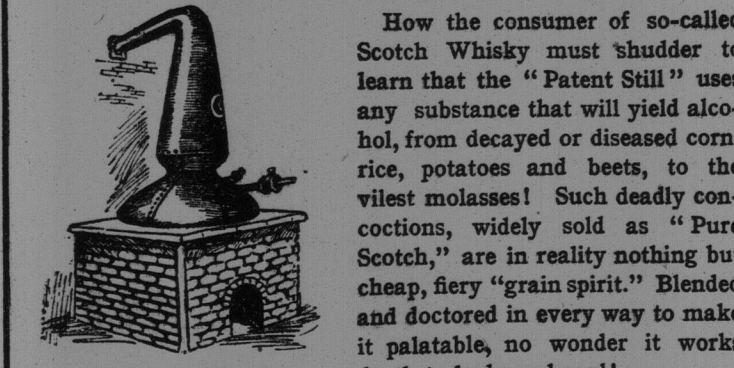

To derive a revenue so great even as the last mentioned figure would involve an enlargement of the license that would be so radical it might render it unworkable. At the present time there are 49 hotels and saloons, 10 shops, 8 bottling works, and 3 brewers doing business in the city of Vancouver. If these were grouped into two classes, one class covering hotels, saloons and shops with a license fee of \$800, and the bottling works and brewers at \$250, this would give a revenue of \$43,250 per year, which, in view of the Seattle and Victoria revenues, will probably strike your board as being very moderate.
