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DISORDER WAS RAMPANT.

Disgraceful Scenes at Last Evening's Overflow Meeting.

HOODLUMS AT THE AUDITORIUM.

An Organized Gang Interrupts the Speakers.

Able Addresses in Support of the National Policy and in Defense of the Government's Position on the National Question.

Mr. Cockburn's Reply to the Traders—Some Very Eloquent—Bleakly Meeting Ended in Gloom.

The overflow meeting in the Auditorium partook but little of the hurried and impetuous nature of the ordinary gathering of that class. The hall was crowded by electors and some who seemed scarcely entitled to the franchise, whether or not they possessed it, besides a considerable number of ladies.

The interruptions were both frequent and annoying, and had not apparently reached their culmination when the meeting was brought to an abrupt conclusion.

Over an hour before the time set for the opening of the meeting the crowd began to fill the Auditorium, and at seven o'clock the hall was comfortably filled, the first gallery being crowded by ladies and their escorts.

An orchestra seated on the platform entertained the audience with a few speakers arrived, led by G. R. R. Cockburn, complacent as ever, and amid prolonged cheers, they filed to their seats, standing while a "Rule Britannia" was sung.

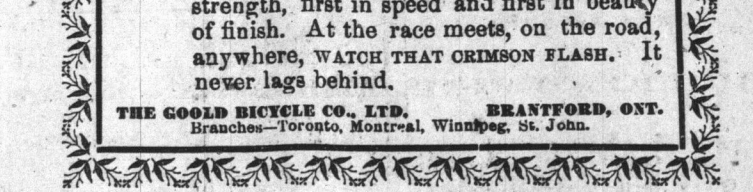

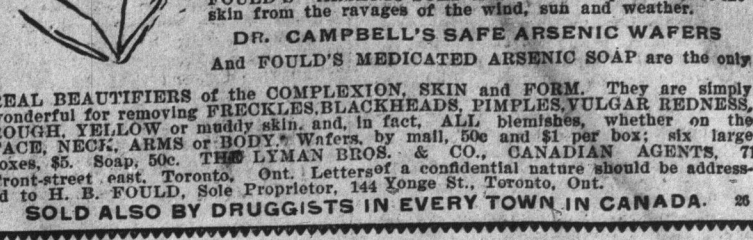
