OTTAWA, May 14th.

Sir John Macdonald moved the resolution appropriating 49,000 acres of land in the North West Territory to the descendants of those persons, not being half-breeds who settled under the auspices of Lord Selkirk. The lands are to be granted on the same principle es that previously appropriated to the half-breeds.

Defeat of the Government on the New Brunswick School Law.

The Government have sustained a defeat on their policy in reference to the School Laws of New Brunswick. Wednesday Mr. Tilley moved that the House go into Committee of Supply, whereupon Mr. Costigan moved an amendment that the people in New Brunswick who feel them selves aggrieved (the Roman Catholics) should have an opportunity of bringing their case judicially before the Privy Cauncil in England, and that in the meantime the Governor-General should disallow the several acts passed during the last session of the N. B. Legislature to legalize assessments made under the Common School Act of that Province After a spirited debate the amend. ment was carried by 99 to 63, thus declaring that the previous policy of the Government in this matter was wrong. Having made an open question of it the adverse vote does not affect the standing of the Govern-ment, but the moral effect of such a defeat cannot but prove injurious to their strength and influence.

by the Government, while at the

the Catholics in the Province petitioned the Governor General, praying
that the Act might not come into
operation, but when this petition was
referred to the Minister of Justice he
gave it as his opinions that the Provincial Legislature had not exceeded
they constitutional powers, and that,
therefore, the Act must go into operation. After a full discussion on the
subject in the House of Commons last
session, it remained pretty much in
the same position as it was before.
"The legislature of New Brunswick
when appealed to, refused to after or
yamend the law;—On the contrary
they passed additions and amendments to the Act which still more
sunoyed and aggravated the position


