

According to recent messages, the British Parliament is being asked to provide for Three million soldiers and a quarter of a million sailors Even for the Navy this is an addition of 100.000 men to the 150.000 standard before the war. But in the case of the Army the increase is almost fourfold what was considered the warfooting of the Army before the War. The fact that Germany and Austria has been kept busy by France, Russia, Belgium and Servia and the British Expeditionary force, and that the British Navy has maintained a supremacy at sea has given time for extensive recruiting, training and organizing, so that within six months of the commencement of the war, quite a formidable British army even on the continental scale has been brought into being. Apparently the voluntary system has been highly successful for little is heard now in the Press of the need of conscription. Indeed, a million men outside of military age, have voluntarily organized themselves, paid their own way, equipped them selves at their own expense, and force ed a reluctant recognition from th War Office, which in giving recognition to them, insisted that they should make no calls on the War Office fo money for any purposes. These m are training themselves for Home De fence. It is a splendid tribute to the spirit of voluntaryism. We are gla to find that Mr. Rowell, K.C., in his address at Halifax advocated that Canada should respond man for man the day with the Old Country. His estimate was that it would call for an enrol ment and training of 300,000. His es estimate is however much below the mark. If Canada is to provide for men for the army at the rate Britai is providing, it will call for a Canad ian Army of at least 500,000 men, and even this would leave out of accoun any response for the Navy, and no reckoning any voluntary organization like the Home Defence Army, for which there is no call in Canada. is, however, pleasing to note the strong advocacy by Mr. Rowell of a man for man response by Canada to put itself nearer on a part with the Home Country.
