In last night's air raid, one bomb ell outside a hospital, another smashed through a theatre, and still another hit a retail store in which a number of girls were sleeping. Notwithstanding the moonlight, nothing ould be seen of the raiders, although their engines could be heard overhead. That they were invisible was perhaps due to a slight haze, which owever, was insufficient to obscure the moon. The raiders were contantly shelled by anti-aircraft guns and several British machines took the air to attack the invaders. The streets were practically deserted at he time of the raid, it being long afer theatre hours. The few late street cars that were running were without ights, or stripped. A message from the southeastern district says that apparently the invaders crossed the North Sea in three successive groups, and that all were severely shelled both arriving and returning.

The Chatham district for the first ime experienced an air attack on Monday night, when one or more combs fell on a section of the Royal Barracks, killing 107 bluejackets outright and wounding 86 others. Four combs in all fell about the barracks but two were harmless, and in fact eavy toll of life, the damage in the whole area was insignificant. The ammocks and a majority of the men were asleep at the time of the attack. The first indication of the presence of air raiders was the sound of engines overhead. 



British Monitors.

Aid in Shelling of Trieste Defences-Effort, if Successful, May be Em-

ployed in Attack on German Coast. Washington, Aug. 27.-The first innation that the British navy is assisting in the great Italian offensive was received at the Italian embassy to-day. The cablegram indicated that combined fleet of British and Italian monitors, carrying 15 or 16 inch guns, have been piloted through the mined Adriatic and are subjecting the principal fortifications on the Hermada, the mountain range which proects Trieste, to a terrific bombard.

The cablegram, which was partially deleted by the censor, indicates that the monitors are lying out of range of the guns on the shore batteries and are throwing an indirect fire over the hills thereby dislodging the guns which were expected to hold back the Italian forces.

Because of the altitude of the Hermada, it will be impossible for the Austrians to haul large siege guns to positions where they might be available against the bombarding fleet. A number of Austrian battleships are lying in Fiume harbor behind carefully constructed nets and other safeguards. They may be sent out to fight the monitors in a last effort to save Trieste.

The British and Italian fleet is being protected from submarine attacks by destroyers while super aeroplanes of the latest Italian type are protecting them from aerial attack and are directing the long range fire.

In the event that the monitor attack on Trieste accomplishes the destruction of the mountain fortifications and forces the city to fall before the Italians, it is believed that the allied navies may attempt a similar attack upon the German coast.
