Protection Not Approved
by Canadian Farmers.

Manufacturers Should Contribute
to the Treasury Directly--Terror-
ism in Ireland Must be Broken
Up--Lloyd George Introduces
Double Policy--Three Counties
Under Martial Law.

WANT TO ELIMINATE PROTECTION

WINNIPEG, Dec. 10.—Our eyes are set on the goal of elimination of protection as a principle in our fiscal policy. We propose to get it as easy as possible for our industries to adjust themselves to it. During this period revenues will of course come from tariff and there is no reason why customs duties cannot continue as in Great Britain, to afford a very considerable portion of our revenue, and if need be the principle of excess tax can be applied in this way, compelling the home manufacturer who enjoys protection, to contribute his share to the National Treasury. Above was the keynote of a speech made to-day by Hon. T. A. Crerar, leader of the United Farmers Organization of Canada before the Canadian Council of Agriculture here.

DETERMINED TO BREAK UP TERRORISM

LONDON, Dec. 10.—In referring to the intention of the Government to declare martial law in Ireland Premier Lloyd George said in the House of Commons to-day that he regarded the "men who we know were promoting murder have not given any indications that they are prepared to surrender upon terms this country could possibly accept, consistent with its self respect or with a prospect of enduring peace in Ireland, and the Government is determined to break up these terrorists who are more or less organized because otherwise it is not thought possible for Ireland to recognize that independence which is essential for peace."

SAFE CONDUCT TO SINN FEIN MEMBERS

LONDON, Dec. 10.—The British Government has decided to give safe conduct to the Sinn Fein members of the House of Commons, so that they may meet the Government to discuss the Irish situation, Premier Lloyd George announced to-day in the House. Safe conduct would be granted, the Premier said, to those members who had been involved in serious crime. Martial law is to be proclaimed in parts of Ireland, Lloyd George announced. In his announcement of the "double policy" of the Government the Premier declared that under martial law persons found possessing arms after a certain date, or unauthorized wearing of uniforms, would be liable to the death penalty.

EMBARGO FOR ONE YEAR ONLY

WASHINGTON, Dec. 10.—An amendment of the Johnson Immigration Bill limiting embargo on immigration to one year instead of two was adopted to-day by the House.

WILL MAKE SEPARATE PEACE

NEW YORK, Dec. 10.—One of the first acts of the new administration will be to "make" peace with Germany and "repeal" the war powers of the President, Senator Champ Clark, declared here to-day in an address before the Annual Convention of International German Manufacturers.

MORAN DEFEATS BECKETT

LONDON, Dec. 10.—Frank Moran, of Pittsburg, knocked

out Joe Beckett, English heavy-weight pugilist, in the second round in the Albert Hall here to-night.

BUSINESS QUIET IN CANADA

WINNIPEG, Dec. 10.—Business conditions throughout Canada continue quiet, and the public is still showing little inclination to buy in volume, apparently waiting to see if prices will not work still lower with the result that both wholesale and retail trade is small for this time of year, states the weekly report on trade conditions issued by the Canadian Credit Men's Trust Association.

SPOILING THE RACE

BOSTON, Dec. 10.—Plans are now well advanced for the schooner Mayflower, to be built financed and manned by Bostonians to compete in the International Schooner Races off Halifax next year.

AN "IF" IN IT

ST. JOHN, N.B., Dec. 10.—If docking facilities can be obtained on the eastern side of the harbor here the Canada Steamship Line will open direct bi-monthly service between this port and St. John's Newfoundland, for the winter months at least, according to an announcement made to-day by Thomas Nagle of Nagle and Wigmore. Nagle said the service would be practically a continuation of the service carried on between St. John's and Montreal in summer.

MARTIAL LAW IN THREE COUNTIES

DUBLIN, Dec. 10.—Martial law was proclaimed to-day from Dublin Castle in the City and County of Cork, City and County of Limerick and Counties of Tipperary and Kerry.

DELEGATES CANT AGREE

WASHINGTON, Dec. 10.—An alignment of the delegates of France and Japan against those of Great Britain, Italy and the United States at the International Communication Conference in session here for allotment of seized German cables has brought about an impasse, again threatening to dissolve the conference, according to officials of the conference.

APPLICATION GRANTED

OTTAWA, Dec. 10.—The Minister of Labor received an application for a board of conciliation to deal with the dispute between employers of the Canadian National Railway and the management of the system arising out of the new famous "Hanna order." The application for the Board was received at the Department of Labor to-day and it was granted without delay. Steps are now being taken to appoint three men to act on the board.

ENGINEERS RETURN.—By Thursday's express, engineers Ring and Gardner, who had brought the steam yacht Carmen to Port aux Basques from this port, returned to town. The Carmen, which had been used by the Government on the northern coastal service, proved unsuitable for the work and was returned to her owners.

C.M.B.C. Wrestling Tournament.

A large number of people manifested their continued interest in that classical game, wrestling, by attending the tournament held last night in the C.L.B.C. Armory under the auspices of the C.L.B.C. Athletic Association. It is many years since the sporting public of St. John's has had an opportunity to witness an exhibition of this kind, and those who did attend were not disappointed. During the evening the audience was also treated to an exhibition of boxing by Messrs. F. Marshall and A. Martin, and Stokers Sparkes and Luff of the Marconi Station. The wrestling bouts, which was run in heats, proved very interesting and also provided plenty of excitement. The winners of the various events and the prizes are as follows:

- Featherweight Championship—Prize gold medal; won by T. Hall.
- Welterweight Championship—Prize, silver cup, won by A. Hammond; 2nd prize, gold medal, won by H. Adams.
- Bantamweight Championship—Prize gold medal; won by C. Stone.
- Lightweight Championship—Prize, silver cup; won by A. Hennebury.
- Middleweight Championship—1st prize, silver cup; won by A. Hammond; 2nd prize, gold medal; won by A. Martin.

The prizes were presented by Lt. (Rev.) E. H. Fletcher, Chairman of the Athletic Association, who complimented the winners and competitors in general on the very fine exhibition they had given, and he expressed the hope that last night's tournament would be the precursor of several others during the coming year. The C.L.B.C. Athletic Association is to be congratulated on providing such an enjoyable night's entertainment for the sporting public.

Football in Armour.

The American footballer clothes himself with armour more varied than any knight of the days of the Crusades.

First of all, he proceeds to bandage any part of his body that may be specially weak or liable to accident. Around each ankle or wrist he winds a narrow bandage of silk or cotton, binding it as tightly as is consistent with comfort and flexibility, in order to prevent dislocation of the joint.

His knickers are strongly made of stout fustian, moleskin, or some similar tough fabric, with a thick, quilted lining of cotton-wool or some padding equally light and elastic. In addition to this quilting, the knees, hips, and other vulnerable parts are further protected by thick padding.

The jersey or jacket is of similar material, sleeveless, and thickly lined and padded to protect specially vulnerable parts of the body.

Inside his shoes, which are entirely made of the best leather, and which lace high, he wears anklets of leather, and over his stockings he adjusts a pair of strong shin-guards of leather, strengthened by pieces of cane, and attached securely around the calves by straps.

But the most fearsome part of our footballer's armour still remains to be donned. To protect his nose, he encases it in a shield of indiarubber, perforated to allow free access to the air; and to the nose-shield is usually attached a similar shield, also perforated, which is gripped by the teeth and protects the mouth. Each ear is protected by a circular piece of leather, perforated and padded, and kept in position by a strap which goes round the head.

Then the knight of the football walks on to the field prepared to do or die!

barrel; Turnips \$3.50; Cabbage 5 cents per pound; Beets, Parsnips and Carrots 4 cents per pound.

Where other years a numerous fleet of craft was engaged in prosecuting the shore fishery, this season but two or three boats are making daily trips to the grounds about Channel. The price offered is not attractive or compensating, hence men are seeking other avenues of employment whenever possible.

A small number of men is yet working at the Port aux Basques new Freight Shed, and it is doubtful if

the structure will be completed by the end of the year.

There is no marked improvement in conditions along the coast. East of Channel, coal and flour are scarce at many points and people do not know whether there will be any adequate importations of these necessary articles or not.

TRINITY.

I heard a man say, a few days ago, that if he had to build a dozen dwelling houses he would plan them square, with a cottage roof. He pointed out what he considered several positive, and negative advantages of such a plan, illustrated by a house or two recently built in Trinity. Then he ventured a prophecy,—that it will be the standard plan for dwelling houses in Newfoundland, in the not far distant future. His remarks brought to my memory some words of the wise man who wrote the book Ecclesiastes:—"The thing that hath been is that which shall be, and that which is done is that which shall be done, and there is no new thing under the sun."

Should this man's prophecy be fulfilled at any time in Trinity, it would be only what the wise man implied, viz., history repeating itself. The square, cottage-roof building of our forefathers was the aristocratic building of a hundred years ago in Trinity, as it was, I presume, in other parts of the country. To them it was nothing new, for it was but a reproduction on their part, of many of the buildings in the old land, so familiar to them in their boyhood days.

The first St. Paul's Church of Trinity, that stood in the middle of the old Churchyard, where Rev. John Clinch's tomb is to-day, was a square building with a cottage-roof. So was the little Methodist Church on the old site, and also the "Mission House," that stood where the present Methodist Church stands to-day. Such was the house of Mr. William Tilley, that stood in the garden at the south end of Mr. Joseph Morris' house to-day. Such was the house of Mr. Robert Bayly, where Capt. Flander's house is; and such was the house of Mr. Abel Hiscock to the westward of Bayly's Hill. Such was the house of Mr. Doherty, at Hog's Nose. Such was the house of Mr. William Hunt, in Fisher's Cove, and such was that of Tailor Dooling, that crowned the top of Thack's Hill. There were others, but the only one left to-day, is that which was built by old Capt. Ash, in the centre of the town, and, to me, it is the very embodiment of solid comfort. I have been told that the one objection to a cottage roof is—it has no attic. Whilst on the other hand I have also been told, that an attic encourages the accumulation of many things that should either be given away or destroyed. Hence, the freedom to build as one likes best, is something to be thankful for.

One of our latest, and most interesting local, business enterprises in Trinity, and one that is steadily finding its way into the practical side of our daily life, is what is known as the Grant-Palmer Motor Co. It had its inception in 1917, when Mr. Samuel Grant undertook to light his house and shop by electricity, generated by a local plant, supplied by the Gray Motor Co. of Detroit, Mich., U.S.A. of that number, three houses and two shops are satisfactorily supplied.

The company then secured the agency for Marine and Stationary Engines, and in order to continue a practical interest in the engines after they were sold,—it became necessary to establish a repair shop. Then with the coming of the Ford Car to Trinity, a Ford station was added, and equipped with everything necessary for ordinary repairs to that make of car. Mr. Grant is a man with a vision, and away and beyond the use of a car for personal pleasure, he saw in it something that the general public had only to see, and enjoy in operation, in order to adopt it for practical use in daily locomotion.

He began with one car, and advertised it for passenger traffic. The next year the requirements demanded two, and recently a third has been added, with another for winter use in view. They are all kept busy and the prospects are good for a steady and a profitable increase in the business. When Mr. Grant leaves Trinity in the summer for the fishery at Blanc Sablon, he takes the dynamo with him for use there; and any respectable codfish, no doubt considers it an honor to be split and cared for by electric light.

The repair shop is limited in equipment just now, although it looks after some bad fractures, and seriously twisted parts. A modern drill and lathe are on the memo sheet, to be added in the near future. When the cash on hand warrants it. In addition to several other practical features, the company being, now in a position to repair the jump spark, and the make-and-break coil of the marine engine, constitutes it a valuable institution to the fishermen. Mr. J. Clouston, so well known in Newfoundland as a successful experimenter in canned preparations of our staple and other fish, was a guest at

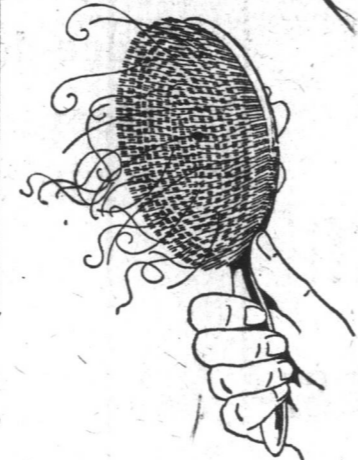

The salmon fishery to date has not been so valuable to our fishermen as it is capable of being made. With new markets opening up all the time, and good prices obtainable, the cold storage plant means a good deal to the fishermen, and it is now up to them to co-operate, and thus to make the most of it.

TIME BUDGETS.



"I can't see where on earth the time goes. The days simply fly by without my getting half I want done."
"I seem to be busy from morning until night and yet I don't seem to accomplish much."
"I must write those letters, but I simply can't find time."
How often one hears complaints like the above. "How to live on 24 hours a day is the next most difficult problem to 'How to live on an income that won't buy half what it used to.'"

Have You Looked Over Each Item?
And the only way really to solve the problem is to go at it systematically, scrutinizing each item of expenditure with a judicial mind. Most of us have tried that on our financial problems, but how about our time one?"

Has the lady who said, "I can't see where on earth my time goes to," ever inspected her daily time expenditure and found out just where it did go? Probably not.

Or else she would have unquestionably learned "something to her advantage" as the delightful old persons used to read.

Where Some Time Does Disappear.
She would perhaps have discovered that the 15 minutes she spends herself as spending over the morning paper, is really nearer 40 minutes. She would very likely have found that several hours a week of that mysteriously disappearing time goes into telephone conversations. She would perhaps have been astonished to discover how much time the making of elaborate desserts, takes; or how many hours she spent shopping for an article that she ultimately got only a few cents cheaper than she might have bought it at the first place she looked; or just how much more time it takes to do her hair an elaborate way than it would in a simpler fashion; or how much time some long tolerated household inconvenience eats up.

Now, mind you, I am not condemning any of these usages of time. That is a matter one must decide for one-

self. I am just suggesting that it is interesting to know what one is spending one's time for, so that one may consider the whole situation and make up one's mind whether one is getting the most possible pleasure and profit out of one's time income.
Hard to Tell, Sometimes.
It isn't always easy to decide this. In my own life there is a problem which I have often faced but never satisfactorily disposed of. I know where too much of my time goes—into sleep. I always feel rebuked when I read the Psalmist's reproachful "Yet a little slumber, yet a little folding of the hands to sleep." And still it does seem to me that that extra hour (I want nine hours) adds to my efficiency in my waking hours. Every now and then I rearrange my time budget and cut that hour out. And then I get tired and put it in again. With the help of mental science I hope some time to cut it out altogether and be more like Solomon's ideal woman who "Riseth also while it is yet night."
But there are other ways in which I have increased my time efficiency by stopping small leaks, and I have found the results well worth the effort. Try it—if you haven't already.

Fleur-de-Lis.

The Fleur-de-lis is a heraldic device in armorial bearings of many countries, but is especially associated with the royal house of France. The design is based on the white lily, and shows three flowers joined together, the central one erect, and the other two bending outward. The shield of the Kings of France was blue, powdered with golden fleur-de-lis. The standard of France in the days of the Empire bore the device, but it has been abandoned since the days of the Republic. Some people think the fleur-de-lis represents the white iris, the "flower de luxe" of Shakespeare. In Roman and Gothic architecture it is a favorite ornament.

"Snow Widow" Bride at 90.

Mrs. John McKenzie, aged 90, the "Snow Widow," and the idol of British Columbia Cree Indians, is to become a bride for the fourth time. Mrs. McKenzie lost three husbands, all trappers. Two were frozen to death. The third died of starvation. It was while the latter lay dying that Mrs. McKenzie's most tragic adventure took place. They were camped a hundred miles north of Stanley Mission. In the dead of winter game became so scarce that with their two babies they faced starvation. Then the husband fell ill. Only food would

save him. With the two babies, one nursing, Mrs. McKenzie started the hundred mile trip with a famished dog team. Tucking the babies in the sled, she fastened the harness about her own waist and continued ten miles. Then one baby fell ill and died. She wrapped a blanket about the tiny body, placed it deep in the snow and out of the twigs of a pine tree fashioned a pitiful little cross, which was placed over the spot. Then she continued the journey. On her arrival food was hurried to her husband, but he was dead. She became the "Snow Widow."

As the North Sees It.

(Twillingate Sun.)
Three insolvencies last week are reported from St. John's, they being Robert Moulton & Sons, of Burgeo, John E. Lake, of Fortune, and Ephraim Inkpen, of Burin. The strange part, and at once the serious part, lies in the fact that all are solvent on paper. As is pointed out the whole financial structure of this Colony upset by partisanship and Government interference especially in the question of codfish exportations and sugar, is dangerously like a house of cards, and one never knows when with the collapse of some, the whole fabrication will not tumble in pieces. Artificial attempts that may be made to bolster some members of the structure only lead to suspicion and suspense; and at present business—beyond the favored few—knows not what to expect next.

One of the worst financial problems that is going to face anyone will be that confronting Minister of Finance Brownrigg, who is going to spend the next half year on Uneasy Street. The finances of the country—that is its revenue income which is its main income—has fallen so steadily as to be alarming, and the reckless expenditure of the Government of which its last most reckless act has apparently been the guaranteeing to the St. John's merchants—or some of them—a certain proportion of the price on their fish, has run up an expenditure that must be positively alarming.

Evidently—judging from the telegraphed reports of the Port Union Convention—Mr. Coaker sees the three big seas coming, and is hastening to batten down to meet them; as he asks to be relieved from the Department of Fisheries, and the active Presidency of the F.P.U. retaining an

honorary life presidency and the management of the Port Union ramifications.

Sugar is now 8 1/2 cents in New York, yet the F.C.B. is continuing the sale of high-priced sugar till the end of February. It is now said that a considerable sugar has been moving the F.C.B. must import new sugar to fill up. That is 8 1/2 cent sugar in New York will be imported by the Government and sold for 24! What has been done by the F.C.B. heretofore is gentle compared with this outrage. Do good supporters call this profiteering, or what is its name?

Preparing for Big Herring Pack.

Northern Fisheries Co. Will Go Into Business on Large Scale.
The Northern Fisheries Co. with headquarters at Pilley's Island, are preparing to carry out an ambitious industrial programme the coming year. When the war ended in 1919 on the advice of Mr. E. W. Roberts, the manager, the company very wisely refrained from going on with the business of herring packing. What happened in this industry has vindicated the wisdom of their action.

Now, however, they see great possibilities ahead and their barrel factory having been completed, they will start in making barrels for Scotch pack on a large scale. Their factory and material are in good condition and they will enter the business in 1921 with an equipment equal to the Scotch herring merchants with whom they will have to compete.

Mr. Roberts will shortly go to Scotland to engage some capable herring skippers experienced in fishing after the Scotch methods, and familiar with all the details of herring packing. He hopes to be able to employ a large number of men in Pilley's Island next season and to have one or two small steamers.

The Northern Fisheries Co. is in an advantageous position inasmuch as they own a saw mill, a stave mill and a barrel factory, besides a wharf, tramway and packing plant. They also propose later on to have cold storage, smoke house and canning factory. They propose to import tins in sections and have them soldered at their own place for canning lobsters, salmon and sardines.

This, however, is by no means the full scope of their ambitions as they intend to have a pulp mill where pulp will be manufactured for export to the United States, where there is an unlimited market just now. The wood for this industry can be obtained from the timber lands owned by Mr. Roberts, adjacent to Pilley's Island.

Already a company for his work is organized and capital subscribed for the purpose. Indeed it looks as if Pilley's Island is on the eve of a great industrial boom. The pyrites mine developed there will be a great help to sulphite production in conjunction with pulp operations and will save the pulp company thousands of dollars.—Trade Review.

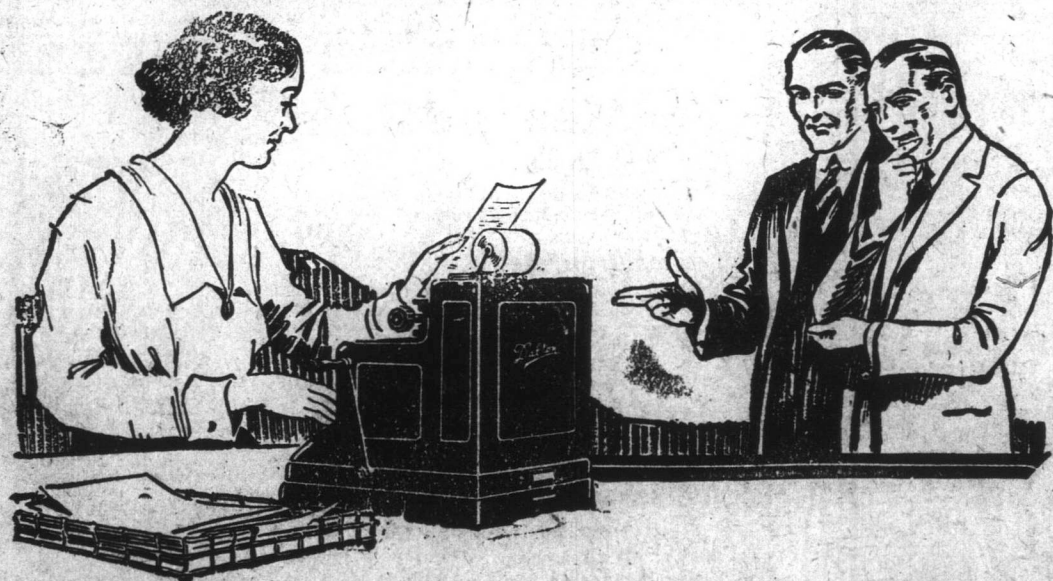

Premier Assails Liberal Opponents on Irish Reprisals.

London, Dec. 3.—Bonar Law, proposing the health of Premier Lloyd George at a complimentary dinner given to the latter at the Constitution Club tonight, paid a glowing tribute to the Prime Minister, referring particularly to his hopefulness and buoyancy during the last two years of war. On one occasion only it occurred that this buoyancy was absent.

"I was the first of his colleagues whom he saw after the German offensive of March 21, 1918," said Bonar Law. "It seemed to me then for a moment that although neither his courage nor determination had diminished, there was no less of buoyancy, but within half an hour he had composed and dispatched a telegram to President Wilson to the effect that we were up against the crisis of our fate; that it did not matter what America did next year or six months hence, but if it was to be of any use it must be done then as that was the only way it could render effective aid, by placing men in Europe to fight side by side with Frenchmen and Englishmen. I hope it will be long remembered to President Wilson's credit that the affirmative answer came the same day, and it was the knowledge that these men were to be counted upon that was one of the vital facts in turning the tide of that hour."

Lloyd George responding to Bonar Law's toast, defended the necessity of a coalition government during the war and since. He said:

"The times have changed, problems have changed and methods of dealing with them must be changed as well, and men who do not realize that are not fit for responsibility in a great epoch. Countries where it is not realized have had griefs. America,

where they have not signed peace with Germany, and ever Greece are illustrations of the same truth.

"The perils were so great, the difficulties so enormous, the burdens were so heavy that no single party, however powerful, could cope with or carry them. That is why we came to the conclusion that you had to get both political parties concentrating their energies, their talent and their zeal to pull the country through the greatest trial with which it ever has been confronted, and we succeeded."

The Premier then accused his political rivals of using reprisals as a manoeuvre to get rid of him. He said:

"There is a well organized, highly subsidized murder campaign going on in Ireland against the men who are discharging the elementary duties of civilization in that country. One of those duties is the guardianship of order, security of life and property. While the police are discharging those elementary duties of civilization and carrying out tasks which are most difficult they are entitled to the support of every honest citizen, Liberal as well as Conservative.

"What is happening? I am really ashamed to say that men belonging to the party I belong to should be attacking these people, holding them up to obloquy, not only of this country, but of the whole civilized world. Hundreds of policemen and soldiers have been killed treacherously, but there is no map issued by the London Liberal Federation to mark the spots where they fell in defending liberty. The map is for the murderers.

"Cotton warehouses are burned, with material which would provide employment and food none too plentiful now—for thousands in this country, and a poor boy who tried to give information that would extinguish the flames is shot like a dog in the streets. I have not yet heard of a leaflet issued by Abingdon Street to denounce the murderers of unarmed men done to

death in the presence of pleading wives.

"I have not yet heard that Sir John Simon had gone to Oxford to denounce that infamy, where men who had been shot, lying wounded on a lonely, dreary hillside road in Ireland, were mutilated while wounded and defenceless. I have not yet heard of a demonstration to be organized in Albert Hall to denounce that brutality.

"No. Their denunciation, their time, money, talents and enthusiasm have been devoted to holding up to execration the victims and not their assassins. Believe me, this is not liberalism.

Paired by French Attitude.

"Have they reckoned on the effect abroad of all this? I am sorry to see the French journals publishing this attack on England. That French journals should send men to Ireland to scavenge among the people who conspired to destroy France at its darkest hour in 1918—for material to slander the nation that stood by them in their darkest days and lost 600,000 lives in France to defend the liberties of that country.

"I believe Frenchmen will agree with us in saying they are ashamed of all this. But it is not merely effect abroad—in France, in America, where you have always a certain type of journal which gives heavy headlines to any attack on Great Britain and never prints the reply. Have they thought of the effect on the murder gang itself? They are encouraged, they are stimulated, they are supported by this action.

"The real danger is the encouragement that will be given to the forces of disorder by the appearance that this country is weakening. It is not you can turn this Government out, but as long as it is there, we mean to exhaust every resource and power we possess to stamp out this thing. The country that made such sacrifices during the war, that won such triumphs, that showed such endurance, is not going to be beaten by a gang of murderers at our own door. We are doing it in the interests of Great Britain, yes, but we are doing it in the interests of Ireland. It is not that you won't get peace in Ireland. You won't get consideration of the best method of establishing peace until you destroy the terror.

"I was asked by somebody the other day, 'Supposing there were an election in Ireland, what would happen? Would the Sinn Feiners be returned?' He said, 'Yes,' I said, 'Does that mean Ireland supports them?' He said, 'Oh, Ireland supports them.' He said, 'No, it means no man dare put up against them. It means no man dare go to the poll to record his vote against them.'

"What is the good of talking about

German Propaganda.

Like surgery, propaganda has made remarkable strides during the war, says a correspondent in Berlin, who sends the following example of a curious development. It consists of two 1-mark notes, both of which have been torn through the centre as a result of being folded too often. They have been joined together by strips of adhesive paper, and each strip bears a legend printed in red ink. The translation of one runs: "Why is the mark worth only 10 pennings? Ask Ludendorff and Ebert!" The other inquires, "Why is the mark so tattered? Because the state finances are tattered." Presumably they are a Government issue of the banks, so that worn-out paper money may be put on its legs again for further circulation and at the same time a blow be dealt to the Government's old enemies.

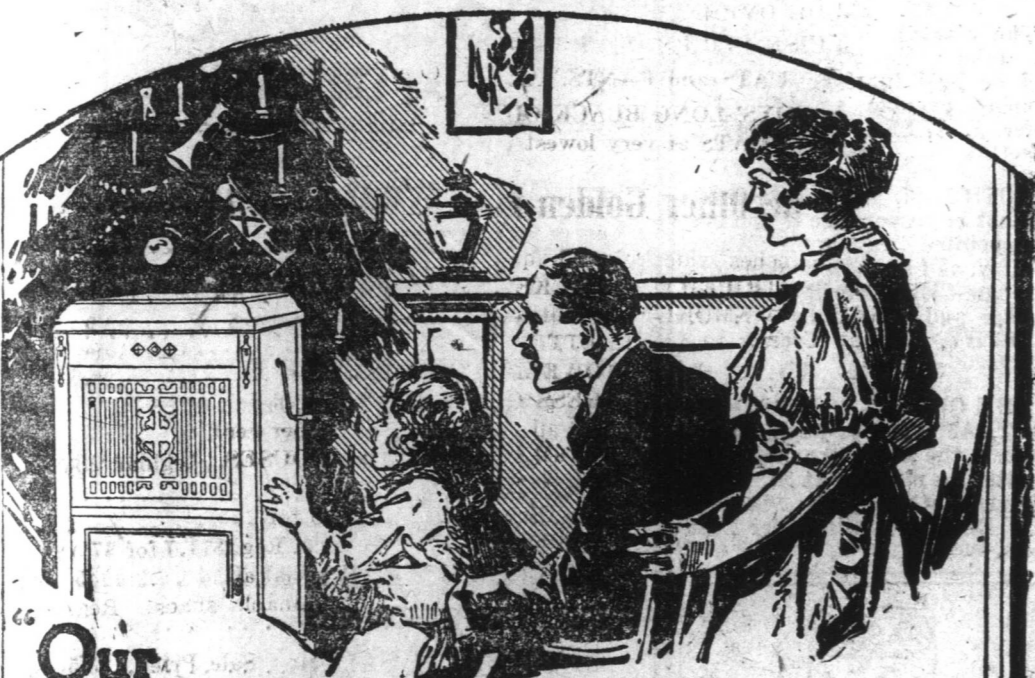

EX-EMPRESS NOT IMPROVING. DOORN, Dec. 11. Former German Empress, Augusta Victoria, was said yesterday to be still in a serious condition.

NOBEL PRIZE AWARDS. CHRISTIANIA, Dec. 11. Distribution of the Nobel Prizes were made here yesterday. The principal awards of Peace Prizes for 1920 are given to Leon Bourgeois of France and Woodrow Wilson.

TOWING CABLE PARTED. BOSTON, Dec. 10. The steamer East Indian sent word by Radio to-night that the tow line by which she was attempting to bring in had parted, and asked that other vessels stand by to assist in picking up the tow. The message, which said that weather was foggy and sea rough,

LAWYERS DEMAND MORE COURT-EST. NAPLES, Dec. 11. All lawyers have decided on a forty-eight hour strike here as a protest against "the small amount of difference" judges show toward them.

PROMINENT MANUFACTURER DEAD. LONDON, Dec. 11. Sir Albert Dixon, Chairman of the Cotton Control Board, and President of the International Cotton Federation, died here yesterday.

GETTING AFTER THE TRUSTS. WASHINGTON, Dec. 10. The Institution of Justice proceedings against five organizations of farm implement manufacturers and dealers, and the re-opening of United States Government Anti-Trust prosecution of the International Harvester Co., was recommended to congress to-day by the Federal Trade Commission.

NOT TAKING ACTION YET. OTTAWA, Dec. 10. The unemployment situation in Canada was the subject of further consideration by Cabinet at a sitting held this afternoon. The problem was reviewed in all its aspects by Ministers, and the question of the proper policy to pursue discussed at length. Prime Minister Meighen said at the close of the sitting that the Government was not yet in a position to make any further statement than that made to the Deputation which waited upon Ministers, in regard to this matter, in the morning.

THOUGHT BRITAIN RUNS THEM. LONDON, Dec. 10. The correspondent in Geneva, of the Times remarks that incidental mention by Hon. N. W. Rowell, of the commonplaces fact that the statements of the Mother Country have no voice in the management of the affairs of Canada, produced the amusing effect of a bombshell upon many of the foreign delegates and journalists, who appear not to have had the faintest conception of the relations existing between Great Britain and the Dominions.

SEISMIC DISTURBANCES. SAN JUAN DEL SUR NICARAGUA, DEC. 10. Many earth tremors have been felt during the past few days in Managua, Capital of Nicaragua and in Leon, in Western part of this republic. At eleven o'clock last night, a sharp, sharp shock occurred here.

CHILDREN BURNED TO DEATH. SAULT STE MARIE Mich., Dec. 10. Four children, ranging in ages from one to eight years were burned to death last night, when the farm home of Archie Brown, fourteen miles from St. Ignace, was burned to the ground. It became known to-day. Four other children escaped. An overturned lamp started the fire.

LEAGUE'S ECONOMIC BLOCKADE. GENEVA, Dec. 10. Just how economic blockade may be used as the League of Nations weapon is being decided by a determination of the Council, which is being determined by special commission, which Council will report to the Council at the next Assembly. This was the essence of a report adopted with minor amendments by the Assembly to-day. Pending further action by the next Assembly, the General Secretary of the League is to act as a sort of outpost to watch for infractions of the Covenant and inform the Council, which shall meet to take cognizance of such facts, and subsequently to inform all other members of the League.

NEWS SUMMARY. (British wireless Service.) Dec. 11th, 1920—The first inland air service attempted in this country is to be established tentatively from London to Birmingham, which by railway is one hundred and thirteen miles from London. Both passengers and freight are to be carried. Despite recent talk of a slump, there is little evidence of depression in November trade returns. They disclose a striking advance on the result of previous months, and in circumstances of moment and especially having regard to dislocation caused by the coal strike, their recovery is eminently satisfactory. Moreover increases in exports comes entirely under the head of British manufactured goods. These show a rise of just under eight million pounds sterling, compared with November, 1919, which is a notable achievement under present conditions. The adverse balance of trade is down to eleven million seven hundred and eighty thousand pounds sterling, which figures, except for these of July, is the lowest of years.

Tetrazzini's Voice Heard 400 Miles Away.

(New York Times.) Mme. Louisa Tetrazzini, standing in her apartment in the Hotel McAlpin recently, gave, with the aid of the radio telephone, a musical evening for hundreds on board naval ships at sea and in port within a radius of 400 miles. The prima donna sang four songs into a specially equipped telephone, tuned to transpose her voice to the telephonic receiving sets with which nearly all of the navy vessels are now equipped.

Amplifiers on board the vessels had been rigged to project Tetrazzini's voice on board ship. The crews were assembled at 8.30 recently, the hour set for the concert, and telephonic radio stations had been ordered to suspend traffic for thirty minutes. When William H. Leahy, the prima donna's manager, received word from B. Collins Buckner of the radio staff in the Whitehall Building that everything was set, Mme. Tetrazzini, with three musicians, grouped themselves near the transmitter.

"We have a treat for Mme. Tetrazzini," came a voice from somewhere. "Private Fred Bennett of Fort Wood, Staten Island, is going to sing 'A Tumble Down Shack in Athlone for her.'"

The soldier's voice came clearly over the wires to Mme. Tetrazzini's room, and, although there was no amplifier, the prima donna and her friends could hear it very plainly. A chorus of "bravas" from those in the McAlpin followed the song. Then Mme. Tetrazzini sang the "Polonaise" from "Mignon," "Rondo" from "La Sonnambula," in which she sent her high F sharp far up to sea. "Somewhere a Voice is Calling" and "I Milioni d'Arlecchino."

After the songs Tetrazzini talked with some of the men in the Whitehall Building and on the Pennsylvania, in the Brooklyn Navy Yard. "Fine," was the comment from Pennsylvania. "Some ships cut in, but we shut them up and they listened, too."

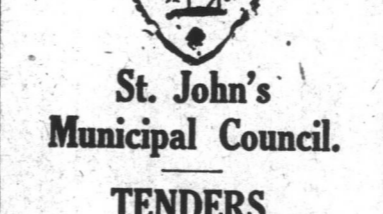
Naval officers said that the experiment in long distance entertainment for the men on shipboard was successful, although definite reports from the ships, which would give the range of the entertainment, were not received.

THE STAMPS OF NEWFOUNDLAND.
 Eleventh Issue 1897.—In 1827 a new series of stamps was issued to commemorate the 40th anniversary of the discovery of Newfoundland by John Cabot, and the 50th year of the reign of Queen Victoria. These stamps were designed by Sir Robert Bond, the then Colonial Secretary, and were engraved and printed by the American Bank Note Co. New York. There were fourteen values, the stamps of each value bearing a different design. These designs I have placed in brackets after each stamp in the check list. The 1c. and 2c. of this issue were used up some years ago, but the values from 6c. upwards were on sale at the G.P.O. until very recently. The remainder of the 15c., 30c., and 35c. were recharged for use when the supply of 2c. and 3c. Caribou gave out lately. The supply of the 10c. gave out about four years ago. This, by the way, is rather a scarce stamp. There are no minor varieties in this issue, so far as I know. The stamps are per. 12.

NEWS FROM THE STAMP WORLD.
 At an auction held recently in Paris, a copy of the famous 24. "Post office" Mauritius of 1847 fetched the record price of £3980.

A new issue from Albania has just come to hand. The face value of the stamp we have received is 5q. and the design, which is rather a crude one,

consists of a picture of Skandenburg, the Albanian national hero, with an Albanian eagle on each side.

A new French colony, Haute Volta, has been formed out of the territory of Mossi and Lobi, places north of Dahomey and the Ivory Coast, with its capital at Ouagadougou. Stamps for this colony will soon put in appearance.

Moore's Weekly notes a postmark used in Japan recently, commemorating the 8th World's Sunday School Conference held at Tokio late in September.

The two sets of stamps prepared for the Bermudian Government for the Tercentenary commemoration have now been supplied to the colony. The design of one set shows a portrait of King George at right and the pioneer vessel "Queen Victoria" at left, and the design of the other set depicts the King's head and the badge of Bermuda. It is doubtful whether any issue of stamps has ever been the cause of such prolonged discussion as have these two new sets for Bermuda.

The new European States have not yet ceased their attempts to increase their revenue and incidentally fleece the poor philatelist, by the rather over-fragrant issue of unnecessary stamps. It will soon be time for Portugal and her colonies to hide their heads in shame, for when it comes to superfluous issues Europe has them beaten to a frazzle. Estonia in particular has come to the fore lately, several new issues having put in an appearance in this state recently. Bulgaria, too, has tried to do its best by issuing a series of labels commemorating its national poet, Vassof, Messrs. Bright & Son have recently issued a new edition of their British Empire Catalogue, and the Red Gibbons, 1920 edition, has also put in an appearance. The latter contains some startling changes in values.

NEW G.W.V.A. PRESIDENT.

The adjourned general meeting of the Great War Veterans' Association was held in the T.A. Armoury last night, and was largely attended. The chair was taken by Capt. G. G. Byrne, M.C., in the unavoidable absence of Major March, who was nominated chairman to carry out the election, and conducted the election of officers in a very able manner. The chairman, in his opening remarks, impressed upon the comrades present the grave importance of electing the best men possible, men who, in addition to having the necessary qualifications, would attend executive meetings and have the welfare of the Association at heart. He further spoke at some length on a matter of the utmost importance to those to whom it referred, and asked for the co-operation of everybody in remedying this matter. The Secretary then read the minutes of the previous meeting and after some discussion relating to previous motions, their adoption was confirmed. The Bank of Commerce incident then came up for discussion, and in view of the Bank's turning down the claim of a returned Veteran in preference to a man who never served, a motion deploring the Bank's action in connection with this matter, was proposed and seconded, and on being put to the meeting was unanimously adopted. A letter was read from the Prime Minister relating to the 20 p.c. increase which it is hoped that all Nfld. pensioners will receive. In this he intimated that the Deputy Colonial Secretary was being instructed to have this matter put on the agenda for the next meeting of Committee of Council, when it is hoped that some action will be taken, thereby ensuring that the Nfld. pensioner will receive a pension almost equivalent to their Canadian comrades. A letter was also read from the Deputy Colonial Secretary intimating that in the matter of a mother who lost one or more sons, that after careful consideration the Government could not see their way clear to change the pension act and grant the mother an allowance. Comrade H. A. Anderson moved that the Special Committee keep in close touch with the Government regarding the proposed increase for all pensioners until a satisfactory agreement has been reached. The election of officers for the ensuing year was then proceeded with, resulting as follows:

J. G. Higgins, Capt. Anderson and Dicks were, however, unable to accept nomination owing to business and personal reasons and asked leave to withdraw from the election, and there being no other names put forward, Mr. J. G. Higgins was unanimously elected. The only office contested was that of Asst. Vice-President, for which Lieut. C. F. Garland and Petty Officer Kearley were nominated, and resulted in the election of the latter who held the same office during the past year. The presiding chairman, Capt. Byrne, congratulated the new President and the other officers on the honor conferred on them by their brother comrades and felt assured that they would do their utmost while in harness, and wished them the best of good luck during their period of office. The newly-elected President, together with his officers, were then installed in office. His speech was a very happy one and he thanked all the members for doing him the honor of electing him their President, and assured them that their welfare and the Association's would always be his first consideration. He could not too strongly urge all veterans to stand together and achieve their legitimate aims, without which support he felt that the Association could accomplish nothing. On the conclusion of his remarks he was loudly applauded. After passing a vote of thanks to Colonel Carty, Capt. Byrne and the outgoing Executive for their successful and helpful stewardship, the meeting closed with the singing of the National Anthem.


