BOARD OF TRADE REPORT.
The Secretary of the Board of Trade, Mr. W. J. Patterson, has published his sixteenth report of the Trade and Commerce of Montreal, and even those who are umble to coincide in all his views, must acknowledge that he deserves great credit for the inclustry with which he has collected a mass of valuable information. Many doubtless will be of opinion that Mr. Patterson is too sanguine as to the future of Montreal, and that we shall be unable to divert the traftic of the NorthWest from other great cities on the Cinited States seaboard. We must never forget, when considering the course of inland transportation for grain, the long period during which our ports are closed, and the short season of navigation. During that season Montreal possesses great adrantages, and when the enlargement of the Welland canal shall have been completed we may hope that with reduced port charges we shall be able at least to hold our orn.

## hoading ghain.

The agitation which has been renewed in England by Mr. Plimsoll on the suhject of! stowing grain cargoes has naturally attracter the attention of the Comeil of the Board of Trade, and Mr. Patterson was specially instructed to investigate the system of grain loading followed at the Port of Montreal. He has made a most valuable report on the subject. It appears from that report that up to and inclucling the year 1872 , although there were rules for the proper loading of vessels with grain, yet by the payment fof the comparatively trifling. fine of 80,5 the
rules could be evadecl, and it appears that in that year, 1872 , filty one steamers and seven sailing vessels paid the fine, and that six steamers and eight sailing vessels were reported as "foundered," "abandoned" or "missing." The loss of grain by the six steamships in 1872 was 147, 496 bushels of wheat, and 152,440 bushels of com. Before the opening of navigition in 1873, a code of revised rules was sunctioned, and the regulation for loading grain was made much more stringent. The penalty was raised to $\$ 800$, and the customs authorities were authorized to withhold the ship's clearance until the master obtained the port warden's certificate. It is most gratifying to learn the complete success which has been the result of the new regulations. Between 1873 and 1879 , both years included, 1076 steamships and 1,113 sailing vessols cleared from the poit of Mrontreal, and during the entire period not a single accident or loss ocenrred in consequence of a vessel being grain-laden. Mr. Patterson refers to the proposition which has been made in England, to make it compulsory that all grain should be shipped in bags, the cost of which it is said by the advocatesj of the measure would ${ }^{\circ}$ be trilling. Mr. Patterson, on the other hand, is of opinion that the extra expense would add from 3 to 4 cents per 100 lbs . to the cost of the grain carried from Montreal during the season of navigation, and that it would have enhanced the price of the grain shipped in 1879 by nearly $\$ 900,000$. Mr. Patterson has come to the conclusion that the method of loading pursued in Montreal is in the interest of the grain trade, and he is very averse to any new legislation in the direc. tion demanded by Mr. Plimsoll, and maintains that it should not be applicable to grain-laden vessels from the St. Lawrence. He concludes his letter by an expression of opinion that, if his views are concurted in, the subject should be pressed on the attention of the Dominion Cabinet, with a view to representations being made to the Home Government so as to prevent this infliction of grievous injury upon the shipping and commercial interests of Canada. Mr. Patterson's letter is dated 17 February of this yenr, and it is to be hoped that it has been acted on. Sir Alexander Galt's services on such an occasion would, we have no doubt, be very valuable.
cavada's commerge and industh:
Mr. Patterson has furnished comparative statements of the trade in certain articles between Canada and Great Britain and the United States for the last six months of each of the years IS7S and

I879, with the viow of showing the in. creased trade with Great Britain and the falling off in that with the United States. In the article of sugar the imports from Great Britain during the last six months of 185 S were $19,173,000 \mathrm{lbs}$., and from the UniterlStates $38,000,000 \mathrm{lbs}$. In the yoth ending 30th itune, 1878 , the imports from Great Brilain were $50,071,580$ los., and from the United States $16,375,750$ lis. In the last six months of 1878 , or the tirst six months of the fiscal year 187 !, a great change took place, and the imports from the United States were greatly increased; but since the new tarif has come into force the imports from the West Indies have been neruly double those from Great. Britain and the United States togecher. There is no doubt that the imports firm the United States have materially fallen off, and it would be interesting to ascertain the cause. Mr. Patterson has selected six items for comparison, the first being "hion and Steel manufactures," which the United States had of late supplierl to us very largely. It appears that while the imports from Great Britain iner eased from $\$ 1,491,867$ in 1878 , to $\$ 1,688,614$ in 1879, those from the United States fell off from $\$ 1,725,000$ to $\$ 1,285,000$, The same change took place in the imports of cotton goods, glassware and leather manufacturers. 1 what is this to be attributed? The duties are relatively, the same. The only cause that we can discover is the increased prosperity in the United States, and the absorption of the manufactures of that country in the home markets. There is no longer any necessity to resort to a sacrifice market, as it was the fashion to term that of Canala. 'There has been a marked change in the tea trade, the imports from the United States having fallen off from $3,516,000 \mathrm{lbs}$. to $1,400,000 \mathrm{lbs}$. , while those from Great. Britain have increased from $2,056,000 \mathrm{lbs}$. to $3,201,000 \mathrm{lbs}$., and from China and Japan from 575,000 lbs., to $1,515,959$ lbs. The decrease in value from Great Britain in 1879 was 7.47 per cent., and in the United States 33.06 per cent., but Mr. Patterson has very properly analyzed the imports and separated the dutiable goods from the free, the effect of which is to alter the proportions materially. The chief falling off in the imports from the United States was in free goods, caused in all probability by Western produce finding its way to the seaboard by other routes than the St. Lawrence. The dutiable imports from the United States fell off 18.62 per cent., while those from Great Brituin fell - off 15.87, so that the difference is by no means so consider. able as we have been led to imagine.
what canada mxports.
The aggregate exports in 1879 were less than in any year since 1869. The chief falling ofl was in the produce of the forest, which was less by over nine millions than in 1877, and by over six milJions than in 1878 . Bread stufts were slighty in excess of 1878 , so were animals, but there was a folling oft in salted meats, in butter, cheese, and manufactured articles. The aggregate trade was under $\$ 152,000,000$, against $5170,523,000$ in 1878 and $5216,756,000$ in 1874 . It must be constantly borne in mind that the prices of goods in 1874 were very much higher than in 1579 , so that the real is much less than the apparent difference.

## THE FISHERIES.

Mr. Patterson gives a satisfactory account of the fisheries. The export in IS79 was greater than in any of the preceding three years, although it fell off to the United States. It is estimated that the Jishories of the Dominion employ about 1,000 decked vessels, ]7,000 open boats, 42,000 men, while 200,000 persons are sup. ported by the industry.

> DATRE PIODUOE.

It is rather unsatisfactory to find that the value of our butter and cheese has not increased in proportion to the quantity produced. This is esuecially the case with cheese, the expoit of which increased from 39,371,139 lbs. in 1878 , to $49,610,415$ in 1879 , while the value decreased from $\$ 4,121,301$ to $\$ 4,034,750$. The value of the butterexported in 1579 is the smallest aluring the last decade, and is about half a million of clollars below the average, while the quantity is about one million of jounds above the average.

Thif catitie mepont trade.
We must bo very brief in our reference to this rising tiade, but it is very satisfactory to learn from Mr. Patterson's report that Mr. Duncan MeEachran, M.I.C.V.S., was able to state to the Minister of Agriculture that the shipping season of 1879 "has been the most successful since exyortation of livestock from the Dominion to Europe began." We have barely glanced at a few of the numerous topics reated by Mr. Patterson in his interesting report.

## 'HE FRANCO-CANADIAN CREDI'T FONCIER.

As a bill is now before the Legislature of the Province of Quebec for the incorporation of a landed crellit institation, under the above name, it may not be inappropriate to give a general outline of the mature of the system which it is proposed to introduce into the Province.
"The object of "eredit foncier" institu-
tions is to furnish to proprietors of immovables, who wish to borrow on mortenge, the means of paying the debt contracted by mmuities at long date; to place land. ed property and capital in immediate and favorable contact with each other; to facilitate the debtor's discharge, and to place at the continual disposal of the cre ditor the funds which he may have ad. vanced. To accomplish this object it is necessary to create a strong intermedial power or body which will act bet ween the capitalists and proprietors of land, by generalizing individual guarantees, and by marking them with a stamp of control previously accepted by all as the signet of uncloubted security. The intermedial body must guarantee the value of the otiginal security ; must promise the regular payment of interest; and centrali\%e the money derived from the sinking fund, so as to be enabled to offer to the proprietor the facility of repaying the amount of his loan by a gradual scale of small contributions, and, to the lender, the power of realizing at any time on favorable conditions. This system, which more than a century ago was introduced in Silesia, has been put in operation in all the continental states of Europe, and has relieved landed property from the terrible slavery of debts payable at short date, with the usual consequences of expensive renewal and costly proceedings, generally followed by expropriation. The landed credit, with its two economical innovations,--the redemption of the clebt by the sinking fund, and the conversion of the mortgage title into a circulating medium negotiable on change,-has extended its action all through Europe, notwithstanding the different state laws regulating mortgages.

Constituted as joint stock companies, the credit foncier institutions lend money on mortgage to proprietors of immovables, and the borrower, by paying a certain amount called annuity for a certain number of years, extinguishes the debt. The anmual interest, the sinking fund, and the cost of management are included in the collective term "annuity." The rate of annual interest is fixed at the figure which the bank will have to pry in negotiating its bonds. The cost of management is generally established at one per cent., and the amount of sinking fund to be ammally paid in is based upon the duration of the loan. The Credit Foncier de France camot charge more than 5 per cent. interest, and six-tenths of one per cent. for cost of management; and the sinking fund is the sum bringing 5 per cent. interest per amum which capitalized every six months would, at the expiration of the loan, reproduce the
amount; consequently, the anmuity to reimburse a capital of 100 francs, borrowed at the ruse of 5 per cent. interest, 60 eentimes per cent. cost of management. and the sinking fund, for a loan of 50 years' duration, may be divided as follows:

This apparently small sum of 46 centimes, capitalized each six months, will at the end of 50 years' duration of the loan replace in the liants of the institation the amount loaned and yelease the mortgaged property.
The "credit foncier" establishments are anthorized to issue bonds on "Lettres de gage" for an amount equal to that of their loans. The sale of these bonds enables the companies to make new loans, which permit the issue of more bonds and thas increase the loaning power of the institutions. During the Prussian war, the securities the least affected by the crisis were the bonds of the credit foncier. The amount of its loans on rural and city properties in limuce is over eigbt milliards of francs, and the shares of the company of a par value of $\mathrm{DO}(\mathrm{fr}$. are held at 12.80 . fr . Wererwhere in 'Europe similar gratifying relief of the landed property has been accomplished throurh the agency of like institutions.

In the Province of Queboc, the introduction of the system of landed credit is not a new attempt; already, in 1862, the question of the establishment of a " credit foncier bank" attracted a large share of public attention during the session of Parliament, but the measures proposed by the St. Hyacinthe Convention were not adopted, and the causes which prompted the leaders of the French Canadian "habitants" at that time, in their agitation for the relief of the rural population from the onus of mortgage debt, are as active to day as they were then. We maintain that the main causes of the want of enterpriseamong this class have been the weight of debt which burdens almost every farmer's property in the country parishes of Lower Canada, and the want of available means to place the re-payment of that rebt on suoh a footing that it may be easily accomplished. In addition to these, but of course as a natural sequence, we find a universal system of ruinous usury to which the overburdened farmer is compelled to resort to save his family from expropriation; the real cause being the want of some system through which the
undoubted security he can ofler might enable him to obtain credit at a molerate rate of interest.
The company of landed credit soliciting its incorporation under the mame of Credit Foncier Franco Camadien has for olject: 1st. The loaning of money on moltgage to proprietors of immovalbles siluated in the Province of Queber, with provision for paying the debt by amuities at long chate, or at shom date with or withouta sinking fund. 2nd. The loaning of money with or without mortgate to duly authorized mumeipal corporations, board, of schicol commissioners, vestry boarts or turtees for the building or repair of churches in sad province, either at long date by anmuities, or at short date with or wihout a sinking funct. 3rd. The buyng and selling of bonds or debentures ot muncipal or school corpo. rations. 4th. 'The leatingy of money to the Prorincial Govemment, as well as the deaing in Provincal Govermment securities. 5th. The issuing and negotiating of bonds or lettres de gage of the company for an amount not exceeding the sums due by the horrowers and the value of the bonds and public securities held by the company. 'The capital of the company is in. $25,000,000$, divided into 50,000 shares of hr. 500 each, Five thousand shares are to be issued at once, and 25 per cent. of their value is to be paid within one month of the date of subscription. The shares are to be paid in franes, either in Paris or in Quebec. The Board of Directors may comprise from seven to fiften members; part of the Poard residing in France will form the Paris committer, and manage the interests of the company in Europe; that portion of the lhoard residing in Canala will attend to the management of the business in the Province, and the Paris committee may vote by correspondence at all the meetings of the Quebec Board. 'The management of the business of the company is entrusted to wo oflicers, one residing in Quebec, the other in Montreal, each one at the head of a division of the Province. The general meeting of the shareholders shall take place every year either in Paris or in Quebec, according to the largest mumber of shares recorded at the ollice of the company in either city.

In regard to loan-, the company lends money on first mortgage only, and on properties of an ascertained revenue; the loan cannot be in excess of one half of the value of the mortgared property, neither can the annuity be above the net revenue the property may sive. The rate of interest on the loms is decided by the Board of Directors. It cannot be over
the rate authorized by the laws of the Province of Quebee. Tho issue of bonds by the company and their various classes is copied exactly from the statutes of the credit foncier de France. What is peculiar to this Canadian company is the issue of the special bonds against the loans made to Government and public corporations, having as a guarantee, besides the capital of the company, the special securities left with the institution. All the bonds are redeemable at par, either at a fixed time or by lot without specification of their duration The Art. CXI. of the Bill for Incorporation reads as follows: A privilege of 50 years is granted to the company. Their privilege consists in the engagement from the Provincial Government not to authorize in the Province the formation of any credit foncier institution having any connection or branch in France. The Legislature of the Province of Quebec will, in a few days, decide whether the Ianded Credit System, so successful in Burope, shall have a fair trial in Lower Camada.

## MR. GOLDWIN SMITH AND THE CURRENCY.

Those who are fimiliar with the writings of Mr. Goldwin Smith must be aware that there are few subjects on which he is unprepared to state his opinions with a degree of confidence that is indicative of a conviction that it is impossible that he can lie mistaken. We have had occasion more than once to combat the views of the learned professor on the sulject of what has been termed "Commercial Union," and we propose on this occasion to question the soundness of the opinions enumerated in the July number of the Bystander, regarding the currency. Before adverting, however, to what we consider erroneous in the author's remarks on this important subject, we must acknowledge that he has rendered good service by his opposition to the advocates of what has been termed a " national currency," but which is avowedly an issue of inconvertible Government notes. The Banks have reason to bo grateful to Mr. Wallace and his associates for creating a prejulice against a really sound national currency, not only convertible into gold on demand, but so regulated by Parlia. ment as to render it a source of profit to the people at large, and at the same time as secure as it is possible for any currency to be. When we use the term "secure" we do not mean it as indicating the ultimate security of the Dominion for its liabilities, but in the sense of security for immediate convertibility into gold of every note issued by the Government.

Mr. Goldwin Smith doubtless imagines that his authority on the subject of a bank note currency is more reliable than that of the most eminent statesmen and economists that have flourished in Eng. land during the last forty years. It is, he tells us in the Bystander for July, "still "problematical, to say the least, whether "the famous attempt to regulate the "paper currency by the Dank charter "Act has been successful." He then affirms that "one of the effects of the "Act is to cause at periods of disturbance "is sort of hysterical contraction which "aggravates the evil, and has thrice ren"dered necessary a suspension of the "Act." It is evident to us that the leamed professor has very confused ideas on the subject. The issue department of the Bank of England is regulated strictly by Act of Parliament, and is precisely what it would be if it were. wholly unconnected with the Bank and a department of the treasury. The Act of Parliament regulating the Bank issucs is based on the assumption that the currency of a country consisting of Bank notes, and of groll, ought to be precisely what it would be if the entire currency consisted of cold. When the celebrated Act of 1844 was passed under the auspices of Sir Robert Peel, the Government was largeiy indebted to the Bank of England, and it was deemed safe, and experience has proved the correctness of the opinion, to permit the Bank to isstue notes to the extent of $\varepsilon 14,000,000$ sterling on Government securities, all beyond that amount to be issued on gold alone. Provision was made for an increase of the amount issuable on securities, when the circulation of existing private banks should be withdrawn, and under this provision the amount issued on securities has been increased to $\$ 15,000,000$. No difficulty has ever been experienced by the issue department from the day that it was established. The work has been strictly automatic, gold being given for notes, and notes for gold, just as clemanded.

The Bank of England department for discount and deposit is like any other bank, but its directors have, in accordance with long practice, considered themselves bound when those "periods of disturbance," as Mr. Goldwin Smith properly terms them, arise, and when there is an unusual demand for money, to come to the assistance of the commercial classes who are at such periods unable to obtain. money from the other banks and discount houses. The reserve of the Bank of England is held principally in notes of the issue department, and the consequence of its giving increased necommodation has
been the serious reduction of its reserve, to such an extent that, on the occasions to which Mr. Goldwin Smith refers, it has been in danger of being unable to meet the demands of its depositors. The practical effect of the suspension of the Act to which reference has been made has been simply to euable the Bank of Issue to loan its notes to the Bank of Discount, to prevent the latter from suspending payment. The very fact that the Bank ol' Issue has, on all occasions, been able to render this assistance withour inconve. nience is proof that the Act of 1844, so far as it regulates the issues, has been a complete success.
It is now thinty-six years since the enactment of Sir Robert Peel's Act, and ministers of various shades of politics have been in power in England, but no states. man has ventured to propose an alteration in the system. We have had reason to infer from remarks in the United States' journals that the relations of the Bank of Fngland to the Government in respect to the currency are completely misunderstood, and it has even been imagined that the suspensions of the Dank Act of 1844 were in effect suspensions of specie pay. ment, instead of being a mere permission to the Bank of Issue to increase its circulation at a time when it had an ample supply of gold. In so fir, therefore, as regards the working of the Bank of IEngland Issue department it must be obvious, 1st. 'That, being strictly regulated by Parliament, it is a Govermment note issue; 2nd. That it has been a complete success.
We dissent entirely from Mr. Goldwin Smith's assertion, that "a Govermment "issuing paper currency is a bank nam"ing its own reserve, changing the "amount at will, and exempting itself "from all penalties." We further dissent from his view, that the issue of a paper currency to be used in a bostitution for gold is a branch of legitimate banking, and also that the banks are "better regulators of the amount of bank bills to be issued than any Govermment." The true principle is that of the Bank of Enginad, and that was the principle of the Dominion Note Acts, which Sir Leonard Tilley has thought lit to amend in such a way as to render the Government issues anything but safe. We cannot, however, admit that Sir Leonard Tilley ean obtain "a forcedloan" so long as the currency is convertible. The notes in circulation, so long as they are convertible, will not be greater in amount than the requirements of the people, and the Government notes can only be increased if the notes of the banks are reduced. Of course it is anticipated that the prohibition of the $\$ 4$ notes
will tend to increase the Government circulation, but only slightly. We do not, apprehend the possibility of any large increase in the Govermment issue, but we have more than once pointed out the danger of keeping an inatiequate reserve, and that is a danger that the banks have it in their power to keep in check. We have the satisfaction of knowing that in the foregoing remarks we have expressed no opinion that is not in strict accortance with the views of the most eminent statesmen and economists of the day. When Mr. Goldwin smith has first reformed the political institutions of the United States, and then accomplished the amnexation of Canada to that country, he may perhaps find leisure to reform the currency of the United Kingdom.

## THE APPARENT GRAIN SURPLUS.

What will become of the probable surplus of grain from the present crop on this continent is a question of the deepest interest to the commercial community, and as stach has already engaged a good share of its attention. That there will be a surplus is not seriously disputed, the most reliable reviewers and statisticians merely differing as to the quantity and the disposition to be made of it. New life has recently been infused into the discussion of the subject by the remarks put forth in Messr's. Dun, Barlow \& Co.'s circular on failures mentioned in our last number. The writer says that" close observers view with considerable anxiety the possibility of a great decrease in the amount o: money to be realized in the coming year from exportations. A good harvest in Europe would result in a changed condition of affaiss, so that instead of exporting 175 millions of bushels of grain the amount might drindle to 75 millions. An unsalable surplus of 100 millions of bushels of wheat is a possibility not to be ignored. . . A lessened foreign demand would of course serionsly interfere with the earning power of all means of transportation, and generally put out of gear the machinery of business in its present expansive shape."

The idea of an "unsaliable surplus," which we deem to be merely an unguarded expression, is stoutly opposed by that excellent authority on trade matters, the Financial Chronicle, and it is urged in contradiction that the United States can put down wheat in Liverpool cheaper than any other country in the world, and still make money in doing so. The writer goes on to say, "we sold the surplus crop of $1878-79$ ( 147 million bushels) at an average of $\$ 1.081$, according to the Pro-
duce Exhange report; the surphas crop oi 1sily-s0 may have averaged si.38, and we may perhaps lave to take an average of $\dot{\text { I }}$ lor the coming one, luless the late unfaromble reports from Ru-sia, \&c., move correct. But no one has any fear that her surphus will not lind a. maket; it will he soll, and the milroals will have to caldy it." Undoubtedly so ; Lut the real question is not as to seling the surphus but as to the price it will hing, the r:uhoa ts almost necessarily recenving less for transportation in proportion to the price oltained.
The Cnmmercial Bulletin takes up the suliject, tud in support of the conclusions reached in Messrs. Uun, Barlow \& Co's circular furnishes the following ligures of the total exports of wheat and thur from the Uuited States for the last three fiscal years:

These averages, in round figures 293, 000,00 ) bushels crop, against $73,000,000$ bushets export, give an amual domestic consumption of $290,000,000$ bushels. The crop last year is given at $449,000,000$ bushels, and that for this year is estimated at 10 per cent. increase, or $494,000,000$ bushels. Allowing an increase of 12 per cent. in consumption over the average above mamed, to represent increased population, \&e., the matiter of supply and requirements would stand thus:

If this continent had really to contemplate such a surplus of unsalable wheat the situation woull be serious enough ; indeed, wholesale disaster might be predicted with the boldest assurance; but fortunately no such contingency is apparent. It is totally unjustifiable to figure present export demand from that for the years $1873-6$, and the probabilities as to home consumption tre not at all satisfactorily represented by the arbitrary addition of 12 p . c . to the average during that period. Those years were yenrs of worldwide business prostration, and consumption was at the minimum everywhere. Today Europe and the United States alike are consuming far more wheat per capita, to say nothing of the natural and known increase in population. Then again the figures are based on an estimatod average crop in Europe, whereas the probabilities nere now very decidedly the other way. In Russia we have a state of aflaits so bad that rumors of Governneent prohibition of export of wheat obtain ready credence, and according to latest accounts Spain lias been visited with crop disaster, and Great Britain with very serious damago from ton much rain and flooding, while the continent has not escaped without injury.

It is impossible as yet to put these conditions into figures that would lave any real value, but their bearing is none the less ummistakable, and the fact would appear that, notwithstanding an assured splendid yield on this continent, there is no good reason to foar that nur surphus product of wheat will not find a fair market at moderate prices, the range of which is still largely dependent upon harvest news.

## THE BOARD OF TRADE MEETING.

It is much to be regretted that there should be even an apparent want of unanimity among the commercial classes in Montreal at this particular time, when the citizens have a common interest in preserving, and if possible extending the Western trade. We cannot but fear that some members of the Board of Trade have manifested of late more zeal than discretion. It has been for many years an object of great importance that the port of Montreal should be relieved of the charges incident to the deepening of the River St. Lawrence, which, when first undertaken, was never deemed to be in any sense a local work. In process of time, owing to causes with which we need not enter at present, the work was abandoned by the Central Government, and but for the zeal of several gentlemen connected with the Harbor 'rade would not in all
probably have been prosectuted for many yenrs. The late Fon. John Young was distinguished for the zeal with which he advocate 1 this, as well as many other improvements, calculated to extend the brade of Montreal, and he was warmly supported by Mr. Thomas Cramp. An--ther gentleman, Mr. A. M. Delisle, who has recently passed from among us, and who was for some years chairman of the Harbor Commissioners, displayed a great deal of energy in securing the partial cooperation of the Government to the more vigorous prosecution of the work, and there is no doubt that Mr. Delisle found considerable obstacles in his way, and had to labor with great assicluity before he succeeded in accomplishing his object. At the late meeting of the Board of Trade Mr. Thomas White referred to the nature of the opposition that had to be surmounted, and which was at all events powerful enough to prevent the late Government, notwithstanding the persevering efforts of Mr. Cramp, from assuming the liability which had been incurred by the Harbor Commissioners for a public work, which is certainly of as great importance to Canada as are any of the improvements in the St. Lawrence Navigation. We have recently got a new chairman of the Board of Harbor Commissioners in the person of Mr . Andrew Robertson, a gentleman whose zeal in promoting the interests of Montreal has not been surpassed by that of and of his predecessors. We believe that Mr. Robertson has already accomplished not only as much but even more than could reasonably have been expected, and yet we have of late had more discord among the commercial classes on the subject of what they term a free port than we ever remember, even in times when there was much greater cause for complaint. It must be sufficiently obvious that the utmost that can be expected from the Dominion Parliament is the assumption of the works undertaken for the purpose of deepening the chamnel of the St. Lawrence, and possibly the reduction of the tolls on the canals. The charges more inmediately connected with the port of Montreal can only be reduced at the expense of the citizens at large, and the proprioty of so reducing them must be a question for the consideration of our city council. It is tolerably clear that, so long as the present competition between the various railroads from the far. West to the Seaboard continues, MIontreal, which depends chiefly on the traftic by the Lakes and the St. Lawrence, will have hard work to maintain its ground. This then is no time for controversy on minor points. The citizens of Montreal, and more especi-
ally the Commercial Boards, should sink allminor differences, and more especially all political proclivities, and act as one man to secure the support of the Govera. ment to the main proposition which we have indicated.

A comespondent at that proint writes as follows:-"lhe visit of the representatives of the Montreal Cuy Conncil and of the Harbor Commassioners will, it is hoped, tend to awaken the interest of the citizens of Montren in this project. The ider of the manicipulities along the route is to ask others to come and see and judge for themselves whether or aot the scheme is practicnble, and whether or not it is likely to prove of alvantige by shortening the distiance fiom the West to Montreal, and, at the smme time, lessening the clangers of havigation. I'hat T'oronto shonld be opposed to the project, as she is to any and every project that passes turonto by, was to be expected. The comparatively by, was to be expected. vilhe comparatively
unimfluential towns and vilages lying along thontine of the proposed camal naturally look io Montreal as the commercial metronolis of the Dominion, and the place chiefly interested us a great shipping port in securing a speedy and sufe route to her harbor, to thow her mighty sute route to her hation, the Camal, or Inland Water Route, as it might be more appropriately called, is practicable. It can be opened up for a comparatively small sum, and even if the effect of opening it wonld be to render the Wedland Oami nlmost nseless, that will be but another proof of the great advantage of the new route."

A perrition against the extension of the charter of the City Passenger Railway for a term of 40 years his ubtained the signatures of several hundred citizens. Whe pelitioners cxpress regret that "a special committee of the Council had bound over the city to an exelusse monopoly, and had determined to hand over to a private corporation exclusive privileges for the term of forty years without providing that any advantage of consequence should acciue to the city revenue by fiar contribution or by a redaction in fares conferring the boon of eleap transit to the people," und submit thut it is not right to bind posterity: to the observance of any onerons contract, but that right of repurchase at actual value of nroperty sutrenderparchase should always rest with the city ithit privileges graned to a company should be paid for at a rate at least equal to individual taxation; that- the true way to tax a company like that in question is either by a percentage of gross receipts or a per capita das for persons
carried, and that the best method of settling all these giuestions is for the city to build tramwars and lease the privilege of ranning cars for a term of years to the highest bidder.

Tue "International Collection Association" has recently opened business in this city under the agis of the well-known and lighly esteemed firm of Abbot, Tait, Woherspoon \& Abbott, whot as connsel and atiorneys for the Assuciation, issuing its notices and receiving the replies. The orghnization is formed, as its name suggests, for the collection of debts, and has atready atuacted to its subseription list some 200 business houses in this city, inchuding many of the best names, commercially speakine, known in the commminy. The methol prisued is first to adrise a debtor of the fact that the account has been placed with the Association for collection, and to urge its immediate parment to avoid troable and expense and publication; and then, in cuse this effort should not ayail, to send a second communication to the effect that "If this necount is not settled within thirty days from above date we shall enforce the vules of the Association and publish four mame mud acconnt in our monthly reports, which ate issued to the tradesmen and business men of thicounty and province, which will deprive you of "tll finme credit." Some strictures upon these methods haviag appeared in the daily papers, the Association responds, promising to reply to them at lengthand withont dehy.

As English contempomary, in commenting upon the great decline in fron, finds that the price has fallen 100 per cent. We try to keep, abreast of the times, but are not prepared with our pesent light to record any such collatise. Stock companies liable to assessment sometimes become so involved that shareholders would be glad to arive thrir property away, and at one time in this market it looked as thongh some holders of pig iron were willing to exchange it for anything in the shape of paper that they cond get, beit literally to hold as slable commodity a of no value quite passea betief. It is suid to be a poor rule that wont work both ways, bat it hardly fullows that becatuse iron or anything else may rise 100 per cent., it mata also fall 100 jer cent.

A good, srasonable business in nearly all deparments is the record of the weck. Shippers have been very busy, and have every reason to be gratified with the summer's work thus fur. European motions as to the value of wheat are moving down mother faster than prices on this side will approve, and complaint is mude of orders and bids received at impossibte figures, but this is the case in every monition of warket, and the fact remains of constant and heavy shipments to an extent to heep stocks well reduced. The dry goads, trade presents an exceptionally faromble revort; the business in fall grods ojens well, and much confidence is felt as 10 its continmance on a satisfactory plane. Hardware lins reached the season of inactivity, and will be quict for some weeks to come. The tendency of prices nad temper of the market are regatded as foromble to holders of stock. Leather is somewhat less active, but loses nothing in firmess. Boot and shoe manufa charers are not pressed with work, as at this time they might expect to be, and are expressing dissatisfaction with prices. The nost striking commorcial feature of the week has been the strength and activity in butter and cheese, which it will be seen have adranced materinlly. Groceries are moderntely actire. Fruits quiet, with business mostly confined to new apples and lemons. Wool is firm ; deaters now hare the bulk of the clip, and are waiting for something to turn up. More actirity is reported in the money market, the supply continuing abundant at unchanged rates. Good commercial paper is done at $G$ to 7 p. c., and call or short dated loans on security at 4 to 5 p . $c$. and below aceoriling to conditions. Sterling exchnage is quoted weak at $108 \pm$ to 1088 for 60 -day bankers bills, and 1073 to 107 fur documentary. The stock market has well maintained througbout the general list the rise reported last week, Ontario Bank and Montreal Telegraph achieving further marked adrances. The Siock Exchange seems to have entered upon a clear and tro appreciation of the leathiful condition of commercial gifhits now witnessed, nud the good promise held out of an excellentharrest to be marketed at reasomable prices. A leading manuficturer, who, though doing a lively business, is not disposed to mhle a rose-robred view of the situation, jocularly declares that he is in receipt of more orders to cancel than to book. mod maintains that registered letters are no longer welcome messengers of remittances butadrices to cancel, sent in this way to make assurance doubtly sure. He deseribes the trude ns directing its principatenergies to gutting ofl the roods 8 g bonn is an order is booked so as to heat of the dreaded tidings of cancellation only too likely to follow. It appears that ravelers are doing unasual and heric (?) things this senson in the way of competition by prevailing upon many, who have already given orders, to cancel them, offering as an inducement an extra cut in prices. And this leads ne to note that what dissutisfaction there is with current business is not based so much upon volume as upon prices. It is genemaly admitted that any amount of busimess could be had if only buyers' views as to figures would be accepted. We understaud that Quebec is very busy just now, a circumstance undoubtedly traceable to the cause liere indicated. Remittances are reported very satisfactory but according to some accounts this slivild be regruded as one of the necessities of the situation, since the tade is now conducted, as to prices, on the theory that no bad debts will be made. It mnst be understood that this is the mammieturer's view, fud while it demonstrably has at substantial hasis of fiace to rest upon, such ac: counts may alryas te immpered by the other side withont prejudice to their fairness.

Cattab.-At the St. Gubriel market on Monday last there was a good demand both fur shiphing and local irnde. Prices were firm, and in some cuses a rise was looked for. The Vigur market on Thestay was also firm, offerings being readily bought up by butchers at prices ratiging from 82 e to 4 de per bl Good shipping cattle are worth, from 5 to 5 炛e per lb. Sheep and lam bs in good dema ud. The former sell at $\$ 4$ to 56 each, and the latter at $\$ 2.50$ to $\$ 3.50$.

Day Goons.-The record of the weck is a good one. Travellers are all out, so fir as our inquiries extend, and first acconnts have come to hand, covering a fatr volmme of orters, rather above expectations, which is saying a good deal. Some of our most prominent and active loouses are reporting a very considerable increase in the percentage of business as compared with last year, and their warerooms bear abunidnat corroboration of the report. When one leading house docs "as much in two weeks this year as in four last," and another fools up "the largest June we've ever had" and an equally promising Jubs, the situntion speaks for itself: Other accounts are of like tenor though with considerable modifieation, and, as is pretty much almays the case, there are exceptions which are not favorable. These are
undoubtedly due to the fact of a weeklyreport, the dry gools trade not being of so siently it eharacter lhat the dealings of a single lomise for any one weck wond inclicate the current of business. We note that all reports of a disposition to cut prices in Camadian womlens have ceased, and these goods are now yiven a decidedly firm tone. This is attributed to the strength of raw wool which has sufered n not inconsiderable adrance since the berimning of the clip as our report of that matiet adtises. Some disposition is reported on the prart of country merchants to hold off until the results of the harvest shatl thore delinitely appata, This action can lmadly obtnin to miy maked extent; should it dos so it wouk only revele: the ativity here nated the more remarkable.
Dhugs and Cnemicals.-The market here is exceedingly quite with litule demand for any line of goods, and we do not expect much improvement for some little time. In Enghand everytuing is firm with prospects of a rood antumn trade for home and aboond, and the indications seem to point to higher prices hatm the revere. There has been a quarrel among the lodine and Iodide of Potassitum makers in Finghand, who have been working nuller a combimation for a number of years, and as a consequence there has been a great drop in price of these articles. We have mot ascertained delinite particulars as get, but hope to have them by next issue.

Faurs.-Some fine dmerican apples have come to market, and move off lreely at $\$ 2.50$ to 33.00 per barrel; also Canalian appiles in limited quantity, which bring 32.75 to $\$ 3.25$ owing to the Inrger size of the barrels. The promise of the yield of this fruit from all points in the United States and Camadn is fitvomble, both an to quantity and quality, except on this island and vicinity where the usual off year is experienced. Liuropean advices are aleo favorable to a good supply, and the expectation is that reduced prices will hare to be accepted. Late arrivals of Lemons are ammsually fine in quality, but, owing to the milduess of the Weather, in:quiry is not eager. Prices machanged att 55.60 per bux and 57.50 to 58.00 prer cise. Nothing of any account doing in other fruit.

Flour and Guals.- Wheat has been graditally settling since last report, and there seems to be a growing tendency to anticipate lower prices still. The probabilities of u lage surplus meet with wide assent, notwithstanding that latest advices are unfarorable to the Emropean crops. There are always tides in speculative feeling, and the current now is unmistrkably downward; but it may be queslioned if the whole sitnation, admithing the abundant yield which scems now hasured on this Continent, justifies prevailing expectations of rery low prices. In this market Canadia Soring No. 2 has ruled stendy atS1.18 to Sl.2n, with the sale of an extra choice lot at Si.25. Operations in Toledo and Milwatice and other descriptions of wheat for Nontreal account have been very large and at varying prices as represented by the fluctuntions in ihose markels. There is wide diversity of judgment as to the prospect for the fall season, but the weight of conservative opinion, as we are able to gather it, is agrimst a continuance of the present high range of prices and the reasons given are, briefly, an abormally large make in Oranada and the United States wifi no good grounds for combing upon any correlative increase in transatlintic consumpion.

Wool-Foreign wool has a better tone in symunthy with the Boston and other niarkets but is without ruotable change in price. Manufacturers are still at work on old stuck and will not be driven into matiet for some time yet. Business is therefore vury quiet, but holders have picked up confidence and are contented to await developments, ine outlook being not unfivorable. Domestic fleece is mach the same as last week, perhaps a shate firmer. We quote 30 c . to 32 c ., and cannot learn of anything outside of this range in the trade, athough outsiders have somehow aequired notions of higher value. The clip, which is now said to be mostly in dealers hands, has been bought up all the way from 2cic. to 30c., with the bulk of transactions mobably nearer the higher figure. Dealers are now mwaiting the American buyers' pleasure or necessities, and are in hopes of being able to move prices up at point or two as soon as ull consins discover their wants.
