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

A MEMORABLE MARCH. How Colonists from Sutherlandshire Walked Through the Trackless Wilderness from Port Garry to Northern Ontario.

(Correspondence of the New York World.)
TORONTO, Oct. 27.—In what is known as the Scotch settlement in South Simcoe. about forty miles from Toronto, died a short time ago, at the age of ninety-two years, Charles Macbeth, one of the last two survivors of the emigrants who accompanied Lord Selkirk to the Hudson bay territory in 1812. Lord Selkirk had visited America in 1810, and travelled extensively in the United States and the British possessions. While in this country he conceived the project of establishing a Scotch settlement in the region now known as Manitoba, but at that time in possession of the Hudson bay company. He returned to Scotland and induced 130 tenants of the Duke of Sutherland to leave their homes in the old country, where they made but a poor living, and try their fortunes tn the new land. The little band of adventurers set sail one June morning from Glasgow. The first hardship they experienced was when beating along the apprepared for the rigors of a northern winter. After a month of toil through a trackless wilder-ness, two of the number sank exhausted and were buried where they fell. During the second month a new life was ushered into the world. By patient toil they pass-ed south of the Lake of the Woods and into the intricacies of what is now known as the Sayanne Swamp. The days were as the Savanne Swamp.
