

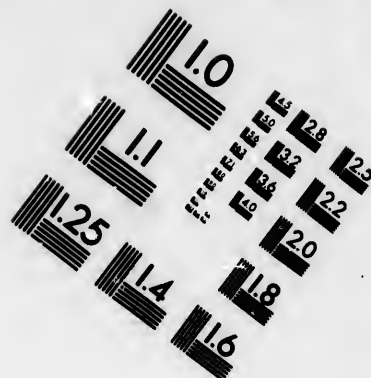
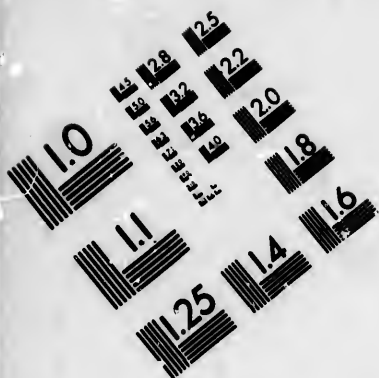
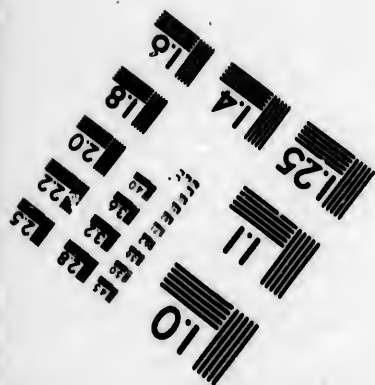
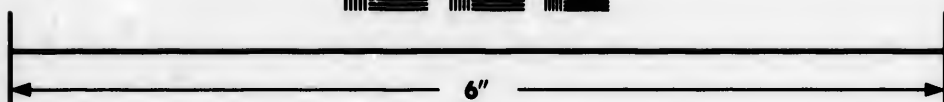
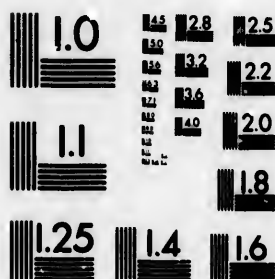


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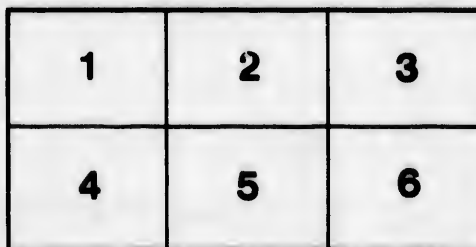
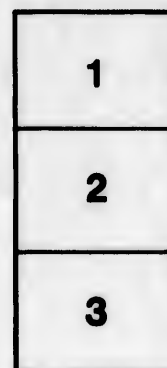
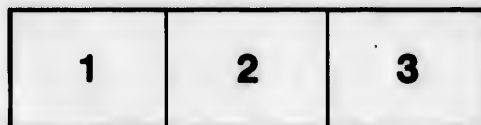
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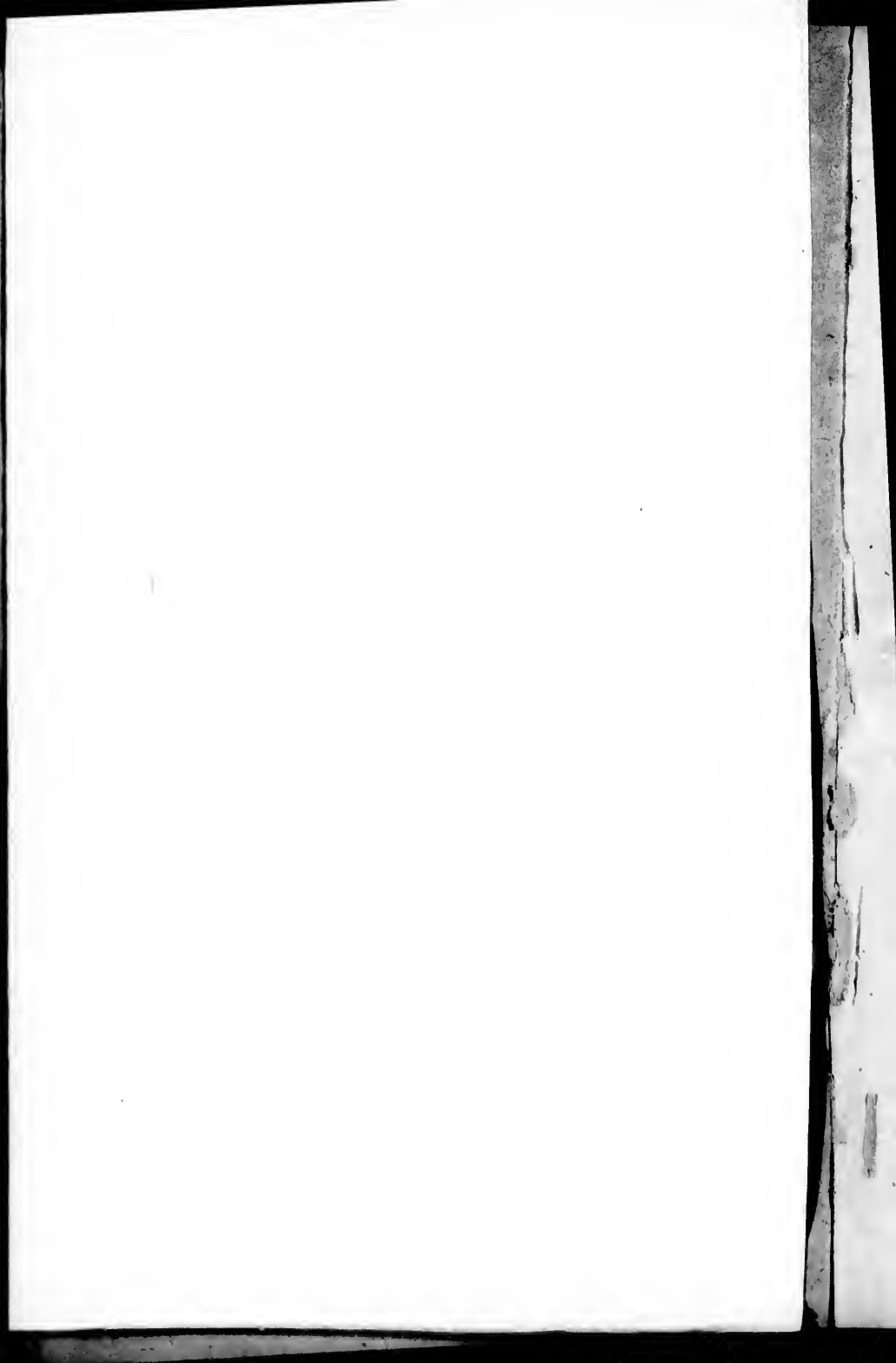
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ECLIPSES IN 1841.

There will be six Eclipses this year—four of the Sun and two of the Moon—as follows.

The first will be a small partial eclipse of the Sun, on Friday, January 22d, at the time of New Moon, visible only in the southern extremity of the Southern Ocean.

The second will be a total eclipse of the Moon, on Friday, February 5th, visible throughout the whole of the western continent and the Pacific Ocean.

Apparent, or Solar time, Evening.

Depth of immersion in the Earth's shadow, 20.62 digits from the northern side.

The third will be a partial eclipse of the Sun, on Sunday, February 21st, early in the morning, at the time of New Moon; invisible in America; but visible in the North Atlantic Ocean, Iceland, and East Greenland.

The fourth will also be of the Sun, on the 18th of July, at 9h. 17m. in the morning, invisible in America, by reason of the Moon's south latitude; but may be seen at Greenland and in the northern European countries.

The fifth will be another great and total eclipse of the Moon, on Monday, August 2d, at the time of the Full; partially visible throughout the whole of the Western continent, and the Pacific Ocean.

Digits eclipsed, 13.58—nearly in the centre of the Earth's shadow.

The sixth and last will be of the Sun, on Monday, August 16th, in the afternoon, at the time of New Moon, a very small eclipse, and invisible here by reason of the Sun's southern latitude. This eclipse will be visible in the South Pacific Ocean, and in some parts of the Southern Ocean.

MORNING AND EVENING STARS.

The Planet Venus will be *Evening Star* till May 14th, thence *Morning Star* through the year.

Jupiter will be *Morning Star* till June 5th, thence *Evening Star* till December 22d, and then again *Morning Star*.

Mars will also be *Morning Star* till April 17th, thence *Evening Star* to the end of the year.

Saturn will be *Morning Star* till June 21st, thence *Evening Star* till December 27th, when he will again be *Morning Star*.

TIME FOR GOING THROUGH THE FALLS,

NEAR THE CITY OF SAINT JOHN.

The Falls are level or still water, at about three and a half hours on the *flood*, and about two and a half on the *ebb*, so that they are passable four times in twenty-four hours, about ten or fifteen minutes each time.—No other rule can be given, as much depends on the floods in the River Saint John, and the time of high water or full sea, which is often hastened by high winds, and in proportion to the height of them.

LIGHT HOUSES.

Commissioners for Light Houses in the Bay of Fundy.—John Ward, senior, Robert W. Crookshank, Thomas Barlow, John Ward, junior, Lauchlan Donaldson, and W. F. W. Owen, Esquires.

Commissioners for Partridge Island and the Beacon Light Houses.—John Ward, senior, and Lauchlan Donaldson, Esquires.

Commissioners of Machias Seal Island, Campo Bello and Saint Andrews' Light Houses.—Hon. Thomas Wyer, Hon. James Allan-shaw, and John Wilson, Esquire.

Lauchlan Donaldson, Esquire, Surveyor of those Light Houses in the Bay of Fundy belonging to New-Brunswick; and also of those belonging to Nova-Scotia which are partly supported by this Province.

Cape Sable Seal Island Light.—The first Light in approaching the Bay of Fundy, is on the South Point of the Seal Island. This is a plain white Light—elevated about 80 feet above high water mark, and may be seen in approaching the Island from any point of the compass. A very dangerous rock, under water, but upon which the sea always breaks, called *Blonde Rock*, lies about two miles S. S. W. by compass, from the Light House. Between this rock and the Island, there are some dangers—the ground is rocky throughout, and large vessels, therefore ought not to attempt passing between them.

Cape Forchu Light.—The Light House on Cape Forchu, on the West side of the entrance to Yarmouth, (Nova-Scotia,) in lat. 43 39, North; lon. 66 8, West, was put in operation on the 15th January, 1840, and exhibits a plain revolving light—visible one minute and a quarter, and invisible half a minute. The building is painted white, and is elevated 135 feet above the level of the sea.

Brier Island Light.—In advancing up the Bay, the next Light is situated on Brier Island, about half a mile N. E. from the N. W. point thereof.—A plain white Light.

Digby Gut Light.—The next Light on the Coast of Nova-Scotia is placed on the West side of Digby Gut—from Brier Island North Eastward. The Coast is very bold and not indented; the Light is therefore chiefly intended as a guide into Digby Basin. The Lamps and Lanterns were renewed in the Spring of 1835, and Reflectors furnished, so that the Light is in high order.—A white Light.

Gannet Rock Light.—This Light bears from the Light on Brier Island, N. W. $\frac{1}{2}$ W. 21 miles. It is intended to warn vessels of their approach to a very dangerous range of shoals and ledges, which extend from the Old Proprietor to the Seal Islands off Machias, a distance of about twenty miles.

Bearings from the Gannet Rock Light House:—

To the Old Proprietor, which dries at $\frac{1}{2}$ ebb, (very dangerous,) E. by N. $\frac{1}{4}$ N. 7 miles. (E. $\frac{1}{4}$ E.

" Black Rock, (always above water 25 feet,) off White Head, N.

" South West Head of Grand Manan, N. W. $\frac{1}{2}$ N.

" Northernmost of the Murr Ledges, (dry at $\frac{3}{4}$ ebb,) N. W. by W. $\frac{1}{4}$ W.

" Southernmost of ditto, called Saint Mary's Ledge, (always out of water,) S. W. by W. $\frac{1}{4}$ W.

" Machias Seal Island Lights, distant about 13 miles, W. by N. $\frac{1}{4}$ N.

NOTE.—Between the Northernmost and Southernmost of the Murr Ledges, there is a range of dangerous rocks and shoals, many of them

always above water, and which extend Westward from the Light House about four miles; from this range, farther Westerly, about eight miles, lies a dangerous breaker, called the Roaring Bull. This may be avoided by keeping three remarkable headlands near the S. W. end of Grand Manan, open.—The red glass having been removed from the Lantern, there is now a flash light—white—twenty seconds dark and forty light in each minute. The Light House is painted in stripes, vertical, black and white.

Machias Seal Islands Lights.—There are two fixed white Lights upon the Machias Seal Islands, elevated about forty-five feet above high water, and bear from each other E. S. E. and W. N. W. distant about 200 feet, by which circumstance of two Light Houses at the same station, they will be immediately distinguished from all other Lights upon the Coast, (British or American)—the following are the bearings from them, viz.:

- To the Southernmost Murr Ledge, (St. Mary's,) E. S. E. easterly.
- " Gannet Rock Light, E. by S. $\frac{1}{2}$ S. 13 miles.
- " Southern Head of Grand Manan, E. by N. $\frac{1}{2}$ N.
- " Northern Head of Grand Manan, N. E. $\frac{1}{2}$ E.
- " N. E. Rock, distant 2 miles, N. E. by N.
- " Little River Head, N. by W.
- " Libby Island Light House, (American,) N. W. by W.

Vessels standing in to the Northward, between these Lights and the Gannet Rock, should tack or haul off the moment they bring these Lights in one, as they will then not be more than three fourths of a mile from the Murr Ledges, if more than five miles to the East of the Lights.

Head Harbour Light.—Next in order after passing Grand Manan and the plain white Light (American) on West Quoddy Point, is Head Harbour Light. This is placed on the North East extremity of Campo Bello, and is a guide to vessels entering the main Channel to West Isles, Moose Island, and the inner Bay of Passamaquoddy; it enables vessels also at all times to enter Head Harbour—it is a fixed white Light.

Point Le Preau Lights.—Upon this projecting head land two Lights are placed, one above the other in the same House, and distant twenty-eight feet.—Both Lights can be seen from every point of the compass, where they may be useful—both are fixed and white. In consequence of orders from the Home Government, this Light House was, in 1840, painted red and white, in stripes of five feet broad each, horizontally, in order that it may be seen more distinctly at a distance.

Partridge Island Light.—This Light at the entrance of the River and Harbour of Saint John, having been established upwards of forty years, requires no particular notice, further than it is a fixed white Light, and that the Light House is red and white in vertical stripes.

Beacon Light.—Within Partridge Island, and upon a Spit or Bar, which extends about half a mile S. S. E. off Sand Point, and which dries at two-thirds ebb, stands the Beacon Tower. Upon this Tower a light is established, which is eminently useful to the coasting trade of Saint John, and to all other vessels having pilots on board, as it enables them to enter the harbour at all hours of the night. A fixed white Light. The House is white and black, in stripes, vertically.

Quaco Light.—A revolving white Light is placed on a small rock off Quaco Head, showing twice full and twice dark in a minute. This Light can be seen from any quarter where a vessel can approach.—The Light House is painted white and red, in horizontal stripes.

Cape Enrage Light.—A new Light House has been lighted on Cape Enrage in Westmorland, nearly opposite Apple River Harbour. The House is painted white.—A plain white light.

N. B.—As the order for painting the Light Houses of New-Brunswick and Nova-Scotia of various colours, arrived late in the Fall, it may so happen that Head Harbour and the Machias Seal Island Light Houses may remain of plain white till next year.

* * * The half of the expense of the Cape Sable and Brier Island Lights is paid by New-Brunswick, as they are so highly useful to vessels trading with this Province.

LIGHT HOUSES IN NOVA SCOTIA.

[In addition to the Light Houses in Nova Scotia, before noticed, there are the following.]

Sambro—Sambro Island, mouth of Halifax harbour—a fixed light.

Roseway—M'Nutt's Island, mouth of Shelburne Harbour—two lights, one above the other. [volving light.]

Liverpool—Coffin's Island, mouth of Liverpool Harbour—one re-

Canso—Island, Gut of Canso—two lights, one above the other.

Halifax—Meagher's Beach, Halifax—one light.

Pictou—Entrance to Pictou Harbour—one fixed light.

Low Point—Entrance to Sydney Harbour—one fixed light.

Cross Island Light is situate at the entrance of Lunenburg Harbour, in lat. 44 22, North; long. 64 6, West. The Light House is situated on the South East end of the Island,—and displays two lights—one a *flash light*, thirty feet above the ordinary fixed light. In clear weather these lights can be seen so soon as a vessel loses sight of Sambro Light, and, under favourable circumstances, it is visible at the distance of five leagues, and distinguishable at three leagues.

Scatarie Light House.—This building is placed near the North Eastern end of the Island, is painted white, and elevated about ninety feet above the level of the sea, exhibiting a revolving light, visible one minute, and invisible half a minute. The light can be seen from a southward or seaward position, and without interruption from any high-land, until the compass bearing becomes to the eastward of N. E. by N. when it will be speedily obscured, and a vessel so placed on that side of the Island, is in danger either of the rocks of Scatarie or the southern shores of Cape Breton Island.—From any position to the Northward or in the Gulf of St. Lawrence, the light can be seen while the distance admits, but when it bears to the Eastward of S. E. a ship is in danger on the N. E. shores of Cape Breton, therefore as a present rule, whereby due warning may be obtained, the light house should never be brought to bear Eastward of N. N. E. or S. E. by S. by compass, nor, yet approach nearer than one and a half or two miles.

Saint Paul's Light Houses.—Two Light Houses have been erected on the North and South extremes of the Island of Saint Paul's.—The one on the North East end of the Island is a very brilliant fixed light, and is elevated about 130 feet above the level of the sea. The one on the South West end of the Island is a Flash Light. One of the light houses will be always open until a ship is on the rocks near the centre. The Northern light can be seen to the southward, on any bearing except between N. by E. and E. by N. when it is obscured by the hills to the southward of it. The southern Light can be seen from the northward on any bearing except between S. S. E. and W. when that is obscured by the hills to the northward of it.

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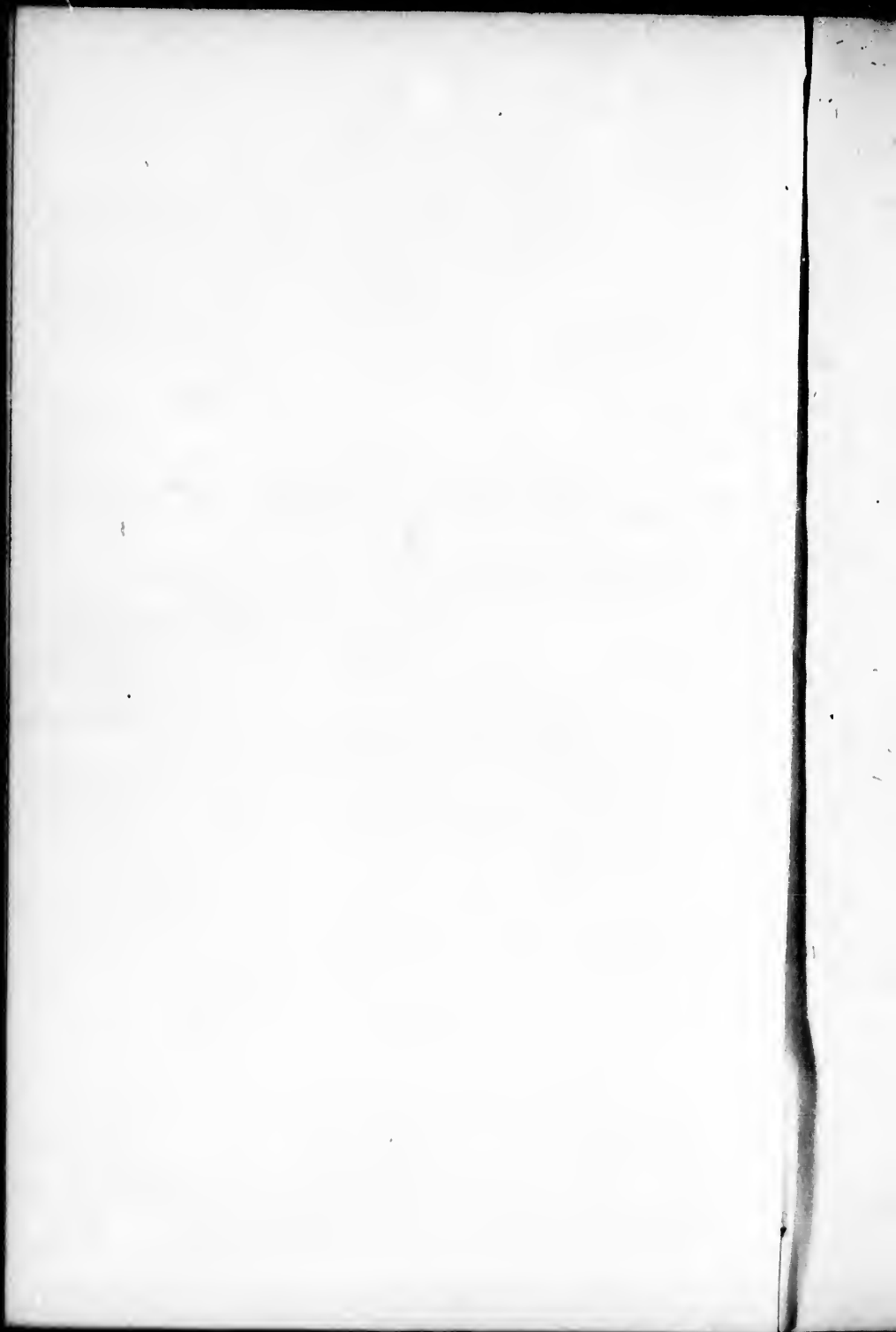

And all Vessels of greater burthen in like proportion with the above scale; and that for all decked British Vessels, whether owned and registered at this Port or otherwise, trading within the Bay of Fundy, and arriving from Ports Northward and Eastward of Cape Sable and West Quoddy Light, within the said Bay of Fundy, there shall be paid in like manner for each and every year, on the first arrival after the first day of April in each year, according to the tonnage and amounts settled by the aforesaid scale.

RATES OF PILOTAGE—Established by the Common Council.

From the first of April to the first of December, the sum of five shillings per foot for bringing any ship or vessel into the harbour of Saint John, and mooring her in a safe place or berth, or securing her alongside of one of the wharves; and five shillings per foot, for removing and taking any ship or vessel out of the harbour. From the first of December to the first of April, one shilling and three pence per foot additional.

In cases where pilots shall be detained on board of vessels, under and by virtue of the Quarantine or Health Laws of the Province, they shall be entitled to demand and receive from the Masters of such vessels, the sum of Ten Shillings per day, for every day of such detention, in addition to the allowance aforesaid.

Coasting vessels, going from one part of the Bay of Fundy to another; British or Foreign steam-boats, or British vessels drawing under six feet of water are not compelled to take pilots; when employed, they are to be paid according to the rates above-mentioned.

For removing vessels from any mooring ground to any wharf, or from any wharf to any mooring ground, or from one wharf to another wharf, and seeing them properly moored or secured, the following rates : For vessels not exceeding 100 tons, 7s. 6d. ; for vessels over 100, and not exceeding 200 tons, 10s. ; for vessels over 200 tons, and not exceeding 300 tons, 15s. ; and for all vessels over 300 tons, the sum of 20s.

The Septennial Act of 1715 extended the duration of Parliament to 7 years, unless dissolved by the King; but it seldom happens that a Parliament sits out this period. AGRICULTURAL AND MISCELLANEOUS ITEMS.

Many a farm, when fresh, has been rendered sterile and unproductive in a few years, by skimming the surface. Deep ploughing brings up latent animal and vegetable particles favourable to the growth of plants, renders the soil loose and friable, and above all, prevents the ground from washing. Hilly land should always be ploughed in a circular direction, and if at the same time it is broken deep, it is rarely the case that hills will not retain all the rain that falls upon them.—*Agriculturist.*

ROHAN POTATOES.—We have been favoured by Mr. Gregory with the following memoranda, having reference to the *Rohan* Potatoes; which have these advantages: that a small quantity of seed is required—there is a great saving of labour, particularly in digging—and they will be found more useful in remote settlements, where there is no market. At the same time it is considered that the season is too short, to bring this potatoe to perfection, although it will doubtless improve when acclimated. Mr. G. makes the subjoined remarks:

"I question the propriety of recommending them for immediate and general introduction. The result of the experiments reported is very satisfactory; but it is very doubtful whether several of the varieties now in general cultivation would not yield better with the same pains, allowing, however a larger quantity of seed. The Christie potatoes, for instance, as in Mr. W.'s experiment."

Mr. Gregory's Garden.—From 15 eyes cut from a Rohan Potatoe, and planted in 15 hills, allowing a square yard for each hill, there were raised 172 potatoes, weighing 93 pounds, and measuring 6 pecks, being at the rate of 483 bushels to the acre, with 5 pecks of seed. Two of the potatoes weighed 5 pounds 2½ ounces, the larger being 3 pounds 1 ounce.

Mr. Watts' Garden.—From one Rohan Potatoe weighing 6 ounces, 26 eyes were cut and planted in 9 hills, allowing a square yard to each. The produce was 70 pounds of potatoes, measuring nearly 4 pecks, and may be estimated at the rate of 530 bushels to the acre, with 8 pecks of seed.

Mr. Watts tried another experiment with the White Christie Potatoe, when a crop at the rate of 740 bushels to the acre was obtained. The ground planted was somewhat more than a square rod, and the Potatoes raised measured 23½ pecks.—[*Frederickton Sentinel.*

Population.

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POTATOES.—It is said that late potatoes, of such as are not ripe, make the best seed, and that planting such restores a degenerated variety.

How to obtain new varieties of Potatoes.—Take the apples of potatoes, or potato hails before the frost has hurt them, hang them up by the foot stalks in a dry closet, where they will not freeze. Let them hang till March or April. Then mash the apples, wash the seeds from the pulp, and dry them in a sunny window. Sow the seeds in a bed about the first of May. When the plants are four or five inches high, transplant them into ground well prepared, one or two in a hill. They will produce full grown apples, and some of the roots will be as large as hens' eggs. English farmers hold it absolutely necessary to renew their potatoes from the top seed once in fourteen or fifteen years.

SAVING SEEDS.—Every farmer should endeavour to save such seeds as he may want, selecting from the best and most productive plants. There is scarcely an article cultivated by the farmer or the gardener, that may not be improved by selection and care. Plants, the varieties of which are liable to intermix, when intended for seed, should be planted at such distances from each other, that the pollen of their flowers cannot intermix. Beets, cabbages, turnips, squashes, and even corn, should be planted at a distance from other varieties of the same plant, if pure seed would be had. Seeds keep well, by simply cutting them when sufficiently ripe, hanging them up in a dry place, until thoroughly dried or until wanted. Herbs, too, should be saved, as more or less of them are wanted in every family for culinary or medicinal purposes. There are many who might, were it not for their negligence, secure an abundant supply of good seeds, and pot or sweet herbs, that when such things are wanted are obliged to rely on the greater forethought and charity of their neighbours.

CUCUMBER SEED.—Some people do not know how to cleanse the cucumber seeds which they save from their own gardens. They cut the cucumbers open, dry them and dig out the seed with the dry mucilage adhering to the seeds. A better way is—when the cucumbers are ripe, cut them open and scrape out the seed, with all the mucilage, into an iron or tin vessel large enough to contain them. Put water into the vessel, and set it in a place moderately warm. In a few hours fermentation will take place, that will collect all the mucilage together on the top of the water, leaving the sound and heavy seeds to sink clear to the bottom. Pour off the water with the thick stuff on the top, and there you have the seeds clean. Put them where they will dry and then lay them away till the next spring.—*Maine Cultivator.*

Herbs, if dried in the sun, turn yellow, lose their fragrance and much of their real virtue. They should be spread out thin, say upon the floor of a garret or open chamber and left to dry in the shade, being occasionally turned. When sufficiently dried, they may be tied in bunches and hung up.—*Ib.*

PRESERVATION OF CABBAGES.—The Albany Cultivator recommends the following method of preserving cabbages for winter use, as the result of experience :—

"The cabbages should be gathered before injury is done them by the severe fall frosts; the heavy outside leaves should remain on the stalk. Fix a string or cord round the stump near the roots, suspended from the sleepers with the heads downward in a cool cellar, and

they are ready and fit for use at all times. Cabbages kept in this manner retain all their peculiar flavour and sweetness; the whole virtue of the stump and leaves is concentrated in the part which is used; are handy of access, occupy but little room which would be occupied for other purposes, and seldom, if ever, rot; the outside leaves wilt and contract, and in time become quite dry, which form a sort of coating that serves to exclude the air from the inside of the head.

"Another method, highly recommended, is to cut the head from the stump, pack close in a sack, taking care to fill up the vacancies with dry chaff, thereby excluding the air, and keep in a dry cellar."

ASHES FOR TURNIPS.—A great object is gained by bringing turnips forward as rapidly as possible after they come up, as the principal danger of destruction or failure is before the rough leaf is put forth. In England, bone dust is usually drilled in with the seed, to hasten the early growth; here bone dust is comparatively rare, but a mixture of soot and ashes, or ashes alone, is found to be a very good application, particularly for the common turnip, and may be sown upon them broad cast, or scattered over the rows by hand. It will hasten their growth, prove a partial protection against the insects, and improve the size and goodness of the roots.—[*Cultivator*.]

FOR SCOURS OR DYSENTERY IN HORSES.—One-fourth of an ounce of gum gamboge, half an ounce of aloes; half an ounce of sulphur;—reduce all to a fine powder; add flour and water till it makes it thick dough or paste. Divide it into four pills; give one pill every night and morning. Give the horse half an ounce of ipecacuana, dissolved in about two quarts of hot water; by adding half a pint of this solution into a pail of water for him to drink every four hours. When the fever has abated, take a quart of oak bark, pour two quarts of hot water upon it, and let it stand till cool. Give the horse a pint of this bark tea in a pail of water, and let the horse drink of it freely.

Another.—Take a table-spoonful of saleratus, reduce it to a powder, and give it to the horse in a pint of new milk. Repeat the dose if necessary. This remedy has proved effectual in some severe cases.

NOVEL AND DELICATE OPERATION.—We are gratified to learn, from the Boston Medical and Surgical Journal, that Dr. Dix, of that city has succeeded in an operation for the relief of squinting. It consists in a division of the muscle by which the eye is turned inward, and, we presume, is the same as those which have, of late, been mentioned in foreign journals. The operation was performed with but little pain to the patient—a young lady—yet with manifest utility, as her vision is much increased.

LENGTH OF DAYS.—At Berlin and London the longest day has sixteen and a half hours, and the shortest seven and a half hours. At Stockholm and Upsal, the longest has eighteen and a half hours, and the shortest five and a half. At Hamburg, Dantzic, and Stettin, the longest day has seventeen hours and the shortest seven. At St. Petersburg and Tobolsk, the longest has nineteen and the shortest five hours. At Tornea in Finland, the longest day has twenty-one hours and a half, and the shortest two and a half. At Wardorhus in Norway, the day lasts from May 21 to July 22, without interruption; and in Spitsbergen, the longest day lasts three months and a half.

It is said the male grasshopper sings, and not the female. What a happy set the grasshoppers must be—they have dumb wires.

ROYAL MAIL STEAMERS.

The Mails for North America are made up in London on the 3d and 18th of March, April, May, June, July, August, September, and October, and on the 3d of November, December, January and February; and a Steamer starts on the next succeeding days from Liverpool for Halifax and Boston, with the Mails. When the 3d or 18th falls on Sunday, the Mail is made up in London on Monday, and the Steamer starts on Tuesday.—Returning, a Steamer leaves Boston on the 1st and 15th, and Halifax on the 3d and 18th of March, April, May, June, July, August, September, and October, and Boston on the 1st and Halifax on the 3d of November, December, January and February.

The passage from Liverpool to Halifax is made in about eleven days, and from Halifax to Liverpool in ten.

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Two Markets will be held at Spring field, (Head of Bellisle Bay,) King's County, in 1841—one on the first Tuesday in May, and the other on the first Tuesday in October.

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
