The delegates to the Pan-Prebyterian Alliance resumed business yesterday morning with vigor, which had been renewed by a rest of two days.

Dr. W. T. Campbell of Monmouth, Ill., presided, and there was a good attendance of delegates and visitors.

Rev. Principal Caven submitted the Business Committee report. Among other things it recommended that a resolution of sympathy be sent Rev. Dr. McCosh, and that the paper which was to have been read by him be printed in the proceedings.

Rev. Dr. John Ramsay of Baltimore, Md., read the life of Mrs. Grimson of Toronto as the national history of the church. It was a very interesting and well-written paper.

Rev. Dr. John Hall of Montreal, Quebec, read a paper on the subject of the "Theological Education of the Clergy." It was a very able and well-considered paper.

DAVE RASMUSSEN'S FISHKILLER BICYCLE RIDE.

Philadelphia Will Likely Leave the Irishmen-Rosedale Cricketers Battered By Brampton—The Canadian Amateur Athletic Records—The Baseball Record—General Sporting News—D. Namith, the crack long distance rider of the Toronto Bicycle Club, made an extraordinary record for 10 miles yesterday morning on the brick dust track at Rosedale.

Namith was out preparing for his trial on Thursday, when he will attempt to beat the world's records for all distances from 10 to 100 miles. Unfortunately there was only one match held on him and the time cannot go as a record. Namith's trainer sent him off about 11 a.m., and the rider kept up a spur for the entire distance. And at the conclusion everyone marvelled at the phenomenal mark given out. The time announced was 26 minutes and 8 seconds, but he did not intend to dismount until he has finished his task. He will be paced by some of Toronto's fastest men, so the time should not be looked for. The affair is in the hands of the racing board of the T. B. C., which is a guarantee that everything will be properly arranged.
