Garafeaxa.—Fall wheat, poor average, 15 to 20 bushels per acre; Spring wheat good, 20 to 25 bushels; hay, good crop; barley good.—over average; cats, good—over average; potates, good—up to mark; turnips, prospects good—up to mark; turnips, prospects good—up to read avanced yet; peas, good crop; clover seed, none. Splendid crops all around here—every farmer seems to be well pleased in this locality.

Halton County.—Fall wheat, 5 to 25 bushels per acre, average 13; 5pring wheat, not much sown, but good; hay, barley and oats, average crop; potatoes and turnips, look well at present; clover seed, not much sown, but good; hay, barley, oats and peas are good in quality and quantity. Fall wheat is a good sample, but not much to the acre, being winter-killed; average ten bushels. Hay is an average crop, and well cured. Roots at present look well. There is not much clover seed gathered in this neighborhood.

The Attacks on Mr. George Brown.

BY TELEGRAPH TO THE MERCURY

The Way the Cable Talks.

An operator sits at a table in a room darkened by curtains. On his desk stands a little instrument named the "reflecting galvanometer," the invention of Sir William Thompson, without which Atlantic telegraphy would be a slow process, not exceeding two or three words per mmute, instead of eighteen or twenty, the present rate. This delicate instrument consists of a tiny magnet and a tiny mirror swinging on a silk thread, the two together weighing a few grains. The electric current, passing along the wire from Valencia, deflects the magnet to and fro. The mirror reflects a spot of light on to a scale in a box placed at the operator's right hand, where, by its oscillation, the spot of light indicates the slight movement of the magnet, and follows every change, in the received current; and every change, great or smil, produces a corresponding oscillation of the spot of light in the scale. A code of signals is arranged by which the movement of the spot of light is made to indicate the letters of the alphabet. When receiving a message from Valencia, the operator watches the movements of the light speck, which keeps dancing about over the scale on his right. To his practised eye, each movement of the spot of light is made to high represents a letter of the alphabet, and its seemingly fantastic motions are spellfing out the intelligence which the pulsings of the electric current are transmitting between the two hemispheres. It is truly marvellous to note how rapidly the experienced operator disentangles the irregular oscillation of the little speaks into the letters and words which they represent.

Milk as a Diet, and its Effects upon the System.

There is a considerable difference of opinion on the subject of a milk diet. It is surrounded by a mass of whims, or prejudices, and of mistaken ideas, which are based more on Individual fancies than upon certain facts. To one, a glass of milk imbiled is believed to be a sure provocation of a bilious attack; to another, a disordered stomach; to a third drawsir e-s; and so on, through such a category of simple, though disagreeable aliments that we look aghast at the farmer who drains cup after cup of the fresh, pure liquid, time and again during the day, and wonder at the resisting powers which his organization must possess. The truth is, however, that milk is not nuwholesome. On the contrary, it contains good substantial bone, muscle,

shesh and brain producing substances which, assimilating quickly, act rapidly in building up the body. Naturally, we assert it is mourishing; that it does bring on certain troubles, is neverthelesserue, but the cause is in the individual stomach, not in the milk, provided, of course, the latter be fresh and sweet. The Commercial Advertiser of recent date had some excellent remarks on this subject which are well worthy of repetition: "Milk diluted one-third lime water," it said, "will not cause any one billiousness or headache, and, if taken regularly, will soo strengthen the stomach as to banish these disorders. It may be taken with acid of some kind when it does not easily digest. The idea that milk must not be eaten with pickles is not an intelligent one, as milk curdles in the stomach nearly as soon as it is swallowed. When milk is constipating, as it is frequently found to be by persons who drink freely of it in the country in the summer time, a little sait sprinkled in each glassful will prevent the difficulty. When it has an opposite effect, a few drops of brandy in each goblet of milk will obviate its purgative effect. As milk is so essential to the health of our bodies, it is well to consider when to take it, and how. It is a mistake to drink milk between meals or with food at the table. In the former case it will destroy the appetite; and further functioning actions of the pure milk should be drunk; and if any one wishes to grow fleshy, a pint taken before returing at night will soon cover the scrawniest bones. In cases of fever and summer complaint, milk is now given with excellent results. The dies that milk is 'feverish' has exploded, and it is now the physician's great reliance in bringing through typholo patients, or those in too low a state to be nourished by solid food."


