



So far as observed all were fertile, each specimen examined containing a living embryo about four inches in length. When discovered the snake was coiled upon its eggs, apparently incubating. Upon being removed from the log the eggs dried up rapidly. As the temperature in the log was noticeably above that of the atmosphere it is probable that the close coils of the snake prevented evaporation. Graduates of this school are now found not only in all parts of America, but in Europe, Africa, South America and Australia, and are occupying positions of trust and influence in professional and business life, several being ministers and missionaries. Mrs. Hamilton of Paris, Ont., who sent a note of greeting, attended the school in the old Masonic Hall in Market-lane, in 1835. Mr. Francis Thomas, 15 Alexander-street, city, who was present, attended in 1836, and Mr. William Dixon, 63 Adelaide-street west, also present, was a scholar when it met in George-tireet in 1838. Roaf, George Lugsdin, Reuben Millichamp, William Dixon, S. R. Heakes, Harry Webb, J. D. Nasmith, Sidney Turner, sr., Joseph French, E. J. Joselin, Alfred Howell, F. G. Alexander, J. C. Copp, James Smith, architect; Isaac French, William Freeland, H. L. Thompson, John Wightman, George Scott, William H. Rodden, Charles J. Page, E. Potts, Samuel Whitt and many others. The Messrs. Goulding, W. D. Grand and others were unable to be present.

One of the most pleasing features of the afternoon was the presentation of an illuminated address to Miss E. Vandersmissen, who organized the first primary class in the school 50 years ago, which was the first primary class in the city. The address was read by Mr. George Pim, a former scholar in Miss Vandersmissen's class, and nine others who had been members of her class stood during the reading of the address. Prof. Vandersmissen made a suitable reply on behalf of his aunt, expressing her joy at meeting so many of her former scholars who had grown up to be active Christian workers. The atternoon session occupied an hour and a half and was most interesting throughout.

Tea was served from 6 to 8 o'clock, followed by a platform meeting in the church. Mr. W. E. Ashdown, honorary superintendent, presided. Brief addresses were given by the following gentlemen, who were former members of the school: Samuel Wickson, R. Freeland, William Freeland, John Boyd, William Dixon and Alfred Howell. Each address was replete with reminiscence and interesting incidents of former days. Interesting letters were read from a large number of former scholars now in distant parts of the world. 
