HOW TO USE A SWORD.

5 R SWORD is put into a soldier's hand that he may use it in smiting the enemy. What would be thought of a warrior, who, at the enemy's sug-

gestion, should, in the very midst of the fight, lay down his sword and enter into a lengthened discussion with him as to the maker's stamp, and the quality of the metal, etc.? The soldier may be most earnest and elequent in his efforts to prove that his weapon bears upon it the royal stamp of his sovereign, and that its metal is superlative; yet it is not difficult to see that the enemy gains an immense advantage meantime. Into our hands, Christ, our sovereign, has put the "Sword of the Spirit, which is the Word of God," not for protection and safe keeping, but that we may use it against His and our foes. Is it not time, therefore, to cease our disputation with the Devil, and to "gird on every man his sword ?" Full well Satan knows the stamp it bears, and the keenness of its double edge. Our great Captain, with this weapon, dealt him a deadly blow. There is nothing the Devil fears so much as this "Sword of the Spirit." If he cannot persuade us to break it in pieces and throw it away, he will have us place it in the scabbard, and devote our attention to guarding it. I somehow imagine that in no way can we so well prove our sword, and honour our King, as by slaying His enemies. No wonder that the enemies of Christ triumph, when His soldiers are mainly employed de-fending their weapons. "The Word of fending their weapons. THE CYCLOMETER.



THAT is a cyclometer ? It is a small instrument used by bicycle and tricvcle riders for measuring the distance run. It is attached to the axle of the driv-

ing-wheel, and is so constructed that a train of wheels, contained in a case, and mechanism revolve, setting in motion hands which move on dial-plates outside, as in a watch. These dial-plates show either the number of revolutions of the driving-wheel, or the distance in miles and furlongs. In the former case a little calculation is required to find the exact distance run; in the other, the length of the journey can be seen at once. At various stages on his journey the traveller alights and examines the distance register. He can thus tell how far he has travelled since his last examination: he can calculate his rate of speed, and, if he knows the route, can tell the probable time of his arrival at his destination.

The cylometer is of direct use only to the rider; but it has its lesson for all. In a spiritual sense we are all travellers along a road we have not traversed before. We shall do well, therefore, to carry with us a spiritual cyclometer, and frequently to use it. After the day's work it were well to ask, "What distance have I run to day, and along what road have I travelled ?"

One all-important enquiry which you

must settle before proceeding farther is this:—On which road am I travelling ? Scripture speaks of two paths. There is the broad path that leadeth to destruction, and there is the narrow way that leadeth unto life. Settle at once this question:—Is my face set Heavenward ? Whither do my footsteps tend —to Heaven or hell ? There is no middle course. I am either treading the path that leadeth unto life, or I am following the road that leadeth to destruction. On which road am I ?

Are you a believer ? Then self-examination will open out to you a wide range of enquiry. But beware lest range of enquiry. while looking at yourself you withdraw your gaze from Christ. Self-examination will only be a help so far as it unites you more closely to Him. Do not con-fuse things that differ. Your acceptance before God depends entirely upon the work of Christ for you. The work of the Holy Spirit in you is the result of that acceptance. Is thine heart right ? Measure it fairly; test it honest-Is thine heart The Bible will suggest many topics lv. Self-examination in the of enquiry. light of God's Word will show you your weakness. You are at the best an unprofitable servant; but let not this discourage you. Your source of strength is Christ. Bring all your sins of omission and commission, of thought, word, and deed to the Lord Jesus, and rejoice in His pardoning love. "If we walk in the light as He is in the light, we have fellowship one with another, and the blood of Jesus Christ His Son cleanseth us from all sin."
