Gathered in Ottawa for the Annual Meeting of the Grand Lodge. The Ex-Gold Commissioner of the Klondike Has Now to Face an Investigation. HE DENIES ALL CHARGES MADE. Commissioner Ogilvie Gives Thirty Days for the Filing of Further Complaints.

Ontario, March 14.—The Sons of England Grand Lodge opened this afternoon, with the President, Ad. E. J. Powell in the chair. Among those present are Supreme Grand Officers: E. The Supreme Grand President reported that the past year had been full of encouragement and the financial position of the society had been much improved. The lodge receiving the largest number of members during the year was Loyalty Lodge of Aurora, which had doubled its membership and won prizes. The members of the same lodge won a prize for bringing in the largest number of members.

Behind With the Work. So far the work has proceeded, and all is in readiness, but the Government is said to be behind with the work it proposed to bring before the Parliament. It is generally not one single bill of legislation in a sufficiently advanced stage to submit it as soon as possible.

Speech From the Throne. The speech from the Throne is said to have been agreed to by Council to-day, but will not be given until tomorrow night. From what can be gathered about it, the document will be about as long as the last year's, and predecessors under Liberal rule, and will be noticeable for its brevity. It is a reference to last year's crop will be made, and the country will be mentioned in connection with the improvement in business and the increase in both the import and export trade up to June 30 last, but no reference will be made to the great falling off of exports during the last eight months. Reference will undoubtedly be made to the Washington negotiations, which, it will be claimed, have been "suspended, not broken off, but suspended," and that the Government has been prepared to give if the Americans would have conceded anything at all.

Looking Backward. When proposing Parliament last year the Hon. Mr. Mackenzie King congratulated you on the very important legislation which has been the outcome of your deliberations, particularly the Franchise Act and the new Franchise Act, which, it is confidently expected, will be satisfactory in all parts of the Dominion.

The Plebiscite. This year's speech will contain a reference to the plebiscite which took place last year, but it is extremely doubtful whether the plebiscite will be mentioned in the speech. As to the Franchise Act, which it was confidently expected would please everybody, it has been found by the experience of the plebiscite and a few bye-elections to be so unpopular that it will be amended.

The Coming Census. Then there will probably be a reference to the fact that a census will be taken in 1901 and that provision will have to be made in the estimates for the purpose of the "honorable gentlemen of the Senate" and "gentlemen of the House of Commons" who will be asked to contribute to the cost of the census. It is not to be expected that any reference will be made to the fact that the census of 1901 will be the first taken in the Dominion since the census of 1871.

SONS OF ENGLAND NUGGET MAN AFTER FAWCETT

HE MUST DECIDE NOW.

Commissioner Ogilvie Gives Thirty Days for the Filing of Further Complaints.

Vancouver, B.C., March 14.—According to reports published here, ex-Gold Commissioner Fawcett of Dawson is now the subject of an investigation, specific accusations having been made against him by E. C. Allen of the Klondike Nugget, a paper which has made a long fight against him. Commissioner Ogilvie is to hold an inquiry into the management of the affairs of the Gold Commission.

Fawcett was absent. The territorial court room, in which the meeting was held, was crowded to suffocation. Mr. Fawcett was not present, for he was at that time out of Dawson on business. The complaint read by Mr. Allen alleged that Fawcett had unlawfully manipulated his powers to open and close Dominion Creek beach claims, to the detriment of the miners and the benefit of officials and his friends. It is claimed also that Fawcett received entrance fees from more than one party for the same ground, and refused to return the fee when the irregularity was discovered; that Fawcett used his official powers, to the benefit of personal friends and to the prejudice of free miners.

But the investigation did not begin at once, as the ex-Gold Commissioner asked. Instead, Commissioner Ogilvie decided to continue the matter for 30 days, during which time he would receive additional charges.

LIABILITY OF EMPLOYERS

Interesting Talk With Mr. P. W. Ellis on Mr. Crawford's Bill and the Government Measure.

AN EMPLOYER WHO TALKS FAIRLY. There is Less Chance for Litigation Than Under the Old Law-Some Points for Workers.

Both Mr. Crawford's bill to amend the law relating to compensation for accidental injuries to workmen and the bill of the Government, promised in the speech from the Throne, are now before the Legislature and the lawmakers in the park have an opportunity to compare them.

When the bill drafted by the member for West Toronto was first mooted it met with much opposition from many employers, but it is now seen that the bill is well understood it is seen that whatever fault may be found with some of the details the principle of the measure is sound and in the interest not of the employer merely, but of fair-minded employers as well.

Yester-day The World called upon Mr. P. W. Ellis, the head of the famous firm of manufacturing jewellers, and asked him how he, as a large employer of the kind of labor likely to be affected by them, regarded the bill.

Employer is obliged to insure his work people entirely at his own cost. The definite fixing of the liability Mr. Ellis considered most important and valuable feature in Mr. Crawford's bill, and one that is in the interest of both employer and employee. The provision for proper medical supervision is a proper and sufficient safeguard against bogus claims.

Another Clause to be Modified. The clause in the bill requiring employers to notify the Provincial Secretary within ten days, in cases of accidental injuries to workmen, Mr. Ellis thought, should be modified. The injured employee should be first required to notify the employer, who should then be required to notify the Provincial Secretary within a reasonable time, say six weeks.

Some Mutual Spot. When an employer is required, under the act, to submit himself for examination, the place should not, Mr. Ellis thought, be left entirely to the choice of the workman, but it should be at a place to be mutually agreed upon or fixed by the Judge.

NEWS OF ONTARIO MINES.

How Our Ontario Stocks Have Advanced in Price During the Past Few Weeks.

ANOTHER MIKADO GOLD BRICK. Bullion Company at Work—Something About Development in Michipicoten—Mining Exchange.

The Mikado gold mine in the Lake of the Woods last week turned out another \$10,000 gold brick, and development is going on rapidly on the Bullion and Sirdar mines in the same neighborhood. It will be interesting to watch the development of D233, adjoining the Mikado on the east, which is known to contain the richest ore in the district.

By the way, it is interesting to note how Ontario mining stocks have recently advanced in price on the local and other exchanges. Owing to the fact that the market is so buoyant, one can buy a share of the Mikado at \$1.50 and sell it at \$2.00.

Mr. Albert E. McManus, secretary of the Golden Star Mining Co., is in town and is registered at the Hotel Hamilton. He has nothing to say regarding the mine, asserting that he is here on a visit to his family.

Big Strike at the Front. A Montreal dispatch reads: A letter was received here to-day from the manager of the Big Three mine at Keweenaw, conveying the most gratifying news to the shareholders. It is understood that the mine will be a shipper by Dominion Day.

East Kootenay. Says the Fort Steele, B.C., Prospector: "The district (East Kootenay) with steel, and we will give the world gold, silver, copper and lead in return."

Opening Michipicoten Mines. News from Michipicoten this week continues to be encouraging to those interested in the district. A Michipicoten city corporation of the district, which includes the Lake Wawa Gold Mining and Milling Co., are working the mine company known as Mackie's Point. They are following a ledge of quartz which goes down at an angle of about 20 degrees, and purpose to drive a cross-cut at the 200-foot level to catch other veins coming down from the top of the hill.

The Cora has made another rich strike. The shaft is down about 22 feet, and nice showings of free gold can be got anywhere in the quartz at the bottom. The vein measured eight feet wide at the surface and is nine feet at the present depth. There is 100 tons of milling ore in the dump at present, and from any part of the gold can be panned.
