SACRED RELIC TO FOOD FAIR

Part of Cingalese Temple Wall **Brought From Kondy, Ceylon**

BOSTON, Oct. 15—An express wagon early this morning will bring to the Food fair in Mechanics' building one of the most sacred of relics of India that has come all the way from Kandy, Ceylon, on the British steamship Ben Vreckle to New York, and thence to Boston.

A portion of the sacred wall around the Temple of the Tooth of Buddha, held in the most profound reverence by all Buddhists, has been dislodged from its resting place, and it will be seen tomorrow in the Totam, or Ceylon tea garden, at the Food fair, which has been offering oriental hospitality to so many thousands

If the lore of the Cingalese historians is to be believed, this bit of stone and earth, which has threatened the wits of the little brown coolies on the steamship the little brown coolies on the steamship, is more than 2,000 years old. On the deck of the steamship Ben Vreckle, 46 Buddhist sailors lay on their faces, prostrate, without moving a muscle for hours at a time, and there was all but open trouble among them when the holy of holies was removed and shipped to Boston.
