts, D. C. L.

Wolfville mourns the loss of one of her best-known and most highly esteemed citizens in the passing of Professor John Freeman Tufts, D. C. L., which occurred at 3.30 o'clock Monday afternoon at his home on Westwood Avenue after an illness of some weeks. The deceased has been such a familiar figure in Wolville during the life of the present generation that it is hard to realize that he is gone.

For over forty-five years he has been citizen of this town and a builder of Acadia, first as Principal of Horton Academy, and later as Professor of Economics and History. Born in New Albany in 1843, he obtained his education at Acadia and Harvard. At Harvard, where he spent five years, he secured by wrtten examinations the advanced standing for admission which Acadia graduates have ever since received without examination. As a teacher he excelled, being a man of wide scholarship, enthusiastic in his work. keenly alive to the value of passing events, and with unusual gifts for inparting his knowledge. His death so closely coincident with the burning of College Hall, the last link of former days, will be sharply felt by the hundreds of graduates scattered throughout the country. Tufts, of Control of Riverport; Hilda A. Tufts, of Section 1. Cambridge, Mass., and by his niece, Miss Andrews, for many years chatelaine of his household.

The funeral took place on Wednesday rnoon at 4 o'clock. The service was held in the Baptist Church where the faculty and students of Acadia University with a large number of citizens of Wolfville and friends from distant parts assembled to pay their last token of respect to the departed. Freed from the pain he so long had borne with Christian fortitude, the deceased looked peaceful in death, wearing the regalia of his College so familiar to all, the Academy gown and College cap. Among the numerous floral tributes resting on his casket were beautiful wreaths from the faculty and the classes of '21 and '22 respectively. The pall bearers were his former associates on the faculty, Prof. Haley, Dr. Spidell, Dr. DeWolfe, Dr. Wheelock, Prof, Perry and Prof.

OVERCOMING THE HIGH CHARGES

Possibilities of Central Heating Plants Should Be Thoroughly Investigated

The annual coal consumption in Canada or domestic purposes is nearly 7,000,000 tons which, if we allow a cost of \$15 per ton, epresents a yearly expenditure of some \$105,000.000. With increasing population and the gradual extension of settlement northerly, this consumption will naturally ublic attention.

The hope of relief, entertained by some. through electric heating from our water-powers, has been definitely shattered by the fact that, outside of the question of cost, the demand would far exceed the supply available. For instance, in Quebec nd Ontario alone, assuming a populatio of some 5,000,000, a total of probably not less than 10,000,000 h.p.—and costing from \$150,000,000 to \$200,000,000 per an-

num-would be required to supply electrical heat. The power available within the more thickly populated portions of these two provinces, even including Canada' equity in the great possibilities of the St. Lawrence and Niagara rivers the greatest water-power rivers in the worldonly amounts to about 51 million hors

The possibilities and economic efficiency of central heating plants appear par ticularly applicable to Canadian condition or to any country with long winters Due to the initial cost of the underground distribution piping system, the plants usually involve heavy overhead expenses; when the plant is used intensively and during long periods each year, the charges can be spread over longer periods than would be the case for systems used only during shorter periods, as in certain localities in the United States Another economy would result from the possibility of using the cheaper grades of coal, instead of anthracite now commonly used in Eastern Canada. Suitabl boilers with automatic stokers and smoke consumers would overcome some of the present disabilities in the use of inferior fuels.-L. G. Denis.



WINTER RATION FOR MILCH COWS nental Farms Note.

The general principles involved in the feeding of milch cows may be outlined. but the most economical ration can be determined only by the feeds available

It is also known that digestive troubles, due to the heavy feeding of meal which is necessary under high production, can be largely overcome by giving an abundance of succulent feed along with the hay and meal ration. In considering a ration for milk, therefore, a good quality of hay, succulent feed, and meal mixture must be considered as definite requirements.

The quality of the hay is a big factor, as poorly cured hay is not appetizing and may cause digestive troubles as well. The value of good clover hay as compared with the grasses is too little appreciated even though there is abundant evidence to show that the legume hay will materially reduce the meal feed requirements over the average hay

Hay and meal alone cannot give best results. This is not because hay and meal does not contain the necessary constituents for milk as the corn silage or roots but rather because the animal is kept in better physical condition because of the succulent roughage and is therefore able to make full use of the meal and hay fed without ailments that are likely to follow heavy feeding of these alone.

The succulent feeds are corn and roots Corn silage alone can be fedmore abundant ly than roots, for the reason that thebowels are not kept as open. A good combination is one-third roots and two-thirds corn. mixed together. Cows ranging around 1100 pounds may take 50 pounds of the above mixture per day and those 1400 pounds may take 60 pounds without being too loose. It is necessary for the feeder to watch his stock as cows cannot do well if purged excessively.

In compounding a meal ration bran should be one of the principal ingredients. Of all the mill products from wheat, bran seems to be the best and this with cracked oats should approximate twothirds of the meal ration. To this is added the cottonseed or linseed meal which are more concentrated. A mixture which has given good results in feeding at the Kentville Experimental Station is made up of 300 pounds bran, 200 pounds crushed oats, 200 pounds cottonseed, 100 pounds linseed meal. This is mixed together and pound salt added to every 100 pounds

of the mixture when mixing. With reasonable care there is little danger of trouble from overfeeding with bran and oats, but with cottonseed there is danger, and it is doubtful if it is, even in such a mixture, advisible to give a cow more than 4 pounds of cottonse per day, and if very heavy feeding is practised so that above that amount is given we would increase in the linseed and correspondingly reduce in the cotton-Cottonseed may be dropped out and the linseed meal used entirely as the latter is a safer concentrate, but generally the cottonseed is cheaper and can be used in part to advantage.

The practice at this Station is to feed during the winter 1 pound meal to 3 pounds milk produced, and 40 to 60 pounds roots and ensilage using two-thirds corn who to one-third roots, either turnips or mangels and 10 to 12 pounds hay for each

cow per day. The first feed is given directly after milking in the morning, consisting of half the ensilage and roots with half the meal scattered on it, and followed by half hay. This is followed by an afternoon feed of ensilage and roots with meal, to be all eaten before milking time, and the hay is given after

ON VENTILATION

The word ventilation means the carrying or moving of air. Now the reason for moving air is that there are some kinds of air that are desirable and some kinds that are not. Now the problem on hand is to remove the undesirable air and replace it with the desirable kind. In cold weather the undesirable air is that containing noxious gases and watery vapour also cold air of any kind. The desirable kind is pure warm air.

It is a well known scientific fact that gases exhaled from our bodies, escaping fumes from stoves, furnaces, lamps, etc., are heavier than pure air when of the same temperature. These gases on first appearance are warmer than the air of game resulted in a victory for the Hantsour houses and therefore begin to rise; but soon become cooler from losing heat to the surrounding air and being then heavier, at once descend to the floor and run down the stairs like so much water. If you want a good proof of this, just put your nose to the foot of the stairway and sniff. You will find the most impure air of the house.

This is the air that should be removed from the house as soon as possible; for Monday. it is both cold and impure. It cannot of course be removed by opening a window upstairs; but you can remove a lot of good warm air that way. The best way to remove this cold foul air is to have a register grating in the hall floor near the foot of the stairs and connected by a duct of good size to the bottom of the chimney This air that has been removed will of course be continually replaced by pure air from outside without the necessity of open windows in cold weather. To prevent local circulation of air in a room from window to radiator and back again, double glass windows should always be used, for if not the heat is continually going out through the glass and no fresh air is gained on account. It is all very well to talk about flinging open all the windows in zero weather if some one else pays for the coal, but when you have to pay \$30 per ton for hard coal out of your own hard earned shekels; one is not likely to pause before shoveling his fuel out o the window.

The cold air treatment is of course purely a financial idea advocated by such people as doctors, druggists, patent medicine men, undertakers, grave diggers, and coal merchants. Pure air treatment is an altogether different problem and should be carefully studied and followed So the problem for us in these days of expensive fuel is to remove the impure air from our homes without removing the heat at the same time.
