DRYS CARRY REFERENDUM ON LIQUOR IMPORTATION

THIRTEEN CITIES VOTE DRY ELEVEN HAVE WET MAJORITY

The vote in Ontario on Monday on the importation of intoxicating liquors was only about 60 per cent. of a full vote. There was no organization of the Wets outside the cities, and many of the voters did not seem to take much interest in the question. to take much interest in the question. Watford gave a majority of 277, the vote being 386 Yes and 109 No. The

With hardly an exception the Western Ontario counties contributed a thousand or two to the dry majority. Ridings in Essex and Waterloo were the only ones to vote "no." and jority. Ridings in Essex and Waterloo were the only ones to vote "no," and only two cities, Windsor and Kitchener, are to be found in the wet column. On the other hand some of the Western Ontario cities did as well as any in the province, from the standpoint of the drys. Chatham, for instance, gave a "yes" majority of nearly 1,000, and the whole County of Kent contributed nearly 6,000. Tilbury was the only town in Kent to Tilbury was the only town in Kent to

vote wet. Lambton rolled up a fine dry masomewhat by the fact that Point Edward, alone in the county, went wet by 11 votes.

Dunnville, one of the towns on

bunnyine, one of the towns on which the eyes of the province were focused, following disclosures regarding the moist condition of the cellars went dry by 172 votes.

The County of Huron and the County of Eigin both acheived a clean slate, not a town or township voting wet. Eigin's arid wastes extend even to Port Stanley which

tend even to Port Stanley, which turned up a "yes" margin of sub-stantial size. Bruce would have been similarly situated if it had not been for Lucknow and Mildmay, which

gave small wet majorities.
North Waterloo lived up to its reputation by giving a wet majority of 2,500. The same riding in the referendum of 1919 voted wet on all four questions. South Waterloo, on the other hand, went dry by 500. Toronto gave a wet majority of

er 5,000. In East Lambton there only 6578 votes polled. At the vote in 1919 for prohibition there were 8616, or over 2,000 more votes polled.

RESULTS OF THE DRY VOTE

Having voted "Yes" on the referendum regarding the importation of liquor for beverage purposes, Ontario Inquor for beverage purposes, Ontarionow awaits the order of the Dominion Government giving effect to the expressed will of the people. There will then be three measures operating to make this a "bone dry" province. The Dominion enactment making the importation of liquor from any other part of the country or anywhere else illegal; the Ontario Temperance Act itself, and the provincial measure and the provincial popularly known as the "Sandy Bill."

Measures to preserve and increase the reputation of Canadian dairy products in foreign markets are embodied in the Dairy Produce Act, considered and agreed upon by the Agricultural Committee. This act gives the Cabinet power to make regulations for the grading of butter, cheese and other food products manufactured from milk, when these are intended for export. Heavy fines, running from \$50 to \$200, and a term of imprisonment not exceeding three months are provided as penalities for infraction of whatever regulations are issued under this new act.

In a recent interview Mr. Edison said: "I am not against the eight hour day, or any other thing that protects labor from exploitation at the hands of ruthless employers. But it makes me sad to see young Americans shackle their abilities by blindly conforming with rules which force the industrious man to keep in step with the shirker. I am glad the eight hour day had not been invented when I was a young man. If my life had been made up of eight hour days, I do not believe I could have accomplished a great deal."

In a quiet but forceful way without any flare of verbal "eloquenc," he has presented in those few words a vital argument that is unanswerable.

OLD COLONIAL BLUE LAWS

The Township of Plympton lost one of its most highly esteemed and enterprising citizens in the death of James W. Symington, which sad event occurred at his home, 10th line on Saturday night last. Death was caused by an affection of the heart. Mr. Symington was born in Plympton, in December, 1856, and was a son of Wm. Symington, one of the early pioneer settlers. In March, 1883, he married Mary Stirrett, a daughter of the late George Stirrett, of Plympton, and sister of R. Stirrett of Petrolea. She and six children survive him, viz., Mrs. James Annand, Walfon-on-Thames, Eng.; George, La Pas, Man.; Jean Isabella, May Marguerite and Bruce, in Toronto, and Wm. E. G., (the eldest) on the homestead. Bruce served three years in France during the war. One brother and two sisters are living, Thos. Symington, Enniskillen; Mrs. Mary A. Cattanach, in California, and Mrs. Helen Rattray, in Windsor. The function to the Wyoming cemetery, and was one of the largest held in the town-ship in many years. Those grave old churchmen of Massachusetts and Connecticut pass-

ed stern regulations about one's cuffs, ruffles, ribbons and bands. And, moreover, if you failed to attend divine service, the town watchman saw to it that if you failed to attend divine service, the town watchman saw to it that time hung heavy on your hands. No one was allowed to leave town on the Sabbath; no one must come to town except for church attendance. No work was permitted on farm, in shop or on ship. A boat could not be used, except when absolutely necessary in getting people to "meeting house." Using a horse, an ox, or a wagon was unlawful if the church were within reasonable walking distance, and "reasonable" was in this case a most expansive word.

Then, too, the odor of cooking food on the Sabbath was an abomination, while to smoke or chew tobacco near a meeting house on Sunday meant a seat in the stocks instead of a church pew! Indeed, this use of "sotweed", as tobacco was called, was a most sinful habit on any day. "None under 21 years, nor any not previously accustomed to it, shall take tobacco without a physician's certificate. No one shall use it publicly in the streets or in the fields or the woods, except on a journey of at least ten miles, or at dinner. Nor shall any one take it in any house in his own town with more than one person taking it at the same time."

Nor did one dare for a long time to make mince pies, or play any musical instrument, "except a drum, a trumpet or a jew's harp!" Card playing was absolutely forbidden; whoever brought cards into the dominion was fined \$5! And as for dancing—the thought was unbearable. Says old Judge Sewall in his famous 17th century diary: "After the Ministers of this town (Boston) come to the Court and complain against a Dancing Master who seeks to set up here and hath mixt Dances, and his time of Meeting is Lecture Day (Thursday)." A little later Sewall joyfully records that the dancing master has fled town, because of debt—"several warrants out for him."



It is to be hoped that Mr. Mc-Namara's Bill to compel children who forget filial obligation to supor their parents—when by reason of age, disease or infirmity the latter are unable to maintain themselves—will be as well received in the country as it was in the Legislature. Cases, come to the surface not infrequently where sons and daughters who have come out into the world requently where sons and daughters who have gone out into the world and prospered forget the old folks at home who "invested" life's little savings in providing their children with well-nourished bodies and well-educated minds. The Legislature has approved of a measure that will give the neglected fathers and mothers some rature on that investment.

Only after the Crown Attorney of the district has been satisfied that there has been neglect or evasion of duty sufficiently great to warrant investigation will those in default be summoned before a Magistrate. The law will not be invoked very often law will not be invoked very often. Few offenders will have the hardihood to face the shame of public exposure. Children who forget will be fewer in Ontario after the McNamara Bill is given the Royal assent.—Globe.



MARK TWAIN'S CABIN IN NEVADA DESERT
