Fish Families in Ocean Deep.

allows the steam to escape and pre-

When a disaster occurs at sea, and eople read that some leviathan vessel has gone down to the utmost depth of the ocean, imagination is stirred in wondering what conditions

surround her. According to Sir John Murphy, one of the greatest authorities on oceanography, the bottom is a desert oitchblack darkness, penetrating cold, and eternal silence. Worms, sea puddings, and coral polyps sluggishly crawl or sway in the almost currentess depths, and only two species o fish, both of them small, with much head and little body, have been found

The range of fishes in the sea is as though it were divided into layers, one above the other, and no fish can live above or below this layer. Thus many of the deeper fish-three-quarters of a mile below the surface—have peen found floating at the top. They had swallowed a fish as large or larger than themselves and its buoyancy had lifted them out of the strata to which they were accustomed.

almost impossible to know, because they are built to resist a tremendous pressure of water and when this ressure is released—as when the are brought to the surface in a net-sometimes the fish has burst—the organs are crushed beyond reconstruc

Similarly, if a fish of a higher stratim attacks a bottom fish in the neutral zone where both can live, andas sometimes happens—his teeth be come entangled so that he cannot le go, and he is dragged into deeper wa ter, he strangles instantly, for his breathing arrangements are of no use o him under the pressure of water in the lower strata of the sea. As a rule, however, the fish of the various

depths rarely feed on those above o below them. There have been brought to light an astonishing number of forms of fish and especially of prawns of a bril liantly red color, living in the ocean at a depth of 3,000 feet. But, aston ishing as it may seem, these brilliant ly-colored fish and prawns, instead of being conspicuous in the water at that depth, are nearly invisible, when almost any other color could be easi-

MEXICO CITY, To-day, Hostilities have been resumed with herceness around the Mexican capital, after the truce which lasted only a few hours. The armistice which was signed at 2 o'clock Sunday morning, signed at 2 o'clock Sunday morning, by representatives of both sides agreeing to suspend operations for twenty-four hours, was breken before noon. President Madero reiterated his refusal to comply with the suggestion that the Senply with the suggestion that the Senators resign. He declared that he was still able to dominate, and that given time he would crush the rebel forces. Diaz had not shown himself to be greatly in favor of an armistic but consented to it out of respect for the efforts of the American Ambassador and Minisers of the Powers to bring about cessation of hostilities until foreigners and other non-con batants, still within the zone of fightng, could be removed to a position of comparative safety. There is little actual suffering from lack of food or shelter within the city, but there is a vast amount of discomfort and great danger to those who remain.

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

London's Missing Thousands. About twelve months ago an old ady walked out of her house at Chiswick, and from that moment to this no trace of her has been found. She

has disappeared as completly as if the ground had opened up and swallowed her, and when application came | med in the northern floe. before the courts to presume death | the judge expressed his astonishment that a person could so completely disappear in the Metropolis. This, however, is but one of hun

dreds of cases of mysterious disappearance of which the public never hear, according to the report of the Commissioner of Police of the Motropolis. Readers will doubtless be amazed to learn that during 1911, 28,-958 people were reported to the London police as missing. Of these, 10,-416 were found and restored to friends by the police, while 18,075 were found by friends or returned home, leaving 467 still unaccounted for. Where they have gone, or whethr they are still alive, no one knows. unidentified bodies found by the police in 1911 accounts for some of them. And the misery and tragedy of Lonlon's underworld is illustrated by the grim figures in the report concerning suicide. There were no fewer than 625 suicides committed during the year mentioned, while 545 other people, 10 cases ONIONS. who attempted to put an end to their lives, were prevented from doing so by

the police. One gets an interesting insight into the multifarious duties of the police from this report, duties which "are yearly increasing in volume and in number," to quote the words of Sin Edward Henry, the Commissioner During the twelve months there were nearly 25,000 policemen on duty a fires, and the man in blue himself ex tinguished 264 conflagrations. He stopped 302 runaway horses, restored over 8,000 dogs to owners, and seized 37,392 other dogs which were found wandering about the streets.

Syllabus, is nothing more or ess than an effrontery to the constiuted regulations of our school sys-To protest against what may r may not be an "already burdensome curriculum" may be justifiable, but for a Board to refuse to recognize the prescribed Syllabus and to instruct the teachers under their control to disregard them, is, to say the least, audacious, and savoring of kicking over the traces.

By what standard, pray, will the pupils of this school be examined, now that the Board of control in their wisdom (?) have so injudiciously shut them out from the approved system? The C.H.E., whatever defects it might ossess, is, admittedly, the only source v which a uniform standard of ex-Board is going to run things accordng to their own little ideas? Chaos ndeed would soon reign supremely in our educational affairs if such actions are tolerated.

There is no doubt, whatever, in the nds of most people, that the combined intellects of these gentlemen who compose the C.H.E. sought to compile a syllabus which would meet he needs and be acceptable to the majority. That the Syllabus was napped out to suit the city colleges. as has been insinuated, we hesitate Boards and teachers alike to endeavor to adapt themselves to its provis ard set. If a uniform grading of education is to be maintained in the country. I submit, the curriculum of every individual school must be sin ilar, though the methods adopted for the study of subjects must of necessity differ in proportion to the intel-

lect and ability of each teacher. 



LONDON, Feb. 16. The others were obliged to stand aside. Com nander Evans denies there were any dissensions among the members of the expedition or that the supporting parties had any disagreement. He says Scott forbade searching parties leave the base to search for him.

ATHENS, Greece, Feb. 16. The Island of Crete was finally vacuated by the protecting powers. o-day, when the Greek flag was oisted amid enthusiastic demonstraions by the Cretans. The British cruiser Yarmouth landed a detachment of blue-jackets and marines in Suda Bay. There the men hauled own the flags of the Powers, which had flown since 1898, as well as that of Turkey, and handed them with full military honors to the consuls of the respective countries. Captain Oates walked out in the blizzard and practically committed suicide, because on account of his hands and feet being frozen, which was a drawback to the others, who died like English gentlemen, as Capt. sent an officer with a white flag demanding surrender. Oates sent back this reply: "We are here to fight not surrender." The Boers retired but the last shot fired wounded Oates in the thigh and he was invalided

MEXICO CITY, Feb. 16. The rebels obtained their first personal revenge when they burned the private house of President Madero located at the corner of Berlin and Liverpool Streets. It was a handsome structure, and, since the inumbency of Madero, had become one of the show places of the capital. The rebels had driven a detachment of the federal forces to retreat on Barcelona Street. Only the servants occupied the house, since the members of the President's family took refuge in the Japanese-legation. The febels entered the building, and carried off whatever took their fancy. A moment later the building was in flames. As the fire mounted, the cracking of cartridges revealed the fact that the structure had been practically an arsenal. The third Secretary of the American Embassy, Mr. Tennant, accompanied by a messenger in an automobile, was stopped in the streets and robbed.

The Father of Shorthand.

Just one hundred years ago-on January 4th, 1812, to be precise, Sir Isaac Pitman, the "father of modern shorthand-writing," was born. He was a Wiltshire boy-Trowbridge being his native place, and his father was first a factory overseer and after wards a cloth manufacturer.

Young Isaac Pitman started his working life as a clerk, and from that he went to teaching in small parish schools. In one of his schools Wotton-under-Edge, Gloucestershire, he introduced shorthand as a subject and published a book which he called 'Stenographic Sound Hand."
