

DEFENCE PROPOSES TO ESTABLISH A WITNESS STAND IN THE NAPANEE BANK ROBBERY CASE

That is to be inferred from the evidence brought out in the Napanee Bank Robbery Case Yesterday—Ponton's Friends on the Witness Stand—Wilkes and the Steel. Napanee, Aug. 16.—(Special.)—The investigation continued today. At first it was rumored around town that the Crown had made its case out, and therefore the prisoners would be once committed, but to the great surprise of everybody the defence has succeeded in putting in some very strong evidence. This gladdened the hearts of Ponton's friends, who are still in the great majority here. The defence claim that Pare's story has been completely shattered as to dates, especially as to April 24 and May 1.

Southern Cotton Crop. This Year's Yield Promises to be Better Than That of Last Year. New Orleans, Aug. 16.—Henry Neill, the cotton statistician, made public today the following letter to be issued to-morrow by Nell Bros. in London, giving his views of the growing cotton crop: "As regards the present growing crop, it is apparent that the promise to-day is equal or superior to that of last year at this date in every state and vast territory in Texas, which state has weather conditions equal to those which produced the enormous crop of 1900 lbs. per acre in 1894-95 and this prospect, as to the present Texas acreage, 6,750,000 acres, including the Indian Territory, might result with equal conditions hereafter, in a crop for Texas and the Indian Territory, of over 4,000,000 bales, while for the other states a crop equal to the last year would be over 8,000,000 bales. I have therefore no hesitation in saying that the promise to-day, even with somewhat unfavorable conditions hereafter, is for a crop of over 10 1/2 millions bales, assured, with a million to a million and a half more within the range of possibilities.

His father, McVey and White, tried to console him, but to no purpose. Corbett said that if the reports were true his father must have become insane. Both his father and mother took a deep interest in his affairs, and keenly his defeat by Fitzsimmons at Carson City. They both wanted him to retire from the ring after that. Corbett said that until he had received more definite information from California he could not say what his future plans would be. He will stop training for the present, and his fight with McCoy at Buffalo on Sept. 10 may be postponed. His manager, George Considine, is on his way to Asbury Park from New York, and he and Corbett will have a conference and decide on the plans for the future.

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NORTHWEST ASSEMBLY

Lieut.-Gov. Cameron's Address at the opening of the 17th session of the Legislature.

Regina, Aug. 16.—The Northwest Assembly was opened today by Lieut.-Governor Cameron. His address began as follows: "Although meeting you for the first time since I have had the distinguished honor of being appointed to the office of Lieutenant-Governor, I have during the course of a long public life always taken the deepest interest in the welfare and development of the Territories and have watched their progress ever since they became part of the Dominion. I have to congratulate you upon the many evidences of prosperity which I have noted in such parts of the Territories as I have been able to visit recently, and also upon the marked advances to be seen in all communities since I first had the pleasure of visiting the west. From all parts of the Dominion, from reports of substantial prosperity and splendid prospects for the farmer and stock grower, these evidences of real progress are everywhere to be seen. Immigration, point to the fact that the Territories have entered upon a period of unusually rapid growth and development. It is not surprising that the Dominion of Canada has cut off from the Territories the Yukon judicial district for the purpose of its own administration. Before this was done my Government had taken steps to put into operation in that district a system of the country as called for by the general public, and I am glad to see that the Executive Council, empowered with necessary authority, have now for several months past been engaged in the revision of the laws and a report will be laid before you as early as a date as possible. The address then proceeded to refer to matters of revenue, consolidation of ordinances, etc.

Scotch Railways Are Prosperous. Glasgow, Aug. 16.—The past half-year has been the most prosperous in the history of the Scotch railways. The receipts of the Scotch railways for the first half of the year were £28,000,000, an increase of £2,000,000 on the corresponding period of last year.

Great Britain's Population. London, Aug. 16.—The Registrar-General's return shows that the population of the United Kingdom in the middle of this year was 40,188,287 persons. During the three months ending June 30, 294,515 births and 169,881 deaths were registered.
