

The work done by the government analysts shows that at the present time, adulteration is practically un-known in many of our standard foods.

Adulteration is not found in flour, cer-eals, butter, cheese, lard, canned fruits, vegetables, meats, tea, and sugar. On the other hand, there is more or less Adulteration in coffee, cocoa, milk, maple sugar and syrup, spices, cream of terear increased in the other off maple sugar and syrup, spices, cream of tartar, jams, jellies, catsups, olive oil. In the list of goods subject to adultera-tion, the adulterants are not usually of harmful or dangerous character. For instance, coffee, when not pure, is usa-ally mixed with roasted cereals and chicory. Starch or flour is added to cocoa, spices, cream of tartar etc. Maple sugar is adulterated with ordinary cane sugar, whilst jams and jellies are com-posed in many cases, largely of glucose and apple pulp.
