Dwelling Burnt Down.

DISASTROUS FIRE AT MR. GRACE'S—OCCUPANTS BARELY ESCAPE.

A disastrous fire occurred last night (Thursday), says the Harbor Grace Standard of March 31, when the house occupied by Mr. H. Martin and family, on Stretton's Hill, formerly Capt. Tucker's, was burnt to the ground. The family had gone to bed at 10.45 p.m. and at 11.30 Mr. Martin heard something cracking and on investigating found that the lower part of the house was in flames which were rapidly nearing the stairway. He took his three young children and with his wife barely had time to get down by way of the stairs. With the help of some neighbors and some men who had been attracted by the fire, he managed to save some of the furniture from the ground floor. About \$50 was in a drawer in the bedroom, and although attempts were made to save it, it could not be reached. The fire consumed the house and then attacked a large stable immediately east of the house and in a short time it was also destroyed. A horse and some sheep which were in the stable

were driven out before the fire reached it. With the heavy wind from W.N.W. the house owned by the Fitzgerald estate and Brae Head were threatened by the sparks and flying flanks. The fence to the east of the destroyed property was on fire several times and a couple of trees in the Brae Head property was also on fire. The firemen present were working on the adjacent houses as Mr. Martin's house could not be saved, but the force of water from the hose from Harvey Street was small owing to the hill on which the houses are situated. The loss of his home and most of the contents is a hard blow to Mr. Martin and he has the sympathy of the whole community.

The need of the central fire bell was clearly demonstrated last night when only people to the east and near the east end bell were alarmed. The people from the central and western parts of the town who happened to be up and saw the reflection were the only ones in that locality to know of the fire, with the result that the number of men at hand to lend any assistance necessary was small. It was remarked by several men present that if the firemen were equipped with ropes and a couple of grapnels for use at similar fires, outhouses might be removed and fires would be better kept from spreading.

N. F. Sailor Killed by Falling Block.

Reporting that William Rice, a member of her crew, had died at sea on February 18, from injuries received when a becket block fell from the mast head, striking him on the head, the Newfoundland schooner John W. Miller, put into port yesterday afternoon (Morning Chronicle, Halifax, March 23). The schooner came here to land her cook, Joseph Pike, of Carboneau, Nfld., who is seriously ill.

According to the story told by Captain Stanley Duder and members of the crew, Rice lived unconscious for three days after the accident. They were oiling the spars at the time he was injured and the block fell, hitting him on the head. Everything possible was done for the injured seaman, and after three days unconsciousness he passed away and was buried at sea.

William Rice was a native of Cape Broyle, Nfld., 26 years of age and single. He was a son of Mr. and Mrs. Patrick Rice and leaves two brothers, one of whom is a police officer in St. John's, and the other on the schooner Jean Campbell.

The schooner, which is out 66 days from Bahla for St. John's in ballast, was within 120 miles of St. John and was forced to sail off shore owing to ice. The vessel passed through three large fields of ice, one of which was over 20 miles long. She endeavored to make Louisburg but could not penetrate the icefields off the Cape Breton Coast.

On arrival here yesterday the schooner was boarded by Dr. Judson V. Graham, port doctor, who ordered the cook taken to the hospital.

The Jean W. Miller was built at Shelburne in 1915 and is owned by Sir John Crosbie of St. John's.

Thirty-two Years Away.

IT TAKES THAT TIME FOR LIGHT FROM SOME STARS TO REACH US.

Many of the stars we see in the heavens to-day are no longer there! They died scores of thousands of years ago. We will go on "seeing" them because the light rays they gave off all that while back continue to reach us.

There is a star called Aldebaran, easily distinguishable from the others because of its bright red colour. We see this star—M. Camille Flammarion tells us, in "Death and Its Mystery"—not as it is to-day, but as it was thirty-two years ago. If it had vanished thirty years back it would still be visible to us to-day, and we should go on "seeing" it for another two years before it finally disappeared from our ken.

The reason for this is that Aldebaran is thirty-two "light years" distant from our earth. In other words, it takes that length of time for a ray of light, travelling at the rate of 186,000 miles a second, to bridge the gulf

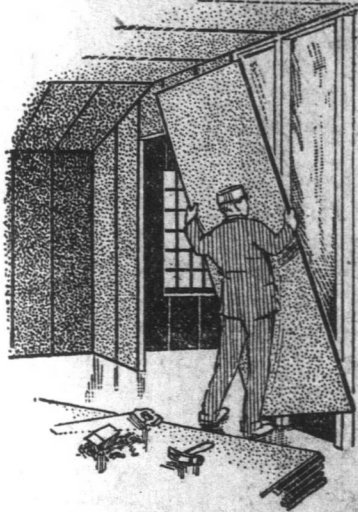

Forty-Three Years in the Public Service—The Evening Telegram

A Question for Manufacturers.

Editor Evening Telegram.
Dear Sir—Through the columns of your esteemed paper may I ask for an explanation of a matter that is somewhat a puzzle to a great many of your readers. Why is it that so many business men who own or are interested in local factories import so much goods that these factories can produce? For some time past there has been a cry of Buy Home Made Goods. Circulars to this effect have been sent to shopkeepers and clerks. The notice was posted on telegraph and telephone light poles and bill boards. It was also stamped on letters going through the Post Office. Was all this purely a farce? Are not the men who were behind this movement the men who are importing what they should be producing? There is something behind this matter that the public cannot understand. For instance, a well known firm on Water Street imports from New York a pair of boots and sells them for \$3.50. They are genuine leather and in style, fit or finish they cannot be excelled. The workman in New York who made these boots was paid one and a half times as much as the local man. The manufacturer in America does not conduct his business at a loss, yet these goods can be sold here at least 40 cents cheaper than the local made. You cannot buy the lowest grade local made shoe for less than \$3.90. The same conditions apply to clothing, paint, soap, tobacco, and those who have interests in the local factories are the ones who import these goods. There is need of an explanation on this all important subject. Tyranny, hypocrisy and bluffing caused people in other lands to wake up, and there are signs that the awakening is coming here too. Why do not the men who are shouting "Buy local made goods" come out and tell us why the local goods are dearer than the imported and inferior in quality. This is a time for co-operation and conscientious work.

Lloyd George Retains Confidence of Commons.

French Premier Also Sustained by Deputies
--Republican Soldiers Stop Collin's Meeting--
Inter-cine Strife Threatened--
Conciliation Board for Nova Scotia.

THE VOTE OF CONFIDENCE.
LONDON, April 3.
Premier Lloyd George is to appear before the House of Commons this afternoon and ask an expression of confidence on the Government's policy toward the International Economic Conference at Genoa. He is expected to receive a substantial majority. Mr. Lloyd George is "stick of office," according to the speech of his son, Major Lloyd George, but greatly improved in health after three weeks rest. The Premier's resolution reads: "Resolved that this House approve the resolutions passed by the Supreme Council at Cannes, as the basis of the support His Majesty's Government in Genoa Conference, and that it will endeavour to give effect to them." Notice is given of seven amendments, but that of the Labour Party is given priority. It reads: "While approving the International Economic and Financial Conference, this House regrets that the scope of the Genoa discussions has been so circumscribed that the Conference must fall short of settlement of the political and economic evils which affect Europe, and it is the opinion that a Government which clearly has not the confidence of the country, and which is responsible for a policy whose unfortunate effects are too clear at Genoa, is not competent to represent the country."

POINCARÉ SUSTAINED.
PARIS, April 3.
After a discussion of the Government's foreign policy, the Chamber of Deputies to-night voted confidence in the Poincaré ministry by 484 to 78. The Washington gathering was many times termed a humiliation for France, and the point was urged that the French delegation to Genoa should not be placed in a position similar to the French delegation to Washington.

CONCILIATION BOARD 'RECONVENED.'
OTTAWA, April 3.
Premier King announced in the House late to-day that a conciliation board to investigate the mining dispute in Nova Scotia would be reconvened unconditionally.

FREE STATE RULE DENIED.
MULTINGAR, County Westmeath, April 3.—An incident from which sensational developments are anticipated, occurred this morning when 100 from State troops marched to the gates of the barracks occupied by the Irish Republican Army adherents of Eamonn DeValera and were refused admission.

ANOTHER CHURCH DESTROYED.
MONTREAL, April 3.
The Church of the Sacred Heart was destroyed by fire here to-day, with a loss of \$500,000 with \$200,000 insurance.

TASCHEREAU'S HINT TO KING.
QUEBEC, April 3.
In face of the Fordney Tariff and high American railway rates on Canadian products, Premier Taschereau, of Quebec, suggested that the Ottawa Government might take note of the fact that 10,000 acres of freehold forest land was being raised in Canada every year to supply one million tons of pulp wood to American mills. The export of pulp wood from Crown lands is prohibited by Quebec.

TO SIDETRACK CANAL PROJECT.
WASHINGTON, April 3.
It is claimed an agreement between eastern and southern members of Congress has been made to sidetrack the St. Lawrence River Canalization project for the present.

A SILLY RUMOUR DENIED.
LONDON, April 3.
The Canadian Press is authorized by a high authority to say that there is no truth whatever in the story appearing in American papers that Lady Patricia Ramsay and her husband have for months been practically separated and living apart.

Aroused at Last.

There are several familiar proverbs, all in everyday use, which may be very appositely quoted to-day. Everybody will recognize their applicability, and will agree to their appropriateness under the circumstances. One is "constant dropping wears away the stone." Another "misfortunes like chickens come home to roost," and yet another "even the worm will turn." Abraham Lincoln's expression that "you may fool half the people all the time, and all the people half the time, but you cannot fool all the people all the time" is as true to-day as it was on the occasion when it was uttered. The present Government worked and has been working with the fixed idea that it could fool all the people all the time. If proof is needed study carefully its doings and its legislation. All the experience gained in their three sessions of the Legislature has not given the leaders of the administration any wisdom. The rank and file does not need any. They blindly lead. But, as in every case, where tyrannical and unjust laws are imposed on a free people, they rise in indignant protest and often in their might hurl Government from power, so to-day in St. John's—if not all over Newfoundland—the people have begun to slough their apathy, and are awakening from their slumbers. The leaders are aroused, and the sound of the tocsin of alarm will be heard throughout the land. The worm has turned. The weight of the burden placed on the shoulders of demos has been deliberately increased, year after year by those who professed to be apostles of economy in public expenditure. No longer can either the classes or the masses stagger under the load, and if something is not done quickly all will fall by the wayside and the lamp of trade, commerce and production will cease to burn. But a blow is about to be struck: is being struck in fact as these lines are passing through the hands of the printer. The Board of Trade, the highest commercial body in the land, is assembled in session, the object being to arouse public sentiment against the evils and iniquities of the Government. Having long groaned under an intolerable system of taxation, having been restricted in their business by Acts of Parliament, many being near brought to the verge of bankruptcy, some having dropped over the edge, the members of the Board find that they can no longer remain silent, if the best interests of Colony and population are to be served. Therefore they are now engaged in discussing the financial condition of the Colony having regard to (1) The Estimates for 1922-23 as submitted by the Minister of Finance, (2) The Tariff as it is, (3) Fishing Supplies past and to come, and

(4) The Proposal of the Government to add further to the taxes already being collected. Other matters arising out of these four subjects will also be dealt with intelligently and squarely. The Board of Trade represents no political party, neither has it as an organization any political predilections. The personal views of its members on political matters do not come into the range of discussion. The benefit and advancement of Newfoundland is the prevailing idea, and the backing of the people, if not in St. John's then in the outports, should be given. The strength of the sixteen electoral districts outside St. John's East and West, should support the Board of Trade in the uphill work that they have to-day voluntarily undertaken. True they have been a long time making up their mind, but better late than never. With public opinion behind them, strengthening their determination and decision, it may be made possible for the bright light of prosperity to be made shine forth from the present darkness of depression. Public sentiment, public spirit, public opinion, needs to be aroused. All that is wanted are leaders. The Telegram backs the Board of Trade, in the present movement, and will do all in its power to place facts and particulars of to-day's meeting before the public of Newfoundland.

Twenty Years Ago To-Day.

(Evening Telegram, April 4th, 1902.) Quite a number of schooners from the westward arrived in port to take supplies for the fishery. Landsmen between Cat Harbor and Western Arm hauled 700 seals ashore. A bill in reference to the Incorporation of the Electric Light Co. for Heart's Content, Carbonar and Harbor Grace was introduced in the Assembly. Hadda Mullah, a fanatic with 5,000 armed followers, marched on Cabul Afghanistan, to make trouble for the British. Cecil Rhodes body taken to Rhodesia.

S. U. F. in Cape Breton.

OTHER LODGES TO BE ESTABLISHED. The Society of United Fishermen, of which two Lodges are already formed in Cape Breton, one at Sydney and one at North Sydney, is planning to broaden out by the establishment of three more Lodges in the district. The parent organization of the S.U.F. is in Newfoundland. Local members wish to obtain a district grand lodge by establishing the requisite number of branches, which is five. The Sydney and North Sydney branches are now in flourishing condition and rapidly gaining membership. Sydney Lodge paid a fraternal visit to their North Sydney brethren last Tuesday evening.—Sydney Post, March 24.

The Budget.

HIGHER POSTAGE FORESHADOWED. It is expected that the Budget Speech will be delivered in the House tomorrow afternoon. No major alterations are expected in the tariff. Higher postage on foreign letters is foreshadowed. This recommendation will be made by the Minister of Posts and will suggest that the postage on foreign letters should be raised to four cents, which is the rate now in force in England, Canada and many other countries. This might possibly mean a substantial increase in revenue. Other means whereby the Government hope to augment their revenue are the Income Tax and Business Profits Tax, both of which are now before the House in the Committee stage, and in the form of Resolutions. The Income Tax Resolutions will form an important point in the discussion which will be taken place at to-day's meeting of the Board of Trade.

The Tariff Commission.

AN UNWELDY COMMITTEE. It is understood that the personnel of the Tariff Revision Committee will be announced in the House to-morrow afternoon. The Commission consists of nine members and Hon. H. J. Brewin, Minister of Finance, and Hon. H. W. LeMessurier, Assistant Collector of Customs, will be the Chairman. Mr. H. W. LeMessurier, Assistant Collector of Customs, will be a member, and other members are Messrs. J. V. O'Dea and Fred Angel. The latter is representing the Manufacturer's Association. The Commission will begin its activities as early as possible and from time to time will make recommendations to the Governor in Council. The whole tariff will be considered. The revision was that of 1898. Since then there have been occasional amendments, particularly with regard to classification. Several questions of policy will have to be decided by the Commission such as matters of protective tariff and kindred questions. These matters could be dealt with more easily by a smaller commission as it is doubtful whether the one to be appointed will have the right to decide them.

Obituary.

MRS. (CAPT.) STEPHEN PARSONS. Yesterday morning there passed away to the Great Beyond the estimable lady in the person of Mary, wife of Capt. Stephen Parsons in her 63rd year. The deceased lady had been ailing for some time and despite all that medical skill and loving attention could do her spirit entered the reward of a life well spent. During her illness she was attended by her daughters Elsie and Kathleen whose loving care and devotion helped to ease the sufferings of a devoted and noble mother. The deceased lady was the daughter of the late Capt. A. Z. Alcock, of H. R. Grace, and leaves to mourn besides her husband, three children, 2 daughters, Elsie and Kathleen at home and one married to Rev. Mr. Butler, of Port de Grave; three sons, Stephen, conducting a successful business at Quebec; Baxter, a pressman at the Daily Star, and William, chief engineer of the s.s. Clyde; she also leaves two sisters, Mrs. H. B. Cross, of this city, and two brothers at Griquet, Mark and William. Having lived in St. John's over 20 years, Mrs. Parsons made hosts of friends and her passing is deeply regretted. The funeral takes place to-morrow afternoon at 2.30 from her late residence at Cook Street. The Telegram joins with other friends of the family in expressions of heartfelt sympathy in their sad bereavement.

West Coast Fishery.

SCHOONERS HAVE POOR FARES. The fishery report from Rose Blanche to Hermitage for the week ending March 11th gives the total as 440 and altogether 4,300 qts. The report states that there was good fishing on the outer banks, but nothing worth while on the usual fishing grounds. On Tuesday, March 7th the boats and schooners on the outer bank found fish plentiful and many of the boats averaged 10 qts. or 20 cwt. per day. The following Wednesday and Thursday drift ice was over the ground. On the Tuesday mentioned the schooner did well and one hauled for 120 qts. for the day's work, others ranging from 60 to 100 qts. On the whole the schooners are poorly fished for the length of season they have been prosecuting the voyage.

The College had already given 140 priests to the diocese. The address was illustrated by 50 lantern slides. His Lordship proposed a vote of thanks to Dr. Facey and his excellent lecture. He then brought the proceedings to a close with the Benediction.

Legislative Council.

MONDAY, April 3rd.

The House opened at 4 p.m. Following the reading of the minutes the acting leader of the Government, Hon. M. G. Winter, tabled the report of the Select Committee on the Delinquent Children Bill.

The Bill "An Act to amend Chapter 75 of the Consolidated Statutes entitled "Of Sufferers from Marine Disasters" passed the third reading without amendment.

A Bill "An Act to regulate the Importation, Exportation, Manufacture, Sale and Use of Opium and other dangerous drugs," and a Bill "An Act to amend Chapter 22 of the Consolidated Statutes entitled "Of the Customs," were given final reading. Slight amendments were made to these bills when in committee and the House of Assembly was notified accordingly.

The House went into Committee on a Bill "An Act for the Disposal of surplus funds collected for Hospital Cots." When the clerk read that an endow a cot owing to having a hospital in Jerusalem, Hon. P. Templeman took exception to the vote. He said he did not think that we were so well off here that we need send money as far away as Jerusalem, and he wanted to know the explanation.

Hon. Mr. Winter who had charge of the Bill, stated that such allocation of the surplus funds was desired by Mr. L. E. Emerson.

Sir P. T. McGrath, whose participation in many phases of war work brought him in contact with the work of the Ambulance Corps, explained that after the capture of Jerusalem by General Allenby, it was proposed that all the dominions should endow for all time a bed in the military hospital. It was made possible for this Colony of their contract and exemption from surplus to the credit of our cot fund.

Sir Patrick regretted that the Bill had gone through the Lower House without any comment on the great effort made by the Ambulance Corps during the war. Altogether \$130,000 had been raised for cots for the wounded, and of this amount \$118,000 had been expended, and it was a portion of the balance that was being set aside to establish and endow in perpetuity the cot at Jerusalem.

Hon. Dr. Campbell agreed with the view expressed by Hon. Mr. Templeman. He thought that every dollar in Newfoundland was needed here.

There were a large number of our own soldiers who needed constant hospital treatment and the money could be used in that direction.

Hon. Mr. Templeman again stated that he would not support the Bill. He thought it was uncalled for, and would not be agreed to by those who subscribed to the fund, some of whom had to borrow the money. "It is absurd, scandalous and ridiculous to send money to Jerusalem for a hospital cot when people no farther away than Bonavista were dying because they could not get hospital treatment," said the speaker. "We are not fit to handle money at all," he concluded.

Sir P. T. McGrath regretted that hon. members were taking a wrong view of the matter and would lead one to believe that he had taken sole care of our soldiers in hospital. "The fact is we did not do, and could not do. It had cost Canada and Australia millions of dollars to care for its wounded in hospitals. It took all our efforts to finance the pay roll. The British Government fed and clothed our men and it is also contributing a substantial amount to the pensions of the Naval Reservists. In view of these facts I don't see how this vote should be challenged, said Sir Patrick.

The Bill comes up for a third reading tomorrow. A Bill "An Act to amend the Law Society Act," passed the Committee stage but not without some debate. The Bill makes it possible for a law student to enter the profession without a University course. Several of the members objected on the ground that there was already too many lawyers.

Hon. Dr. Campbell thought that the Law Society should be affiliated with some University that specializes in the training of law students, and that students should qualify and pass specific examinations before being admitted to the bar.

The second reading of Bill "An Act to amend the Act Geo. V, Cap. 6, entitled "An Act to confirm a Contract between the Government and the St. Lawrence Timber Pulp and Steamship Co., Ltd." was deferred on request of the Minister of Agriculture and Mines.

This company is seeking an extension of time for the fulfilment of the terms of their contract an exemption from taxation for a further period.

The House adjourned at 5:30 until this afternoon at 5 o'clock.

Government Disregard For Economic Law.

Review of the Past Year --- Demoralizing the Fishermen.

last year, I had occasion to attempt to review the economic situation of the country, and now, encouraged by your effort, I propose to outline the situation which exists at the present time. As I said before, no man is now, I am by no means a pessimist, but that does not prevent me from seeing that Newfoundland is in a worse condition, economically, than ever before in her history. There are some who believe that an optimistic who is forever looking through coloured spectacles, and who completely overlooks any signs of disaster. That is an entirely erroneous for in my opinion, optimism consisting of seeing misfortunes when they are, and doing one's best to combat them. The people of Newfoundland have united effort, economy and patience will bring us through our financial difficulties.

FISHERY SUPPLIES.

The question of supplying for the fishery will soon demand the attention of the Government, and it yet remains to be seen whether they propose to continue the absurd policy which they adopted last year, and which tended more than anything else to the utter demoralization of the people. In a sense, it was worse than road work or snow shovelling, and it will probably be years before the full effect will have worn off. Last year, the sum of over \$400,000 was given out in supplying for the fishery. Even if the catch had been bigger than it was, the then ruling prices the fishermen would have barely wrought a year's existence out of the season, and would have had nothing left to recompense the Government for the money loaned. True, some of those who bought supplies with Government money, did sufficiently well to enable them to make a return of all or some portion of the amount given them. Here, however, we see the results attendant on a breach of an economic law. Jevons, in his introduction to his work on Political Economy says "much of the poverty and crime which now exist have been caused by mistaken charity in past times, which has caused a large part of the population to grow up careless, and improvident, and idle." This then is what we in Newfoundland have to guard against, for the seed of unjustifiable charity bore such fruit that those who could afford to reimburse the Government for supplies, refrained from so doing. Out of the \$400,000 spent, returns were made to the extent of \$25,000.

THE ONLY COURSE.

The fish merchants have already stated their unwillingness to supply this year. Under the circumstances, the fishermen will naturally turn to the Government and will expect the same treatment as they received last year. As I have previously stated, I do not know what action the Executive will take, but there is only one right course open to them. They must refuse to supply. But, it may be argued, that will only make things worse than ever. The people will not be able to exist. That is not likely, I believe it would be better to feed them at the public expense until such time as conditions got back to normal, rather than that the Government guarantee more money for supplies. It is a well known fact that a great many fishermen have money in the Banks. Those who have, if the Government does not supply, will be compelled to use it, as they ought. In the case of those really too poor to purchase their own supplies, some other method of assisting them than that of giving them money, for supplies, may be found. I shall not, however, deal further with this matter now. The problem is an intricate one, and

relief work had to be given, it had been distributed in a manner which would not only take away the talent of charity, but would be productive of something useful. The building of roads from nowhere to nowhere was an act of unproductive stupidity. It was a conception of wealth without adequate returns. Briefly, it was a device of every principal of economics. If this were not bad enough, the money employed on this work were permitted to idle away their time. They did not do five per cent of the work which they were paid; and worse than that, if they had no money, it only necessary to seek the means of livelihood from the Government, they did not need to work for it. It would tend to make parasites out of the most independent men in the country, the Newfoundland fishermen. It may seem a hard thing to say, but the truth is always unpleasant.

EVIDENT INCOMPETENCE.

Road work had been confined to districts in which, it would be useful; if, instead of building roads, repairs had been effected on the old ones which badly needed still need them; and with this,

will require careful consideration, but I shall close my few observations by reiterating the statement that the Government must not supply.

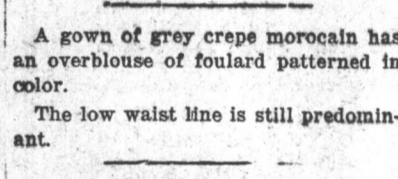
A QUESTION OF TARIFF.

Upon approaching the question of tariff, we find another instance of the complete disregard by the Government of the laws of economics. The people of Newfoundland are to-day groaning under an enormous burden of taxation which has prevented them from benefiting by the reduced prices of commodities abroad. Not alone are the tariff rates enormous, but they are applied in a manner out of all proportion to the value of the commodities as necessities of life. In other words, where necessary articles of food pay duty at the rate of over 100 per cent. many luxuries, which may well be done without, pay less. An immediate revision of the tariff is necessary. One fact that the Government has completely lost sight of is that decreased tariff means increased importations. From this, it will be seen that the revenue will be the same in the end, if not more, while the people will be able to live at far less cost than before. I have taken up more space now than I had at first intended, and yet, there are many points on which I would have liked to elaborate. In conclusion, I again state that I believe the country can recover from its economic distress, but this depends upon the Government and the people themselves. Economy must be practiced and all must do their utmost to help in the common cause. Would that it could be said of Newfoundland when she was at a crisis in her economic existence "Then none were for a party, and all were for the State." It is the one solution.

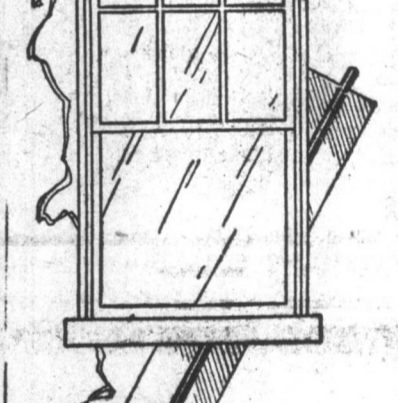

Harbor Grace and the Sealfishery.

LOCAL HISTORY AND STATISTICS SHOULD BE PRESERVED.

We have much pleasure in republishing the following communicated article taken from the current issue of the Harbor Grace Standard. The writer clearly appreciates the research work done by Messrs Shortis and O'Mara, two gentlemen of the pen to whom the columns of the Telegram are open at all times.

The spring of 1872 fifty-four vessels cleared from Harbor Grace, including two steamers, Messrs. Punton & Munn had 30 vessels, Mr. Donnelly 9, and Messrs. Hilday & Sons had 14. Messrs. Punton & Munn's catch was 97,085 seals. Seventeen of the vessels supplied by them had a total of 66,524 seals, namely:—

The Telegram has republished the article written by M.J.O.M. in 1913, on the sealfishery, in which the result of that fishery is given for the year 1887. The writer refers to Mr. Shortis' letter and states that Harbor Grace is given perhaps a little too much prominence, Mr. Shortis wrote of the facts and figures as he knew and heard of them, for the purpose of putting on record the work done in the old days by a class of men who were in no way second to those of other places, who showed foresight, judgment, discretion and tact in prosecution of the industry. The writer also states that the financial backbone of the country and the very life of the communities in which they lived. These men were recognized as being in a class by themselves for hardihood and knowledge—a class that is to-day, unfortunately for us, very little known. Were the same enterprise and industry shown to-day in all branches of industry as was shown by those men in the prosecution of the sealfishery, the present state of the country and its future prospects would be much brighter. But to return to the purpose of this article. "M.J.O.M." in his lengthy and interesting letter concerning the catch of 1887, states that that spring twenty-four vessels out of St. John's brought in 120,000 seals—a large and valuable catch. In the spring of 1872, Messrs. Punton & Munn had thirty vessels out, including one steamer. The catch was nearly 100,000 seals—a fairly good return, and one that compares favorably with the catch commented upon by "M.J.O.M." Mr. Shortis and "M.J.O.M." have given their time looking up and placing in cold type the history of the sealfishery years ago, and for their work deserve and are entitled to much credit. Their records are valuable, and it is to our discredit that the history of the old times, the fishery and other matters, has not been given greater activities.
