

The Church Society was established in 1842.

Its objects are :

- 1. A Mission Fund to aid in paying missionaries to struggling congregations.
- 2. A General Fund to aid in the erection of Churches and Parsonages, in the education of the children of the Clergy, to aid congregations in maintaining schools for their children, and for the general expenses of the Society.
 - 3. A Widows' and Orphans' Fund for the Clergy.
 - 4. A Pension Fund for agod and infirm Clergy.
 - 5. A Fund to provide higher education for the children of the Clergy,
- 6. To provide bibles, prayer books and religious publications, either gratuitously or at reduced prices.

Its affairs are managed.

- 1. By the Central Board and its sub-Committees.
- (a) The Central Board is composed of all the Clergy licensed within the Diocese, the Churchwarders, and others elected by the Society, being members of the Corporation.

- (b) The sub-Committees are the Finance, the Land, the Investment and Education Committees.
- 2. By the Clergy Trust Committee, which manages (a) the Bishopric Endowment Fund. (b) the capital arising from the commutation of the Clergy Reserves, and (c) the Endowment Funds of the several missions and congregations.
- 3. By the Diocesan Board of Missions, composed of clergymen and laymen elected by the Church Society and by the Synod.

This Board pays all the missionaries of the Diocese, and receives for this purpose (a) the annual grant of the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel. (b) the Mission Fund of Church Society, (c) the contributions or assessment of the congrugations served by the missionaries, (d) a grant from the Clergy Trust, (c) the interest of the Sustentation Fund.

All letters ref rring to the assessment or contributions of congregations should be addressed to the R.v. A. A. Von Iffland, B. rgerville, the Secretary, or to Mr. John Hamilton, the Honorary Treasurer of the Diocesan Board.

All other letters and contributions should be addressed to the Rev. M. M. Fothergill, the Secretary, or to Commissary General Irvine, C.B. C.M.G., Quebec, the Honorary Treasurer of the Church Society.

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ANNUAL MEETING.

The Annual Meeting was held on Wednesday afternoon, 1st February, in the National School.

The Lord Bishop of the Diocese in the chair.

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After prayers the minutes of the previous meeting were read and confirmed.

The reports of the Central Board, Diocesan Board and Clergy Trust Committee were presented, adopted and ordered to be printed.

The accounts of the Clergy Trust Fund, Bishopric Endowment Fund, Local Endowment Funds, the Church Society and Diocesan Board were adopted and ordered to be printed.

The report of the St. Francis District Association, giving an interesting account of the work of the Church in that portion of the Diocese, was read by the Secretary and ordered to be printed in the Annual Report.

The Vice-Presidents were re elected with the addition of George Lampson, Esq., Honorary Counsel.

A vote of thanks was passed to the Honorary Counsel, viz.: the Hon. George Irvine, Q.C., James Dunbar, Esq., Q.C., and George Lampson, Esq., for their valuable services rendered during the year.

His Excellency the Marquis of Lansdowne, Governor General, and fifteen other gentlemen were elected members of corporation.

Twenty-one members were elected to serve on the Central Board.

Fourteen members were elected to serve on the Clergy Trust Committee.

Rev. R. W. Norman, D.C.L., was elected a member of the Diocesan Board in place of the late Rev. George V. Housman.

The thanks of the Society were given to the Auditors for their assidnous care and attention in the examination of the Society's accounts.

A vote of thanks was also tendered to Com. General Irvine, C.B., C. M. G., and John Hamilton, Esq., for their valuable services as Honorary Treasurers of the Church Society and Diocesan Board respectively.

A By-law was introduced on the management of Endowment Funds, which was read and stands over for final adoption.

The Lord Bishop pronounced the Benediction, and the meeting adjourned.

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ANNUAL REPORT OF THE CENTRAL BOARD FOR THE YEAR 1887.

(Presented to the Church Society, February 1st, 1888.)

In presenting the Forty-Sixth Annual Report, the Central Board has reason to render thanks to Almighty God for the great measure of success which has attended the Society for nearly half a century.

The following comparative statement will show the result of the operations for the year in comparison with that of 1886. Showing a deliciency of \$384.32 which the Board cannot but deeply regret.

GENERAL FUND.

(To aid in the erection of Churches and Parsonages, in the support of Schools, in the Education of the children of the Clergy, in the formation of Local Endowments, and for the general expenses of the management of the Society.)

The following grants have been paid during the year, viz., \$486.04 to the Education Fund for use in paying salaries of Teachers in various Districts, \$150 as outfit to three Clergymen, \$100 to the new Parsonage at Valcartier and \$150 to the Parsonage at Magog.

The following applications for aid are still under consideration, viz., from Portneuf, Kingsey Falls, Scottstown and Stanhope towards erection of churches and from New Liverpool towards the Parsonage.

The work which the church is doing by means of your Society in the Diocese deserves all the care and attention which can possibly be bestowed upon it. The burdens of the coming year will doubtless be quite sufficient without carrying over any from this year.

It is much, therefore, to be hoped that all Parishes and Missions will, without exception, render the General Fund a generous support and will take care that the coming Quinquagesima offerings may enable the Board to meet all claims for aid from the congregations before mentioned. There has been a slight increase of \$41.42 in the receipts during the year.

MISSION FUND.

(For the payment of the Stipends of Missionaries in conjunction with the Annual Grant from the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel, assessments from the Rural Congregations, and a Grant from the Clergy Trust Fund, the Interest of the Invested Capital of the Sustentation Fund, administered by the Diocesan Board.)

A full account of the Missionary operations of the Society will be found in the Annual Report of the Diocesan Board and Missionary reports of the clergy.

The receipts by offertories and subscriptions throughout the Diocese shew a decrease of \$341 in comparison with 1886.

PENSION FUND.

(For aged and infirm Clergymen.)

In consequence of the lamented death of the Reverend William King and the return to active duty of the Reverend F. A. Smith, there only remains one elergyman upon this Fund.

There has been a decrease of \$44.12 in the receipts during the year which is much to be deplored.

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There has been steady progress made in the schools aided by your Society during the past year, Very great difficulty is, however, experienced in some localities in obtaining Teachers. The Schools at Bourg Louis (No. 3) Portneuf (No. 2) Hemison and West Frampton are closed, notwithstanding that great efforts have been made to procure certificated Teachers who are members of the Church.

The Colonial and Continental Church Society generously assists in the work of education in the Diocese.

ENDOWMENTS.

Robert Hamilton, Esq., having again very generously offered aid to certain missions having endowments, the following have complied with the requirements of Mr. Hamilton, and thus added largely to the amount of their funds, viz.: Brompton, Bury, Charleston Rectory (Hatley), Malbaie and Point St. Peter, Magog, Melbourne and Richmond, Rivière du Loup en bas, Upper Durham and L'Avenir. The above mentioned offer remains open until the 12th May next. A full statement as to endowments, etc., will be found in the report and accounts of the Clergy Trust Committee.

LIFE MEMBERS.

LEGACIES.

A legacy of \$50 has been received from the executors of the late Mrs. Sample. \$500 has also been bequeathed to the Widows' and Orphans' Fund by the late Wm. White, Esq., and received by the Hon. Treasurer shortly after closing his books for the year.

Mr. Walton Smith, one of the most regular attendants of the Board, and for some time Honorary Secretary-Treasurer of the Depository; he ever took a keen interest in the Society's work.

The above statement is in some respects a satisfactory one, as it shows that there has been no falling off in the amount of assessments received, and that the obligations of your Board in respect to stipeneds have been met without diminishing the balance in hand at the close of 1886.

It is a matter of regret, however, that the subscriptions to the Mission Fund are not as large by over \$200 as they were in 1886.

If the contributions to the guarantee fund for new missions has occasioned this, it is none the less to be regretted; since subscription to any new object, however worthy, ought not to be given at

the expense of another which has such strong claims as the Mission Fund of the Church Society.

The agreements with the various missions expiring at the close of the year, your Board has been occupied for some time past in negotiations for a renewal of these engagements on the basis of a small increase.

With the exception of some few congregations with which your Board is still in correspondence, they have all cheerfully complied with the proposals made to them.

The total increase, however, will not add a very large sum to

our missionary resources.

The opening of the new missions of Newport and Barnston, whose clergymen are supported by the Guarantee Fund, is a matter of interest in the record of missionary work in the Diocese. The subject is fully alluded to in the Report of the St. Francis District Association, from which we learn that every reasonable ground for encouragement has been extended to the Rev. Messrs, Eames and Robertson by the people.

The great difficulty of securing suitable men has interfered with the complete fulfilment of the scheme in the opening of a third new mission, and this difficulty is also injuriously affecting the spiritual interests of some of the older missions. St. John's Melbourne, Durham, Cookshire and Shigawake are now all vacant.

In this connection your Board would draw the attention of the Clergy and faithful Laity of Christian fathers and Christian mothers in the Diocese, to the duty incumbent upon them to use their influence, so that more of our young men may be moved to offer themselves for the work of the sacred ministry. There should be from among these a sufficient number of candidates for Holy Orders, not only to fill the vacancies as they occur in the Diocese, but also to supply in part the demand for missionaries in the North-West and elsewhere.

Of means and opportunities to prepare the elergyman and equip him for his calling, there is no lack. Learning, zeal, and experience stand ready in our University to instruct, and to guide, and to form the missionary for his work. But before a man will come to be trained for the work, he must possess, and be possessed by, a love for the work. And love for the work, respect for the work, is not sufficiently encouraged, it is to be feared—even if it is not actually chilled—in our youth by the habitual tone and tenour of their surroundings. Surely something must have been left undone that ought to have been done, when there are found so few among us willing to give themselves for the service of Christ and His Church. If the Clergy, as well as the devout

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rgyman and ng, zeal, and ruet, and to before a man i, and be possork, respect be feared the habitual neithing must nen there are it the service is the devout Laity—if mothers and fathers—would take this matter more to heart, look upon it as in some sort a reproach against the Church m the Diocese, and make it their business to watch for and seek out fitting young men in their several Parishes, and endeavour to arouse in them a desire for the work of the ministry, the need of applying to the Mother Church to send her sons as well as her money into such long established and well organized colonies as this would soon cease to exist.

During the year just passed the Diocesan Board completed the twenty-fifth year of its existence. It may not be uninteresting then to take a brief retrospect and observe what progress has been made in the Diocese during the quarter of a century in which its missionary work has been under its direction.

At the time your Board was constituted in 1862, with the exception of Sherbrooke and Three-Rivers, there was not a single cure of souls outside of the Parish of Quebec that was self-sustaining.

There were thirty-four missions, all at the outset receiving aid from the Diocesan Board; and it is fairly computed that prior to 1863, when the present system actually came into force, the total amount supplied by these thirty-four missions towards the support of the Clergymen ministering among them did not exceed \$3000 per annum.

Of these thirty-four missions fourteen have eeased to be a charge upon the missionary funds of the Diocese, and are most of them helping in the work of God and His Church outside their own boundaries.

In addition to this nine other missions, not included in the above, are now to be found on the Diocesan lists, two of which are self-supporting.

We have therefore now forty-three separate charges in the Diocese covering the ground occupied by thirty-four in 1862, of which sixteen have become self-supporting. Though it but imperfectly represents the progress made, when the missions existing in 1862 are spoken of as occupying the ground; for many of the new missions, since formed, have established their roots firmly in soil which, before, it had been only possible to survey at a distance, with scant knowledge of its fruitful character. A quarter of a century ago, Magog and Georgeville, Brompton and Windsor, Ascot Corner and Newport were scarcely thought of as suitable fields for the establishment of organized missions. Now we are beginning to realize that in the near future we may look upon these still feeble outgrowths of missionary enterprise as stepping stones under the Divine Blessing to yet further successes.

And if we seek for evidence of progress in the more abundant

offerings of the people the test does not fail.

About \$3000 was the measure of the capacity and readiness of the congregations in 1862 to contribute of their substance towards the maintenance of the Church Ministrations. The assessments received during 1887 amounted to nearly \$10,000; and this only takes account of four out of the sixteen self-supporting Parishes. The remaining twelve may faily be set down as compilating at least \$7,500, and we have \$17,500 in 1887 as contrasted with \$3,000 in 1862. A computation of the amount raised in 1862. for Extra Parochial and Extra Diocesan purposes, would be difficult to make. It cannot in the nature of the case have been large. probably under \$1,000. In 1887 fourteen Parishes and Missions in the St. Francis District, not reckoning Sherbrooke, contributed \$1,764 towards the work of the Church outside their own borders. The self-sustaining Parish of Melbourne which in 1862, could only promise \$250 a year towards its Clergyman's stipend. raised \$394 for outside objects in 1887, and many other cases could be referred to in which the same spirit has been exhibited. And whilst it may seem in some sort to be travelling beyond its special province, your Board cannot avoid a reference to the part taken by the Diocese at large, on behalf of Missionary work, under the direction of the noble Societies in England, and in our own North-Western Territories. It is far from being claimed that we are doing all we ought to do: but taking into consider of on the circumstances of this Diocese, it may fairly be alleged that we have not fallen behind the others either in respect to the offerings in response to the Epiphany and Ascensiontide appeals, or as regards the more recent but most valuable work of the Women's Auxiliary Associations, the contributions from this source in our Diocese during the past year having been exceeded only by those of the large and wealthy Diocese of Toronto.

Other evidences of advancement during the last quarter of a century could be pointed out, and which all middle aged members of the Church can easily recognize for themselves. Those that have been referred to, however, are sufficiently palpable and important to justify your Board in an expression of devout thankfuness to Almighty God, for the great and substantial measure of success with which he has blessed the work of His Church during this period of time, success which has been achieved in spite of many difficulties, and which for this very reason cannot fail to strengthen the hands of those who are still fighting the good fight in the midst

of difficulties equally great.

The reports of the Clergy serving under the Diocesan Board are

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hereunto appended, and are full of valuable details in connection with their work, your Board would bespeak for them a careful perusal. It is only from these narratives of ordinary work, varied occasionally by incidents of more than usual interest in the lives of our Missionaries, that we are able to secure that supply of particular information so necessary to the growth and maintenance of our sympathy with their trials and labours as well as their successes.

The following appointments have been made during the year: In the month of February, the Revd. R. W. Colston to the Mission of Ascot. The Revd. W. C. Bernard to the Mission of Portneuf.

In the month of March, Mr. Alex. Robertson (ordained in June following) to the new Mission of Newport The Revd. J. Eames to the new Mission of Barnston.

In the month of May, the Revd. Josiah Ball to the Mission of Labrador; and in the month of September, the Revd. G. T. Harding to the Mission of Sandy Beach.

Your Board has to regret the removal from the Diocese of the Revd. A. H. Judge, to New York, and the Revd. F. E. J. Lloyd to Charlottetown, Prince Edward Island: the former, one of the most faithful and successful of our Missionaries, and whose loss will be seriously felt in the St. Francis District: the latter, during his comparatively short stay, falling behind no one in zealous labours for the Master.

Report of the St. Francis District Association of the Church Society for the Year 1887.

The most noteworthy event of the year in the District, in the matter of Church progress, is the opening of the two new missions of Newport and Barnston, the first result of the movement for Church extension, begun at Sherbrooke exactly two years ago. A full account of this movement appears in the report from this District for last year; suffice it to say that the statement of our wants, then laid before the Church in the city of Quebec, was responded to with a hearty kindness that can never be forgotten, and of the sum of \$1500 a year, for three years, asked for by the Bishop, to enable the Diocesan Board to open at least three new missions, the greater part was subscribed there within a few days. To meet this, \$500 a year was at once pledged by the clergy of this district as our fair share, a pledge which was assumed with hearty readiness by the laity at the Deanery Board meeting of

last year.

The money was now ready; and the next question, always a much more difficult one, was to find the men. The first was found in the Rev. Alexander H. Robertson, L. S. T., ordained from Bishop's College last June, who was at once appointed to work in the new mission of Newport, during his Diaconate, under the supervision of the Rev. A. H. Judge, and with Mr. Judge's valuable experience to draw upon. The new mission of Barnston was at the suggestion of the clergy who knew the district and the man, offered by the Bishop to the Rev. Joseph Eames, B. A., of Bishop's College, then missionary at Sandy Beach. Mr. Eames at once accepted the call from his Bishop. though at some considerable sacrifice to himself, and has now been some four months working at Barnston, where he has been received by all classes with the greatest kindness, and, what is still more satisfactory, his mission from the Church of England heartily welcomed. This was made evident when it became necessary to select a place in Barnston as the headquarters of the new mission, several localities being anxious to secure the advantage. The village of Wayville was finally chosen as the most central spot, and the offer was made to the people of Wayville by the Bishop, that he would fix the headquarters of the mission and build a church there, on condition that they would build a parsonage house for the missionary, to cost not less than \$1000. Barnston Corner and Baldwin's Mills, and probably

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other localities, were eager to accept the Bishop's offer if Way-ville should fail; but within the time allowed them for their canvass, the good people of Wayville secured the necessary funds, and church and parsonage are to be built there next summer. In the meantime, failing to find a home in Wayville, Mr. Eames is residing at Barnston Corner; and the members of his newly formed congregation there, though disappointed in securing his permanent residence among them, are already bestirring themselves to provide a church. The Association bespeaks for the spirited people of Wayville and Barnston Corner the kind sympathy and help of well-to-do churchmen throughout the district generally. Mr. Eames has service now every Sunday at Barnston Corner. Wayville and Baldwin's Mills.

For the third mission no clergyman has yet been found. So far from this, the Association has to report with deep regret two old and important parishes as vacant, that of Durham, from which the Rev. G. T. Harding, after 12 years of faithful service, has removed to Sandy Beach; and that of Cookshire, from which the Rev. A. H. Judge, after too brief a ministry of five years among us, is leaving us for the City of New York. The Association desire to record their sense of the value of Mr. Judge's able and loving ministrations, and their great regret at his departure from

the Diocese.

The total amount contributed during the year within this district for both home and foreign Church Work, by the 15 parishes which have reported, is close upon \$23,500.

The following is a list of the amounts contributed (in the Parishes which have reported) for the missionary work of the

church outside their own borders :-

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Amounting in all to the handsome sum of \$3041, contributed by 15 of our Parishes and Missions, out of 20, to the work of the Church outside their own borders. And of this sum, no less than \$1.087 was sent away to help to sustain the work of the Church outside the Diocese altogether.

The Association regrets its inability to make this interesting

statement complete, owing to no reports being sent in from the remaining Parishes and Missions, namely, Bury, Ascot and West-

bury, Dudswell, and Drummondville.

But by comparing the amounts contributed for the Church's mission work outside their own horders by the 15 parishes which have reported, with the amounts contributed in the same parishes last year, it is found that this year exceeds last year by the sum of \$1233. This result affords ground for devout thankfulness, for in the judgment of the Association there is no bett a test of advancing spiritual life in the Church than self-denying gifts in aid of her mission work.

ACTON

The Rev. L. C. Wurtele reports:—

I am sorry it is my duty to chronicle the occurrence of two disastrous fires that have checked the material progress of the mission. Actonvale had commenced to prosper. It had the benefit of the Rosconi Woolen Factory, that gave employment in the

building itself to over forty hands.

The looms were running 18 hours in every 21, with an an amount of orders on hand as would give employment for 9 months to come. However, on December the 20th, 1886, it was completely consumed by fire. The loss was partially co-cred by insurance. Though not yet rebuilt, we have great expectations of seeing next year one built three times its size.

Since the fire nine English families through lack of employ-

ment have been compelled to leave and settle elsewhere.

But the mission had to suffer loss in another quarter, by the same element, for on September the 19th last, the village of Danby was quite obliterated, the only vestige remaining being a chimney belonging to the bakery.

Twenty-nine buildings including our little church, and the Grand Trunk station, were consumed. The appearance of the place after

the fire was really and truly desolation itself.

The loss of the inhabitants was great; as the fire came on very suddenly and unexpectedly, by a sudden change of the wind, so that scarcely anything was saved. I believe only six persons had any insural ones, a organ in oth

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very that any insurance at all on their property. We were among the fortunate ones, as the little church bore an insurance of \$250.00 and the organ of \$75.00. Since then seven English families have settled in other places.

Notwithstanding these disheartening circumstances, we must arow that God is good, and great are His mercies. Had the fire come on the village in the night, there would certainly have been loss of life, when only loss of property was the result, and life is more precious than worldly substance.

There appears also to be among the remaining families a more fraternal feeling, a proof that the grace of God is being abundantly shall men them.

shed upon them.

At present the church services are held in the Dissentient school

house about a quarter of a mile from the station.

We have to record the death of William Hardy, on February the 6th last. He had led an exemplary life, and died in the sure and certain hope of the resurrection to eternal life. For several years he had been the people's churchwarden.

On June 6th the congregation had the pleasure of a visit from his Lordship the Bishop of Quebec, and five candidates were confirmed. His visits always do much good to the congregation.

The appearance of St. Mark's church in the interior was changed for the better on last Easter. Over the platform, between chancel rails and end of aisle, hung a handsome chandelier, the present of Mrs. Wm. Hardy. The windows had new curtains, given by Mrs. G. B. Wells, and on the aisle floor was matting, six feet wide, purchased with funds collected during lent by the Sunday School children. For these gifts the thanks of the congregation are tendered to the donors.

During the past year, Divine service was held on Sundays in St. Mark's church morning and evening, and in Danby at three o'clock in the afternoon. In West Wickham, a service was held every second Monday evening. The chief festivals were also observed. The number of my services with a sermon were 197. The average attendance was at West Wickham 10½, at

Actonvale 27, and at Dauby 32½.

ASCOT AND WESTBURY. (Received late.)

The Rev. R. Waller Colston reports:

Your Missionary took charge of this Mission in the end of May last.

The Mission is made up of three organized congregations: the Church of the Holy Comforter, Ascot Corners; The Church of St. Thomas, Apostle and Mortyr, Westbury, and an unconsecrated Church East Angus. The latter is free of debt, and will be ready for consecration as soon as a font and some other requisites for the due performance of the Divine offices of the Church, have been obtained.

The mission is unfortunately racked with internal dissensions. To such an extent is the bad feeling carried, that on one occasion the ministrations of your missionary to the sick and dying were rejected, and this by a churchman.

It is with great regret that I have to report, that through ill health absolutely nothing beyond the Sunday services has been done since the beginning of July last. I have to thank Messrs. J. King, Brooks, and Dixon, Students of Bishop's Collège, Lennoxville, for their kind assistance in the Services on Sunday.

In September a branch of the Church of England Temperance Society was started in East Angus and promises to be a power for good in the place.

Our thanks are due to Mrs. Williams for two bundles of useful articles for Christmas tree.

I append the usual statistical statement:

BARFORD.

The Rev. C. B. Washer reports:

Dixville.—We are plodding along here, in the day of small things. The few church people are being ministered to, and persons outside the pale are becoming better acquainted with the church's system. We have a service every Sunday, and every

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end of May

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of small ed to, and l with the and every Wednesday evening, and on the morning of such days as Christmas, Ash Wednesday, Good Friday, Ascension and Thanksgiving, with encouraging little congregations. The Sunday school is small, a little larger in number perhaps, and each member willingly submits to discipline. There is slight improvement in attendance at Holy Communion.

84. Lawrence.—The fortnightly Sunday service regularly kept up here, with a few omissions last winter, when the snow roads were worse than usual. The kind balles, mentioned in my last report as conducting a Sunday school, performed the same good office this summer. The church building has un lergone necessary repairs, and the ground in front has received more levelling and smoothing.

Stanhope.—The congregation has continued good, assembling every alternate Sunday. But we must increase the number of Sunday services in the year if church work here is to progress. Before each service I teach a few children. We might have a flourishing Sunday school if we could get the help we need. The topic of interest at this station is the proposal to erect a church. A most suitable site, in the best part of the village, has been donated by Mr. and Mrs. Archibald Wilson; and subscriptions are being canvassed. We hope to commence building operations next spring.

Percyboro.—Service every other Sunday, and well attended, and proportion of communicants large. There is here considerable appreciation of the church's privileges. This appreciation was specially manifested recently by a gift kindly made by the people to their elergyman.

Hereford.—I have occasionally ministered in the church at this place during the year. Little can be looked for till a resident elergyman can be provided for the neighbourhood.

I regret that I have not been able of late to move about the mission with much vigour; and my house to house visiting is less regular and frequent than formerly. I am hoping for a teturn of normal strength, when I shall be able to attend better to this most important part of mission work.

BARNSTON.

The Rev. J. Eames reports:

In this my first report from the newly opened mission of Barnston—with an existence of only a little more than three months, I cannot speak of a spiritual progress, but merely give a general outline of what has been done. Upon my advent to the Mission in August last I at once sought out the few church people in the immediate vicinity of Wayville and Barnston Corner, and made arrangements for regular Sunday services at both places, intending, upon a more thorough knowledge of the ground, to extend my services to other points within the township.

This I have in part been able to do. Preceding the beginning of services in each locality with pastoral calls from house to house.

Regular Sunday services are now given at Barnston Corner, Wayville and Baldwin's Mills. The attendance on these services has on the whole been remarkably good and much interest shown. And I am more than pleased to report that this interest is not of a transitory nature, passing away with a more intimate acquaintance with the Church service.

On the 9th October last, the Lord Bishop of Quebec made to the people of Wayville, through the Rev. Dr. Roe, a most kind and liberal offer to build them a church, providing they would build a house for the Incumbent.

The offer was eagerly seized upon, and \$730 subscribed within a little more than a month. This sum they hope to augment by further subscription, which with an offer from the Incumbent to raise one-third as much as will be subscribed enabled them to accept his Lordship's extremely kind offer.

A beautiful and I may venture to say the best site in the village has been secured and approved for the Church and parsonage. And we fondly hope that before the beginning of the next Christian year to see both completed and in use.

But the interest in church building does not centre at Wayville alone,

The church people of Barnston Corner are fully alive to the

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necessity of having a suitable place in which to worship and regard as home. They have accordingly organized a committee to solieit subscriptions for that purpose.

With the kind assistance of Dr. Roe vestries were duly organ-

ized at Wayville and Barnston Corner.

In my pastoral visiting I have found in the vicinity of Wayville and Libbytown twenty-eight church people, at Baruston Corner and Baldwin's Mills twenty-three. Others have signed or signified their intention of signing the declaration required by Canon XVII. of the Synod of Quebec, declaring themselves regular attendants on the services of the Church.

On the whole the prospects are very encouraging and with God's blessing on the work I trust at the close of another year to

have something of more interest to report.

BISHOP'S COLLEGE, LENNOXVILLE.

The Rev. Principal Adams, D. C. L., reports:

In September, 1887, our Clerical and Professional staff was increased by the addition of the Rev. F. J. B. Allnatt, D. D., who had accepted the post of Professor of Pastoral Theology. It had been agreed beforehand that the Professor of Pastoral Theology should have the students in the Divinity Faculty residing with him, with the object of training them in the Devotional Habit. In pursuance of this resolution three of our senior students have entered upon this special course of training. As a connecting link between this special training and the general spiritual life of the College, a special Litany has been said in the chapel every Friday afternoon. This is one of the regular offices of the Divinity Students, it has been thrown open to the whole body of Students, many of whom have availed themselves of the additional spiritual privilege. At these special services a series of short addresses has been given by Professor Allnatt on the spiritual life.

The cefebrations of the Holy Communion have been regular and frequent. The average number of communicants throughout the year was eighteen. A Devotional Society has been formed amongst the students under the guidance of the Rev. Dr. Roc. One of the rules of this Society is that its members should communicate together on a certain Sunday in the month. There is a celebration every Sunday and every Saint's Day. A confirmation service was held by the Bishop of Quebec on June 6, 1887: 8 boys

received the sacred rite.

At the ordination held at Hatley on June 5, the Rev. M. G.

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Thompson, M. A., was ordained Priest, and Mr. A. H. Robertson. J.S.T., was ordained Deacon. Mr. Robertson has since begun his work in the parish of Cookshire. The Rev. J. B. Williams, B.A., who had completed his Arts Course with us in June, was on St. Matthew's Day ordained Priest in New York by the Bishop of Springfield, Illinois, and has since sailed for Liberia as a Missionary of the American Church. Another graduate, Mr. C. E. Belt, B. A., was ordained Deacon by the Bishop of Niagara at Hamilton on June 29th (St. Peter's Day), the Rev. C. E. Belt is now working as curate in the Church of the Ascension. Hamilton. Of the 22 students now in residence, one (the Rev. Albert Watkins of Newfoundland) is in Deacon's orders. 19 are candidates for Holy orders. The number of students entered since the last report was sent in is 8. The Temperance Society has held its meetings regularly. Two social meetings have been held which have been attended by friends from Sherbrooke and Lennoxville as well as by the members.

The Missionary Union has held its special Terminal services regularly. The invited preachers and speakers have been the Rev. W. T. Forsythe, of Stanstead, the Rev. A. J. Balfour, M.A., of Melbourne, and the Rev. Prof. Allnatt, D. D.

During the Lent and Trinity Terms the Principal continued his Devotional Greek Testament readings for the Students, the Epistles to the Galatians and Colossians were read. The attendance was perfectly voluntary and was fairly good.

The Rector has maintained three classes as a Sunday School in the College School. The Senior Class has studied the Gospel according to St. John and latterly the Prayer Book office of Morning Prayer; Barry's Teacher's Prayer Book being used. The Intermediate class was a confirmation class. The Junior studied the Catechism and the Collect, Epistle and Gospel. Since September there has been (1) a Communicants' class of 21, (2) a Junior class of 30. From the latter will shortly be formed a Confirmation class.

The offertories in the Chapel have amounted to \$208.60 besides \$36.70 subscribed by members of the Missionary Union. This sum has been apportioned as follows:—

BISHOP'S COLLEGE MISSIONS.

The Rev. Prof. Roe. D.D., reports:

The only mission remaining under my supervision as Professor of Divinity is that of Agnes and Ditchfield in the Lake Megantic district. This mission is still conducted by Mr. I. M. King, a student of the diocese of Montreal. Mr. King has given the mission a fortnightly service regularly during the past year, except during the vacations, when he was otherwise employed. The number of families belonging to the church in the mission is 16, besides 6 or 7 individuals not reckoned in families. The people of Ditchfield are very anxious to build a small church for themselves, and have taken some steps towards it; but so far nothing very definite has been done. I hope to visit the mission myself before long and look into the matter on the spot. The amount contributed during the year has been \$60, which has all been absorbed by the expenses of the mission, Agnes being 70 miles from Lennoxville.

Four of our students are also regularly employed in mission work at Milby and Moulton, the former being under the supervision of the Rev. Professor Allnatt, and the latter of the Rev. A. C. Searth. Seven of our senior students have been employed during the winter and midsummer vacations in assisting the clergy in various parishes, where we hope they have both been useful and have gained valuable experience.

The baptisms at Lake Megantic during the year have been taken by Rev. Mr. Watkins, a student in Deacon's orders. He has baptized 6.

BROMPTON AND WINDSOR

The Rev. T. L. Ball reports:
The work has gone on quietly during the year. Though Ifeel

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every day more convinced that I must provide assistance in some way if the Sunday services and parish visiting are to be kept up throughout the two townships. Brompton has had two legacies left to the church, one of \$50 from the late J. Gates Ball to the assess-This came in very opportunely to meet the loss occasioned: by the removal from the mission of the principal contributor to thefunds mentioned in last report. The other of \$1,000 from the estate of the late Mrs. Mack towards the endowment. This fund has been increased again by \$100 from Robt. Hamilton, Esq., of Quebec, and \$50 raised in the mission. To the latter sum every Protestant family in the vicinity of the church contributed but It is hoped that the fund will become available next year. At Brompton Falls service has been held fortnightly on Sunday evening. The hishop also kindly gave a service in a grove at the time of his visit for confirmation. The people here have contribu ted towards the assessment of Brompton Church during the year.

Wirdsor.—The congregations have been larger and the attendance of church members more regular. The enlargement of the church rendering it more comfortable and seemly for worship. A. shed for horses has been provided, and the church lot graded and improved. Early in the year steps were taken towards a parsonage, but the seeming impossibility of getting a supply of water near the church, and a desire on the part of some of the congregation to have all mission buildings nearer the front of the town, have rendered it advisable to suspend operations, awaiting further developments. The Ladies' Association has continued to do good work both in keeping up kind feelings and increasing the funds. Fresh interest was infused by Mrs. Williams, who kindly accompanied the bishop on his visit and attended one of the meetings. Regular service on Friday evening has given an opportunity for Bible instruction and singing practice, and will, I trust, be the means of increasing among the young members a growing interest in the church and her services. It is hoped among the increased number of operatives about to be employed in the paper mills we shall have some church members coming to unite with the congregation. here.

Hardwood Hill.—Divine service fortnightly on Sunday evening. The removal of Protestant families from this neighborhood is deplorable, fully one-third have gone away during the last three years. It was expected the church would be ready for use this autumn, but owing to the near approach of winter it is thought best to defer the plastering till spring. £10 sterling kindly given by the Society for Promoting Christian Knowledge in England is

now in the bank for this purpose. As there is no debt on the building so far we may consider the work financially a success.

The Rev. II. C. Stuart reports:

1. A missionary's experience in a very poor and thinly settled parish is seldom a very promising one, excepting in drawbacks and discouragements, with which it is generally filled to repletion. Speaking of this poor mission with an experience, now alas almost ancient, I must be allowed to point out that here, at any rate, the amount of money raised for church purposes is not a fair rule by which to measure its spiritual progress. For the land on these arid plains becomes yearly more impoverished, and the people see their means of support grow gradually and dismally less. If the future may be judged by the past, there seems but two things open to the bulk of our people, either emigration or extermination.

2. During the year the church services have been regularly maintained and well attended. The Sunday School now numbers forty-five children, some of whom live at a distance of six and seven miles from the church. Our thanks are due to the kind friends who organized a very successful concert, during the summer, also to the generous patrons of the Sunday School treat, and to the Guild of All Souls for a grant of altar hymnals.

The Rev. H. S. Fuller reports:

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Entering upon work in this place in February of present year my report must of necessity be somewhat meagre, and the moreso

that I shall endeavor to confine myself to the barest facts.

The kindness of village churchmen made the settling into the house in midwinter a very much more comfortable matter than it might have proved, as the house was thoroughly cleaned and warmed, and such of my effects as had come to hand in place before the arrival of my family, who found that the same friends with kindly forethought had provided not only refreshment for the day but such a supply as rendered housekeeping an easy matter for some time. Col. F. Pope also had provided a large amount of wood for heating the house; and Mr. L. McIver, finding that there was a difficulty in obtaining water, arranged to furnish us with a supply until the return of mild weather should make it possible to set in order the ram which drives water up to the house.

The ready kindness and courtesy displayed on our first arrival has been steadily and uniformly maintained, and has made our few months sojourn in Bury very pleasant. Where so many have been kind it might seem invidious to particularize. My hay grew! my good neighbors sent teams and men, and it found its way into my loft; my grain ripened! and again, without thought or trouble on my part, it found its way into my bins, and the straw to the hay-loft, and so in many other matters, I have found on every side a most unfailing kindness and ever ready activity.

The readiness with which work in the parish has been entered upon, and the energy with which it has been carried forward, has been at the same time a pleasing feature in work here, and one that gives great encouragement to hope that, bye and bye, when we have once got our affairs into a good practical shape, Bury, though very far from being a wealthy Mission, will make a good showing in the matter of Church growth and Christian activity, which brings me to the topic of work entered upon or completed during the last nine months.

Since my arrival in February last, some 200 services have been held, at which I have found attentive and reverent congregations, the services in some instances characterized by a heartiness of response that has been very pleasing, this giving a warmth and fervor to a service, for the lack of which nothing can atone. The services in question have been distributed between two churches, four school houses and (in the case of Scottstown) a Presbyterian kirk, which by the kindness of our Presbyterian brethren we have

been permitted to use.

Sunday work has consisted of Sunday School, and latterly three services, while during the week two and three services are held at what seem desirable points for the same.

1st week, Hardwood Flat, school house, Wednesday, 7 p.m. Bury Corner, school house, Thursday, 7 p.m.

Village Church, Friday, 7 p.m.

2nd week, Scottstown monthly, served alternately, from Cookshire, Tuesday, 7.30 p.m.

Village Church, Friday, 7 p.m.

In the parish we have now three Sunday Schools.

I. That of Robinson Village with an attendance of some ninety children, average 55, and 8 teachers. Superintendent Mr. A. L. McIver who, together with his wife, display the most thorough interest in School and scholars attending.

II. Hardwood Flat Sunday School, consisting of 34 scholars and five teachers and owing its successful establishment very largely to the interest and able management of Messrs. Todd and

H. Harrison.

III. Bowns School House which owes its existence to the zeal and goodness of Mr. W. Bown, assisted from time to time by neighbors. The children here, in a sparsely settled neighborhood, number 14.

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to the zeal to time by ghborhood, Having got together an excellent library for the village Sunday School we have been able to divide our old books between our new Sunday Schools, furnishing a nucleus for a future Library to each.

Of the self denying efforts of our Sunday School teachers, and their devotion to the task they have undertaken, as evidenced by the regularity of their attendance, it were impossible to speak too highly, and I trust their endeavors will result finally in the establishment of several efficient and well equipped Sunday Schools in our neighborhood in which the young shall be trained to know in church doctrine, Bible truth.

Added to our new schools another venture has been entered appen by Mrs. L. McIver during the autumn, from which we may hope much in the future. A society for young children under 15 years, this I believe numbers some 30 members, meets once a week, and under the direction of Mrs. L. McIver, and of one or two young ladies who lend their assistance, the members work for the church.

Although so recently established, I understand this ambitious and active little community have by their needles produced some \$20 worth of saleable articles. However, besides the immediate benefit to the mission, one would expect much good to result in the future both to the church and children, from the guiding of the young activities of the parish into proper channels and the development of taste and the creative faculty.

During the past year \$450 have been added to the endowment fund of the parish, \$300 being given by unknown friends, to whom we rest under a deep obligation, \$150 was raised to meet the same

within the parish.

In regard to Stipend. I must note the fact that the congregation of St. John has paid each quarter promptly to date, Robinson and St. Thomas falling somewhat into arrears. This in the case of Robinson resulting perhaps in some measure from the adoption of a new system (the envelope). However, I understand that efforts are being made to wipe out all indebtedness in the case of Robinson and St. Thomas, and with such a fair chance of success that I hope ere long to report the debt as a thing of the past.

In the case of Lingwick all arrangements (if any existed) with the board have been ignored, by which a very serious deficiency will be created in my income, serious as crippling me in my work through insufficiency of means which must result, and care and

anxiety consequent.

CACOUNA.

The Church Warden reports: -

The Clergymen nominated by the Lord Bishop of the Diocese, as Incumbents of the Church of St. James the Apostle for the season of 1887, were, for the month of July, the Rev. G. H. Parker, Rector of Compton, and for the month of August, the Rev. George Thorneloe, M.A., Rector of Sherbrooke. The first service was held on Sunday, the 3rd July, 1887, and the last on Sunday, the 4th September. On this last Sunday the Lord Bishop of Niagara officiated at all the services, and administered the Holy Sacrament of Baptism to 2 infants at the Litany service in the afternoon.

Morning Prayer was said daily in the Church during the season, and there was an early celebration of the Holy Communion on the

12th August, the Centenary of the Colonial Episcopate.

By the Canons of the Synod of the Diocese of Quebec, a meeting of the congregation must be called between the 20th July and the 20th August, and all who attend such meeting and declare themselves in writing to be "members of the Church of England, and to belong to no other religious denomination whatever," have the right to vote. The Annual Meeting of 1887 was held on Saturday the 20th August, immediately after the Morning Service; the Incumbent, the Rev. Geo. Thorneloe, presiding.

This Vestry Meeting was probably unique; out of the Churchmen present there were three Bishops, namely, Ontario, Quebec and Niagara; one Archdeacon, the Venerable A. Dixon of Guelph; one Canon, the Rev. J. A. Muloch of Ontario, and three Rectors or Incumbents of our own diocese, whilst the three Dioceses of Toronto, Ontario and Quebec had representatives

amongst the laity.

The improvements to the Church, referred to last year, were completed this season by a neat cresting being placed on the roof, and a further sum of \$24.16 was subscribed by the congregation to complete the amount required to close this account.

The following were the receipts for the year :- Ordinary Sunday

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and Holy Day Collections, \$230.50; Special Collection on 24t July for Mission Fund, \$583.55; Special Collection, 14th August for Pension Fund, \$69.33; Donation to Funds of Church, \$15 Total, \$898.38.

CAPE COVE.

The Rev. W. G. Lyster reports:

I cannot report any considerable change in the position or pros-

pects of this Mission during the past year.

We have not, it is true, suffered quite so much from removals as in previous years, but the fishery, upon which so many of the inhabitants depend, was far from being successful, though this wa in some measure compensated by the excellent crops, with which God was pleased to bless this part of the coast.

In March I met with a severe accident. I fell on the ice at

my own door and broke my leg.

My misfortune was greatly mitigated by a very general expression of kindness and sympathy, not only from my own people but from the Roman Catholics. My friends did not desert me during a long and trying confinement to my room; and very grateful I then felt and still feel for frequent visits and kind attentions.

I was at first greatly troubled at the thought of the discontinuance of regular services in the churches; but at my request, the Lord Bishop kindly licensed Mr. George Gaudin as Lay Reader, an office which the latter filled most acceptably and with zeal and regularity, so that the churches were only for one Sunday without services.

Mr. Gaudin's readiness in this matter, as well as his continued attention to myself during my illness, have rendered me deeply obliged to him. To Mr. James Baker and Mr. P. Beck, Churchwardens, I also owe many thanks.

I may add that my clerical brethren, the Rev. Messrs. Richmond, Lloyd and Walters, came forward most kindly and held services.

In June I was sufficiently recovered to permit of my being carried into church here; and about a month later, I managed to reach Percé; and ever since I have been gaining strength, and have performed the usual work of the Vission

have performed the usual work of the Mission.

In July we were cheered by a visit from the Lord Bishop, who confirmed twenty-four candidates here, and eight at Percé. The Cape Cove candidates had been prepared by myself; those at Percé by Mr. James Tuzo.

St. James' Church, Cape Cove, was painted during the summer

by an excellent workman, at a cost of \$136.00.

On this coast, paint needs to be frequently renewed, as the rainstorms of spring and fall coming from the sea have an injurious effect, and quickly wear the paint off an exposed building.

Very few deaths have taken place since my last report. To the deep regret of all who knew her, Mrs. Le Grand died on Christmas Day, 1886, leaving a young family. She had been for some years a teacher under the Church Society; for many years a Sunday School teacher; and always, from early girlhood to the day of her death, a very exemplary member of the congregation.

In November the Honorable Thos. Savage, M. L. C., died at the ripe age of eighty-one. In former years, he was a frequent benefactor of the congregation of St. James, having given part of the glebe lot, and having at various times presented a harmonium,

books for the parochial library, alms dishes, &c., &c.

To myself also he was very kind and generous in those days

when he had the ability to give.

It is a source of regret to most of us that the Wardens here and at Percé have felt themselves unable to return to the Diocesan Board the required promise of increased assessment for the next three years.

The fact is, there is considerable difficulty experienced in collecting the amount now guaranteed. Here, every farthing of assessment and pew-rent goes to the Board; while the ordinary collections

are insufficient to meet local expenses.

The Mission is not so strong now as it was some years ago. There are a few families who once contributed, who are now absolutely unable to give anything, while nearly all the others subscribe quite as much as they can afford.

A return of prosperity to the coast, and the cessation of emigration to other parts of the continent, would no doubt conduce to the removal of what is yearly becoming an increasingly painful

dilemma.

I trust that I shall not be considered egotistical when I mention that on the first of January, I shall have been twenty-five years in this place.

Though sincerely thankful to Almighty God for the many mercies vouchsafed to me during so long a period, I shall not trouble you with reflections thereon, as I suppose my experiences have not

been uncommon ones.

It is right, however, to say that I have been especially happy in the entire absence of disunion or dissent within the mission, and that my work has been in consequence lighter and more pleasant than it otherwise would have been, and it is very satisfactory to remember an do my kindne usual

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ber and to acknowledge that in my humble and imperfect efforts to do my duty, I have always been supported and encouraged by the kindness and good feeling of united congregations. I append the usual statistics.

COATICOOK.

The Rev. J. Foster reports:

During the current year the services of the Church have been

regularly kept up without any intermission.

In St. Stephen's Church there are two services every Sunday; in Christ Church, North Coaticook, one service at 3 p.m. every Sunday.

I have a weekly service at Belknaps Mills, three miles from Coaticook, and during the last winter weekly cottage services were kept up at North Coaticook. The attendance at all the services is about the same as last year.

There are two Sinday Schools, one in each of the Churches, which are well attended.

Our members do not increase because we have little or no emigration from the mother country. I know of only two young men, farm laborers, from England who came here during the current year.

The question of how best to secure a fair proportion of the emigration from the British Islands to these townships is, in my judgment, one which should engage the most serious consideration of our people.

If anything in that direction can be done it should be done at

On looking back over a period of twenty-five years I cannot but view with alarm the rapid increase of the French population in the County of Stanstead during that time. Scores and scores of the

best farms in the county, which fifteen years ago were owned by English speaking people, are to-day owned by the French, and still they come; and still the English speaking people move off West.

Nearly all our young men are obliged to move West in search of employment. It is obvious that unless steps can be taken to induce tenant farmers, with moderate capital, from Great Britain, to come and purchase farms in this part of the Country, it is only a question of time until the Anglo-Saxon population of the Eastern Townships will be driven away from this part of the Province.

We have wise, far-seeing, generous, and devoted laymen in the Diocese, who, if they can be aroused to see the necessities of the case, would assuredly take prompt and effective steps to carry the project into effect.

I hope I will be pardoned for throwing out these suggestions to

which I have devoted a good deal of thought and anxiety.

The Rev. G. H. Parker reports:

It is with devoit gratitude that I report the completion and consecration of our new church. The cost of the church has been about \$3,800.00, and is complete in every respect. There is naturally more or less anxiety connected with the erection of a church, especially when the style of the building is altogether different from that which the people are familiar with, and the gratification all the greater when the result is so generally satisfactory, and we may be pardoned for feeling proud at having a building which is not only an ornament to our immediate neighborhood but also a credit to the Diocese. The Bishop consecrated it on the morning of the 2nd September. In the afternoon dinner was provided by the Ladies of the Parish in the Ladies College, and at 5.30 we again assembled in the Church for Evening Prayer and Confirmation, when nine Candidates were presented for the Apostolic Rite, all of which took their first communion on the

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Prayer for the on the following Sunday morning. Full reports of the consecration were sent by some of the visiting clergy to the papers, which render any further details in this report unnecessary. May God grant that our new and beautiful Temple may be a means of quickening and deepening mightily the religious and spiritual life of the people.

The Ladies College is going on quietly, doing, we believe, a good work, and winning, we hope, the confidence of the public. The first year was, as anticipated, one of more or less trouble and anxiety, but the results at the close of the year were highly satisfactory to those who had the management, and, we have reason to believe, to pupils and parents also. Two of the pupils went in for the University Examinations, and both obtained certificates. the aid of the offertories sent in by several parishes, amounting to about \$300.00, and the Government grant of \$200.00, we were able to meet all expenses, and had a small balance to commence the current year with, and thus no call was made on the guarantee fund. Twenty-nine pupils have attended during the term just ended, and we have reason to believe the numbers will keep up during the year. We have an excellent staff of Teachers under the Principalship of Miss Prince, of Montreal. Several gentlemen, Dr. Roe, Dr. Norman, Dr. Allnatt, and Dr. Henneker have kindly promised to give Lectures during the present winter. A branch of the Women's Auxiliary was formed in this Parish last spring, and a bundle of clothes, etc., was sent in the autumn to the North-West, valuing over fifty dollars.

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The Rev. Arthur H. Judge reports:

employ the parish priest.

In September the Rev. Alex. H. Robertson was appointed by the Bishop to the newly established mission of Newport, set apart from this parish. This appointment consummates a series of efforts to relieve the parish of Cookshire, far too extensive and unwelldy in its old shape to be efficiently worked by one man. This parish, now comprising the entire Township of Eaton, is fairly compact, having for its centre the important village of Cookshire, wherein is situated the parish Church, with 97 families attached, while to the South are Sand Hill and Johnville, with 63 families on the visiting books.

At Sand Hill is a small mission church, and at Johnville the church people have assisted in the erection of a Hall, in which it is expected our services will be held hereafter. Thus it will be seen, the parish of Cookshire—now it appears to me more fitly designated Eaton—contains 160 families requiring pastoral care. These visited once a quarter, with his necessary study and attendance upon the sick, as well as work with Guilds, etc., will fully

The mission of Newport numbers 55 families, with ample scope for true mission work in the townships of Clifton and Auckland. Here also there are two churches, and three outposts where services are held.

St. Peter's Church, Cookshire.—The strength of the parish lies in this congregation, and here the full services of the Christian Year are observed, while clustering around the appointed agencies are our various Guilds and Auxiliary societies, having for their ultimate aim the advancement of the Christian life. These all continue to flourish, and with a real though varying power strengthen the good work of the Church. In things material the Church has been improved by the erection of two hot-air furnaces in the newly excavated basement, adding much to the comfort of the worshippers, and appearance of the church edifice also, through the removal of unsightly stoves and stove-pipes.

St. Luke's Church, Sand Hill.—The work here has gone on uneventfully but steadily during the year. The congregations have been small, yet always devout and attentive. Finds are now in hand to finish the Church Hall recently put up, and thus complete a most useful addition to this mission station. I regret to say that I have not been able to devote to this district the labor and care I could have wished.

Christ Church, Island Brook.—Mr. Thos. Lloyd, the lay

reader appointed by the Bishop to assist the Rector of Cookshire, has had this Church under his care during the year. The village was visited by the Bishop in June last, and a class of fifteen candidates, prepared by Mr. Lloyd, were presented for confirmation. This very hopeful and happy service may be called the chief event of the year. Our hopes are that those who were presented—some of them in advanced life—may continue firm and consistent Christians.

St. Matthew's Church, Randboro'.—Here again there is little of special import to chronicle. The work of the church has gone steadily forward. The Guild and Missionary Union continue their useful work, and under Mr. Robertson's care I trust all work for God will flourish. The Bishop also at this Church held a confirmation service, administering the rite to five candidates. The bell I mentioned in my last report was duly placed in the turret, and dedicated with appropriate solemnity on Christmas Day. It is of fine tone, clear and strong.

At Learned Plain and Johnville services are held fortnightly.

Also at Clifton and Wilsons in Newport mission,

St. Alban's Church, Scotstown.—This work though not in the parish of Cookshire requires mention. In my last year's report I made mention of its conception. Now the church, completed and only needing its furniture, stands upon a corner lot in Scotstown village. It will be soon free from debt and ready for service. One hundred kneelings are provided. The whole work causes great thankfulness on the part of those who labored in it.

The Rector of Bury now has this station under his care. It is hoped, however, that at no distant date. Scotstown together with Lingwick and Megantic Lake mission may be set apart as a

separate charge.

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During my absence in the summer mouths, Mr. J. M. King, of Bishop's College, did efficient work in the parish, labouring chiefly in Cookshire and Sandhill.

DANVILLE AND PARTS ADJACENT.

The Rev I. M. Thompson reports:

Services have been held once every Sunday in the Churches of Danville, Troutbrook and Lorne, and a fourth, either at Danville or Kingsey Falls. Week evening services have also been held, with more or less regularity, in Bilton and Pinnacle School Houses. Valley Road and Lodge Sel. I houses, and at Mrs. Hall's at Nicolet, with occasional Cottage Services in Lorne and Troutbrook. There is not much to notice in the way of change either in attendance or

interest during the year.

We have lost in all four congregations by removals; our young people going in numbers to the Eastern States. We have also lost sadly by death. Notably amongst these was my fellow laborer, M John P. Stockwell, whose place in the Church it seems impossible to fill. The special efforts of the Mission during the year have been, first, to raise the assessment up to \$600.00. This, I am glad to say, has been cheerfully done. The second, was to pay off the long standing debt of \$300.00, which remained upon our parsonage. Ira E. Daying, Esq., of New York, who holds the claim against us, kindly offered, that if the people would spend the sum of \$300.00 upon the property, within 3 months, he would make the Mission a present of the debt. I am thankful to be able to report that in the most hearty way the offer was met by the people, and within the specified time, not only was the sum of \$300.00 given in material, labor and money, but a further sum of \$75.00 was expended in painting and improving their Clergyman's home. All of this amount has been paid, but the small sum of \$25.00, which we hope to clear off before the end of the year. Danville has now one of the most comfortable and convenient parsonages in the Townships. The third effort was the erection of a small church, at Kingsey Falls. This church is now up, with only a balance of \$100.00 remaining as debt upon it; this amount will be assumed by the building committee, so that the church may be consecrated when the furniture is ready. We are now using it for Divine service, and the little congregation is delighted to have a place of worship that they can call their own. This church will, I trust, be a blessing to our poor people living at the Falls.

What is needed now, is a Clergyman to assist the Incumbent in carrying on the work, which has now grown out of the reach

of one man's powers.

Two Sunday Schools have been in operation this year. One in Danville and the other in Troutbrook. The school at Danville is superintended by myself assisted by four faithful teachers. The

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school at Troutbrook is superintended by Mr. John Wilson, delegate to the Synod, and is very prosperous. Lorne Sunday School had to be closed, owing to the sad death of Mr. Stockwell, for no one could be found willing to assume the responsibilty of overseeing it.

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I cannot close my report without saying that the happiest relations exist between all my people and myself. I also wish to express my appreciation of the self-denying efforts of wardens, teachers, collectors, and fellow laborers, in all departments of church work, all of whom have tried in every way to encourage and assist me. May God abundantly bless and prosper them.

DRUMMONDVILLE. (Received late.)

The Rev. F. G. Scott reports:

The Rev. F. M. Webster resigned last autumn, and, as I was in England at the time of my appointment, the Rev. H. S. Fuller was placed in charge of the parish. I arrived here on February 10th.

On June 9th the Lord Bishop of the Diocese held a confirmation in the church, when twenty-three persons received the special strengthening grace given by "the laying on of hands."

We have every reason to believe that God has blessed the parish during the past year. During Lent the services were all well attended.

On Easter day there were forty-eight communicants. During Holy Week there was a celebration of the Holy Communion every morning at 7, except on Good Friday and Holy Saturday, when there was a special service at the same hour. The number of those attending these services was never less than sixteen, and on Good Friday twenty-four were present.

The congregations on Sunday keep up satisfactorily. The usual attendance on Sunday morning is 70, sometimes more and some-

times less, according to the state of the weather and the roads. In the evening the usual congregation is about forty.

The services on Sundays and week days are as follows:

Holy Communion, Sundays at 8 a.m.
"Saints Days at 7 a.m.

" 1st Sunday in the month at 11.45 a.m.

Matins and Litany at 11 a.m. Children's service at 3 p.m. Evensong on Friday at 7 p.m.

Baptisms during any of the services and Churchings before any

service.

A Sunday School on the other side of the River has been devotedly taken by Miss Watts and Miss MacDougall, and a class on this side by Miss Mazurette. The two together comprise about

thirty children.

The day school on the other side of the River, consisting of about 19 children, is visited on two mornings of the week at 9 o'clock, when religious instruction, similar to that of the National schools in England, is given. This has been found very helpful in establishing order in the school, and in teaching the children about the Bible and Prayer book, as a child learns much better on a week day than on a Sunday, when it thinks that it should have no work to do.

I am sorry to say that the financial position of the parish is very unsatisfactory. On the departure of the Rev. F. J. B. Allnatt the parish owed the Church Society the sum of \$162. This was then increased by a sum of \$50, taken from a special fund to pay the retiring Rector. During the incumbency of Mr. Webster, and the locumtenency of Mr. Fuller, this amount was increased by over \$100, taken from money that belonged to the endowment fund. The parish is also in debt to the present curate.

I think one source of difficulty in times past has been that the place was overtaxed by the Church Society. The parish is not a rich one, on the contrary, it is extremely poor; the population being a farming one, and farmers handling very little ready money. The place was certainly, as past experience has shewn, quite unfit to have been made into a self-supporting rectory. However, the Bishop has been now informed of the state of things, and I hope-

that next year a more favorable account may be given.

EAST FRAMPTON.

The Rev. Felix J. Boyle reports:-

In casting the mind's eye over the year which is now leaving us, it is with much gratitude that I am in a position to state, that the services in both of my churches have been duly kept up with the exception

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of a few Sundays, when through stress of weather it was not fit for man or beast to be out. The congregations, too, have been good, as a general rule, and with a visible increase in the number of communicants at the Lord's Table.

I have often grieved at seeing my flock leave for other parts; but they were not all lost to us, for within the last four years I could mention two mothers, who traveled at different times a distance of over ninety miles with their blessed infants, and to use their own words, "they wanted their babies baptized by their old Pastor in their own church."

Others again have left us in arrears to church, and after an expiration of some two or three years have sent back money to the wardens or myself sufficient to liquidate their indebtedness.

I merely mention these facts to show that neither distance nor time will cause many of these people to forget the church of their love.

Another pleasing feature is, that some three or four families who left this mission some years since purpose returning next spring to remain.

This last summer I have had a good substantial fence put up round a goodly portion of the glebe, and the Parsonage which up to this winter was unbearably cold, we gave a thorough overhauling to, and now it is very comfortable, as far as heat is concerned.

All church property is insured against loss by fire, and the principal church, St. Paul's, two years in advance, and no debts except one disputed quarter of assessment to Diocesan board.

I buried two esteemed members of my flock last summer. The first Mr. John McNeely, who was always a supporter of the church, and Mrs. Rutherford who was an annual subscriber to the Church Society. This might seem a loss; but their families are walking in the steps of their parents, and filling their places in this laudable work, the extension of God's kingdom.

I closed my report last year, by stating the fact that we had done better than ever before, and I was proud to say so; but I am prouder to-night when I say we have done better this year than last, as the following financial statement will show:—

GASPE BASIN.

The Rev. J. P. Richmond reports:

The Services in the Churches in this Mission have been maintained, I am thankful to say, without interruption during the past

year.

St. Paul's Church.—In the month of January last the Vestry determined to depend upon the Sunday offertory to meet all pecuniary calls upon the Congregation. This plan has in great part fulfilled the expectations of its advocates. The Diocesan Board has been promptly paid, but the funds are not sufficient to meet some urgent calls, e. g., the repainting of the Courch, without which the building will suffer injury another season. I hope the plan will succeed better when it is more fully understood, that the action of the Vestry in abolishing pew rents and subscription lists or promises to the Congregation, leave every man's offering a matter of conscience for which he is answerable, not to his fellow man but to God.

St. James Church.—This Congregation are continuing their laudable endeavor to build a new Church, and so far their undertaking has been prospered. The building is now "boarded in and shingled," and safe from the weather. This winter the flooring, clapboarding and sash and door material will be obtained, and in the spring the roof will be painted. Some members of this congregation have left the place, and others are absent for a time. The necessity of leaving the place to obtain work both in summer and winter still exists, and for those who remain at home there is little or no winter work by which to make a living. If a change takes place in this state of things, the financial prospects of the mission will improve. The loss of the mackerel fishery is also much felt in this and the neighboring missions.

The Parsonage has been put into a good state of repair internally.

the foundation and roof still want looking after.

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HATLEY AND WATERVILLE.

The Rev. A. Stevens reports:-

The work of the Parish during the past year has gone on as usual. Upon the establishment of the Barnston Mission, Libbytown ceased to be under my care.

At Hatley the congregations are generally good in the summer

months, but in winter the attendance falls off considerably.

The Bishop kindly consented to hold his Trinity Ordination this

year in Hailey.

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Both of the candidates were well known here; one, Mr. Robertson, was a member of this congregation before he left for his Divinity Studies; the other, Mr. Thompson, taught our Academy for a year.

A large congregation assembled, and all were deeply impressed

by the solemnity of the service.

Of the material works of this congregation during the year I may mention the following: (1) The repainting of the outside of the Church, the funds for which were provided by the Ladies Guild. (2.) The bringing of a supply of water to the Parsonage at the cost of \$130. The water is brought more than half a mile in iron pipes. Towards this object the Ladies Guild gave \$45. A kind friend of mine in England gave \$50, and the men of the congregation did the work required in putting the pipes down. (3). Funds have been raised to put a new and substantial fence around the grave-yard. (4). A devout member of the congregation has added \$500 to our endowment fund, which now exceeds \$4000. (5). Another has been moved in remembrance of the many favors received by this congregation in the past sixty years from the S.P.G. to send a thank offering of \$100 to that venerable society.

At Waterville the services have been well attended, and the singing greatly improved. The Church has been re-shingled, and money provided to do some other necessary repairs. The Wardens have been greatly helped in raising funds for these objects by the Ladies Guild. The Rector also acknowledges a gift of \$10 from this Guild towards making the Parsonage stable more comfortable.

As the business of the village grows, the population increases, and there is every year felt the greater need of a resident Clergyman here. I have started a weekly Bible Class for the young and middle aged, from which I hope to see good results.

The attendance at the Services in Massawippi has not been altogether encouraging, but I lope and pray for better things next

year.

I had the great happiness and pleasure of accompanying the

Bishop of the Diocese on his visitation tour in Gaspe, Labrador, and the Magdalen Islands, and also of attending with him the centennial celebration in Halifax. This delightful trip of nearly 3000 miles, and of seven weeks duration, was made possible by the payment of all my expenses by the Bishop. During my absence the work of the Parish was undertaken by the Rev. Mr. Robertson, whose services were highly and deservedly appreciated. I append the usual financial statement.

INVERNESS.

The Rev. P. Roe reports:

I have to report that the usual services in both churches of this Mission have been held regularly during the year, also a monthly service at St. Julie station. Holy Communion has been administered once a month in both churches; the attendance at both churches has been very good. At the church of the Ascension, Campbell's Corners, the attendance has increased this year. The Sunday Schools during the summer months were well attended; the teachers painstaking and diligent, and the children well behaved and progressing favorably. Mr. Brown, Church Warden, superintends the school at the Church of the Ascension, assisted by his daughter Miss Ellen Brown, who is the Organist for that church, and to whom we are very much indebted for valuable assistance in the church and Sunday School. Miss Barbara Brown takes the leadership of the choir. Mrs. Roe and my daughters have charge of the Sunday School at St. Stephens, and I superintend this school myself. Mrs. Roe has a Bible Class for young girls during the winter months at the Parsonage, which is well attended The chief event of the year was the visit of the Bishop to confirm in October. His Lordship preached on Sunday morning 30th October in St. Stephen's Church, and held a Confirmation service at the Church of the Ascension at three p. m. when twenty-six young persons received the sacred rite. His Lordship's addresses to the young, and his sermons were much appreciated by all.

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ermons were

There has been considerable sickness during this year in this neighborhood, and a good many sudden deaths; not all members of our church; one old member, Mr. Richard Hill, was killed by falling from a load of hay, he was a faithful member of the church, and has left a widow and several children to mourn his sud; n removal.

I must acknowledge the receipt of a very substantial gift from Mr. E. G. Palmer, of St. Julie, of three barrels of fine flour, and an Easter present of a purse of thirty dollars from that locality, presented to me by Miss Johnston, of St. Julie; these kind of surprises are few and far between in missionary life, and deserve

to be recorded.

The Women's Guild or Auxiliary to Foreign and Domestic Missions meets regularly once a month at the Parsonage, and is, I am sure, productive of good; the women are much interested in the work of missions and incidents read to them every month; they sent the sum of nine dollars to the Women's Jubilee fund for widows and orphans of Algoma, and are now preparing some articles of clothing to be sent in the spring to the Wawanosh Home.

We have to thank Mrs. Williams for a bundle of clothing, which has been distributed by Mrs. Roe where she found it was needed.

We had a very successful picnic in the month of September, a gathering of young and old from all parts of the Mission, on Graham's Hill, a most delightful spot, where a few hours were most pleasantly spent, swings and races for the young people, and the older ones sat round and enjoyed themselves, "fighting their battle over again."

Both churches were most tastefully decorated this Christmas with beautiful wreaths of spruce and hemlock and cedar, and

some most appropriate mottoes.

I omitted to mention that the members of the Church of the Ascension have this year erected a very substantial stable and shed for horses at a cost of over \$200. This was much needed, and will increase the attendance at the services in cold stormy weather, as our people are very careful about their horses.

I have touched upon some things that you may consider trifles to speak of, but our life is made up of trifling incidents, and I must say something. In conclusion I think I may safely say that to all outward appearances the members of our church here are "growing in grace and in the knowledge of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ, whom to know is life eternal."

IRELAND.

The Rev. R. Hewton reports:

The present year has been in some respects an eventful one with us.

Chiefly to be recorded are two visits from the Lord Bishop of the Diocese.

The occasion of the first was the consecration of Christ's Church, Lower Ireland, which took place on the First Sunday after the Epiphany. Besides the Bishop and Incumbent, there were present Rev. Dr. Roe, and the Rural Dean, Rev. J. B. Debbage. A very large congregation, many of whom were dissenters, attended to join in and witness the solemn service of dedicating the beautiful church to the worship and glory of God, as well as to listen to a most edifying sermon on the ceremony of church consecration by Rev. Dr. Roe. In the evening of the same day a missionary service was held in Trinity Church, Upper Ireland, when the claims of the Foreign Mission Fund of the Church Society were laid before the congregation and a collection was taken up for that object.

The second of the Bishop's ever-welcome visits took place in October when 24 persons were confirmed—9 at Upper Ireland, 7

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at Lower Ireland, 6 at Adderley, and 2 at Black Lake. Advantage was taken of the Chief Pastor's presence on this occasion to hold our Thanksgiving services in the three churches of the mission. In Upper and Lower Ireland the sacred edifices were tastefully decorated. In addition to his confirmation addresses, the Bishop preached three Thanksgiving sermons which were listened to with rapt atention by large congregations.

Apart from these two special events, some advance has, I think,

been made.

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Let the facts speak.

Services have been kept up regularly as reported last year, with the exception of the summer months, when the assistance of Mr. H. A. Diekson, student of Bishop's College, Lennoxville, enabled me to hold more frequent services in the outposts of the mission. He worked very earnestly and with acceptance to the people. While he was with me 5 services were held every second Sunday, and a drive of 70 miles accomplished. In this way the 5 stations were supplied in one day.

The attendance at the various services of the church during the year has been excellent. Responding hearty and evidently devotional. Communicants increased. Interest in spiritual things

seemingly deepened.

Parochial visiting has been conducted with more or less regularity during the year. It is my rule to visit everybody regularly, twice, at least, each year, but an accident and impaired health for some months prevented the accomplishment of such a desirable object. However, returning good health is inspiring your missionary with fresh energy, and the hope is buoyant that not many months will elapse before the complete rounds have been made.

Before going into the details of each station I desire here to testify to the unabated kindness of my people. Besides the many useful tokens of welcome that awaited Mrs. Hewton's arrival in the mission, a continuous stream of kind deeds reach down to this day.

Out of many kind acts experienced at the hands of Mr. William Cross, I will select two instances worthy of recording here.

Last spring he presented me with a yearling colt. During the summer months he gave me the free and entire use of one his horses. This was acceptable, as the presence of an assistant necessitated an extra horse, and I could not afford to hire one.

I trust I may be permitted to draw attention to these kindnesses, not in a spirit of exultation, but to show that although a clergyman may endure many privations and discouragements in a scattered

rural district, yet there is much to be thankful for, to comfort and to cheer him in the sympathy and appreciation of a kind-hearted

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and hospitable people.

Trinity Church, Maple Grove.—A fairly prosperous year with hearty services well attended can again be reported here. Communicants average 40, an increase of more than 10 since last report. Sunday School work went on as usual under the joint superintendence of Messrs. H. T. Wood and W. G. Stewart. These gentlemen are assisted by Mrs. Hewton and Mrs. H. T. Wood. Sunday school work is necessarily suspended in this part of the world during the winter, on account of the scattered situation of the children. The Ladies' Association have devoted their efforts to the purchase of a hot air furnace, which was placed in the church a couple of weeks ago. Mrs. F. H. Wood still exhibits her zeal and energy as President of this Association. Through the exertions of Mr. Joseph Stewart, who offered his services for this purpose at the last vestry meeting, a number of the Upper Ireland people have procured lumber for building a new stable and coach-house on the church property for the use of Incumbent. We expect to have the logs sawed at the mill next spring and the building erected immediately afterwards. Mrs. H. T. Wood continues her efficient services as organist, assisted by Miss Maggie Cross.

Christ's Church, Lower Ireland,—Healthy progress is shown in matters here. At the regular annual vestry meeting, last Easter, it was decided to build a stable near the church for the convenience of those who drive from a distance. Accordingly an enclosed building containing 26 stalls was erected during the autumn of this year at a cost of about \$160.00. This is a very important step in an inclement climate like ours. A cruel thing it seems to see a number of horses tied to posts on a cold stormy

day during divine service.

An important event in the history of this church was the purchase of a splendid bell weighing 1,103 lbs., without mountings, from the firm of Hy. McShane & Co., Baltimore, Md., U. S. A. Its tone is excellent. It was obtained chiefly through the generosity of the Johnston Brothers, Mr. John Johnston giving \$100.00.

The congregation are now directing their efforts to the purchase of an organ, the old one being unfit for use. We have on hand

about \$40.00 for this object.

A long felt want was supplied by the widow of the late Rev. R. G. Ward, who presented the church with a set of solid silver altar vessels, beautiful and chaste in design, procured from the Guild of St. Matthew's Church, Quebec, in memory of her husband.

A set of polished brass altar-rail standards, carpeting for the chancel, and cocoa-nut matting for aisle were procured early in the year, and add very much to the beauty and comfort of the Lord's house. The standards and carpeting were procured through the zeal and energy of some ladies of the congregation who collected the money for this purpose. The thanks of the congregation are due to Mr. Henry Little for conveying the bell from St. Julie Station to the church over very bad roads, and also to Mr. Oliver Davidson for his zeal in collecting money for elevating it to its place in the tower. The work is very encouraging in this part of the mission. A large proportion of the members of the congregation attend the vestry meetings and take an active interest in the welfare of the church. The church wardens, moreover, are very zealous, and are always ready to assist and encourage the clergyman in his work.

Last but not least is an event in connection with this part of my mission which I must not omit to mention. At the opening of the University of Bishop's College, Lennoxville, in September, Mr. Isaac Newton Kerr matriculated very creditably, and bids fair to a successful career. He has given himself up to the work of the sacred ministry. May God prosper him and make him a useful instrument in His hands for leading many human souls from the path of sin to the way of righteousness and peace.

St. Loke's Church, Adderly.—Matters have gone on about as usual here. During Mr. Dickson's stay, however, services were weekly instead of fortnightly. A flourishing Sunday school, moreover, was carried on under his superintendence. The greatest hope in this part lies in the Sunday school, but it is in a measure dormant as there is no one in the neighborhood who seems capable of carrying it on in my absence.

Krough's Range, School House,—Monthly Sunday evening services are carried on here regularly, as reported last year. The inhabitants of this neighborhood, some of whom are at least nominal churchmen, keep up their interest in these services. A greater familiarity with the Prayer Book is gradually becoming more manifest. An offertory collection is being instituted here to defray current expenses. Those who attend these services expressed their gratitude last spring by sending me a load of oats for my horse.

Black Lake.—Considerable progress has been made here. Congregations range from 30 to 40. Although the residents are of various denominations they have acted in accordance with the

principle that "unity is strength," and have formed themselves into one congregation. The Bishop held a confirmation here when two married persons "joined the church." Holy Communion was celebrated once, when 9 persons partook of the Blessed Sacrament. We hope to build a church next summer, unless unforescen circumstances arise to prevent it. I am sorry I cannot visit this place more frequently than monthly, but my other appointments will not allow of more frequent ministrations. For a couple of months during the summer, however, the summer services were formightly, with occasional services on week day evenings.

KINGSEY.

The Rev. J. S. Sykes reports:

Quiet and uneventful is the best description I can give of the past year's work in this mission—not a very glowing or a very

grand description, but true.

The services have been maintained regularly, and attended by earnest and devout congregations. Our assessment has been paid. All special collections have been taken up, the response in every instance being very creditable to the people. But not with standing the constant strain of many appeals, the Incumbent has not been forgotten, \$38.50 having been presented to me by my people, for the purpose of giving me a rest, and this followed up by the filling of my hay-loft with a winter's supply of hay. These are not small things,

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as they represent not only the kindness of heart, but also the appreciation of the people for the church and her provision for their spiritual welfare. The Sunday School at Sydenham has been under the charge of Miss Evans, who has proved herself as good and competent a Sunday School teacher as she is an organist. That at Spoener Pond was kindly taken by the Venerable Archdeacon Lonsdell, with the assistance of Mrs. Lonsdell. Attendance good; conduct of scholars encouraging.

LAKE BEAUPORT AND MONTMORENCI.

The Rev. W. S. Vial reports:

I am happy to be able to report that the full number of fortnightly services have been kept up in this mission during the past winter, with only one or two exceptions, on account of a severe storm at one time, and impassable roads at another.

There is almost always a very fair attendance, notwithstanding the distance people live from the church, the smallness of their number, and sometimes the badness of the roads.

Miss A. Montgomery still kindly accompanies the hymns and chants in the service. Her services are valued by the congregation as was shown by initiating, without any prompting, the gathering a sum of money to expend in the purchase of some token of esteem, which resulted in presenting her with a handsome gold bracelet.

The repairs to the church are finished, and the floor is now solid, dry and smooth. Much more might easily be done, but the money

is finished, too, with a minus balance.

LABRADOR.

St. Clement's Mission, Mutton Bay.

The Rev. J. Ball reports:

On the 1st June, 1887, after a passage of seventeen days from Berthier en-bas, on board the schooner "Starlacona," I arrived at the above place, which is the chief station of the Mission, where there are thirteen families belonging to the Church, comprisi 3 about sixty-five persons. Here I remained three weeks, holding morning and evening services in the Mission House on Sundays, with children's classes in the afternoons. Also services on Wednesday and Friday evenings, besides gathering the children two hours daily. Saturdays excepted, when they were instructed in the elementary branches of education. There being but one teacher for the Mission, which extends about 300 miles along the coast, many of the children are unable to read.

The great difference in numbers attending the services now and formerly was frequently the subject of remark by the older members of the little community. During Rev. Mr. Hepburn's incumbency the Mission House was filled below as well as above by a company of devout listeners. But those were the palmy days of the fishing interests, and the additional attendants were supplied by the schooner's crews from Newfoundland and Nova Scotia, who came annually to the coast to fish. As many as fifty and sixty vessels have been anchored at one time in Mutton Bay, each having a crew of from eight to twenty men aboard. Now

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not more than two or four schooners are seen at any one time, having Protestant crews, and these remain only a week or two

It is needless to say that the fishermen of Mutton Bay accorded me a hearty welcome, and almost every man, woman, and child attended the services.

Being informed that the old mission boat, North Star, had been repaired and treated to a new coat of paint, preparations were made for a cruise along the coast. Here, I must state, that the news of the Mission boat being serviceable surprised me, for, when in Quebec, I had been given to understand that she was unseaworthy, and money was given me to buy a new boat upon my arrival at Natoshquan. But finding the price almost double the sum mentioned in Quebec, I did not purchase. It was not therefore unwelcome news when information came that the North Star was ready for sea, being aware that the bishop intended starting on his visit to the coast about the end of June.

On the 22nd June, the cruise commenced, the first visit was to Harrington Harbor, where are a great number of young people from among whom I expected to find some candidates for confirmation. This was the plan adopted throughout, going where most candidates were to be expected, consequently a few places were passed by on the downward trip. Three weeks were occupied in reaching Blanc Sablon, the eastern extremity of the Mission, during which time, together with a week at latter place, sixteen regular services were held, Holy Communion administered to two aged men, and one sick woman, together with twelve baptismal services, and pastoral visits.

My cruise was rather a rough one. We had to beach the boat at Esquimo Island, during a fog, on the eastern trip, and returning came very nearly being wrecked in attempting to round Point Geroux during a gale; much of the inconvenience was occasioned in consequence of my pilot's inexperience with the coast. He was unacquainted with the inner ran, so, in order to avoid rocks and shoals, kept out in the open sea. Since the old pilot left, no one is willing to go for the same wages; \$100 were asked by one, and \$130 by another, for the season. Until my predecessor's time, no clergyman was charged more than sixty dollars for pilotage.

I arrived back at Mutton Bay, just seven weeks from starting. Remained one week, distributing clothing, and then started west, going as far as Wolf Bay (Cape Whittle), beyond which there is little need of a minister's visits, our friends at Musquarro being absent for the season, and the fishing establishment at Natoshquan temporarily closed. Consequently, I returned to

Harrington Harbor, where are eleven protestant families, but not all Church members. Possibly, I shall winter here. Mrs. D. D. Witter and A. S. Jan S

Bobbitt teaches Sunday School,

Statistics, as follows:—Baptisms, 19; Marriages, 4; and recorded 4 deaths; 33 candidates were prepared for Confirmation, but, owing to the Bishop's visit being unexpected, some were absent at the time of his Lordship's arrival at the several places.

The people desire me to express their sincere thanks to the kind donors for the bountiful supplies of warm clothing sent for

distribution among them.

There are two mission houses, one at Mutton, the other at Schooner Bay. They are in tolerably good condition, but the School House, at the latter place, is fast going to decay.

I hope the School master will reside at Schooner Bay this winter, as some families have signified their intention of residing there for about six of the winter months, in order to obtain for their

children the benefit of his vocation.

I have also to return thanks for quantities of pictorial papers, which are much prized by the fishermen. Also to Messrs F. Milburn & Co., Toronto, for a valuable supply of their proprietary medicines. And to Mrs. Williams, for her untiring zeal in behalf of the settlers upon the Labrador Coast.

EEEDS.

The Rev. J. Kemp reports:

This report may well be brief, for there is little to tell. The ordinary parochial work has been carried on much as usual and with about the same results. The extent of the Mission, the age of the incumbent, and domestic affliction have prevented him doing as much in the way of visiting from house to house, in the more distant parts of his Mission, as he would have wished, and under other circumstances would have done. The public services however, both Sunday and week day, have been kept up as heretofore with out diminution. Stress of weather, rain, and what is worse, snow storms, have sometimes prevented the missionary from keeping his appointments, as to-day, Dec. 29th, he had an appointment 12 miles off, a violent snow-storm keeps him at home.

St. James Charch, Leeds.—This is the headquarters of the Mission, just at the clergyman's residence. Here we have our largest congregations, and here nearly two-thirds of our assessment is subscribed, and here consequently are the greatest number of services held, with an attendance of from fifty to eighty or a hundred.

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arters of the we have our ur assessment number of seror a hundred. Mere also we have a Sun lay School during the summer months, with about thirty scholars. Our worthy lay delegate, Mr. G. Bayne, still keeps at his post in charge, assisted last summer by his son, Mr. Norman M. Bayne, who cheerfully gave his services, together with Miss Craig and Miss B. Marshail taking the junior classes. I have held a bible and confirmation class on each alternate Sunday morning. We sadly need a Sunday School Library, which I hope will be in part supplied for next summer. My services here are once a fortnight in the morning, and every Sunday evening, and on week days. Christmas Day, Ash Wednesday, Gool Friday and Thanksgiving day.

st. Mark's. Kinnvar's Mills.—Here the Sunday services are morning and afternoon alternately, except on my Broughton Sunday, when the morning service is omitted here, save for the last winter or two, Mr. Smith has taken it in my absence, and the same gentleman is also rendering me like help this winter. The congregations are small, from 30 to 60, average perhaps about 40. We have no Samday School here, owing to the fact that I can get no one to take charge. I held a confirmation class here after service during last summer, though there were but eight candidates.

Frizzells.—This is about four miles from Kinnear's Mills. I have service here about once in three weeks on a week day; attendance small—15 or 20, only for this some of the people would never hear the Word at all.

Beattle's Settlement.—This is a settlement, forming the apex of a triangle, of which St. James and St. Marks form respectively the angles of the base, seven miles distant from Leeds, and about nine from Kinnear's Mills. Here I take service at 2.30 p.m. when it is my morning turn at Kinnears Mills, coming home for every service. There are nearly 20 members of nominally church people. I give them the Litany and a sermon. The congregation numbers from 40 to 60. They contribute a small sum towards making up the Leeds assessment. I have arranged to continue this service during the coming winter on Sundays. Until now I gave it up in the winter season, and gave a week day service instead and a Sunday service once in six weeks on my way home from Broughton. There ought to be a church built in this locality, and a regular congregation organized, and separately assessed; but I shall leave that for my successor in the mission.

Broughton.—This is a township which was mostly owned by the late Mr. Hall of Quebec, and settled by Protestants from the north of Ireland, mostly church people, but with a mixture of Presbyterians. Half a century ago, or even thirty years ago, there was a large church population served by the late Rev. W. King from St. Sylvestre; now it has become a French settlement with a large Roman church; and the Protestants are being bought out, and will sooner or later all sell out and leave. The Presbyterians have dwindled down to three families, they have no minister to visit them, and generally are glad to avail themselves of the services of the church. We have as yet about twelve families, one of which, that of the late John Frazer, lay delegate, and with whom I have lodged when in Broughton ever since I came to the place, will leave in the spring, one of the best and most regular church going families, as well as being among the best payers among the congregation.

Broughton is a very awkward place to get at, especially in the winter season—pity it could not be served—from the Quebec Central. The congregation here used to number about seventy, now they do not average more than half that number, and will soon be less. People are hard set to make a living; there has been no day school in the place, save French, for three years, they are talking of starting one next summer for the few children that are there. A little help in this way from the Church Society would be very acceptable, and I think well applied. The Church which is uninsured stands in great need of new shingling, which the people are arranging to have done next summer.

Week Day Services.—I have already mentioned Frizzells, this is a regular appointment, kept up through the year about once in three weeks; besides this during the winter months, I have week evening services in some other places.

Nelson Road School House 2 miles from Leeds Village,— Here there are a few Church members, who are rather strict in their attendance at Church, so I give them service in their own School House about once a month, which is attended by most of the Church members, and many of the Presbyterians of the district; the attendance is from 30 to 40.

Wilson's Mills Schoolhouse, 2 miles from Parsonage.—Here are a few Church members, and I give them a service once a month in the winter, which is fairly well attended; congregation 30 to 50.

This report would be very incomplete did I not mention that on the 19th of October, we had the privilege of a visit from his Lordship The Bishop of the Diocese who confirmed both here and at Kinnear's Mills; on that day nineteen were confirmed at St. James Church, and eight at St. Mark's Church, Kinnear's Mills. There was an adult baptised at the former place, and the day was altogether one to be remembered. One word more. The missionary is just about entering on the last year of his public ministry, he is sorry and he is

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glad—sorry to sever his connection with the people he has known and served so long, yet glad to think that the work will be more effectually done by a younger man. He wishes to make this his last year, his best year, may he make it so in blessing and usefulness.

LENNOXVILLE.

The Rev. A. C. Scarth reports :-

Apart from the ordinary routine of parish work, I know of mothing that calls for special notice, unless it be that we record with thankfulnesss that it was our privilege to join with cur fellow Christians in a solemn service of joy and praise for the completion of the fiftieth year of the reign of our noble Queen. The beauties of her life, and some of the chief blessings of her reign, were eloquently placed before us by the preacher on the occasion, the Rev. Dr. Roc.

I may also perhaps refer to our "Harvest Home" service, which has now become an institution among us, in which by decorating our unpretending church with the products of field and forest, and by engaging in a joyous service of song and praise, we endeavour both to provoke and to show forth our thankfulness to our God and King,

"For His mercies still endure, Ever faithful, ever sure."

I have to report most satisfactory attendance at our Sunday services as well as at the Special Lenten, and more frequent services of Holy week, and on Easter day we had, at the two celebrations of the Holy Communion, a total attendance of one hundred and nine communicants. The total number of communions during the year have been twenty-eight, and the average attendance about thirty-five, all which afford matter for deep thankfulness, for encouragement and hope.

We have reason, too, to be grateful to Almighty God for the

success that has attended the efforts of the Guild. The proceeds of their labours amount to \$314.98, for the past year, out of which has been paid the expense incurred in the enlargement of the Sunday School Hall. This sum of \$314.98 is included in the financial statement.

Of Surplice acts during the year my register shows:

LEVIS AND SOUTH QUEBEC

The Rev. M. George Thompson reports:-

Throughout the year the Sunday services have been regularly kept up, but during the winter months I found it necessary to drop the usual Wednesday evening service, and it has not been regularly resumed yet, except through the seasons of Lent and Advent.

During Holy week I had a daily service, taking as the subjects of meditations the various events in our Blessed Lord's life during that eventful week. These services, I am glad to say, were fairly well attended.

A fortnightly service at Hadlow is still continued. The services which are now held in the school house are as a rule, very well attended. Mr. George Sample still continues his good work here, and has a class every Sunday afternoon for the children who are too young to walk to the Parish Sunday School. He reports 26 names on his list.

On the Parish Sunday School roll we have 53 names; but the regular attendance is not as good as it ought to be. Since being admitted to the priesthood on Trinity Sunday, I have had two celebrations of the Holy Communion each month, one on the first Sunday after the morning service, and the other on the third Sunday of the month in the early morning. By the assistance of the Ladies' Guild, which is doing good work, the debt incurred last year on church and rectory repairs has all been paid off. The ladies also presented the church with a stole and surplice. To the exertions of Mrs. and Miss Green, we owe blinds for the church windows, a very neat and pretty chancel window, the

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inside of the church newly painted, besides some smaller but needed improvements. Mrs. Peebles has lately given a beautiful set of book markers for use in the church. Miss Piton has ably presided at the organ during the year, and has been most faithful and persevering in the performance of her duties. Through the kindness of the Rev. T. W. Fyles and his son, Mr. Wm. Fyles, B.A., a student of the Diocese of Montreal, I was enabled to get a month's rest in the summer, which needless to say, did me a great deal of good, and my sincere thanks are due to these gentlemen, as well as to Mr. Addie, who took charge of the Sunday School during my absence. We were favored with a visit from our Bishop, on the occasion of the annual meeting of the Clergy of the Rural Deanery of Quebec, held here on October 5th. On the evening of the same day, a missionary meeting was held in School house No. 2, kindly loaned by the Trustees, at which addresses were made by the Revs. Messrs. Debbage, Wadleigh, Hewton, and Faulconer, and a collection was taken up in aid of the Shingwank Home. This year our annual festival for the Sunday School children took the form of a Christmas tree and an entertainment given almost entirely by the children. It was very successful, and evidently was greatly enjoyed by the children and the others who were present. The children did not forget their pastor, but presented him with four volumes of poetical works. All were pleased to have with them on the happy occasion the Rev. I. M. Thompson of Danville, whose work as missioner in this Parish is still remembered by many.

I beg again to acknowledge many kindnesses received from

members of my congregation during the year.

MAGDALEN ISLANDS.

The Rev Joseph W. Norwood reports:-

I beg leave to submit the following report for the year: Confirmed, 13; Baptised, 14; Married, 3; Buried, 1; moved out of Parish, 17. Number of services in the following places: Grindstone Island, 73; Gross Isle, 10; Entry Island, 27; Grand Entry,

4; Amherst Island, 12; Celebration Holy Communion, 18; Admited, 1; Amount raised on Entry Island towards building a new

Church, \$50; Offertories, \$14.

Since entering upon this Mission, I have opened a new station at Grand Entry during the summer months, as this place contains lobster factories of some importance. Attendance at services quite large and interesting. At a meeting of the Parishioners at Entry Island, the building of a small Church was determined upon, and for this purpose a grant of land was secured at once for a site, and the sum of \$50 was raised upon the spot. All the people on this Island are faithful and devout Churchmen, and I cannot speak too highly in their praise. The Missionary on these Islands must bear the qualifications of a doctor, a sailor, and a preacher. As a doctor he is subject to many calls, many journeys by day and by night in storm and fine weather, not only in answer to the needs of his own flock, but also to the many who are not among the Protestants. I find that there are a few Baptists and a good many Presbyterians who for many years have been in the enjoyment of the privileges of our Church, but who during the summer advent of some of their own preachers show their teaching by turning their faces against the Church which has nursed them in their poverty. One of the great drawbacks upon the comfort of the Missionary is the five or six months dreary isolation of winter, during which time he is almost completely cut off from all communication with the outside world. No letters, no papers, no recreation such as is found in the intercourse with intelligent and educated people. Another of the difficulties he meets with is the varied form of communication and travel to the different stations. As these islands are from nine to twenty-five miles apart, the missionary must make his way from one point to the other in an open-sail boat, subject to storm, wet and delay, or trust himself to the tender mercies of frozen fields of broken ice. I have been a Missionary among the Savages of Africa, and also among the Indians and Cow-boys of the "Far West," and I am compelled to believe that this field is the very hardest one that I have ever labored in and with the least satisfaction to myself. With reference to the assessment for the Board of Missions, I am satisfied that this matter is rather premature with these people. They have been trained to receive rather than to give, and they put rather a queer interpretation upon the Gospel, being without money and without price. Since the assessment has been pushed upon them by the closing of the Church, as per order, many have since combined together in a determinate refusal to attend the services of the Church, and therefore have invited minisn, 18 ; Admitiilding a new

MAGOG

The Rev. J. Hepburn reports:

In sending my report after ten years of work in this parish, a few details of progress will be acceptable.

In Magog, in addition to the ornamentation of the church, a neat

tower has been built with a bell, at a cost of \$600.

An endowment fund was begun, has been increased, and there now stands to our credit over \$1,000. A parsonage has been erected, comfortable and commodious, costing when complete nearly \$3,000. Upon this there is an indebtedness. It is, however, being hopefully diminished, an a we trust will soon disappear.

A lovely site for a new church beside the parsonage will be ours

when we need to build.

In Georgeville the church has been thoroughly repaired, the foundation secured, and a very pretty tower built at a cost of \$650.

We have nearly secured the \$100 necessary to create an Endowment Fund.

The assessment upon both parts of the mission has been doubled since my arrival, and we have been able to meet demands, sometimes, however, with difficulty. I am happy to say that the difficulty does not increase with the increase of assessment.

I found when I came two churches to supply, and one midway station. I have had for three years past six outstations scattered through the district, so that I really have some - oversight of the whole field of labour. From these places some of my best encouragement has been found.

The Registers show 250 baptisms, of whom 63 have been adults

(10 during the past year); 120 have been confirmed.

I hope these figures are an indication of the presence of God with us in the work we have been endeavouring to do. I comfort myself with the growth of the church, in spite of many difficulties and great discouragements.

There are signs here and there of the breaking up of the terrible indifference which has blighted this whole section of country.

Also our own people appear to be learning the wisdom of working together for the church's sake, and for their own spiritual life.

The ladies' guild in both sections has been greatly prospered; and in Magog a supplementary guild ("Willing Workers') has surprised me with its success.

For two summer seasons I have held daily morning prayer in the church in Magog. The expense of the services the rest of the year prevents me holding them.

As far as attendance goes, these services have not been successful, being often found alone rendering them; but I do feel that they are a great help to me, and afford me also the opportunity so desirable, so necessary for making intercession for the people.

It was a great satisfaction to me to have as an assistant for four months this year Mr. R. J. Fothergill of Quebec,—parishioners and visiting friends enjoyed a double benefit from his presence; I cannot speak too highly of his amiable disposition, and of his readiness to help.

There have been several very sad deaths among us, evoking much sympathy. I feel that I must pay a word of tribute to one, Mr. Ralph Murray; he joined the church seven years ago, when 71 years of age. He made his presence felt at once by forming the endowment fund, he has since helped to increase it. He gave the site (a lovely one and valuable) for the church and parsonage. While he lived he helped, now he rests in peace.

The people of Georgeville and Fitch Bay remembered me very kindly at Christmas, giving a present of \$70.50, a sum turned to account at once in the purchase of a young horse to take the place of the faithful. Terny," who has carried me safely and well ever since I came to the parish. Our small special offerings (a real proof of the true life) are hopefully improved this year, though still very small. We hope and work and pray for a great increase in days to come.

MALBAIE AND POINT ST PETER.

The Rev. Geo. Radley Walters reports:

One seems somewhat at a loss, in a mission like this, so far away from any centre of church life, to find material for a Report that should be, not only interesting to its many annual readers, but also encouraging to its Diocesan Board, to whom it owes so much year after year for support given.

I am happy to be able to state that I have kept all my regular appointments for church services, both at Malbaie and at the Corner of the Beach, also monthly at the Barachois school-house.

and conducted our Sunday school throughout the year.

I cannot speak of an increasing congregation (other than by birth-rate) as I would wish, though I do not want you to infer that it is growing smaller from any other cause than by the yearly exodus of young persons, who seem tempted to leave us for our larger cities, seeking there domestic employment.

This past year, quite a number of both sexes left us, some of course will return again in the coming spring, whilst others, making new

homes and new friends, will be induced to remain away.

I am pleased to report that through the liberality of Elias Collas, Esq., of Jersey, who kindly gave us fifty dollars (\$50.00), I have been enabled to accept the whole of the offer made us by "A kind Friend," in Quebec, last year, and so have added another one hundred dollars (\$100.00) to our Endowment Fund, thus in the two years have I secured for the mission from kind benefactors five hundred dollars (\$500) to this Fund.

In the month of June, we placed in our church three very pretty stained glass windows, from the firm of "Spence & Co.," of Montreal, the money for these was from kind friends of the clergyman's in England, and I trust now that some members of our church here may be moved to place in three more, at their

own expense, which will complete and add very much to beauti-

fying God's House.

My churchwardens are now busy giving to each member of the congregation his quota of wood and shingles, as we contemplate putting a new roof on our church, and repainting the outside this spring,—rather a heavy undertaking for us, still I hope it will not prove the straw that will break the Camel's back.

I may as well tell you we were all very loyal here, "jubilating" at Jubilee time, our Sunday and day-schools were entertained by Mrs. Walters in a field near our house, where a good tea was served under a large tent, and games provided for the children About sixty couples carrying banners and flags marched from the school house to the church, for a very short address and a hymn, thence to Point St. Peter.

The scene will be long remembered here, the merchants ran up their bunting, and many other flags were waving in the breeze

for the occasion.

We are all very much indebted to Messrs. J. & E. Collas, Messrs. John Fauvel & Co., and Chas. LeMarquand, for the kind reception they gave the youngsters in passing, being one continued round of firing, both from cannon and guns, from the employees of those firms, and thus did honor to the day.

We have to thank them too for the huge bonfire provided in the

evening.

Quite unexpectedly two nice boxes of books and magazines

were sent me from Quebec, for distribution in the Mission,

I may say picture papers are always in demand here by those who cannot read, and are delighted with the same for decorating their homes. I beg to thank the donors very kindly, and would say "(Parent many in well kind)".

say, "Be not weary in well doing."

We were all very much delighted with a visit from our Bishop, in the month of June. I presented twenty-three candidates for the Rite of Confirmation; our church was crowded, six (6) of the candidates being Choristers were confirmed in their surplices. The Bishop's address and sermon were both listened to with close attention, and I trust made a lasting impression for good.

My surplice choir is, I find, a great help and a power for good in many ways; many of the boys, though living at a distance of two to four miles from the church, take pains to be regular and in good time. Our hymns and chants, on Christmas day, were I think the heartiest I remember during the ten years I have been here.

On the night after Christmas I invited the choir boys and their parents to supper, which was spread in the Malbaie schoolroom,

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nnce of two dar and in ere I think een here. s and their choolroom, after which we all spent a few hours in games, snap-dragon, and scrambling for nuts, etc.; after a few songs and hearty cheers, all went away delighted.

Our thanks are due to Mrs. Williams, who kindly remembered

The Rev. Thomas Blaylock reports:

Our ordinary routine of Parish work was this year broken intoby the welcome triennial visit of the Lord Bislop. None can tell how welcome but those who like the clergy on this coast, seldon see from year's end to year's end a brother's face, or anyone with whom they can hold spiritual converse. I presented sixty-nine candidates for confirmation, several of whom were well advanced in years having come to us from other denominations. Most of the can tidates have become communicants, and are I believe trying to walk worthily.

Several very sudden deaths have occurred in New Carlisle, and these warnings "to be ready" have not been lest upon others. In several cases they have had a sole ing effect, resulting as they should in increased seriousness and i crust growth in grace. Barnabas McGie, a Christian, aged 88 years, who for three years had been bed-fast and a great sufferer, "yet devout and waiting for the consolation of Israel." died with the closing days of the year. He was ever patient and full of faith and hope. A living example of the sustaining power of Christ.

Our Model School in Paspebiae has done good work this year, under the same teacher as last, Miss Cauffield. All the scholars are thoroughly instructed in "Church doctrine and Bible Truth" I have made several examinations and found all the work satisfactory. We hope soon to turn out several teachers well equipped

for their work and able to give a reason for the faith that is in them." We owe the continued existence of this school to the

grant of the Church Society, and it is money well spent.

Though we have not yet recovered from the heavy losses of subscriptions and removals consequent upon the failures of last year, yet the attached members of the Church in Paspebiac are rising to the occasion, and many have increased their subscriptions, so the this year we have done without calling upon the Diocesan Board for aid, which is an encouraging fact. I do not care to speak of the "loaves and fishes," but cannot help placing in record my thanks to the young people of Paspebiae for their gift of \$116 00, as a token of their good-will and esteem.

NEWPORT.

The Rev. Alex. H. Robertson reports:

As I have only been in charge of the above Mission since 1st September, my experience is somewhat limited, and the Rector, Rev. A. H. Judge, will report on the Mission for the greater part of the year.

I have Sunday services every morning and afternoon at Rambboro and Island Brook. On the second Sunday of every month I exchange with Mr. Judge, in order that he may administer the Holy Communion at the above places. At Randboro, I did not see much chance of establishing a Sunday school at present, so I have had a service of evening prayer every Wednesday at 7 p.m. After evening prayer I have a Bible class for one hour. I am now giving a course of lessons on the Apostles' Creed. The attendance at this service is steadily increasing, and great interest is shown by all. More than half of those who attend do not belong to our church.

Every Thursday formight I have evening service at Clifton. This service was began in the summer months: the attendance is large, from 50 to 70. I think it is a promising stati.

On alternate Thursdays with the above I go to Learned Plain and have service in the schoolhouse there. I have also reopened the Sunday school at Island Brook, and under the superintendence of Mr. John Wilford, with myself as teacher of the Bible Class, I hope it will go on and prosper.

I have visited almost every family in the Mission, and think that the prospects are very fair for building up the church in the Township of Newport.

PORTNEUF.

The Rev. W. C. Bernard reports:--

Since coming into this Mission in the month of May, I have kept up the regular order of services established by my predecessor, namely, morning and evening service at Portneuf village, and afternoon service at Halesboro, one Sunday, alternating with morning service at Halesboro, and afternoon at the village with a celebration of the Holy Communion at each church once in four weeks; the congregations have been on the average very fair, the village congregation being considerably augmented during the summer months by visitors from Quebec. The new church in the village is not yet quite free from debt, but the people have responded very liberally to my calls upon them, and during the summer and autumn months one hundred and ninety-four dollars has been raised in the parish for the church debt, of this amount twelve dollars were the proceeds of an entertainment gotten up by the ladies of the congregation, and sixty dollars was the contribution of one of the church wardens, in addition to this eighty-three dollars were kindly contributed for the same purpose by friends in Quebec.

There have been various improvements made about the church and parsonage, the church having been refreshed with a new coat of cement, and further improved in appearance by having a neat new fence built along the front of the lot, separating it from the road; the parsonage also has been made to look quite new by means of paint and whitewash, all this is also largely due to Mr. Miller, the people's warden. The Sunday School work in Portneuf village has been going on steadily, the average attendance being about twenty-four: through the kindness of Mrs. Greenough, who presented twenty very nice volumes, a Sunday School library was started, a few volumes were added with money taken from the Sunday School offerings, and still further additions have been sent to Mrs. Greenough from personal friends elsewhere, until at the present time our Sunday School Library numbers about seventy volumes. Just before Christmas the same kind friend was instrumental in getting ev a Christmas tree for the children, when the gifts were distributed from the tree it was found that there was something for every child, neither was the Incumbent forgotten. At Halesboro, owing to the distances which separate the various families, it is difficult to keep up a regular Sunday School; but I endeavour to get to effer as many as possible of the young people each Suralay and give them some instruction, also Mr. Newton, who is teaching the Hardwood school, assists up in the by teaching the catechism in school.

The Portneuf Temperance Society is still prospering, seven new members having been added during the past two months.

We are looking forward to a visit from our Bishop in the spring, when I expect to be able to present to him a goodly number of candidates for confirmation, also we hope to be in a position then to ask his Lordship to consecrate the new church.

I cannot close my report without a word of thanks to the people of this Mission for the universal kindness with which I was received upon coming a stranger into the Mission, and also for the many acts of kindness which we have since experienced.

RICHMOND AND MELBOURNE.

The Rev. A. J. Balfour reports:

In our feeble and imperfect way, yet I hope in a way growing in acceptableness to God, we have sought through another short year to extend Christ's kingdom upon earth, "His saving health among all nations." I say "we," for in all my efforts in this

behalf I have been much cheered and strengthened by the kind consideration, sympathy, and co-operation of the great majority of the people among whom I am called to minister (yet alas not a little discouraged at times by the continued neglect of, and seeming indifference to, religious things, on the part of some, whose holier influence and active services the church needs, and we

covet, for our own sake, theirs and Christ's).

If statistics, numerical and financial, are an index of prosperity (they are not always), we have reason to be thankful and not discouraged by the year's work as a whole, for they betoken an improvement upon last year, both as regards attendance at church and at Sunday School, and also as regards the ordinary and special offerings thereat made. In 1886 the parish contributed \$231.26 towards objects extra-Parochial, this year her offering for like purposes amounts to \$390.84, an increase of more than \$150.00. And yet we have, I regret to say, lost by removals during the year now closing some of our most helpful church families. I cannot refrain from making special mention of one— Col. Ready for years was our worthy Lay-Delegate to Synod. a gentleman universally beloved; whilst Mrs. Ready was equally long a zealous Sunday School Teacher, the leading spirit in the "Women's Auxiliary" and in the "Ladies' Guild," indeed foremost in all good works, and a pattern to all devout worshippers. What wonder then that young and old alike should sorrow for their departure as a serious loss to our little Flock.

The Sunday School has been faithfully maintained throughout the year, under my own personal superintendence. In the work of instruction I have been aided by eight efficient teachers. In addition to the Sunday School, I have held a special service for children every Sunday afternoon, the attendance at which has averaged about fifty. The little ones have seemingly been much interested in these their services, and I trust not a little benefited. Their offerings on such occasions are given to the "Shingwank Home," for the benefit of some little Indian child. Since the inauguration of these services, I have been pleased to witness a greater number of children in attendance upon the ordinary services. To familiarize them with the Church's Prayer Book and principles, and to lead them to take an intelligent, reverent and devout part in the Public worship (which before very few

No steps have yet been taken to rebuild the Rectory, destroyed during my absence a year ago, by fire. Having still a debt of \$4000.00 upon our new church, we hesitate to assume a fresh one, and we have only \$1 \to 00 towards this desired object.

I am pleased to be able to report the realization of a long cherished desire, the introduction in our new church of the free and open pew, and envelope system. Being most consonant with christian principles, this liberal policy must necessarily tend to remove hindrances, enlarge the numerical strength of a parish, dissipate prejudice, increase the ordinary revenue and missionary contributions, and promote harmony and good-will amongst high and low, rich and poor.

The Women's Auxiliary continues to meet monthly for the promotion, by prayer, alms and deeds, of missionary work. I wish that more would join. The cause is God's; and they who have the privilege of being His fellow-workers are assured of His blessing. If we seek to deepen it, the interest will increase, and with it, the two-fold reward. Through this Association \$41.70 in money, and some clothing, have been given during the year past, for its work abroad.

The Ladies' Guild was never in more successful or harmonious operation. To its earnest ladies, the Parish is this year again indebted for \$500,00, to be applied towards interest and principal of church debt.

Mr. Robert Hamilton's generous offer of \$200.00, towards the augmentation of our Endowment Fund, provided the Parish contribute \$150.00 towards the same object, was taken advantage of at the beginning of the year.

Another somewhat similar offer from the same ever kind and


liberal benefactor of the Diocese is now being met.

During the first two months of the current year, the adjoining







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Mission of St. John was tended with marked acceptableness and promise, by the Rev. Mr. Bernard.

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As for three years prior to his coming, so since his removal I have ministered as best I could to the spiritual needs of that field.

I have held Divine Service in the neighbourhood of 300 times, and made 1000 parochial visits during the year.

To the Honorable Henry Aylmer and Mr. Harkom, our efficient Church Wardens, and to other lay-helpers, male and female, I am indebted for kind and ready assistance on various occasious. Whilst to all my Parishioners, my warm thanks are due for a gift of \$53.00, amongst many other expressions of good will.

SANDY BEACH.

The Rev. G. T. Harding reports:

I cannot do more this year than inform your Society of my establishment in this Mission, and give a financial statement.

I arrived here in October, and was inducted by the Rev. J. P. Richmond soon after. On all hands, myself and family were received with the greatest kindness, all the people showing the most hearty good-will towards us, and a due appreciation of my efforts to minister among them.

The services I am holding are as follows: At Sandy Beach, morning and evening service on two Sundays in each month, and evening service alone on a third Sunday, besides a Wednesday evening or Holy Day service every week. At Peninsula, one morning and two afternoon services each month, with occasional services on chief festivals; but the third Sunday in each month I devote entirely to Little Gaspé, giving them morning and evening service, and remaining overnight for visiting, etc.

By means of missionary cards, we have collected, since I came, the following sums:

Miss Emilia Roberts, \$7.55; Miss Lucy Gavey, \$5.60; Miss Suddard, \$4.85; Miss Thompson, \$3.15. Total, \$21.15.

The total thus raised has been divided among the various funds of your Society and those of the Domestic and Foreign Mission Board, and added to what was raised for these purposes by special collections in the church. I must add, for the information of those who have put their names on the missionary cards, that I am obliged to leave some of them out of the list of contributors published at the end of your reports, since it is not the custom of your Society to publish the names of those who give to missionary objects outside of the Diocese. This is sometimes a cause of trouble, as people do not understand why their names do not appear along with the others, when they give to Domestic and Foreign missions. And it is much to be wished that your Society might see its way to publish the names of those who give to the latter objects.

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SHERBROOKE.

The Rev. Geo. Thorneloe reports:-

The services in this parish during the past year have been as follows:

At St. Peter's Church every Lord's Day morning and evening, every Wednesday evening: Saints Days and chief Holy Days in the morning; in Lent, daily evening prayer, Litany, Wednesday, Friday morning, morning prayer every day throughout Holy Week, Holy Communion at 8.30 a.m.on the third Sunday of the month and after morning prayer on the first Sunday, also on the chief Holy Days.

At Chillas' Scoool House, Orford, once a fortnight on Sunday

afternoon throughout the year.

At Mayoy River School House once a fortnight for the last two months.

At the Gibbs Home, East Sherbrooke, every Thursday evening,

until the month of August.

The various agencies of the parish have been maintained throughout the year as usual, and one or two new ones have been established.

The Sunday School continues to do good work under the faithful superintendence of H. D. Lawrence, Esq., and has shown a

slight increase in attendance.

The Church Temperance Society has continued its operations, holding the usual monthly meetings throughout the autumn and winter months, with a fair measure of success. It is indebted to various elergymen for assistance in the form of addresses.

The Ladies' Guild has been quite as energetic and successful as usual. In addition to supporting an Indian child at the Wawanosh Home at a cost of \$75, it has contributed \$25 to the church extension fund of the diocese and \$380 towards the new church in East Sherbrooke. It has also done good work in drawing many of our people together in kindly relations and increasing their interest in their church.

The Children's Guild, managed by a few members of the Ladies' Guild, for training the young girls of the parish to use their fingers in God's service, has been fairly successful. The proceeds for the year, \$55, have been given to East Sherbrooke church for

a Font.

The Women's Auxiliary has by God's blessing taken root and flourished abundantly. Already the effects of its meetings and labours are evident in the increased interest of many in missionary work. Besides sending 6 barrels of clothing and books to Algoma

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be se tw it has raised in money about two hundred dollars, for missionary

purposes.

The Parochial Visiting Society, for looking up new comers, ministering to the sick and needy, and maintaining the flow of Christian sympathy between the members of Christ's Body, has continued its work, and has been very useful. There is yet abundant

room for it to grow in strength and usefulness.

The Gibb's Home for girls continues its work, and during the year has placed with fairly satisfactory results about 36 girls. These girls, sent to us by a Society connected with the church in England, and for the most part friendless children, many of them rescued from degraded and immoral surroundings, have, by their conduct and progress in the places assigned them, fully justified the expense and trouble taken on their behalf. Of course some cases give us trouble. But these are exceptional, and we can readily commend the work the Home is doing to the sympathy and interest of our people at large. It should be understood that it is a scheme of church immigration. The children are placed permanently with church families only, and are brought up as children of the church. The work should therefore commend itself in this province where our church population is but small.

A Boys' home, called the Benyon Home, has been established here in the past year by the same Society in England with which the Gibbs Home is connected. It does the same work for friendless English boys which the latter Home does for the girls. And we should be glad if our church people would remember that we have in Sherbrooke homes whence may be obtained for adoption or service boys and girls capable of making themselves useful and

respected.

A Communicants' Union has been established this year. Its meetings are held monthly, and are made of practical use in preparing communicants for receiving the Holy Eucharist. It has long been felt that some agency was needed to draw communicants together, and to awaken in them a deeper sense of the obligations resting upon them as pledged by their own deliberate act to the service of Almighty God. We trust this Association will grow into a useful agency. Already some results in the form of quickened interest in spiritual things have accrued from it.

Another new agency long needed and now happily established is a Bible Class for men, not merely for young men but for all. It began in a very small way, none attending the first day, two the second, four or five the third, and so on, until now it numbers twenty, and is still increasing. Being only a men's class it enables

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oot and gs and sionary Algoma the rector to reach those who are most directly exposed to the temptations of the world, and affords him an opportunity to speak plainly and directly upon these topics. The aim is to encourage frank conversational discussion of the subject on hand. Subjects and questions are often submitted by the members for discussion.

A Sunday School in East Sherbrooke has also been established, and is likely to grow and prosper under the painstaking man-

agement of Mr. Elkins.

Last and chief of all our new Agencies is to be reported a new Church in East Sherbrooke, completed as far as it goes, and opened for service. This is the crowning achievement of the year, for whose successful accomplishment we are devoutly thankful to Almighty God.

In last year's report mention was made of a large sum of money promised towards this object. The payment of this money was contingent upon our use of somewhat expensive plans. Mature consideration of the subject convinced us it would be better to build a less costly edifice. A new canvass was therefore made, new

plans obtained, and the work of building began,

The Church, though not expensive, is neat and commodious. It is 60 feet in length, and 22 feet in width. The walls are finished externally, with elaphoards and pointed shingles in contrasted colours. Arches are used to support the roof. It affords ample accommodation for 150 people; and is so constructed as to be capable of enlargement in case of need. It is proposed to name it the Church of The Advent. In the erection of this building members and friends of the Church on both sides of the river have worked heartily and harmoniously together, and it is hoped that its completion will mark an era in the growth of the Church in this Parish.

A generous gift of \$50 has been received from Mr. R. N. Hall, which is to be applied to the appointments of the chancel; and the ladies of St. Peter's Guild have given a Prayer Desk and Lectern.

The Rector desires to place on record his sense of indebtedness to all the many earnest workers who have aided him in the year past, especially to the office bearers who in kindness and courtesy have been unfailing. But more particularly is it his privilege to acknowledge the continued blessing of the presence and assistance of the Rev. Dr. Reid, to whose advice and cheerful aid he is unspeakably indebted

On June 19th the Lord Bishop of the Diocese visited the Parish and confirmed 31 persons, who were at once admitted to Holy Com-

munion.

SHIGAWAKE AND PORT DANIEL.

The Rev. F. E. J. Lloyd reports:-

The Mission Priest sends in his report of the above mission this year with profound thankfulness. It has been a time, one must believe, of much awakening and spiritual advancement, particularly amongst the younger members of the community. The Lord Bishop of the Diocese visited us during the past summer, and administered the holy ordinance of Confirmation to fifty-eight young persons, all of whom, with one or two exceptions, were admitted to the Holy Communion shortly afterwards. The services at the time of Confirmation in the churches of St. Paul at Shigawake, and of St. James at Port Daniel, were exceptionally hearty and at the same time devont. The female candidates were all becomingly attired in white, and the congregations were very large. In the Church of St. James at Port Daniel many Presbyterians were present, and it is gratifying to report that generally speaking the Presbyterians in this Mission are gradually becoming familiar with the Church and her teaching, so much so indeed that the Mission Priest is assured that by the exercise of tact and discretion the time is not far distant when many of them will seek admission to the Church of Christ. For this, amongst many other reasons, I look forward to my approaching separation from this encouraging Mission with much sorrow. The assessment has been paid with much regularity, and the large increase asked for by the Diocesan Board for the ensuing three years has been made all along the line with readiness, and in the majority of instances even with gratitude. There is observable throughout the Mission a great desire to please God and to do His will. The Shigawake Parish Room and Horse Shed is almost completed. We have to thank some good friends in Quebec for the handsome sum of \$54.50, which they contributed towards this most necessary object. A Bazaar was recently held by the ladies of St. James Church, Port Daniel, by which a fair amount of money was made towards providing a similar building for St. James Church and Sunday School.

The Missionary desires to express his gratitude to the Rev. Dr. Roe for valuable assistance in his work during the summer months.

which he is always ready to render in this Mission.

The time is fast approaching, I cannot but think, when it will be necessary to subdivide the Mission of Shigawake and Port Daniel by making the settlement of Shigawake and Hope Town a mission, and Port Daniel and L'Anse aux Gascons the same, Hope Town formerly belonged to Shigawake Mission, but when L'Anse aux Gascons was added thereto it was ceded to the Parish of New Carlisle and Paspebiac. This last mentioned parish is quite large enough for one man to attend to, and he necessarily can give but a small share of his time to Hope Town. Port Daniel is rapidly increasing in population, and the large number of Presbyterians amongst it are without, and are likely to be so for a long time to come, a resident preacher. The church population is also increasing, and I feel tolerably certain that were a elergyman appointed to a mission comprising Port Daniel and L'Anse aux Gascons only, a powerful church congregation would be built up therein. The temporal condition of the community, hitherto not very bright, is improving every year, and as there seems to be a prosperous future before the thriving settlement of Port Daniel, this improvement is likely to be permanent.

The mission sustained a really serious loss during the past year in the removal of Miss French, teacher of Shigawake school from our midst; ever ready to assist in any good work in the parish, her departure therefrom will be felt for a long time to come. The Sunday School superintendents continue to perform their self imposed labours with zeal, discretion and punctuality. The Missionary Priest cannot close his report without thanking Miss Almord and Miss Kerr for their voluntary and valuable services as organists in Shigawake and Port Daniel churches respectively.

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STANSTEAD AND BEEBE PLAIN.

The Rev. W. T. Forsythe reports:

The past year has not been very eventful in the history of this parish, although there has not been wanting I believe a gradual progress in the work of the church. One has to learn in these frontier missions and parishes that all true growth is gradual, and that we must be content to sow the good seed and to wait for the promise of harvest. Learning this involves often much trial and weariness.

The services at both churches remain substantially the same as last year. I have felt much anxiety in regard to the extension of the church in the surrounding country. My time on Sunday is so fully occupied with the services at the two churches that I cannot hold any services in the country districts; and to establish the church services successfully in any neighborhood when they are unknown, they must be held first on Sundays when the farmers are unoccupied with secular work. I have been hoping that it might be possible at some time or other to procure lay help, on Sundays at least, either from Bishop's College or some other quarter, so that while the regular services of the two churches are not neglected, we may hold services also in some of the district school houses. Of one thing I am certain, that if we wish to win the people for Christ and His church, we must go to them and not wait for them to come to us.

I have received a gift of altur linen from a kind friend in England, which is now in use at Christ Church. The Kilburn Sisters have also sent a gift of church ornaments, etc., which has been distributed between the two churches. A violet frontal was given to Christ Church, which now has three frontals,—green, red, violet, and we hope soon to be able to procure a white one when we shall be able to follow the sequence of the seasons. To Beebe Plain

was given two frontals, and other articles.

christ Church.—Morning and evening services have been held every Sunday. The attendance at morning service has been good, that at evening service (I am sorry to say) not quite as good as it might and ought to be, although this may be partially accounted for by the distance at which some live from the Church, badness of weather, etc. Holy Communion has been celebrated on the first Sunday in each month at mid-day, on the third Sunday early, on all the chief festivals, and weekly in Lent. The number of communicants at the mid-day celebrations has been good, but at the early ones (I am grieved and sorry to say) lamentably small. This coming year, taking "forward" as our motto, I hope to have mid-day cele-

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brations on the first and third Sundays in each mouth, and early celebrations on the fourth. Our special week day services in Lent were well attended, and were quite encouraging to the parish priest. The Sunday School bas, I am glad to say, increased in members, although from the small families of our church people we cannot expect a large number. I thank my zealous little band of teachers, always punctual and ready. The Church Day School still continues its good work under Miss Hepburn's efficient care, thanks to the grant of the Church Society which I hope may be continued.

The hand of time has been for a long time noticeable in the dingy appearance of the interior of the church fabric. The ladies of the congregation have resolved during this winter to endeavor to raise funds to tint the walls and ceiling, and to do other needful repairs, and they have held one social already, which was very successful. May their efforts be crowned with success. They have helped to liquidate the church expenses by a bazaar and strawberry festival. They deserve the thanks of all the members of the church for their persevering efforts.

We hope by the kind liberality of a true friend of the parish to secure the generous offer of R. Hamilton, Esq., to our Endowment Fund, some time at the commencement of the coming year.

I am sorry that our subscriptions towards the various funds of the Church Society were smaller than usual, but we had to raise an extra contribution for the church extension fund. I hope this next year, by strict attention to method and system, to raise a larger amount both for Church Society and missions. At the visit of the Bishop to this church last June, 5 persons were admitted to full church membership by the sacramental rite of Confirmation.

I have held fortnightly week day services for a few months at "Juda's Mills," about 1½ miles from the village, and hope to soon be able to hold services at Casnellboro about 3 miles distant between here and Barnston township. Our Wednesday evening services have been held as usual, but I am very anxious to establish daily service.

I am sorry to have to chronicle the death of D. C. Phelps, Esq., for some time people's warden, and ever an earnest friend to the church in this parish. He died in full communion with the church, and his end was peace.

All Saints, Beehe Plain.—The work of the church in this new field has been gradually growing, sometimes everything has seemed discouraging, then something occurred to give us hope again. The Sunday services have been held as usual, and the attendance on the whole has been good. We were all cheered by the visit of

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this new as seeme again, endance e visit of the Lord Bishop last June, when 6 were confirmed. The service was bright and hearty, and we shall never forget the loving practical words of comfort and advice addressed to us. The week day services in Lent were well attended. The subscriptions towards the various expenses have increased, and payment has been more systematic, as we have partially adopted the envelope system, and hope to adopt it universally in time. The Sunday School, which seemed to grow smaller in numbers some time ago, has, I am thankful to say, again revived.

There is one very encouraging feature in church life here, viz., the increase in the number of communicants at our monthly celebration of Holy Communion, held at 8.30 a.m. We have now thirty communicants, and the average attendance is 13. I know this might be better, but still it is encouraging considering the new-

ness of the work here.

I was surprised and gratified last winter at the kind gift of a handsome fur coat from the members and friends of All Saints Church, It was a pleasing sign of harmony between pastor and people.

I hope to be able soon to hold a week day service at some

point between here and the mission of Georgeville.

I thank all the office bearers of the two churches for their kind co-operation with me in all church work and pray that the work of the church may be strengthened and extended in this vicinity, and notwithstanding the defects and shortcomings of Her minister may redound to the glory of God and the good of souls. To God be all the praise.

The visitation of the Bishop too, was very welcome, during which twenty-nine were received into full communion of the Church of England, and I trust, with the Living Church of Christ.

In conclusion I trust by God's blessing the work will grow and prosper, although there is one disappointment in our labor, that our congregations are on the decrease instead of the increase, as the younger members of old families leave their homesteads as soon as they are able to shift for themselves. Yet my comfort is that I know one soul is as precious in my Master's eye as thousands,

and cost as much to redeem it.

Mrs. Montizambert, Hon, Judge Andrews, and others, have again, as in former years, liberally contributed presents for the annual Christmas Tree.

The attendance at church is unabated. Communicants have increased.

WEST FRAMPTON.

The Rev. J. B. Debbage reports:

The work of the church has been going on steadily in spite of our diminished numbers. My journeys to Cranbourne were very hard on myself and my horse last winter. The roads were very heavy, and it was bitterly cold over the bleak hills. Three times in succession I reached Frampton late and too exhausted for evening service. But with these exceptions I have had my evening services here after my return from Cranbourne. I have maintained a p.m. service in the first range of Frampton on the Sundays that I do not go to Cranbourne. After this service I return home in time for the evening service in the Church.

Both myself and the people are grateful for the kind consideration of the Diocesan Board in not raising the assessment for the ensuing three years.

We kept up our monthly temperance meetings until the Spring, and they have been recommenced this winter with considerable success. A good number have signed the total abstinence pledge.

Our School, thanks to the aid received from the Church Society, was in operation until September, when our teacher, who had given much satisfaction, left us. We have not as yet been able to find another to take her place.

Our people have as usual contributed to different outside purposes. The amount may seem small, but in course of time we may be able to send more, especially for Foreign Missions.

The ladies are proposing, under the kind encouragement of Mrs. Williams, to establish a branch of the "Women's Auxiliary."

We have to thank Mrs. Williams for the promise of a parcel of things for a tree or sale.

My daughter and Miss E. Henderson collected for the Church Society, and I was pleased to be able to send thirty dollars for different funds.

I must acknowledge many kindnesses and gifts from my people, both in West Frampton and Cranbourne. The people in the former place have again cut and hauled for me a supply of wood.

REPORT OF THE CORRESPONDING COMMITTEE OF THE DOMESTIC AND FOREIGN MISSIONARY SOCIETY OF THE CHURCH OF ENGLAND IN CANADA FOR THE YEAR ENDING THE 31st JULY, 1887.

Reference to the tabulated statement shows that nearly every congregation in the Diocese contributed to the Epiphany and Ascensiontide appeals on behalf of missions; and although the amount which passed through the Treasurer's hands was not so large as in the preceding year by \$80, yet the Committee considers the result satisfactory in view of the large amount collected for the Women's Jubilee gift to the W. and O. Fund of the Diocese of Algoma; had all the congregations complied with the resolution of the Synod respecting an annual collection for three years for the W. and O. Fund Algoma, there would not have been any decrease to report:—

being an increase for Foreign Missions of \$76.57 and a decrease for Domestic Missions of \$156.56.

The Committee desires to impress on the members of the Society the great need that exists for strenuous exertions on behalf of the Dioceses of Rupert's Land, Saskatchewan and Qu'Appelle, where the emigrants from the Mother Country for the most part make their homes. If the Church of England is to take firm root in the great Northwest, assistance must be given to the new settlers towards providing the ministrations of the Church during the first few years of their settlement, after which they will be able to provide for themselves. The Committee feels that if the opportunity which is still open to the Church of England is not taken advantage of, it will be in the future not only a matter of pain and regret, but of reproach.

The report of the "Woman's Auxiliary" is appended, which will, we feel confident, be read with great pleasure by all members of our Church.

FORMS OF BEQUESTS AND DEVISES BY WILL.

I. A Bequest of a sum of money, or of Shares of Stock, or Public Debentures, for the general purposes of the Society.

II. A Bequest of a sum of money, or of Shares of Stock or Debentures, for one or more of the specific purposes of the Society.

(Same as foregoing, only instead of the words in Italies say) towards the augmentation of the Fund formed for the purpose of providing for the future support of the Clergy of the Diocese, called the Sustentation Fund.

Or,—Towards the support of Missionaries and Clergymen of the United Church of England and Ireland in the Diocese of Quebec.

Or,—Towards the augmentation of the Fund formed to make provision for those of the Clergy of the United Church of England and Ireland, in the Diocese of Quebec, who may be incapacitated by age or infirmity, called the Pension Fund.

Or,—Towards the augumentation of the Fund formed to make provision for the widows and orphans of the Clergy of the United Church of England and Ireland in the Diocese of Quebec, called the Widows' and Orphans' Fund.

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Or, - For and towards the encouragement of education, and the support of day schools and Sunday Schools in the said Diocese of Quebec, in conformity with the principles of the United Church of England and Ireland.

Or,—For and towards a Fund for assisting persons preparing for the Ministry of the Gospel in the United Church of England and Ireland, within the said Diocese of Quebec.

Or,—For and towards a Fund for circulating, in the said Diocese of Quebec, the Holy Scriptures, the Book of Common Prayer of the United Church of England and Ireland, and Books and Tracts approved by the said Church Society for circulation within the said Diocese of Quebec.

Or,—As an aid towards the erection, endowment and maintenance of churches according to the principles of the United Church of England and Ireland, within the Diocese of Quebec,—the erection and maintenance of parsonage houses,—the setting apart of burial grounds and church-yards, and the endowment and support of parsonages and rectories within the said Diocese.

III. A Devise of Real Estate for the general purposes of the Society,

I give and devise unto "the Church Society of the Diocese of Quebec," incorporated by a Statute of the Province of Canada, passed in the fourteenth and fifteenth years of the Reign of Her Majesty, QUEEN VICTORIA, chapter 171, all and singular, &c., (descr.be the real estate clearly) to have and to hold the said, &c., unto the said Church Society of the Diocese of Quebec, and their successors forever; upon trust to hold and apply the same, and the rents, issues and profits thereof to and for the uses and purposes of the said Church Society, as specified in the said Act of Incorporation, and none other, and ander the provisions of the aforesaid Act of Incorporation of the said Church Society.

IV. A Devise of Real Estate for any one or more of the specific purposes of the Society.

Same as in No. 3—only instead of the words in Italics insert the specific purposes, as in No. 2.

V. A Devise to the Society of a site for Church, &c.

Same as in No. 3, down to the words "for ever"—then go on as follows:—to the uses and upon the trusts following, that is to say:—upon the trusts to hold the same forever hereafter as and for the place and site of a Church and church-yard, and burial-ground, for the sole use and benefit of members of the Church residing in the place adjacent to the said site and premises within the said Diocese of Quebec, according to the doctrine and discipline of the United Church of England and Ireland, and for no other purposes, and under the provisions of the aforesaid Act of Incorporation of the said Church Society.

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


