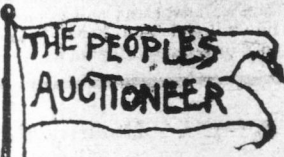

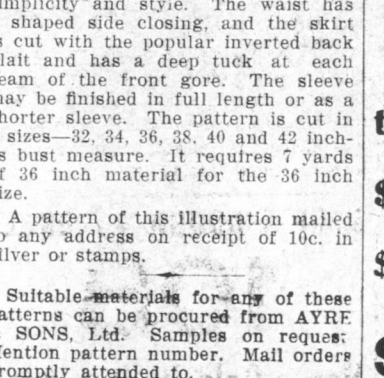

To prepare caramel sweet potatoes, boil and slice the potatoes and dip them first in melted butter and then in granulated sugar. Put into a hot oven until a coating of brown caramel is formed.

A bottle that has contained catsup is difficult to clean. If cold water is poured into it and allowed to stand the work will be greatly simplified. Hot water has a tendency to harden the catsup.

Lavender should be gathered before frost touches it, dried in the house, then cut into small pieces, stalks as well as flowers, and packed tightly into small bags to be put away among the clothing.

For delicious cheese balls, buy some cottage cheese, work it smooth with butter and season well with parmesan cheese. Season with salt and paprika, make into small balls and serve with salad course.

To iron embroidery, the iron should be applied to the wrong side and a thick ironing blanket should be used. In this way the embroidery will stand out well instead of being flattened and looks its very best.

Orange or grape fruit salad is quickly made and will help out many a hurry-up meal. Peel the fruit, slice thick and cut into squares. Lay the pieces on lettuce and pour rich French dressing over them.

If buttermilk is used in place of sweet or sour milk in making biscuits the pastry will be delicious. Buttermilk makes a lighter batter and fewer eggs are needed in a batter made with buttermilk for cakes.

Wiping over the top of a loaf of bread with a little butter before it is baked and again as soon as it comes from the oven will help to brown the crust and at the same time keep the crust from hardening.

When giving castor oil take a small tumbler and squeeze into it a tablespoonful of orange juice; next pour in the oil and add more juice. The juice will inclose the oil and it can be swallowed without tasting.

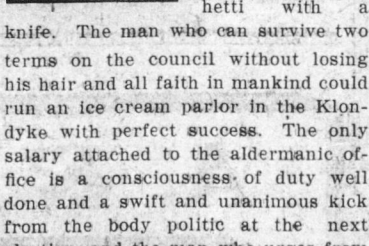

Alone He Did It.

A Captain Who for Three Days Ran the Ship Himself.
For one man to do the work of twenty with his own hands for three days and nights, and with forty lives under his charge, is a feat that takes some heating. It was done by Captain Morell, who brought the steamer Scindia home by himself, although the crew considered necessary to work her was twenty-five, including engineers.

With \$35,000 worth of cargo and fifteen passengers on board, she broke down in the Atlantic, and was driven hundreds of miles north out of her course. An accident spoiled the fresh water, and distilled water gave the crew dysentery, which, together with mishaps, left the captain without an officer or a man capable of work. The first officer and five of the crew were washed overboard, the two chief engineers were killed in the mishap, and the third only managed to make the damage good before he was laid up.

The captain, when the storm subsided, actually started one of the fires himself, got one of the engines to work at slow speed, and, by superhuman efforts, he managed to navigate the ship and keep her going, backed by great good luck.

He brought the Scindia homeward round the North of Ireland, getting no wink of sleep for three days and nights; as he was out of the line of traffic, nobody saw his distress signals. He brought his ship to within twenty miles of the Mersey, and there a pilot-boat met him. Once boarded he collapsed, and slept soundly for twenty-four hours, but he had, says The Mariner, the biggest ovation any merchant captain ever received when he got ashore.

The Perils of Waking.

SOME STRANGE HAPPENINGS.

Crimes Committed in Sleep—Man Convicted for Crime—Was He Responsible for His Actions?

"Many more crimes are enacted during a state of profound somnambulism than is generally known." Dr. Forbes Winslow, the mental expert, who is Vice-President of the Psycho-Therapeutical Society, expresses this opinion on the connection between sleep and crime to an London Express representative.

He was able to supplement the view reported in the Express of Dr. T. B. Hyslop, until recently superintendent of the Royal Bethlem Hospital for the Insane, that many crimes are committed in a state analogous to somnambulism. Some interesting examples were given by Dr. Forbes Winslow from his own personal experience.

Killed His Wife.

"There was the case," he said, "of a man who suddenly awoke at midnight. At the moment of waking he imagined he saw a fearful spectre. He called out: 'Who is that?' and receiving no answer, imagined that the phantom was advancing on him, and having altogether lost his self-possession, he raised a hatchet and attacked the spectre. He found, later, he had murdered his wife."

"Another case was that of a pedlar who was in the habit of walking about the country with an armed stick. He was awakened one evening while lying on the high road asleep, by a man, who suddenly seized him by the shoulders. This was done for a joke.

"The pedlar suddenly awoke and stabbed the man, who died. He was tried for manslaughter, and his irresponsibility was urged by counsel on the ground that in his semi-waking condition he could not be held responsible. Medical witnesses were called to prove this, but the pedlar was found guilty, and, in my opinion, very unjustly punished.

Suicide in Sleep.

"Numerous cases of suicide are reported under similar circumstances. Many a person who has retired to bed in comparative sanity, without manifesting any symptoms of mental disorder, on being aroused from a frightful dream, has destroyed himself.

"I have known many cases of somnambulism in which the people have walked about apparently conscious all the time in this state, but really unconscious of their actions."

"The distinctions of sleep and somnambulism may be divided as follows:

1. Profound sleep associated with unconsciousness.

2. Dreaming, Conscious memory fancy and imagination.

3. Acted dreams.

4. True somnambulism, during which the individual knows nothing of any act committed by him while in this state. Neither can he in the waking state recall any act of his.

"It is a curious, but significant fact, perhaps contrary to the belief of some persons, that insensibility produced by direct hypnotism is not followed by any criminal instinct. This does not, however, apply to those who have never exhibited any criminal intent."

All Danger Avoided.

"One curious thing connected with sleep-walking is the fact that all danger is usually avoided. The sleep-walker will go to the edge of the cliff and then stop and retrace his steps. This is due to the power of the subjective mind.

"No doubt, as in the case of Lady Macbeth, a guilty and uneasy mind acts as an exciting cause in producing general insomnia and restlessness and often somnambulism. An actual confession of crime, however, as here depicted in Shakespeare, is of rare occurrence.

"Regarding the question of the responsibility of any one committing a crime during a condition of somnambulism, there is no possible doubt that such a person should be held irresponsible; but we must, however, guard against the simulation of somnambulism as an excuse for crime. Feigners of somnambulism, as in the case of feigners of insanity, generally betray themselves by some trivial want of truth."

A Bruiser Arrested.

About 4:30 p.m. yesterday a man who was about "half seas over" appeared on Balne Johnstone's premises and wanted to fight all and sundry. When no one else was available, he started to beat a crippled man, John Balsom, an outboard man, aged 70 years, tried to save the other when he was violently assaulted by the drunk, cut about the face, and his son, who also came to the rescue, received several blows from the enraged brute. Head, Feet with officers Tobin and Stamp were soon on the scene and hustled the disturber of the peace to the station.

LARGELY ATTENDED FUNERAL.

The funeral of the late George Bughen took place yesterday afternoon and was largely attended. The deceased was interred at the C. of E. Cemetery, and the services at the graveside were conducted by Rev. G. S. Hewitt.

He later got a job as stoker on that ship, and after arriving here stole an overcoat from a shipmate, and was found with a new suit of clothes which the police could at first find no owner for. Since the man's incarceration he discovered that Mr. L. F. Perlin, of Water Street, owned the property, that it had been taken from a case about to be shipped to Bonavista by the Prospero and was extracted from it on Bowling's premises by the crook alluded to. Mr. Cohen, Mr. Perlin's agent, missing it when he opened the package at Bonavista. The man was also caught attempting to steal from Mr. Samuel Joy's store on New Gower Street, and is now believed that he was one of a gang who held up a train in the provinces but reserved no loot, after which he made Newfoundland his objective, but soon found that our deaths are not as slow as the "queer" people of Canada or the States might imagine. If one such character could come in and operate here is it not possible that there are others around waiting a favourable opportunity to make a haul?

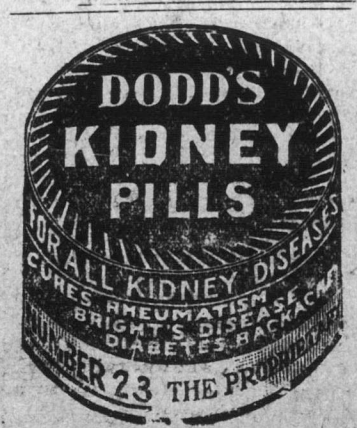

PEKIN, Today.

The Legation considers the end of the Manchur Dynasty imminent. There seems no hope of saving even a nominal throne. The Provinces north of the Yang Tse River are now declaring for a republic. The only force of Manchur troops large enough to cope with the local situation are at Pekin, but there are indications that the capital will be surrounded before many days by Chinese soldiers. Where the Court will take refuge is a question. The Government yesterday proposed to cut the Pekin and T'ien Tsin railway beyond Fen Tai to prevent additional troops arriving. It is understood that the British Minister protests on the ground that Britain is entitled to operate the railway, in the event of a suspension of service, in accordance with an old agreement, and consequently the line is not to be open. The Chinese report that the Kalgan railway is in the hands of the revolutionaries, while the rebel force is proceeding against the line in the direction of Pekin, at a point on the railway 70 miles from the Capital. All railway connections with the Capital are threatened.

CONSTANTINOPLE, To-day.

The War Office does not claim that Turkish troops have re-occupied Derna, Tripoli. An official telegram from there reports that the Turks won a big victory over the Italians, 500 of the latter being killed, 18 guns and quantities of ammunition and provisions being captured. The Porte has despatched a protest to the Powers against Italy's claim that she has annexed Tripoli and Cyrenaica, and setting forth Turkey's determination to resist. An Italian cruiser bombarded the town of Akabah, Arabia, on Sunday, sinking the Turkish gunboat, Italdy, lying in port. The crew escaped.

LISBON, To-day.

Cable News.

Special to Evening Telegram.

LONDON, Nov. 7. Secretary Grey took occasion in the Commons to-day to read the so-called sensational press homily on the danger of spreading false news offensive to the nations. Some of these days, he remarked, if false news continues to be reported, public resentment and excitement would get beyond control of the governments concerned. The incidents what called for these words were the alleged interview with the British Ambassador at Vienna and the alleged passage in the speech of Home Secretary McKenna, both strongly criticizing Germany. The minister explained that neither the Ambassador nor McKenna had been guilty of the alleged indiscretions, but before this was known in Germany, the incidents had been construed as a direct public international affront, which had been the cause of great resentment and called forth the request for explanations from the German government. The Minister continued that there was a tendency on the part of the newspapers of Britain and Germany to put improper constructions upon the actions of the British and German governments respectively.

PEKIN, Nov. 7. The report that the city has fallen into the hands of the revolutionists is without foundation. There was no fighting whatsoever here. There is no evidence that the Emperor or Regent fled. Prince Ching continues to act as Premier pending the arrival of Yuan Shi Kai. General Wu, a brilliant young military officer, recently appointed Governor of Shan Province, was assassinated to-day.

Special Evening Telegram.

LONDON, Nov. 7. The murder of General Wu, Governor of Shan Province, was brutal. He was asleep in his tent in the military encampment at Shikia-Chang when twenty Manchu soldiers rushed in past the guard and murdered him. When the officers and general staff arrested the Manchus, the latter stated that Wu had gone over to the revolutionary side and was betraying the Manchus.

LONDON, Nov. 7. Serious news is received daily from Angola, a Portuguese possession in Western Africa, of the revolt among the natives, which is spreading rapidly. They are burning and pillaging everything in their path. In the region of Caecere and Cassal the tribes attacked the settlements and massacred a minister and several Europeans, after first subjecting them to terrible tortures.

LONDON, Nov. 7. A Pekin despatch to the Times says: "Trustworthy information says the Court is paralyzed with fear, but will remain in Pekin, whatever happens. Many princesses and nobles and ladies have sought the protection of the foreign consulates."

The World's Longest Chimney.

Wales Has One Two Miles High, and a Brook Through It.

Wales has probably the longest chimney in the world. It is two miles high, and has a brook running through it. The chimney is connected with the copper works at Cwmavon, near Aberavon. This is how it came to be built. About 60 years ago the copper smoke from these works was the plague of the neighboring countryside. It settled upon and destroyed the grass for 20 miles round, while the sulphur and arsenic in the fumes affected the hoofs of cattle, causing gangrene. The company tried all

sorts of devices to remedy the trouble but in vain.

Finally, Mr. Robert Brenton, who was later engineer of the Sind Railway in India, solved the problem. The copper works are at the foot of a high steep mountain. Mr. Brenton constructed a flue or chimney running continuously from the base to about 100 feet above the summit, following the natural slope of the ground.
