The next trace of him is at Hendaye, on the Spanish frontier, where, according to the indictment, he robbed the niece of his hotel keeper of her dowry. In 1893 he is found at Bordeaux. There he made the acquaintance of his first wife (who was called at the trial) and vanished with her to Buenos Ayres, where she played at a music-hall. It was at that time that Bolo called himself by, in fact signed his wife's contract with, the names of Bolo de Grange-Neuve. Shortly afterwards he was arrested at Valparaiso, and his wife gave up all she possessed to go bail for him. He displayed his gratitude by abandoning her immediately he regained his freedom. There is no further mention of him until 1902, when he was found again at Lyons as representative of a well-known brand of champagne and liqueur. He played a peculiar part in the Champagne riots, and in 1903 he went to Paris and there made the acquaintance of the rich widow of a Bordeaux wine merchant, whom he married bigamously in 1905. With his wife's fortune Bolo at once launched himself into very big business, and distributed his wife's money in every corner of the world-in Venezuela, Colombia, Cuba, in Champagne, in Switzerland and Spain. Not one of these enterprises was successful. To fill his empty coffers, Bolo, who had been made a pasha by the ex-Khedive of Egypt, lent himself willing to the agents of Germany. His role was to prepare France for a separate peace at the expense of England, and the means to be employed was the Press.

### The Red Terror.

Indescribable anarchy and misery reigns in Russia with Petrograd as the red capital given over to a reign of terror. Cholera is raging in the city, where every suffering that disease, lawlessness, and poverty can generate is exacting its toll from the hapless population. Wholesale imprisonment and execution is the order of the day, the Bolshevik regime resorting to power. According to the "New York World's" representative at Petrograd, quoted by the "Daily Express," the most awful figure of the Terror, the man with the most murder on his soul, is the present Extraordinary Commissioner against Counter-Revolution and Sabotage, a dapper little blond Lett named Peters, who lived in England so long that he speaks Russian with an English accent. He was known and liked best by the American correspondents in Russia because he seemed more cultivated than the rest. Few of them had occasion to rouse in him the fierce class hatred. They did not know the mean, crouched little man, with his pale eyes filled with venom, who now sits in the Kremlin signing away daily the lives of scores of men he never saw. Let anyone be declared a counter-revolutionary by a member of the Soviet and Peters orders him to be shot, often without sending him before the other fanatic. Krylenko, the president of the revolutionary tribunal, Peters now has absolute power of life and death over anybody in Russia. A neutral who visited him lately on a number of occasions to plead for the lives of innocent people told me that Peters has become a mere furious little animal, signing death warrants all day. often not looking to see what he is signing. During one visit the neutral noticed he signed an order to shoot 72 officers without even glancing down at the paper.-London Times.



Germany's Losses. From the day when Germany, vic lorious over France, held in undisputad possession the military control of Europe, the German Empire has never ceased to display its "shining armor" and rattle the sabre in its scabbard; while the "mailed fist" has been in evidence on every possible occasion. Following the Franco-Prussian War, Germany's military prominence was indisputable, but not content with this, the armaments of the Empire were being continuously added to, while behind all the increases of her land forces, there was being built a huge German fleet, which was to, some day, challenge the supremacy of

Britain on the seas. When all this preparation for world dominion had been completed to the satisfaction of the German rulers, and when the day for which they had so long waited, had dawned the button at Potsdam was pressed and the German fury let loose on a world unprepared, unready, and unexpecting. The war for the subjection and plunder of nation was begun. The low envy of great nations with a malicious desire to injure them, which Germany had held for more than forty years was given free vent, and was shown at every step. This envy and malice had even set itself to destroy the Christian religion and replace it with the worship of Germany's own old heathen war gods. And for four years it almost Europe's men had gone down before the armed hordes of the German Kaiser, and for a time it looked as Prussianism was to be the dominating power. But it was not to While in the zenith of its power, the counter blow came swiftly and within four short months, the power and might of the hosts of darkness was shattered by the armies of light, and Germany stood naked and a suppliant before that civilization she had so long outraged and treated contumaciously. To-day finds her stripped of her possessions, her Emperor fugitive, her armies defeated, her navy surrendered to the conquerors, and factional strife and disorder within her borders. Who may sum up the losses of an Empire which has practically lost everything? Still it may be interesting to present some statistics for everyone wants to know the extent of the losses which Germany has sustained. First and chiefly, the German nation lost the war, and los it hopelessly beyond redemption. Secondly the German fleet, consisting of hattleships, cruisers, destrovers, submarines, steamed forth from their home bases and surrendered themselves, in entirety, to the hated British. Never again will the man o' war ensign of Germany float above them. Either they will be destroyed utterly, or apportioned out among the Allies. The trident which was to be wrested from Britain, remains more firmly in

her grasp, and her supremacy on the

seas is greater than ever. This yield-

ing up of property represents dollars,

but what of the millions of German

lives lost, for which no doilars can

pay. Up to the last of October, ac-

cording to figures given out by Berlin,

Germany lost one million, six hundred

thousand men in killed alone, and the

lists at that time had not been com-

thousand missing. This latter num-

dead. In addition to the casualties

which is doubtless far short of the

truth. Therefore the total admitted

loss in man power by the Germans

is six million, three hundred and sixty

thousand, with every probability that the total loss exceeded these figures,

running nearer seven millions, if not

more. The enormous loss of life con-

tained in the above lists will never be repaired, or at any rate not for

enturies to come. The war debt incurred by Germany amounts to some forty billions of dol-lars, and is owed almost entirely to the German poeple, who it is needless say are not likely to receive full payment, and they will be exceeding

ly lucky if they get any of it back. The loss of the German Empire's overseas trade, during the four years, totalled a sum approximately thirteen billions, a loss which is likely to coninue for some time as it will take Jermany years and years to get back ven a portion of her pre war foreign usiness. In August 1914, Germany wned four million tons of ocean going shipping. To-day she has, only by sufferance of the Allies, but a scant half million tons of small vessels. The German Colonies covering over one million square miles of territory, with population set at fifteen millions, have been taken by the Allies, most

all of these falling into British hands. In addition in Europe she loses Alsace and Lorraine, and will undoubtedly be compelled to give up Schleswig, Posen, Silesia and the port of Danzig. The productions of the German Empire have fallen short enormously, and to add to her material losses there is the moral loss of her reputation and that of the respect of the world, which nevermore will recognize Germany as anything but what she has proven herself to be-the pariah of the nations. History does not record so

great a loss to any nation, in all its



GERMAN PRISON CAMP. London.-A recent article in the Ypres during the early part of the war, was transferred in June, 1915. to the camp at Merseburg, and was, tate. His death on July 28 was re ported in the official list by the Ger

Noting a paragraph in a German paper, the British Foreign Office de manded a full explanation of Sullivan's death. The reply was that the Englishmen "were unwilling to go to work before six o'clock, but after be ing told two or three times all went except John Sullivan, who at last attacked the guard, trying to snatch his weapon from him. The guard ferced by necessity, fired on Sullivan

and he died on the spot." The truth is now reported on oath by two repatriated British N. C. O.'s, fellow prisoners of war with Sullivan. "On the 17th July," says the principal witness, "we were sent from our laager to a farm. We were told by the captain of our company before leaving the laager that we should only be employed on very light work from a.m. to 6 p.m. On the first morning we were roused at 4 o'clock and marched to a cornfield, where we worked until 6 p.m., when we marched back to the farm in an exhausted condition. This went on every day until the 28th July, when, being roused from our beds at 4 a.m., we informed the German sentry that as the captain of the company had told us that the work would be from 6 a.m., we should not commence any earlier. The sentry and another soldier fixed their bayonets. The senior senry in charge then struck me a brutal blow in the face, so the remainder of the prisoners thought it better to proceed to work and filed out leaving me alone with No. 3749. Pte. John Sullivan. Irish Guards. Pte. Sullivan had been badly wounded. The two sentries kicked and beat us with their rifle out of the passage as far as the sec ond landing, where Pte. Sullivan halted, trying to explain that it was im possible for him to work with

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



During the half century, 1850-1900, the hours of labor were reduced from 12 and 14 to 8 and 10 per day, while walabor effected this remarkable formation in the well-being of the king class. 


