

A meeting of the Committee was held in Toronto, on the 17th and 18th December, 1891, nine members present. In view of letters having been received from Miss Leake and Miss Cartmell, regarding the arrival of Chinese women in Victoria for immoral purposes, the Cor. Sec. is authorized to prepare a petition to be presented to other Mission Boards to secure their co-operation in endeavoring to have the evil stopped.

Resolved,—That Mr. Watson and Miss Cartmell be a committee to purchase the furniture for the Port Simpson Home, and that Mrs. Crosby and Miss Hart be associated with them as advisory members; Miss Cartmell, Treasurer.

Resolved,—That an additional \$50 be paid to extend the insurance policy on the Port Simpson Home over three years.

The action of Miss Cartmell in sending Miss Lawrence to Port Simpson, to assist Miss Hart during the sickness of the children there, was sustained. The necessary appropriation for the expense was made. Letters were read giving particulars of the fire at Chilliwhack, stating that sixteen children had been sent to their homes, and fifteen children with the teachers were at Mr. Tate's.

A resolution was passed, expressing the high appreciation of Mr. and Mrs. Tate's kindness, sympathy and self-sacrifice in receiving our teachers and children into their own home at much personal inconvenience.

The Literature and Publication Committee was authorized to issue life-membership certificates for Mission Bands free.

That all money received from legacies be used for special purposes, un ess the object for which it is to be used is specified by the donor.

A committee was appointed to meet with the Committee on Consultation and Finance, to take immediate steps regarding the erection of a home, to take the place of the burned Coqualeetza Home.

The Executive met again in June; six present.

The report of the Committee to meet with the Committee on Consultation and Finance was received. As the plans presented were too expensive, it was resolved that other plans be obtained, the cost of which should not exceed \$16,000 for the two Societies.

Provision was made for Miss Lund's furlough and the expenses.

Miss Veazey, having been accepted by correspondence, was appointed to Japan.

REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

Miss Cartmell was authorized to insure the furnace, furniture, desks, etc., of the new Crosby Home.

A committee was appointed to meet with the Committee on Publication and Literature, to formulate a scheme for the reduction of expense of reports, etc.

Twenty-five dollars was granted to the Literature Committee, for the purchase of leaflets, etc.

Decisions by correspondence :

Miss Amelia Brown having married Dr. Stevenson, medical missionary of the Parent Board, was released from her engagement with the Woman's Missionary Society, and her expenses were refunded.

That land be purchased at Chilliwhack in connection with the parent Society for a Union Institute for boys and girls; that Misses Cartmell and Clarke be representatives of the W.M.S. on the Building Committee at Chilliwhack.

That the following ladies were accepted and appointed: Miss Caldwell, of Somerfield, N.S., to Crosby Home; Miss Gifford, M.D., of Owen Sound, to China; Miss Veazey, of St. Stephen's, N.B., to Japan; Miss Alexander, of Owen Sound, to Japan; Miss Brackbill, of Owen Sound, to the Chinese Home in Victoria.

That Miss Wintemute take a full year's furlough.

That the architect's charges in connection with the Crosby Home be paid.

Approval was given of Miss Cartmell's return to Japan, providing her health would warrant it.

The Union Committee *re* Chilliwhack Institute, met in September, considered and accepted plans prepared by Mr. Hooper, subject to some changes. Dr. Sutherland was asked to instruct the architect to proceed with the work.

Executive met October 17th, at Brantford ; thirteen present.

A letter was received from Mrs. Large, tendering her resignation as one of our agents; also a memorial from the teachers in Japan, asking that her resignation be not accepted.

Resolved,—That this Board regret exceedingly that any circumstances should have arisen leading to the resignation of Mrs. Large.

Resolved,—That the resignation be not accepted, but that we take this opportunity of expressing our sense of obligation to Mrs. Large, and our appreciation of her faithful and wise discharge of the important trust committed to her, and that we hope that the day is distant when anything may necessitate her withdrawal from our work in Japan.

The President gave her annual address. For the first time we have had the privilege of listening to a report of our various Mission Fields from the home-workers' point of view, the President and Corresponding Secretary having at their own expense visited during the summer all our Mission Stations in Japan, British Columbia and the North-West. A cordial vote of thanks was tendered to Mrs. Gooderham.

Reports from the Branches were read by the respective Corresponding Secretaries. Reports from separate Auxiliaries were read by Mrs. Strachan, Corresponding Secretary.

The President reported that the Superintendent of Missions in the North-West, the Rev. Mr. Woodsworth, desired the appointment of an Organizer for that field.

The report of the French work was presented by Mrs. Ross and adopted. A memorial from the Committee on French Work, recommending an extension of the work by opening a school at St. Hyacinthe, was referred to the Committee on Appropriations.

The financial statement of the French work was presented, Mrs. Torrance, Treasurer.

The report and financial statement of the Crosby Home were presented and adopted.

The report and financial statement of the Coqualeetza Home were presented and adopted.

The deed of the property on which the Coqualeetza Home was built, is held by the Parent Society, Mrs. Strachan was instructed to obtain a declaration that it was held in trust for the Woman's Missionary Society.

Miss Cartmell's report was read by Mrs. Strachan, Mrs. Gooderham having explained the circumstance of Miss Cartmell's return to Japan. It was resolved and carried unanimously that this Board desires to express its appreciation of Miss Cartmell's unselfish devotion in returning on such short notice to the work in Japan, and to assure her that our sympathies and prayers will be with her in her work in the future, as they have been in the past, only in an increased degree, and that a copy of this resolution be sent to Miss Cartmell.

The report of the Standing Committee on Literature and Publication was presented and adopted. A special vote of thanks was tendered to this committee, especial mention being made to the work of Miss Ogden and Miss Wilkes.

The report of the Council in Japan, including the reports of the various branches and the financial statements, was presented and adopted.

The recommendation that each lady appointed to Japan be allowed \$100 for outfit, and that during the first year of service her salary be two-thirds of the fixed salary. Carried

The President and Corresponding Secretary having permitted the Council in Japan to use the \$300 donated last year by Mr. and Mrs. Carlysle for the purpose of a school for poor children in Kanazawa, their action was sustained by the Board.

A recommendation from the Council of the Missionary Society in Japan was presented, asking that we establish a Central Home for evangelistic work in Hongo.

having a lady missionary in the district occupied by him, yet as a Board, we feel that the state of our funds does not warrant us in extending our work as desired this year. However, our Board has directed that a home be provided for two Bible-women and that our ladies visit this neighborhood as heretofore.

The report of the Chinese Home, Victoria, B.C., was read and adopted.

A communication from the Board of Trustees of the Kingston Medical Woman's College was presented, offering for the consider ation of \$1,000 as a scholarship endowment to make permanent provision for the education of one missionary student annually.

The Secretary was instructed to inform the Board of Trustees that their offer had been placed before this Board for consideration.

The General Society having taken over the McDougall Orphanage, asked our co-operation, this was referred to the Committee on Appropriations.

1. That a badge pin be adopted by this society—a silver star encircling a little world—signifying the "Star of Bethlehem" encircling the world.

2. That the Letter-Leaflet be printed as at present.

3. That District Organizers be responsible for introducing and forwarding the Scattered Helpers Scheme.

4. That owing to the need of the prayer-cards in working the Scattered Helpers Scheme, the Committee be authorized to issue the necessary number.

5. That the publication of a missionary calendar be authorized.

The Committee appointed to consider the annual report and suggest improvements recommended :---

That in statistical reports General Corresponding Secretary omit column "amount raised," strike out word "net" in fourteenth column, also column giving "sale of reports, literature."

In Branch Corresponding Secretary's report, omit columns showing "number of auxiliary and life members" of previous year.

Column showing "decrease" to be retained.

Oolumn showing "number of monthly and public meetings" to be retained, omit "total number."

That the same omissions be made from Mission Bands as from Auxiliary reports.

That all reports of Auxiliaries and Bands be omitted in report but not to take effect this year. Carried.

That the price of Report remain unchanged.

Report of *Outlook* was given verbally by Mrs. Parker, and adopted. It was recommended that we have an official correspondent for the *Outlook* in each mission field. In Japan the appointment of such correspondent to be left with the Council. The Executive to provide for the other fields.

Resolved,—That the Mission Band Quarterly be edited by one person. Miss Smith, of St. John, N.B., was appointed for that office; the Mission Band Corresponding Secretaries to be associate editors.

Miss Palmer, President of N. B. and P. E. I., reported the publishing of a paper entitled the *Palm Branch*. On motion, it was decided that the *Palm Branch* and our *Quarterly* be amalgamated.

The following Notice of Motion was given :

That Art. V., Sec. 1, of the Constitution be amended, to include as a member of the General Board of Managers, *ex officio*, the Secretary-Treasurer of the Standing Committee on Literature and Publication.

The report of the Memorial Committee was presented by Mrs. Whiston. Committee recommended,

That in Constitution for Mission Bands provision be made for a Corresponding Secretary;

That where a Mission Circle or Band desires to work in conjunction with the Epworth League, liberty shall be given to do so, but such Band or Circle must work under the Constitution of the Woman's Missionary Society. When this cannot be done it is earne-tly desired that the Circle or Band do not affiliate with the Epworth League, but remain a separate organization;

That Mission Circles use the set of books prepared for the use of Auxiliary officers; also, that smaller books for junior bands be ruled to suit the requirements of such Bands, by the Secretary and Treasurer of the Auxiliary with which the Band is connected;

That as the work done by the Auxiliaries is legitimate missionary work, the expenses of delegates to Branch meetings are considered legitimate expenses;

That membership fees must be forwarded in full to the Branch Treasurer. Local expenses must be met out of other funds. This to be a By-Law No. 12;

That the memorial asking that Article II. of Constitution be amended to read, "women and girls," instead of "women and children," be not entertained, but be brought before the Branches next year. Carried.

The decision of Mrs. Strachan and myself to undertake the task of visiting all the Mission Stations, met the approval of the members of the Executive Committee, and though it was done voluntarily, loyalty to the cause requires that we should withhold nothing that will advance the cause whose servants we have so long been.

Leaving Toronto, April 18th, we arrived in Vancouver on the 24th, and sailed on the 27th for the "land of the rising sun," and were very glad when the shores of Japan were sighted. We were landed in Yokohama, May 11th, and made very welcome.

As the officers of the society—every opportunity was given us to observe and judge of the character and amount of work performed by all our agents.

Japan is now considered one of the most interesting countries to visit, and in many respects one of the most interesting and encouraging mission fields. Native agencies are multiplying and the people are progressing, as well as peaceable and polite generally in their intercourse with foreigners. In all the places occupied by our agents there is much to encourage, both in the school and in the evangelistic department. This fact caused us devout thankfulness. The quiet manner and voices of the students impressed us favorably. The absence of noisy footsteps or shutting of doors was very grateful to tired nerves, but the earnestness in religious duties, and the readiness to engage in teaching and evangelistic work by the students pleased us most of all.

A reception and welcome was given us in Azabu, Shizuoka, and Kofu, native Christian women presiding in every case.

Expressions of gratitude were abundant for the love shown by the women in Canada to their Japanese sisters, in sending teachers to lead them to Christ. As one said, "truly the sisters were heavenly angels to me."

"If ye sow sparingly, ye shall reap sparingly," may truly be said in Japan, and some churches are proving this now.

There are about forty millions of souls in Japan, and only forty thousand Christians. Our Church has a great responsibility there, in that so many doors are open to us. In a province of four hundred thousand, two of our teachers are the only resident foreigners, with, Other parts are much perhaps, three hundred native Christians. "The harvest truly is plenteous, the laborers are more destitute. few." The converts will need much counsel-we do not ask pecuniary aid for them, but these lambs must have spiritual food and guidance, and they will become strong to work for the salvation of others. We were asked to explain at the meetings the origin and history of the Woman's Missionary Society, and were assured that it was "bread cast upon the waters." Gakko, most hospitably, and witnessed the work of the successors of the late Dr. Neesima, of whom the Japanese are justly proud.

Mission schools are doing much for Japan womanhood. Education alone does not meet their wants. "A woman must be taught that she is more than a chattel, wholly at the disposal of her male relatives."

We have a noble band of women in Japan. They have much to discourage them. Temples of Buddha abound; churches are few. We little understand the temptations which beset the converts in leaving the old worship for the new. Let us support them all by more prayer, asking and expecting more from God through the power of the Spirit, so shall "Showers of blessings descend upon the thirsty land."

The home voyage was very pleasant; a goodly number of homebound missionaries accompanied us. Miss Howe, of the M. E. Mission, had in charge two Chinese girls and three boys preparing for the medical profession. Miss Howe went to China with Dr. Hart twenty years ago, and was in the place he is now in until she was driven out of it. We were met in Victoria by Miss Cartmell and Mr. Gardiner who showed us every kindness during our visit in the city. After a few days' rest we started for Port Simpson. Those who have made the trip to Alaska know something of the pleasure of the voyage to Port Simpson in fine weather. We stopped a short time at Port. Essington, and regretted that we saw Bella Bella only from the steamer. These three Christian Indian villages present a great contrast to some others, where, instead of the neat small houses, one for each family, furnished with stoves, lamps, sewing machines, organs, and other modern furniture, we saw the large houses where several families were huddled together, a fire built here and there on the clay floor amidst the general confusion and disorder. In these houses there was nothing to indicate that there was any poverty among the inmates. Abundance of granite ware unwashed lay all around. The canneries were at work, giving employment and large wages to all willing to work. The season is short, and the earnings soon squandered. The women squatted at the doors, with painted faces, gold and silver finger and ear rings, also bracelets; and good garments shewed how much the love of finery still binds them.

Port Simpson is beautifully situated. There are about seven hundred Indians in the village most of the year, who are ministered to by Rev. T. Crosby, Dr. Bolton, Miss Spence (a trained nurse), Miss Hart, and two other teachers in the Girls' Home, the teacher in the day school and Boys' Home. There is a rifle and fire hall, and two brass bands. The houses seem comfortable and pretty, the work in most cases of the owners.

The church and schools are well attended; Miss Hart has quite a difficult position to fill for one of her years. As she will soon leave

We attended a wedding in the church, and the feast in the rifle hall, where several hundreds were entertained. The cost of the feast was estimated by the missionary to be from \$150 to \$200. There are some handsome marble tombstones in the village valued at hundreds of dollars.

On the return trip we saw a potlatch in progress. I afterwards saw it described in a Nanaimo newspaper: "The greatest potlatch ever known took place at Cape Mudge on the 9th inst. Chief Bell of the Salmon River Indians, gave away 5,380 blankets, 350 boxes of biscuits, 280 silver bracelets, 150 trunks, and \$300 in cash. The total value is estimated at \$8,000." I learned on this visit that the Indian is generous. Are we doing all that is possible to direct this spirit of liberality into the proper channel?

Our visit to Chilliwhack gave us the opportunity to see the Indians on their reserves. This valley is very fertile, and most of the Indians own lands, stock and crops. We were very sorry to hear that these are neglected by some who go to the States in "hop picking," leaving the aged and infirm to look after the work at home.

The burning of the Home was a great loss to the work. Miss Clarke is doing her work well in the school; she has some bright pupils. Miss Elderkin has her reward in the proficiency made by the girls in housekeeping, and Miss Somers was teaching them the use of the needle. I entertain the hope that many of the Indian girls in these institutions will develop into matrons and teachers, and occupy the responsible positions, their training in these industrial schools is intended to qualify them to fill. The Indians seem fond of social meetings, class and prayer meetings, and many of the children have accepted Christ.

On our return to Victoria to attend the first annual meeting of the British Columbia Branch of the Woman's Missionary Society, we found that Miss Leake had returned from her holiday trip. Many are ready to acknowledge the faithful work performed by her in the difficult position she filled in the early history of the rescue work.

Miss Cartmell was busy helping in the business of the Branch meeting, and making ready for her departure on the next steamer for Japan. In her quiet way she had attached many to herself by leading them to Christ, and the members of her Chinese Sunday School were very sorry to lose her from the work. Three of the inmates of the Home were married to Christian Chinamen before she left, and two returned to China on the same steamer. The Chinamen furnished the costumes for their brides, and the refreshments and wedding cake also.

We were present at the annual meeting of one of the Auxiliaries in Vancouver, after taking leave of the Misses Cartmell, Veazey and Alexander, Mr. Kobiashi and other missionaries. Mr. Kobiashi acted as interpreter at the baptism of three of his countrymen just before sailing. Our last act in the British Columbia province was to make arrangements to place "Gertie," a Chinese girl, in the British Columbia college at Westminster.

It is hoped that she will fulfil her promise and become a missionary to her own race after she has completed her education. Pray for her.

We stopped off at Morley and saw the new orphanage built by the government; it is full, and a fine opportunity is afforded now for excellent work amongst the Indian children. There is an abundance of bedding and clothing at the Home, sent out by the Supply Committee. We received much kindness from Rev. J. McDougall and family. The impression made by seeing the Indians riding over the prairie to and from church will not soon be forgotten. Their devout attention in the service was most pleasing.

At Calgary we organized an Auxiliary, held meetings in Brandon, Portage la Prairie, and Winnipeg, receiving much kindness for "the work's sake." We made some new friends and renewed old attachments. Coming so frequently in close contact with the servants of the Lord, we were saved from the dissipation and weariness so often experienced in travel, making us the debtors of many whom we may not meet until "the shadows all flee away."

What the Lord has done for us in the past is but an earnest and promise of what the future may be, if we are faithful in keeping His commandments, and walk in His ways, harkening unto the voice of His word. "All the kings of the earth shall praise Thee, O Lord, when they hear the words of Thy mouth."

The delay in opening a Mission in China has been trying. We lament that one who gave her life to the cause in connection with the Mission of the General Society, has fallen so soon, and we extend our sympathy to the bereaved ones. Have we prayed as earnestly as the case demands for the removal of all the barriers which stand in the way of our entrance into that field? Millions are without the "bread of life." Is it not surprising that oftentimes those most ready to feed the hungry evince no concern for those who are destitute of the Gospel? "The things which are seen are temporal, the things which are not seen are eternal." Have we any warrant in the Scriptures which will excuse us if we give more attention to the temporal wants of our fellows than we do to their spiritual need?

REPORT OF THE CORRESPONDING SECRETARY OF THE WOMAN'S MISSIONARY SOCIETY FOR THE

YEAR 1891-92.

The retrospect of another year brings memories of continued and added mercies and favors from our heavenly Father, such as prolonged life to all our missionaries, spiritual blessings in all our fields, souls renewed in righteousness, though not as many as we would desire, advance in knowledge on the part of our pupils, increased efficiency of our Bible-women and young Christian workers, added membership at home, and a somewhat enlarged income, with an incalculable enrichment of our lives through this service for our Master.

Thanksgiving is befitting. Let us hope that its expression may appear in renewed diligence and enthusiasm, a more complete devotion of time and means to the work of the Lord, and at the same time, enlarged supplication and expectation of His certain blessing.

Difficulties there are, but what work, worth the doing, is without them? Let us face them courageously, looking for the "wisdom that is profitable to direct," "with good will doing service as to the Lord."

JAPAN.

Our special lines of work in this land have been prosecuted with patience and devotion. Many evidences of God's presence and blessing have cheered the hearts of the missionaries, more especially in the growth in grace and development of Christian character and usefulness of those who, but for our schools, might themselves never have heard "the truth as it is in Jesus." Of the seventy pupils in Azabu, Tokyo, fifty attend class, ten are Sunday

Of the seventy pupils in Azabu, Tokyo, fifty attend class, ten are Sunday School teachers, and here the result of their own daily systematic instruction in the Bible is very apparent. Two or three visit a hospital, and others daily teach a number of poor children, whom they have gathered from the neighborhood, thus learning to give out what they have themselves received.

In a city of a million inhabitants, one can readily imagine that there are boundless opportunities of following in the steps of the Master, who "went about doing good," and we realize that it is most important to send forth those now under our influence well trained and "thoroughly furnished unto every good word and work." It is a matter of rejoicing that they take evident delight in such employment, and it furnishes an augury of their future usefulness.

There have been five baptisms in this school during the year, and several others have applied for admission into the Church.

While the great majority are paying pupils, a few are supported by the Society; and again others have been admitted who have been willing and glad to do any work about the school in return for the advantages received. The ability shown by these, and their marked improvement, together with their gratitude, have been very pleasing.

In contrast with these there has been an occasional instance deeply painful to the teachers, of a girl rescued from temptation and poverty, yet not appreciating the opportunitics offered, and so necessitating her return to her friends. Yet who can tell the result of her having heard even a few times of God and His great love to all the world?

The family worship in the school, when teachers, pupils and servants meet to sing, read and pray together, is very impressive, even though the language is not understood by an onlooker. After the opening hymn led by one of the teachers, the girls themselves conduct this service, reading the Scriptures alternately with the school, and three of them leading readily in prayer, after which all unite in the Lord's prayer. great assistance to the teachers as interpreters in women's meetings, which are often held in private houses, and are the means of great good.

Azabu is the centre of our work in Tokyo, being the home of all our ladies and the location of our school; from it regular visits are made to several points in the city, from three to five miles distant, where services are held both on Sabbath and week days, and the work of the Bible women supervised and supplemented. There exists in the school a very flourishing Society of King's Daughters, whose labors and gifts have been highly creditable.

During the year the girls in this school have raised 130 yen for charitable purposes, besides 120 yen for the Church, supporting a bed in a Christian hospital, also a child in the school, and carrying on the "poor school."

Six students have been in attendance at the Bible school, with a view to special training for work as Bible-women. In all our fields the two branches of our work, educational and evangelistic, are closely related and interlaced, both as regards the special employments of our missionaries and their general influence in either department.

One hundred and sixty-nine weekly, and sixteen monthly, meetings have been held; 1,864 visits have been made; forty-two have been baptized, and eleven are on trial.

In speaking of our interests in Tokyo, it would be very ungrateful to omit mention of the unwearied kindness and attention of Rev. Dr. MacDonald who, through all these years, has so freely and cheerfully ministered to the health of our missionaries and that of the pupils. His counsel, both as a medical man and as a wise Christian worker, is most highly valued, and our Church may well feel honored in having such a man on its staff. His expressed appreciation of our work has been a great encouragement.

SHIZUOKA.

The position of the work here this past year has been the most satisfactory of its history, both in our relations with the Japanese Directors and in the increase of pupils, thirty-one having been in attendance, six of whom have been candidates for baptism, besides some of the native teachers.

Eleven are in active Christian work, besides two Bible women, under the guidance of our two missionaries. Five Sunday Schools, chiefly held in private houses, owe their origin to our Society, and are carried on by those connected with our school. A few here and a few there, gathered to learn about the Saviour of the world—who can tell the result !

KOFU.

Here the pupils have not increased as might be desired, but it is from no lack of efficiency on the part of the teachers, or want of convenient or comfortable quarters, the new building and grounds being very suitable and attractive, but it may be that the general reaction against foreign ways has at length reached this interior city, and it is to be hoped that the evident good accomplished will induce many more parents to avail themselves of these advantages for their daughters. It speaks well for the people and for our two noble representatives, that they can live in such peace and comfort in a large city, and it speaks loudly to our Church that these two young women are the only foreigners in that whole province of 400,000 people. To them, with the few Japanese pastors and evangelists, is committed the work of carrying the G spel to this numerous population. "What are they among so many?" KANAZAWA.

In this large city upon the north-west coast, another two of our ladies have been "holding forth the word of life" in women's meetings, Bible classes and Sunday Schools. We have no established school, but some poor children have been taught in hired rooms and it is proposed to erect a couple of inexpensive buildings in different parts of the city. This seems necessary so as to secure control of them for day and Sunday Schools, as in this city containing 250 Buddhist temples, there is such a strong opposition to Christianity. Two of our graduates from the Tokyo school have been of great help here as Christian workers, and we are thus reaping what we sowed a few years ago. Sixteen have received baptism.

Details of our different stations are presented in their several reports. We may well give thanks that God has heard our prayers and sent forth "laborers into His harvest." He has surely chosen for us and blessed their labor—a noble band of gifted, consecrated women, cheerfully and courageously doing service.

Three of them have returned on furlough, having well earned a period of rest and home coming—the one already mentioned, Miss Lund, of Woodstock, and Miss Cunningham, of Halifax, N.S.—while during the past summer three others have gone to occupy places in that important field.

Many other matters are deserving of notice, such as the Council, where all our representatives confer together and deliberate carefully before submitting any proposal to us, the conscientious watchfulness over the expenditure of money, the business capacity and faithful administration of our Sec. Treas., Mrs. Large ; the weekly Sabbath afternoon prayer meeting of the teachers and the readiness to speak in private with those enquiring "the way of life." Our ability does not equal our desires ; much more remains to be done, but thankfulness prevails for what has been permitted.

FRENCH WORK.

At the French Institute, Montreal, there have not been quite as many enrolled as during the previous year, but there has been a larger average attendance; fifteen of them entering as Roman Catholics, the greater number have now embraced Protestantism.

The two day-schools in the east and west end seem to be doing a fine work and are drawing increased numbers. The work of the Bible-women has been most encouraging, there being freer access to the homes of the people, and who can tell the result of these quiet visits with the reading of the numerous tracts distributed !

Two country schools have also received aid from our Society.

INDIAN WORK.

PORT SIMPSON, BRITISH COLUMBIA.

The building so long desired has during the year been completed, possession being given in May, and the twenty-nine girls now in residence, with their three instructors, have a comfortable and commodious dwelling, in which, we hope, many will be brought to know and love God, and be trained in habits of cleanliness and industry. They are being taught sewing, knitting and housework, besides elementary education.

It is to be regretted that the land is of such a character as to preclude the making of a garden, and from the cost of transportation, living is expensive.

REPORT OF CORRESPONDING SECRETARY.

CHILLIWHACK.

Soon after the last annual meeting our Home and school building was destroyed by fire, when sixteen of the pupils were returned to their homes, fifteen being retained and sheltered in the parsonage at no little inconvenience to Rev. Mr. and Mrs. Tate; four others have since been admitted. An adjacent building has been erected through contributions received by Mr. Tate, which is partly used for church purposes by the people in the neighborhood, and during the week as a school-room.

Very fortunately the desks were saved from destruction. The children show marked progress in their studies. It was hoped that a new building would be erected early in the year, but delay has occurred through consideration of a proposal to unite with the parent Society in an institution of a more extensive character. A desirable property of twenty-five acres has been secured in the neighborhood, and plans have been submitted for a union building.

CHINESE WORK.

VICTORIA, B.C.

This has been a year of change, eight having entered and eight having left. Three of the girls were married one evening in the presence of several members of the British Columbia Branch, which had just been holding its annual meeting. One of them had been baptized the previous Sunday, and it was a very touching sight, as she was one of the six whose landing on our shores so stirred our hearts at our last annual meeting. During the year two of those six have found shelter in our Home, and better still, we hope they have learned of the true God and have put their trust in Him.

Through the summer a good deal of anxiety was felt owing to the prevalence of smallpox, but God, in mercy, preserved all the inmates of the Home even when the dread disease was claiming its victims in the next house. During this time especially the watchful care of Dr. Ernest Hall was much appreciated.

The requirements of our work seemed to indicate that Miss Cartmell should be transplanted back to her former field of labor in Japan, and she accordingly sailed August 31st, in company with the two young ladies chosen this summer.

One of the girls who had been in the Home for five years, and had shown aptitute for study, was sent to the Methodist College in New Westminster, through the generous contribution of our President and other friends, with the object of fitting her for tuture Christian work among her own people in this country; and much prayer is desired on her behalf that she may become "a vessel unto honor, thoroughly furnished unto every good work." A similar training is very much desired for another bright little girl, as the more workers can be multiplied among their own people the better.

While doing a little (and very little compared with the need) for those who come to our shores, we desired to reach beyond and send some to represent us in China itself. We did choose a young lady to accompany the party sent out by the parent Society, but in some way there happened to be one of the said party who also made the same choice before the journey was finished, and our Society, not being on the spot, had to yield; but we are glad that our Church is not the loser. We have a medical lady, who is only waiting for the opportunity, when she, with others, will join those who are already planting the standard of the cross in that distant field.

This is only a summary for convenient reference of the work in our different fields, fuller information being given under their respective headings.

The Home Departments in the work of the various Branches, Auxiliaries, Mission Circles and Bands, the publishing interests, the Supply Committee, the Committee on Indian Affairs, will all need to be heard to obtain a just idea of the year's growth, that is, in its outward manifestation. None but the all-seeing One can know all the thought, prayer and effort here represented, nor estimate the results; but all the good, purified and separated from any evil accompaniment, has been of His own inspiring, and to Him most gladly and most humbly do we offer all the glory.

This has been found of great convenience to all in erested in our work, and used not only by the Committee, but for the Ex-cutive meetings of both Board and Branch when necessary. It has been furnished by the kindness of friends, and is open every Wednesday morning from 11 o'clock to 1.

The monthly Letter Leaflet was enlarged to twelve pages, and has now an average monthly circulation of 10,000 copies.

In reference to the resolution passed by the General Board, "that statistical reports be simplified," your Committee, after careful thought, considered, in view of the fact that a large number of the old forms were still on hand, it was better to make use of them for the present year, and delay publishing another form, especially as this resolution seemed to conflict with By-law No. 1, page 167 (Annual Report).

Owing to the delay of the manuscript of specimen page for Mission Band Secretaries "as a guide in keeping correct records of their work," reaching the Committee, it was, after careful consideration, deemed advisable to postpone publishing it until this year.

The Missionary Catechism, authorized by the Board, has been published, and several kind references made to its usefulness among our Juvenile Bands.

The booklet, "Why are We Protestants?" was published in an attractive form, and in time for the Christmas sales. There has been a steady demand for it, the edition being half exhausted.

Suggestions having been received by the Committee for life-member certificates for Mission Bands, after careful thought and consultation with the Mission Band Corresponding Secretaries of the different Branches, it was decided to publish one. A very pretty design was prepared by Miss Orr, a member of one of the Auxiliaries in Toronto, and to whom the thanks of the Committee are due for her valuable assistance.

Leaflets which are in stock have been reviewed in the *Monthly Letter Leaflet* from time to time, according to a resolution of the General Board, thus drawing attention to them; not only in the increased sales are the good results shown, but the interest thus aroused is as good seed sown which will continue to bring forth such harvests as will bless both sower and reaper.

REPORT OF THE SUPPLY COMMITTEE.

We have again to thank our numerous friends for their liberal contributions of clothing and bedding to the different missions under the care of the Woman's Missionary Society, and are very thank ul that, owing to the generosity of our Auxiliaries and Mission Bands, we have in addition been able to contribute to the comfort and joy of many poor Indians, not only in the North-West, but in Ontario.

We have found missions among the white people also, in poor districts, who have highly appreciated these gifts, and are assured that many prayers and blessings have gone to the throne of grace for the Christian charity of the members of the Woman's Missionary Society. The work has extended considerably during the past year, and we owe many thanks to the Indian Department at Ottawa for their payment of freight on clothing to the Indians in the North-West, the total sum of \$147.92 having been refunded by them to Auxiliaries and Mission Bands.

As far as we can judge, by the contents of cases sent to different missions, the aggregate value has been over \$2,000.

The Committee has received in cash the sum of \$75.13, which was used in the purchase of goods and payment of freight to missions in Ontario, British Columbia and the North-West Neither this sum nor that paid by the Government includes the freight on boxes sent direct from different places. Nearly 150 Auxiliaries and Mission Bands have been engaged in this work of benevolence.

REPORTS FROM MISSIONS.

THE JAPAN WORK.

The Fifth Annual Meeting of the Woman's Missionary Society's Council in Japan, was held in Karuizawa, July 13th and 14th, 1892. The following members were present: Mrs. Large, Misses Munro, Lund, Preston, Hargrave, Blackmore, N. Hart, L. Hart, Morgan, Shoults and Robertson.

After the opening devotional exercises, the Secretary of the Council addressed the meeting and welcomed the beloved President and Cor. Sec. of the Woman's Missionary Society to our midst, and extended to them all the privileges of members of the Council. She also stated that Miss Cushing had received a certificate of health from Dr. Macdonald, and that all the terms for her reception as a member of the Council were now fulfilled. By a unanimous vote, Miss Cushing was received as a member of the Council. The reports from the various Branches of the work were read and received as follows :

TOKYO BRANCH-SCHOOL.

Only one in daily contact with our school can know the amount of work being done by our students. The Christian living and Christian influence cannot be put into words, but for the encouragement of our fellow-workers I will try to give a resume of the reportable work done by our Christian girls.

Once a month some of our pupils visit a Christian hospital in which they pay for the support of a bed. Although not more than 5 sen a month from each contributor is allowed, more than yen 35 has been given; many of the 5 sen pieces have been earned. Our "King's Daughters' Society " have expended 53 yen, and have a balance on hand of 70.00 yen, almost all of which has been earned. In turn each "King's Daughter" teaches in our poor school, four going for an hour each day, including Saturday. More than 6 yen have been given to the Scripture Union Society. At the time of the great earthquake in Nagoya, some 47 yen were contributed by the pupils and sent to the relief of the All this is exclusive of church subscriptions, missionary, Sunday sufferers. School and other collections. In all, about 250 yen (gold, \$180) in money have been given by the students of our school for religious and charitable purposes. Besides this, old clothing has been received and made over for the poor. Twelve of our students go out every Sunday for Sunday School and hospital work. One of the senior girls acts the part of an elder sister to the little ones while the others are at the Sunday evening service, and various other meetings are aided or conducted by our girls.

This term we report our first income from our industrial work, which is succeeding according to our hopes. Our attendance continues the same, about seventy. Five have been baptized during the year. One child from the poor school, which is supported by the "King's Daughters' Society," has also been baptized. It has been necessary to expel one of our supported girls.

Evangelistic.—We began this year with six Bible-women, but during the year one has been dropped, one has left us, and one resigned temporarily on account of illness. One hundred and sixty-nine weekly, and sixteen monthly

meetings have been held, with an average attendance of twelve. The greatest average attendance was twenty, the least five. One thousand eight hundred and sixty-four people have been visited, forty-two have received baptism and eleven are still on trial. Taken as a whole, the work has been marked by considerable advancement, the women showing by their lives that they have attained to a deeper knowledge of the things of God.

Six students have entered the Bible school. Of these, one has been dropped, and the remaining five have successfully completed their first year's work. Two of these have assisted in Sunday School work, and the other three have visited in the charity hospital. During the week, one taught a class in the school, two taught in the "King's Daughters" poor school, and the other two worked as opportunity offered at our women's meetings.

SHIZUOKA BRANCH-SCHOOL.

We are glad to report an increase of twelve pupils since Easter. Two of last term's pupils were obliged to withdraw on account of ill-health, one of these expects to return in the fall. Our attendance is now thirty-one, besides two special pupils.

We have watched with delight the growing interest of the girls in their Bible study. Eleven of our pupils are engaged in active Christian work. Six are candidates for baptism, and we hope that during vacation permission will be given them to be baptized on their return. The "King's Daughters' Circle" is widening, and its members are more anxious to work for the Master. The Sunday School started last term has a regular attendance of twenty-two. We gratefully acknowledge our Father's guiding hand during the past, and pray that an increased earnestness may mark our next year's work.

Evangelistic. —Regular meetings have been held once a fortnight at Hirona, Ejiri and Shimada. Once a month at Fujiyeda and Yonakoshi. Every Wednesday afternoon a Bible Class has been held at the school, to which all interested in Bible study were invited (this was not open to the pupils of the school, but for outsiders only). Four Sunday Schools have been carried on. It was necessary to close one of these for a time, but it will be reopened again in the autumn. The others are in a favorable condition, the attendance is good and the order excellent. The school in the west end of the city was given in charge of one of the pupils of our girls' school ; the interest and attendance there are especially good. A lady near Hirona has an empty storehouse which she has offered for Sunday School use. We expect to accept her offer and open there in the autumn.

The Bible-women's reports show an increased number of visits; several non-Christian families are being reached. The Bible-woman in Numadzu reports troubles in the Church that have interfered with her work. She is an earnest, true Christian, and we trust that ere long the troubles will be past.

When thinking of the difference between what one wishes to see, and what is actually seen, there might be cause for discouragement, but we labor on, knowing the battle is not ours but the Lord's, and in his own time good will triumph and an abundant harvest be reaped.

KOFU BRANCH-SCHOOL.

In looking back over our work of the past year in Kofu, as the perplexities and the blessings, the difficulties and the discouragements, pass in review before us, the predominance of the blessings and encouragements is very plain. The difficulties have been very real and often discouraging for a time, but many of them belong now only to the past, while the encouragements are encouragements still.

the facilities for work. The first graduation (a class of three girls) and Miss Wintemute's departure marked the close of the second term. At the beginning of the third, we felt some anxiety for the girls who, owing to the graduations, now became the seniors of the school. These were a class of six by no means model girls, and we were doubtful as to the effect their new position would have upon themselves. On the whole we believe it has done them good. At times they have seemed in immediate danger of overbalancing, but throughout they have made honest efforts and shown a real desire to fill their position worthily.

Early in the year a weekly prayer-meeting was started at the request of the teachers and some of the older students, and though nothing has been said by way of urging attendance, all the resident students have been present at every meeting, unless prevented by sickness or by their work in the cookingclass. At first only a few took part in the meetings, now there are but a few who do not. Much earnestness was manifested at our last meeting, and two girls led in prayer for the first time.

The influence of the reaction against woman's education, which began in Tokyo three years ago, is being felt here now; though it can scarcely be called "reaction against" in Yamanashi, it is rather a loss of interest in the matter, a feeling that woman's education is of small importance, and any trifling inconvenience may lead a man to remove his daughter from school. We began the year with thirty-one girls, we closed with twenty. The founders of the school have lost none of their interest in it and its work.

Evangelistic.—The Lord has graciously manifested Himself in power among us in the work of the past year. There have been shadows; we have seen numbers listening to the truth faithfully and earnestly for a time, and then "the cares of this world" choked the good seed and it was unfruitful. Again, we have not been given to see any fruit of our labor in some of the country meetings, but notwithstanding disappointments, some have been brought into the fold. Our opportunities for work have widened, the tie that unites us to the Japanese has been strengthened, and there has been marked growth spiritually among our Christian workers. Our Bible-women's training class, held twice a week, numbers ten members, and nearly all are engaged in some form of Christian work. We have nine baptisms and one conversion to report. There have been two weekly meetings, one fortnightly, six twice a month, and three monthly. "Strengthen, O Lord, that which thou hast wrought in us."

KANAZAWA BRANCH.

The last year has been a good one, and we feel the Lord has been with us, and that the guidance for which we have so often prayed has been given. Three women's meetings have been held weekly ; one of these, until Christmas, was in the house of an old lady who with her husband had become interested in Christianity through attending some of the preaching services. At the beginning of the year we decided that it would be well to remove this meeting to the church, where we could have a fire, as we suffered from the cold in the Japanese house. The change was a good one. The attendance was largely increased, and no storm was severe enough to keep the old lady, now thoroughly interested, away. On April 17th she and her husband received baptism. Another meeting was held in a preaching-place in the city with an average attendance of about eight. The third was held in our own house. During the winter the attendance was small, and the day invariably stormy, but when the fine weather came more attended, and there has been of late an average attendance of eleven. We, who know how Christianity is hated on this west coast of Japan, and how hard it is to reach the women, do rejoice over each one brought in. Buddhism is strong here; there are about 250 Buddhist temples in the city.

In September a class for training Bible-women was started. Three joined at that time, later on two more joined, so that now there are five who attend: the first three are now teaching in Sunday School. Shimada san, our Biblewoman, and Yamanaka san, Miss Hargrave's teacher, have gained entrance to some houses, where they have talked to the women on Christianity. They have always been politely, and in some cases, gladly received. Preaching services have been commenced in two neighboring villages. We hope the time is not far distant when there will be trained workers to place in these and other villages.

Within the year fourteen women and two little girls have received baptism.

There are thousands of women in this city whom it seems impossible to reach, thousands who hate us because we are Christians and foreigners. May God this coming year go before the workers and open up the way to many hearts and homes.

The plan for training evangelistic workers and the Bible school regulations having been found unsatisfactory. It was resolved to bring those preparing for Bible workers into the regular schools, giving them an extra Bible training where it was found necessary; and that henceforth all estimates for supported students shall come under the head of appropriations for schools, and that such students shall be under the control of the school with which they are connected.

The time having come for the appointing of the first Woman's Missionary Conference (according to the Constitution passed last year), the matter was brought up for discussion; but this plan having proved impracticable, as studied during the year, it was set aside, and the rules for the guidance of the Council revised and accepted. The Treasurer's report was accepted. The accepted report of the Stationing Committee is as follows :--

The Secretary of the Kanazawa Branch having stated that it was desirable to have one of the two school buildings estimated for erected before the winter sets in, the question was asked as to whether we were at liberty to use the amount required before hearing the decision of the Board. In reply to this, Miss Munro asked if the \$300 given by Mr. and Mrs. Carlisle could not be at once used, and expressed it as her opinion that such an appropriation of it would be nearest the wish of the donors.

The President and Corresponding Secretary of the Woman's Missionary Society expressed their willingness for this, and volunteered to take the responsibility of the money being used before the meeting of the Board. The following was then unanimously passed :--

Resolved,—That we ask the Home Board to sustain the action of the Fresident and Corresponding Secretary of the Woman's Missionary Society in granting permission to the Council to use the \$300 given by Mr. and Mrs. Carlisle for the building and furnishing of a school for the poor at Kanazawa, the amount named to be used at once.

Resolved,—That we recommend that the Home Board appropriate to each lady appointed to the Japan work \$100 for outfit, and that during the first year of service, when she is really on trial, her salary be two-thirds of the fixed salary.

Miss Morgan asked for arrangements to be made for her to return home the latter end of November or early in December. Miss Munro desired to sail by the ship leaving nearest the 1st of July, 1893. Miss Preston desired to leave in June, 1893.

Resolved, - That while we consider the text-books on the course of Japanese study (arranged three years ago), the best that can be used, we do not require the study of the "character," and we do not consider ability to successfully pass the examinations of said "course" as any test of a real knowledge of Japanese, but consider the power to use the language the only test needed.

Resolved,—That we respectfully request the Home Board will not consider requests from individual members of the Japan Council unless they are sent through the official medium.

Resolved,—That we express our appreciation of the work done by Miss Wintemute during her term of service, and we pray that wherever her future lot may be cast that she may have many souls for her hire.

We parted a few days ago with Miss Cunningham, and to-day bid farewell to Miss Lund. We pray that God's richest blessing may rest upon them, that as they meet with loved ones, joy may be unmingled with sorrow. When in the interests of mission work they are called before the great congregations, that God will teach them what to say, and that they may be very useful in His hands. We part now, but lock forward to another year when, with renewed health, they will return to us again, if God so wills.

Resolved,—That our sincere thanks be tendered to our loved President and Corresponding Secretary for their coming among us. We can truly say they have done us good, cheered us by their expressed pleasure in the state of our work, helped us by their counsel, and brought us more in touch with those in the home land. We regret that they are to leave us so soon, but pray that journeying mercies may be theirs, that as they go from one mission station to the other, they may ever have the consciousness of the Master's presence, and that if permitted to meet with our sisters and fellow-workers in Canada, the recounting of what they have seen and heard may be the means of awakening a deeper interest than ever in this "woman's work for woman."

Then followed an hour of "prayer and praise," led by Mrs. Strachan, after which Mrs. Gooderham addressed the members of the Council, giving touching words of experience, encouragement and counsel.

After the reading of the minutes of the last session, the fifth annual meeting was closed by Mrs. Gooderham.

THE FRENCH WORK.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON FRENCH WORK FOR 1891-92.

In reviewing the work of the past year we cannot but express our thankfulness at the measure of success which has crowned the efforts of our Biblewomen, and of our teachers in the two mission schools under our care in this city. Amid much discouragement, the seed has been sown, and we can only leave results with Him who is sure to bless every effort put forth in His name.

Early in the year, Miss Jackson, our faithful teacher in the west end school, was taken seriously ill, and her place was temporarily filled by Miss Maynard, your Committee hoping that Miss Jackson would be able to resume the work she loved so well, and which had so prospered under her care. But it was not so to be, and Miss Maynard has continued in charge of the school throughout the year. The attendance has been good, the highest number on the books being eighty-eight in July, average attendance for the year forty-nine; many causes preventing more regular attendance in children of the class from which our school is supplied. The annual examination was held in June, with satisfactory results, and the school was continued throughout the month of July, it being deemed advisable to try the experiment for this year, with what success the large attendance for that month has made evident.

Particular mention must be made of Miss Anderson's painstaking labors amongst the smaller children, who have been by her well grounded in Bible truth and in the catechism, most important seed-sowing in those young hearts, which, we pray, may spring up and bear fruit in after years. Of the children attending this school, twenty-one are French-Canadians, fourteen Irish Catholics, and the remainder, though English and Protestant, have French grandmothers. Twelve or fifteen boys in addition have attended school a portion of the year. The school opened in September, with Miss Maynard as teacher, and sixty names on the roll, so that prospects are bright for the winter's work. Miss Anderson reports having made 1,078 visits during the eleven months, also distributing 1,000 tracts, and a quantity of religious reading matter which has been very helpful. She found the mothers this year not only willing but eager to send their children to our school, realizing the benefit they have received in the past. In the east end school there has been an average attendance of twenty scholars, composed of French-Canadian, English, Jews, Italian and Indian. The teacher, Miss Runnills, reports good progress on the part of her scholars, who did creditably at the June examination. Four of the most promising of her pupils have been removed to a convent, under great pressure from the priests, and other children have been withdrawn from the school under threats of excommunication, the most dire and terrible threat ever held over the head of a devoted Roman Catholic.

Madame Lamontagne reports having made an average of 150 visits per month during the year. She has grown in the confidence and love of those whom she visits, and they listen eagerly while she reads the Scriptures and prays with them.

Although opposition to our work in the east end still continues, it is not of so open and direct a character as formerly, and we think that the parents are more ready to listen to and believe the truth as time reveals the purity of motive and devotion of our workers, the more particularly as their faith in the priesthood has been somewhat rudely shaken by certain occurrences in the neighborhood during the past year.

Your Committee must not omit to report the establishment of a Band of Hope under Miss Anderson's care, in the west end school, of which almost all the scholars are members.

The schools of St. Faustian and of St. Theodore have received grants of \$50 each during the year.

THE FRENCH WORK.

FRENCH METHODIST INSTITUTE.

Thursday, April 28th, brought to a close our third year's work in the new French Institute. In many respects it has proved the most successful session since the amalgamation of the boys' and girls' schools. Seven names were enrolled more than during the previous year, but the average attendance has been greater, and no epidemic occurred, as during the first two winters, materially interfering with our work.

The students were hearly all thoroughly in earnest in their various classes, many of them, particularly the girls, petitioning day after day to spend the time allotted to out-door exercise in study. The lack of interest displayed by many of the students in taking recreation out of doors has been a source of much anxiety to us, as we consider it one of the greatest aids to health, satisfactory study and good order in the building. Could an appropriation be made in the near future for a gymnasium, or even a covered shed where exercise might be taken in stormy weather, we feel that it would be money wisely spent. The pleasure and profit derived by the girls from the weekly drill in calisthenics, kindly given by Miss Finley and Miss Hall, have been very great, showing that exercise is enjoyed when means for taking it are provided.

We are indebted to many kind friends for numerous favors shown to our students during the session, perhaps most of all to the members of the Douglas Mission Band, who in addition to continuing their weekly drawing and sewing lessons, provided a Thanksgiving supper and social, and two well-laden Christmas trees.

Much disappointment was felt by us at the beginning of the year, that so many of our older students were taken from the Institute to carry on the work in the mission fields. We felt, more deeply than they realized themselves, that they were greatly in need of further training before being able to successfully combat the ignorance, intolerance and superstition with which they must necessarily come in contact. A special course of lectures on controversial doctrines was given by Mr. Massicotte, during the session, not only to instruct the pupils in the errors of the Church of Rome, but to prepare them for the discussions and arguments which it is the delight of the Roman Catholic to provoke, and which have been found productive of very good results when, as is not always the case, they are successfully sustained by our people.

We have had fifteen Roman Catholic pupils with us during the session, and of these the greater part profess to have renounced their faith and embraced Protestantism. Several have shown both courage and perseverance in holding to their new faith against ridicule and persecution, and give promise of doing good work for us in future years.

The interest in the Sunday School, class-meeting and prayer-meeting has been well sustained throughout the year, owing greatly to the unceasing and zealous labors of Mr. and Mrs. Hall, to whom the success of this most important part of our work is almost wholly due.

We are looking hopefully to the future, that by God's blessing this time of seed-sowing may result in an abundant harvest throughout the many darkened portions of our Province.

Trusting that we shall be sustained during the year upon which we are now entering by the united prayers of the Woman's Missionary Society,

Of the seventeen persons named in the preceding list, only seven are in the Home at the present time. Shung Mui was only with us about three weeks, when we had to return her to her owner.

Ah Pui, Choy Lin's infant son, died suddenly, August 16th, of heart disease. August 23rd, three of the girls, Lillie, Ruth and Nun Choy, were married to Christian Chinamen, Ruth taking Joseph to her own home. Bo Kum, who was brought over from Westminster in June, has returned to her husband, we believe much benefited by her two months' stay in the Home. 'Kam Yuck and Chan Ah Tai returned to China in company with Miss Cartmell on her return to Japan. They came into the Home to have our assistance in helping them to return to their friends in China. September 14th, Gertrude was taken to New Westminster to the British Columbia College. We had been hopeful during the five years, that Gertie has been under our care, that something of this kind would open up for her, and were glad that Mrs. Gooderham and Mrs. Strachan, while in Victoria, decided that the time had come to give her this opportunity for an education, thus preparing her for a useful life among her own people.

The seven girls left in the Home are young and we are hopeful for their future.

Number of scholars at last report, 9; 8 admitted during the year, 1 died, 3 married, 5 returned, 1 gone to school, 7 in residence at date.

The mercies of the year have been many, for which we desire to render thanksgiving especially for continued good health and preservation from disease. We also desire to thank the many friends who work, pray and give, for their kind gifts and loving interest, and remain,

REPORT OF MISS CARTMELL.

It is always difficult to give an idea of a year's work, and I find it especially hard to attempt it this time for several reasons.

REPORT OF MISS CARTMELL.

The anxieties connected with the work have neither been few nor unimportant. It was therefore a great satisfaction for me to have the ladies clearly understand by seeing and hearing on the ground. While I was sorry to see the oppression that rested upon them as they comprehended the expensiveness of work at that remote station, and saw the various phases of the work that discourage rather than stimulate, I felt it would be well to have them know what are the burdens under which the missionaries have lived for years, and must continue to labor till the fruit of their lives and advancing civilization proves what the work has been. Though the building is by no means perfect, it is a good substantial one, in which there is no reason why the best results may not be accomplished in the training of the pupils for lives of usefulness.

My financial report and notes of explanation to the Executive Committee as Treasurer for this building at Port Simpson, and the reports of Mrs. Gooderham and Mrs. Strachan will make it superfluous for me to say more on this point.

My school work in the Chinese Home at Victoria did not meet my ambition, yet the pupils made fair progress in their studies. We will pray that the efforts made to awaken aspirations after a true and noble life may not be in vain, but that the Spirit of God may keep in their minds the word of the Lord and incite them to self-control and unselfish desire and action. May they intelligently aim at proving their love to Christ by keeping His commandments. May the Lord lead them from strength to strength in the divine life, and cause them to bear much fruit, that His grace may be magnified in them. They are very intelligent, loving, and lovable girls.

In Chinatown, outside the homes of our married girls, there were a few where I was made welcome as an occasional visitor. I felt the former suspicion and aversion were wearing away. The two little girls with bound feet, of whom I have written, were objects of special solicitude. The parents of one yielded to my desire to become her teacher more to gratify me than from appreciation of the advantage to their child. But they were pleased, and proud as they saw her pick up a little English. In this home I became acquainted with another young woman, who had no aversion to me; she knew a little English, and desired to learn more, and though she was considered of very low class, and rude and ignorant by her own people, she really helped me.

In the home of the other little girl, I was conscious of gaining favor. The child herself knew she was of special interest to me, and the mother too, but the fear was gone. I accept these signs most gratefully as evidence that the Lord is working where we cannot, in the hearts of the people.

I am encouraged to hope also that the time is near when we shall be able to do something for the dear little children whose condition appeals to me so strongly. They are neglected and abused as the little slave-girls are liable to be, but loved and indulged. We do not need to rescue them from their parents, but from lives of ignorance and vice. DEAR MRS. STRACHAN,—Again the time has come for the yearly report, and it is with a heart filled with gratitude to our Father for all the blessings we have enjoyed during the year that I prepare my report.

We commenced the year in the old home with twenty two pupils. The following month came the sickness that all suffered from, two of our number dying, one a little girl of seven, the other, fifteen years of age. I feel sure both are among the white-robed throng, saved for evermore.

During the time of the illness, four of the children returned home to their parents, coming back to us in the spring. Towards the last of November, Miss Lawrence came to my help, remaining with us for two months. Miss Beavis arrived in December. In May we moved to our new building. Miss Caldwell arrived the last of May, when school was opened in the Home. All the pupils are doing well in both household, sewing and school work.

During the year five children have left the Home; one had been with us two years over her time, the second at the close of her term. Another was allowed to leave before her term was ended, as the mother wanted her child home again. The fourth was married here in the village. The other was the one who remained home, spoken of before. Our present number is twentynine. There have been many more applicants, but have kept them waiting so that we may not have too many new ones to deal with at one time. The names of those we have at present are : Betsy Webster, Olive Dilly, Maggie Gosnel, Emma Pierce, Angelina Harris, Matilda McKay, Minnie Offet, Nellie Tenas, Louisa Gurney, Peggie Bryant, Martha Harris, Kattie Tenas, Tilly Bradly, Amy Wells, Martha Ross, Sallie Bryant, Mary Tate, Fanny Gosnel, Martha Bradly, Lizzie Bradly, Maggie Paterson, Selina Sampson, Hannah Edgar, Emily Pollard, Elespeth Hinksman, Josephine Abbot, Alice Wells, Dollie Robinson, Maggie Henry.

I forgot to speak of another girl who was with us part of the year, Elizabeth Russ; she came in while the children were ill, remaining till spring, and is now living with Mrs. Crosby.

REPORT OF COQUALEETZA HOME.

REPORT OF COQUALEETZA HOME, 1891-92.

It is with feelings of gratitude to Almighty God for His protecting care throughout the past year, marked by such unexpected and sweeping change, that we submit the annual report.

Through the destruction of the Home building, Nov. 30th, 1891, the work was hindered, and our numbers limited, still we are thankful to say all the inmates escaped uninjured, and with a smaller number of pupils the school was soon re-organized in the Mission House, which was thrown open to us by the kindness of Mr. and Mrs. Tate.

Last year thirty-one inmates were reported. This number continued in residence until the Home was destroyed. At that time eighteen were sent to their homes. As accommodation was provided, different ones were brought back, until there are now nineteen children under our care.

In the housework boys and girls have shared alike, and all have made themselves very useful. Besides cultivating the Home garden, the boys have rendered considerable assistance in working the land purchased by the General Board.

In the sewing department work has been limited to the necessary making and mending for the children, our changed circumstances having rendered it so that work for exhibition was out of the question. However, had the preparation of work been possible, doubtless our girls would have won a good share of prizes as on former occasions.

We have been pleased to note an increased interest in the studies undertaken. Several have reached the stage where the reading of books for themselves becomes a pleasure, because of their enlarged comprehension of the force of words. Perhaps the most marked progress has been made in the study of arithmetic, the rules of which these children find difficult of practical application. The subjects taught are reading, writing, arithmetic, geography, grammar, composition, temperance and music.

The weekly class and prayer-meetings, the Sabbath School and Sabbath evening services have been well sustained, and have proved a means of much spiritual good to those who have attended.

Steady progress is the record of the year. We have endeavored to impart thorough, practical instruction, and have been rewarded and encouraged by the degree of success that has attended our efforts.

We have to acknowledge with gratitude the many substantial marks of kindness shown us by the members of the Woman's Missionary Society and other friends since the fire. Their gifts and words of sympathy have proved very helpful throughout what has been to us, notwithstanding the many ameliorating circumstances, a year of special trial and anxiety.

We are looking forward to the establishment of our work on a broader and firmer basis, and earnestly hope and pray that the desires and expectations of all who have the temporal and spiritual welfare of the Indians at heart may be fully realized in the work of the proposed Institute.

CORRESPONDING SECRETARY'S REPORT OF THE WESTERN BRANCH, 1891-92.

The work of the Western Branch during this, its tenth year, has been very encouraging. We may not report the formation of as many Auxiliaries as last year, nor as large an increase in membership, but we can say that during no year of our existence has work been more faithfully done, as we may gather from the reports sent in, all which show an increased interest taken in all departments of our work.

Twenty Auxiliaries and nine Mission Bands have been organized during the year. The Auxiliaries are Auburn, Belwood, Bethel Appointment, Fullarton Circuit, Beaverdam, Ebenezer Appointment, Holmesville Circuit, Highgate, Guilds, Kintore, Listowel, Muncey (Indian), Nelson, Palmerston, Stratford, Selkirk, St. George, Teeswater, Tuckersmith, Walkerton, Wesley, Whitechurch. Besides these some have organized lately, ready for work next year; they are Alvinston, Brantford (Sydenham Street), Bartonville, Decewsville, Kippen, and Shedden. Raper and Baker's Appointment, Westminster Circuit, have each organized. The new Bands are Copetown, Guelph (Dublin Street), Hamilton (Emerald Street), Jerseyville, London (Wellington Street), Strathroy, Sarnia (First Church), Sarnia (Queen Street), and Teeswater. In addition to these Mount Vernon, Simcoe and Walkerton have just organized Mission Circles; St. Mary's and Cayuga, Juvenile Bands. We are sorry to report that some have dropped out ; among the Auxiliaries are Eden, Fergus, Forestville, Port Rowan, Paris Plains, Preston, St. Williams and Tilbury Centre; among the Bands are Harrow and Teeterville.

We report 147 Auxiliaries, an increase of 12; Mission Bands 50, increase 4; annual members 3,500, increase 391; life members 193, increase 20; total membership 3,693, increase 412; Mission Band members 1,725; total membership, including Bands, 5,418. TENTH ANNUAL MEETING OF THE WESTERN BRANCH.

The tenth annual meeting of the Western Branch assembled in the Central Methodist Church. Woodstock, on Tuesday, October 4th, at 2.30 p.m., continuing through Wednesday and Thursday, the President, Mrs. (Dr.) Burns, of St. Thomas, in the chair. After devotional exercises and roll-call the Nominating Committee were chosen, being Mesdames Wood (St. Thomas), Jackson (Caledonia), and Williams (Galt). These ladies afterwards reported the entire convention divided into the following committees : Resolutions, Modes of Work, Organizers, Mission Bands, and Courtesies.

A tender and solemn memorial service was led by Mrs. Dickson. The following members have died during the year: Mrs. Awde, Mrs. Stinson, Miss Della Thompson, Mrs. Robinson, Miss Cooley, Miss Ham, of Brantford; Mrs. L. T. Kiltie, Sarnia; Mrs. Sharp, Caistorville; Mrs. F. Charlton, Littlewood; Mrs. D. C. Clark, Mrs. Smith, Dunnville; Mrs. J. Crow, Mrs. J. C. Walker, Miss S. A. Smith, Miss W. B. Clark, Guelph; Miss Code, Listowel; Mrs. S. A. Morse, Niagara Falls South; Mrs. J. S. Job, Waterdown; Miss Davidson, Dundas; Mrs. Elson, London West; Mrs. Smith, Woodstock; Mrs. (Rev.) J. C. Laird, Mrs. Abbott, London; Mrs. Bradley, Tintern; Mrs. J. Grant, Acton; Mrs. R. Fulford, Teeswater; Mrs. Spencer, Mrs. Greenwood, Mrs. Austin, Paris; Miss Tisdale, Otterville; Mrs. McCallum, Hamilton; Mrs. G. Horning, Jerseyville; Mrs. Crow, Welland; Mrs. Morden, Rock Chapel; Miss Dora Switzer, Kirkton. As each name was called, some member of the Convention gave testimony to her work and worth. Mrs. Dickson closed with a reflection on the shortness of life and our consequent responsibility.

Between the afternoon and evening session a most delightful reception was held in the lecture-room. The Woodstock ladies had prepared an excellent supper, and a pleasant two hours was spent in social intercourse.

THE OPENING ADDRESS.

After devotional exercises the President, Mrs. Burns, gave her opening address. She said the Society was first organized eleven years ago in Hamilton, at which thirteen Auxiliaries were reported. Now there are in connection with the whole Society 436 Auxiliaries, 183 Mission Bands, 10,014 members, and 5,899 Mission Band members. Last year \$31,698.96 was raised. The Society employs twenty-three missionaries.

The aims of the Society are, first, to establish an Auxiliary in every church, and to imbue its members with a love for missions. The bounds of this general Society stretch from the Atlantic to the Pacific. In connection with each Branch are Auxiliaries and Mission Bands, where the real work is done. The President spoke of the aims and expectations of the Society, laying stress upon our duty with regard to unused talent in our churches. She gave an interesting sketch of the work being done on our different fields of labor among the Japanese, the Chinese and Indians of British Columbia, and the French of the Province of Quebec.

Mrs. Cunningham, of Guelph, read the Secretary's report. It showed that during the year 20 new Auxiliaries and nine Mission Bands have been established, while several new ones have lately been organized ready for work. A few societies have disbanded. In the Western Branch of the Society are now 148 Auxiliaries, a net increase of 13; 50 Mission Bands, an increase of 4; 3,500 annual members, an increase of 391; life members, 193, increase 20; total membership, 3,693, increase 412. The amount raised by hand was \$2,079.13, an increase of \$573.44 over last year.

Miss Dickson, of London, the Corresponding Secretary of Mission Bands, read her report. It gave the total number of Bands as 50, being an increase of 4; membership, 1,723, a decrease of 74. This decrease in the membership is accounted for by the fact that all members who have not paid the full fee of 25 cents hav was \$2,098.1 The rep

The report of the Treasurer, Mrs. Williams, of Galt, showed the finances to be in a most satisfactory condition. The total receipts for the year were \$10,040; of this \$9,895.70 has been sent to the General Treasurer; an increase of \$1,700.

Mrs. (Rev.) Ross, of Woodstock, read a gracefully worded and hearty address of welcome to the delegates.

Mrs. Mills, of Guelph, replied in a few appropriate words.

The representatives from sister societies were: Mrs. Dadson, Baptist; Miss White, Congregational; and Mrs. Beard, New St. Paul's. On the following day, Mrs. McMullen, of Knox Church; Mrs. McLeod, of the McAll Mission; and Mrs. McKay, of Chalmers' Church, were present. All these ladies spoke of the unity of mission work, and wished Godspeed to their Methodist sisters. Mrs. McMechan responded on behalf of the Branch.

Miss Whitfield, who has been engaged in missionary work in Africa, then briefly addressed the Convention, describing the work in the Dark Continent. She had been engaged for five years under Bishop Taylor, her work being in Liberia.

Wednesday was largely taken up with committee work and reports of the same.

At the afternoon session the Committee on Modes of Work recommended (1) that a missionary prayer-meeting be held in connection with the regular prayer-meeting in order to interest and instruct the general public; (2) that once or twice a year the Auxiliary give a plain tea, and especially invite members and any others they may wish to become interested in the work; (3) that members be asked to bring any interesting missionary matter to the meetings; (4) that in each Auxiliary a recruiting committee be appointed, and (5) that there be a thanksgiving offering and a birthday box established, also a self-denial week.

The Committee on Organizer's Work reported (1) that each organizer be provided with the following outfit: Three Reports, twenty-five copies each of "Origin of Our Work," "Ten Reasons why I should belong to the Woman's Missionary Society," "Duties of Auxiliary Officers," "An Appeal to the Women of the Methodist Church," and copies of the Constitution; also one sample copy of the Outlook. (2) That the duties of organizers be to enter all fields in their district as soon as possible; to urge Auxiliaries to organize Bands among their young people; to be in communication with all the Auxiliaries of the District, strengthening the weak, and visiting where necessary to encourage and help. (3) That our Society be represented the second day at the May District Meeting, taking this opportunity to thank the ministers for their co-operation in the work, and trusting that they may have their assistance in entering fields not as yet occupied. (4) That District Conventions be held whenever practicable.

The Mission Band Committee reported as follows:—(1) Where there is both a Circle and Band in a church, if their combined membership be forty, it is recommended that they be entitled to representation at the Branch meeting, if it be eighty, that each may send a delegate. (2) That organizers give particular attention to organizing Bands, and that they be provided with suitable Mission Band literature. (3) That the Mission Bands be provided with annual cards similar to those of last year. (4) That a closer relation between the older and younger members in the same church be cultivated; to effect this, let an interchange of friendly visits be arranged for once or twice a year. (5) To secure accuracy, let the officers of the Auxiliary confer with the officers of the Band in preparing reports.

In the evening the large church was crowded with people to hear the address of Miss Wintemute, the returned missionary from Japan. Rev J. S. Ross presided, and in his opening address referred to the opposition manifested in some quarters when the Woman's Missionary Society was first inaugurated. He was pleased that the opposition had been successfully overcome. Miss Wintemute is a graceful and fluent speaker, and her address proved very interesting. She described the inner life of the Japanese, especially that which has to do with the schools of the Woman's Missionary Society. She gave a brief history of the schools at Tokio, Shidzuoka, and Kofu, describing the daily routine of the scholastic and religious life. She impressed deeply the thought of the perishing millions in heathen lands and the responsibility of practising economy.

The Organizers reported in detail, giving statistics of each district in their respective Conferences. Faithful work has been done by the District Organizers, much correspondence, and a fairly successful year. District Conventions had been held on several of the districts, and had been found very helpful.

Thursday was crowded with business, but the tact and capability of the President brought the Convention safely through the programme in regular order.

At the morning's session the Conference Organizers were appointed as follows: London Conference, Mrs. Wright, South London; Guelph Conference, Mrs. Scarff, Guelph; Niagara Conference, Mrs. Jackson, Caledonia.

The question of where the next annual meeting should be held was then taken up. Invitations were presented from Listowel, Hamilton, Centenary Church, Milton, and Strathroy. Listowel was chosen.

The afternoon's session opened with a consecration meeting, led by Mrs. Jackson. Mrs. Burns led the Conference of Auxiliaries and Mission Circles. Her topics were: (1) How to make Auxiliary meetings interesting; (2) how to increase attendance; (3) how to sustain country auxiliaries.

The following were the suggestions on these topics: (1) Appoint Visiting Committees; appoint a Committee on personal work for the Lord; self-denial week ; quilts and mite-boxes for the children ; (2) that "at homes" at houses of members be given ; the Church members be canvassed for membership ; to distribute leaflets, especially in the country; missionary prayer-meeting; missionary teas; give information in a popular way by tourists' letters, etc.; hold public meetings quarterly, use your own people. On the question of how to sustain country Auxiliaries, where the appointments are far apart, some Auxiliaries hold monthly meetings at each appointment; these have their officers who transact the business. All meet once a quarter, at the same time as the quarterly official business meeting, when the quarter's work is reviewed, and the officers of the different appointments report to the officers of the head of the circuits, who alone report to the Branch officers. By this means the interest is kept up, and the attendance at the monthly meetings is large. Mrs. Mason, of Muncey, gave an interesting account of the only Indian Auxiliary in the Western Branch. In this Auxiliary, seven Indian women had raised \$20 last year. Answers to the question drawer were given by Mrs. Sutherland. Upwards of fifty questions were answered bearing on the work in its different phases. Much valuable information was gleaned from this source. The election of officers was the next business.

Summary of reports of Committees : That on District Work recommended :

That the duty of an organizer is to keep in communication with all Auxiliaries in the District, giving all the information and encouragement possible :

To repeat the request for co-operation to the minister on circuit each year, or as often as may seem expedient, and to appeal to the women of his charge; wherever practicable, to visit the domestic missions, and try to bring the women into sympathy with our work ;

That Associate Auxiliaries be organized, to report only through organizers ;

To hold District Conventions annually, and where Districts are not organized, to invite the ladies to a public meeting, with a view to promoting missionary interest.

Committee on Modes of Work recommended :

The holding of public meetings and conventions ;

The scattering of missionary literature, personal effort ;

A crusade day, work for special objects, special effort of each member to interest at least one other ;

Attractive programmes.

Resolutions passed : That the division of the Branch be left with the Executive Committee, who will report at next annual meeting ;

That two minutes be allowed for each Auxiliary report, the Secretary to

That a Corresponding Secretary be added to the officers of a Band ; That, if advisable, Mission Bands may be divided into senior and junior departments;

That the appointment of a Music Committee to provide selections of suitable music for Junior Mission Bands, be left to the Executive Committee.

Mrs. Platt gave following notice of motion :

In view of the length of time occupied each year with reports of Auxiliaries and Bands, and the necessity of omitting some of the most important, therefore Resolved, -That in future it is desirable for Auxiliaries to report to District Organizer, who will select from each the distinctive features and report to Branch.

BY-LAWS.

The election of officers in Auxiliaries, and of delegates to the Branch meeting, shall be by ballot, without nomination, and a majority vote shall be required. That organizers and officers be required to send in a statement of their expenses before September 15th of each year, as the Treasurer of the Branch is obliged to close her books on that date.

It was resolved that District Organizers be ex officio members of the Branch meeting, and have all the privileges of delegates.

The invitation from Queen Street Church, Toronto, for next annual meeting, was accepted.

MISSION BAND CORRESPONDING SECRETARY.

REPORT OF MISSION BAND CORRESPONDING SECRETARY, CENTRAL BRANCH.

Looking back over the year just closed, we feel much encouraged, and are able to report progress in every respect; increase of members, increase of funds, and very decided increase of spirituality, and knowledge of our work.

We have grown from fifty Bands to sixty-two; from 1,767 members to 2,086, being an increase of eleven Bands, and 319 members. Seventeen new societies have claimed our welcome; these are: Juvenile Band, in Aurora; St. Mark's Church, Peterboro'; Mission Circle, in St. Paul's Church, Brampton; Boys' Band, in Bowmanville; King Street Church, Cobourg; Highland Creek; Honeywood; Lakefield; Medcalf Street, Oshawa; St. George's Church, Peterboro'; Pickering; Coral Workers, Metropolitan Church, Toronto; Maple; Marmora; Springbrook; Warkworth; and Holloway Street, Belleville.

On the other hand, two of our Bands have been dormant, Central Church, Toronto, and Norwood; the former owing to the removal of their President, and the latter because of the death of both President and Vice-President within a few weeks of each other. Three of our Societies have united with Epworth League of Christian Endeavor, but these we do not consider lost to us-rather expect that they shall be incited to additional labor and consecration of means to God's cause. Saddest of all to report, three societies have disbanded during the year, Madoc, Mount Albert and Peterboro', the latter, however, to rise phœnix-like from its ashes, and reorganize with fresh material.

The money sent to the Treasurer, does not at all represent the work done, because there are very few bands that have not made substantial contributions, through the Supply Committee for our different Homes, while some of them have even gone beyond the limits of the Woman's Missionary Society and sent help to other objects. The burning of our Home at Chilliwhack roused the sympathies of our young people, and sent the needles flying in sympathetic fingers.

The letters received by the Secretary during the year have been very interesting, and she wishes to thank the Band Presidents and Secretaries for their kind and prompt attention. Some have told of lively interest maintained; many have borne witness to great spiritual gain; others have testified of intellectual growth in the study of the different countries; lessons of self-denial have been learned, papers prepared, addresses listened to, and many interesting and profitable open meetings have been held. Home mission work has not been neglected; sick and poor have been visited, flowers distributed, and bouquets sent to brighten the dreary days of shut-in-ones. McDougall Orphanage, Crosby Home and Coqualeetza Home have been faithfully remembered. A Chinese girl was supported at the Rescue Home; money sent to support a girl in the school which was expected to be opened in China; a handsome donation was sent to the French Institute, Montreal; and our treasury has been enriched by the efforts of our young people, to the sum of \$1,639.58.

EASTERN BRANCH.

REPORT OF THE CORRESPONDING SECRETARY OF THE EASTERN BRANCH, 1891-92.

How quickly the year has flown, and how gently the Lord has led us on ! Although we have not realized all we anticipated at the beginning of the year, we know the work is the Lord's, and the final triumph of the gospel is as sure as His promises. Eleven new Auxiliaries have been organized. They are : Carleton Place, Franklin Centre, North Gower, Calumet, Lakefield, Brock Street, Kingston; Point Fortune, Lansdowne, Portland, Drummond's, Brinston's Corners.

Number of Auxiliaries 1891, 63; 1892, 71; life membership, 54; total number of members, 1,756; increase of 317. Twenty-six Mission Bands with a membership of 600; increase of nine Mission Bands, and an increase in membership of 141. Receipts for the year, \$4,677.21; increase of \$645.42.

ANNUAL MEETING OF THE EASTERN BRANCH.

The ninth annual meeting of the Eastern Branch was held in the Methodist Church, Winchester, on October 5th and 6th, 1892. The first session opened at 9.30 a.m. Mrs. W. E. Ross, President, occupied the chair.

NINTH ANNUAL REPORT OF THE CORRESPONDING SECRETARY.

"History repeats itself," and the story of the disappointments and successes, the joys and sorrows of the past year, is very much the same as we have told every year since the organization of our Branch of the Woman's Missionary Society.

Governed, as we are, by the law of limitation, our growth has been, and must henceforth be, necessarily slow. We are glad, however, to report each year an onward march. Since our last report, we have dropped one from our roll of Auxiliaries, and have added six, as follows: Granville Ferry, North Sydney, Newport, Grafton, Cape Negro and Annapolis.

We are also glad to chronicle a growth of interest in Mission Band work. Many of our Band reports are aglow with loving service, patient continuance, and active faith, and we rejoice that so many of our communities realize the importance of encouraging and developing an intelligent interest in missionary work among the young. Our added bands are *Large Hart, of Burlington; Parbar Westward, of Middleton; Picket Guard, of Farmington; Forward Movement, of Gabarus, C.B.; Sunbeam, of Halifax South; Shelburne Willing Helpers, Canso Light Bearers, and Bridgetown Band. These youthful helpers have, during the past year, contributed to our funds \$1,289.06.

The treasury is the thermometer by which the warmth of our devotion to the missionary cause is generally tested. Early in the year we watched the mercury sinking until our hearts began to sink, too, at the prospect of a decrease in our income. But our workers only needed to know the danger in order to arouse themselves; and with the aggregate of a little more self-denial here, of more earnest prayer there, and of greater effort somewhere else to interest others, we are able to report a slight advance over last year's income.

We have lost largely by removals, and as in other years, many names have been transferred from the earthly to the heavenly roll of honor—thus our decrease in membership is almost equal to the increase.

It has been, indeed, with us a year of overcomings, but yet a year of undoubted blessing, for we remember that it is the overcomers who shall be made pillars in the eternal temple.

FIRST ANNUAL REPORT OF THE BRITISH COLUMBIA

BRANCH, 1891-92.

As we come together to-day in this, the first annual meeting, as a Branch of the Woman's Missionary Society, our hearts go out in gratitude to our heavenly Father for what He has permitted His humble agents to perform during the year. While there have been discouragements, still we are not discouraged, and believe that we can confidently assert, although our progress has been slow, that we are lengthening our lines and strengthening our stakes. Auxiliaries from which reports have been received show great vitality, and, in most instances, a decidedly progressive tendency. To many of our member the work is new, and the difficulties of inexperience confronts them, but loyalty to the Master's service, untiring zeal, and hearts heavily burdened for the salvation of perishing ones, will readily overcome whatever stands in the way, and will be ready to surmount difficulties, be they ever so great.

During the year two new Auxiliaries have been formed, the first in connection with the Princess Street Church, at Vancouver, almost immediately after the formation of this Branch, and although small in membership, is great in work. The second, organized recently by our Miss Cartmell, at Nanaimo; this Auxiliary, although but little over four months organized, shows signs of healthy activity. Though the field is new, the workers are earnest in their efforts, and with increased experience, and an ever-growing zeal in the Master's service, it will be the aim of our united membership to bring in all the women of our churches, so that, with a mighty force at work, no one can say, "Ne man careth for my soul." I cannot close this report without mentioning one to whom so much of the present condition of this Society in our province is due, namely, Miss Cartmell. To her entire devotion to the work, her thorough consecration to God's service, and persistent efforts in spreading the cause of Christian missions, we may attribute largely, under God's blessing, the position we to-day occupy. May our heavenly Father still be with and bless her, throwing round and about her His protecting care wherever it may please Him to call her to labor, is the earnest, heartfelt prayer of each and every member of this Branch.

MEMORIALS.

OF THE

WOMAN'S MISSIONARY SOCIETY

OF

THE METHODIST CHURCH.

ART. I.-NAME.

This Association shall be called "THE WOMAN'S MISSIONARY SOCIETY OF THE METHODIST CHURCH."

ART. II.-OBJECT.

The object of this Society shall be to engage the efforts of Christian women in the evangelization of heathen women and children; to aid in sustaining female missionaries and teachers, or other special laborers in connection with mission work, in foreign and home fields; and to raise funds for the work of the Society.

ART. III .- MEMBERSHIP.

The payment of one dollar annually, either at one time or in instalments, shall constitute membership; and twenty-five dollars given by one person at one time, or in instalments during the year, shall constitute a Life-membership.

ART. IV. -ORGANIZATION.

The organization of this Society shall consist of a Board of Managers, co-ordinate Branches, Auxiliary Societies and Mission Bands, to be constituted and limited as laid down in subsequent articles.

ART. V.-BOARD OF MANAGERS.

SECTION 1.—The management and general administration of the affairs of the Society shall be vested in a Board of Managers, consisting of the Officers of the Society, the Corresponding Secretary of each Branch, the editor of department in *Outlook*, and delegates from each Branch in the proportion of one to every four hundred members, or major fraction thereof, which delegates, together with two alteruates, shall be elected at the Branch Annual Meetings, said meetings to be held within two months before the meeting of the Board of

Managers. Said Board shall meet annually or oftener, at such time and place as it shall annually determine.

SEC. 2.—The Officers of the Board of Managers shall consist of a President, Vice-President, Recording Secretary, Corresponding Secretary, and Treasurer, who shall be elected by ballot at the Annual Meeting of the Board, and also the President of each Branch, who is by virtue of her office a Vice-President of the Board of Managers. Any vacancies occurring during the year shall be filled by the Executive Committee.

SEC. 3.—The President shall preside at all meetings of the Board of Managers and its Executive Committee; she shall sign all drafts and orders on the Treasurer, authorized by the Board of Managers and its Executive Committee; she shall call special meetings of the Executive Committee at the request of three of its members, of which not less than ten days' notice shall be given, except in cases of emer-She is ex officio a member of all standing committees. The gency. Vice-President shall perform the duties of the President in the absence of that officer. The Recording Secretary shall notify all meetings of the Board, and its Executive Committee, and shall keep a full record of the proceedings. The Corresponding Secretary shall conduct the correspondence of the Society with our missionaries and the different Branches; she shall prepare the monthly letters for publication, and the report of the work during the year for presentation to the Annual Meeting. The Treasurer shall receive all contributions to the Society, keeping proper books of account, and shall make such disposition of the funds as the Board of Managers and its Executive Committee may direct, each order of the Board and its Executive Committee being duly signed by the President of the Society ; and she shall present an audited statement to the Annual Meeting of the Board of Managers.

SEC. 4.—To transact business during the year, the Officers of the Board of Managers, with the Corresponding Secretary of each Branch, shall *ex officio* form an Executive Committee, five of whom shall form a quorum.

SEC 5.—The duties of the Board of Managers shall be: (1) To take into consideration the interests and demands of the entire work of the Society, as presented in the reports of the Branch Corresponding Secretaries, the reports of the agents employed by the Society, and the estimates of the needs of mission fields; to ascertain the financial condition of the Society, to appropriate its funds, to devise the means for the carrying forward of the work to be undertaken by each; suggesting the amount to be raised, employing suitable missionaries, as the work may require, and designating their fields of labor. (2) To appoint a committee to arrange for the publication of an Annual Report of the work of the Society. (3) To transact any other business that the interests of the Society may demand, provided all the plans and the directions of the Board shall be in harmony with the provisions of the Constitution. WOMAN'S MISSIONARY SOCIETY.

ART. VI.-BRANCHES.

SECTION 1.—Branches may be organized according to Conferences. This plan, however, may be changed by an affirmative vote of three fourths of the Board of Managers present at any Annual Meeting of the same.

SEC. 2.—The officers of each Branch of the Society shall consist of a President, three or more Vice-Presidents, Recording Secretary, Corresponding Secretary, Mission Band Corresponding Secretary, Treasurer, and an Auditor, who shall be elected at the Branch Annual Meeting, and shall continue in office till others are elected. These, with the exception of Auditor, shall constitute an executive committee for the administration of the affairs of the Branch, five of whom shall be a quorum.

SEC. 3.—The President or one of the Vice-Presidents shall preside at all meetings of the Branch and of its Executive Committee. She shall sign all drafts upon the treasury before they are paid. The Recording Secretary shall notify all the meetings of the Branch, and of its Executive Committee, and shall keep a full record of the The Corresponding Secretary shall, under the direction proceedings. of the Executive Committee, conduct any official correspondence with the other Branches, with its Auxiliaries, hereinafter mentioned, and with the Secretary of the Board of Managers, and shall endeavor, by all practicable means, to form Auxiliary Societies within the prescribed territory of the Branch. It shall also be her duty to prepare for the Annual Meeting of the Board of Managers a report of the work of the Branch during the year, for publication in their Annual Report. The Treasurer shall receive all contributions to the Branch, keeping proper books of account, and shall forward the money quarterly to the Treasurer of the Board of Managers.

SEC. 4.—The Executive Committee shall meet at the call of the President and Secretary as often as may be necessary, to transact any business that may arise between the annual sessions of the Board.

SEC. 5.—No Branch shall project new work, or undertake the support of new missionaries, except by the direction or with the approval of the Board of Managers.

SEC. 6.—Each Branch may make its own by-laws, regulating its own meetings and those of its Executive Committee, also any others which may be deemed necessary to its efficiency, not inconsistent with this Constitution.

ART. VII.—AUXILIARY SOCIETIES.

Any number of women contributing at least one dollar each annually may form a Society auxiliary to that Branch of the Woman's Missionary Society within whose prescribed limits they may reside, by appointing a President, one or more Vice-Presidents, a Recording Secretary, a Corresponding Secretary, and a Treasurer, who together shall constitute a local Executive Committee.

CONSTITUTION OF THE

ART. VIII.-RELATION TO THE MISSIONARY SOCIETY.

SECTION 1.—This Society shall work in harmony with the authorities of the Missionary Society of the Methodist Church, and be subject to their approval, in the employment and remuneration of missionaries or other agents, the designation of fields of labor, and in the general plans and designs of the work.

SEC. 2.—All missionaries or other agents supported or aided by this Society shall be approved, before appointment, by the constituted authorities of the Methodist Church, and shall be subject to the same rules and regulations as other missionaries or agents of the said Church.

ART. IX. - CHANGE OF CONSTITUTION.

This Constitution may be changed at any Annual Meeting of the Board of Managers by a two-thirds vote of each Branch delegation, notice of such amendment having been given to each Branch before its Annual Meeting; but Art. VIII. shall not be changed, except with the concurrence of the General Board of Missions of the Methodist Church.

By-LAWS.

1. The Corresponding Secretary of each Branch shall be required to furnish in her report, in schedule form, to the Annual Meeting of the Board of Managers, the following items :---

3. The General Treasurer shall publish each quarter, in the Outlook, the moneys received by her.

4. When Delegates to the General Board are elected at the Branch Annual Meetings they shall meet at once, and select three of their number, who shall be members of the Nominating Committee. These three shall decide to which committee said Branch delegates shall belong, and shall report the same to the Corresponding Secretary of the Board of Managers not later than three days previous to the meeting of the Board.

5. Certificates of Membership may be granted to members of any Auxiliary who may be changing their place of residence, which shall constitute them members of the Auxiliary in the place to which they remove.

6. It shall be the duty of the Editress of the Woman's Missionary Society Department of the *Outlook* to publish articles relating to our own work; and also to select and publish items of interest concerning the work and modes of working of the Woman's Missionary Societies of other denominations.

7. All solicitations for funds for Special objects, excepting those legitimately belonging to the Supply Committee, before being introduced to the notice of our members, through any agency of this Society, shall be referred to and receive the approval of the proper authorities, namely, this Board or its Executive.

8. Any Branch may arrange for representation, by proxy, from the Branch within whose limits the Annual Meeting of the Board of Managers may, from time to time, be held.

9. All memorials and resolutions forwarded to the Board of Managers of this Society shall be officially signed and dated.

10. RELATING TO JAPAN.—If any money be not required for the object for which it was appropriated, it may be used for any other purpose which the Council may recommend and the Executive approve; and any surplus funds from native sources may be used under the direction of the Council.

RESOLUTIONS PASSED AT ANNUAL MEETINGS.

1883. Resolved,—That all expenses of the Annual Meetings of the Board, and of meetings of the Executive, including travelling expenses, shall be paid from the General Fund.

1884. Resolved,—That printed (or prepared) forms be issued by the General Board to all homes, refuges, schools, etc., supported by the Woman's Missionary Society, in order that proper returns may be made of the number, names, days' stay, age, sex, etc., of inmates, sources of income, and expenditure of the same, in detail, so that the cost of such institutions may be ascertained in order to have a basis on which grants may be made from the aforesaid Society to support such institutions, and that such reports be sent to the Corresponding

CONSTITUTION OF THE

Secretary of the General Board not later than the 1st of September each year.

1885. Resolved,—That the Annual Meeting be held in the third week of October, leaving power with the President and Corresponding Secretary to postpone to the fourth, if necessary.

Resolved,—That the Secretary of each Branch shall furnish a condensed account of their Annual Meetings, to be published in the Report.

Resolved,—That the members be requested to remember this Society in prayer, between the hours of five and six each Sabbath.

1886. Resolved,—That each institution under the care of this Society be requested to furnish quarterly reports.

1887. Resolved,—That the Auxiliaries and Mission Bands be requested to confine their efforts in mission work to the objects named by our Society at the last preceding Annual Meeting of the Board of Managers.

Resolved,—That, in order to equalize the distribution of supplies to missions, a Supply Committee be appointed, with whom missionaries wishing for goods, and Auxiliaries desiring to supply the same, shall be requested to communicate; and that the Auxiliaries shall be credited with the goods sent, but in no case shall the funds of the Auxiliary be used for the purchase of material or the payment of freight.

1888. Resolved, — That the names of life-members shall be printed with the Auxiliaries where they reside.

Resolved,—That in the election of delegates to the Branches and General Board, a majority vote be required.

1889. Resolved,—That when any change of Constitution is requested, notice of such change shall be published in the Guardian, Wesleyan and Outlook, not later than the middle of September preceding the Annual Meeting, and that this be considered sufficient notice to the Branches.

Resolved,—That members contributing over \$1.00 have the amount entered opposite their names.

Resolved,-That reports of Auxiliaries be limited to five lines.

1890. Resolved,—That the last Wednesday in September be observed throughout our entire membership as a day of special prayer for God's blessing on the approaching Annual Branch and Board Meetings.

Resolved,—That the names of life-members of Mission Bands be printed in the Annual Report.

Resolved,—That auditors be appointed to the Board of Managers and Auxiliaries.

Whereas, believing the earlier publishing of our report will be more helpful to our work, therefore be it *Resolved*,—That the committee be instructed to engage the Book Room to publish our report in the month of November of each year; and that all matter for the report, except the minutes of the Board meeting, shall be handed to the committee not later than the last day of the Board meeting.

Resolved,—That the names of, and amounts given by contributors to special purposes, be printed in a separate column or columns of the Annual Report.

Resolved,—That the General Board make appropriations for all their work, and that no special appeals be made to our Auxiliaries, but that all our funds pass through the hands of Branch and Board Treasurers.

Resolved,—That each Auxiliary be responsible for the number of letters sent; the method of payment to be left to the Auxiliary.

Resolved,—That each Auxiliary inform the Corresponding Secretary of the Branch of the number of monthly letters required by it for the year.

Resolved,—That the salaries of those ladies who return to the work in Japan after the first full term of five years, be increased to seven hundred dollars for each of the first five years of the second term, and eight hundred dollars for each succeeding year.

1892. *Resolved*,—That all money received from legacies be used for special purposes, unless the object for which it is to be used be specified by the donor.

Resolved,--That orders for Annual Reports, Monthly Letters and Quarterlies, be sent to the Literature Committee, Room 20, Wesley Buildings, Toronto, instead of through Corresponding Secretaries of Branches, the money to accompany each order.

Resolved,—That each lady appointed to Japan be allowed \$100 for outfit, and that during the first year of service her salary be twothirds of the fixed salary.

women in the evangelization of heathen women and children; to assist in sustaining female missionaries and teachers, or other special laborers, in foreign or home fields; and to raise funds for the work of this Society.

ART. III.—MEMBERSHIP.

Any person paying annually the sum of One Dollar, at one time or in instalments, to the funds of this Society, shall be deemed a member, and as such shall be entitled to be present at the Annual Meeting of the Society, and vote at the election of Officers. Twenty-five Dollars given by one person at one time, or in instalments during the year, shall constitute a Life-membership.

ART. IV.-OFFICERS.

The Officers shall consist of a President, one or more Vice-Presidents, a Recording Secretary, Corresponding Secretary, and Treasurer, to be elected from among the members, at the Annual Meeting.

ART. V.-COMMITTEE.

A Committee of —— ladies shall be appointed annually, who, with the Officers, shall constitute an Executive Committee, who shall conduct the affairs of the Auxiliary during the year.

ART. VI.-ANNUAL MEETING.

An Annual Meeting shall be held in the month of September, at which the reports of the Secretary and Treasurer shall be presented, an abstract of which is to be forwarded immediately to the Secretary of that Branch of the Woman's Missionary Society to which the Auxiliary belongs; Officers, *Auditor* and Committee elected for the ensuing year, and such services held as may tend to promote the objects of the Society.

ART. VII.—FUNDS.

The funds of this Society shall be derived from membership fees, the proceeds of missionary socials, sewing circles, or the like, and from voluntary donations by friends.

ART. VIII.—APPROPRIATION OF FUNDS.

After meeting necessary local expenses, the funds raised by the Auxiliary shall be transmitted quarterly to the Branch Treasurer, to be applied to the support of such part of the work as the Central Board of Management may indicate.

NOTE.—Any Auxiliary having a preference for any special department of the work is at liberty to designate it.

WOMAN'S MISSIONARY SOCIETY.

BY-LAWS FOR AUXILIARIES.

1. It shall be the duty of the President to preside at all the meetings of the Society, and to supervise its general interests. She shall call special meetings upon the request of three members, and shall be *ex officio* a member of all standing committees. She shall sign all drafts upon the treasury before they are paid.

2. It shall be the duty of the Vice-Presidents to perform the duties of the President in the absence of that officer, and to aid in devising means for the efficiency of the Society.

3. The Recording Secretary shall keep a fair record of the proceedings at all meetings of the Society or Committee, and give proper notice of all special and stated meetings.

4. It shall be the duty of the Corresponding Secretary to report quarterly to the Corresponding Secretary of the Branch the amount sent to the Branch Treasurer for the quarter, and any other items indicating the state of the Society. She shall, in connection with the Recording Secretary, prepare the Annual Report.

5. The Treasurer shall receive, hold and keep an account of all money given to the Auxiliary, and shall transmit the same quarterly to the Branch Treasurer, not later than the 20th of the month.

6. Meetings of the Society for prayer and business shall be held ——of each month. Once a quarter, if practicable, a public meeting shall be held, in which reports shall be read, addresses given and every effort made to increase general missionary intelligence and zeal, as well as earnestness in the special work of the Society.

7. There shall be a Standing Committee of three or more to provide literary exercises of a missionary character for monthly and quarterly meetings, one of whom shall drop out each month, and another be elected to take her place.

8. If an office becomes vacant by death, resignation, or removal, it must be filled by the appointment of the Executive Committee, until the next Annual Meeting.

9. Each lady connected with this Society shall try to induce others to become members, and shall do what she can to add to the general interest, remembering in prayer daily the Society, its workers, missionaries, orphans, or other special interest.

10. At the Annual Meeting of each Auxiliary in September, or such other meeting as may be most convenient, delegates to the Branch Annual Meeting shall be elected in the proportion of one for every Auxiliary numbering under fifty, and two for every Auxiliary numbering fifty or more.

11. A lady shall be appointed in each Auxiliary to obtain subscribers for the *Outlook*.

12. Membership fees must be forwarded in full to the Branch Treasurer. Local expenses must be met out of other funds.

MISSION BANDS.

1. An Association of young people, banded together to aid the Woman's Missionary Society of the Methodist Church, shall be called a Mission Band Auxiliary to the Missionary Society of the Church in which it is found, or to the Branch in whose territory it is.

2. The object of Mission Bands shall be, primarily to develop a missionary spirit, and secondarily, to raise funds to send the Gospel to the heathen.

3. Any one may become a member of the Mission Band by the annual payment of twenty-five cents, and may become a life-member thereof by the payment of five dollars.

4. The Officers of a Mission Band shall be President, Vice-President, Recording and Corresponding Secretaries and Treasurer, and a Committee to arrange the best methods of work; these and an Auditor shall be elected annually.

5. The duty of the President shall be to preside at all stated meetings, and to have a general oversight of the work of the Band.

6. The duty of the Secretary shall be to keep a record of the proceedings of the Band, and make an annual report to the Missionary Society to which it is Auxiliary, or to the Branch in whose bounds it is.

7. The Treasurer shall receive and hold all funds, paying the same annually to the Treasurer of the Auxiliary or the Branch in which the Band is formed.

8. Each Mission Band must select an appropriate name not already in use, and report the same to the Society to which its money is sent.

9. Any Mission Band numbering forty members or over shall be entitled to send one delegate to the Branch Annual Meeting, but she shall not be eligible to any office in the Branch, or election to the Board of Managers, except she be a member of an Auxiliary.

REQUIREMENTS FOR MISSIONARY CANDIDATES.

REQUIREMENTS FOR MISSIONARY CANDIDATES.

1. A missionary candidate must believe herself divinely called to the work of a foreign missionary, and assert her belief that she is actuated only by a desire to work in accordance with God's will.

2. She must here indicate her ability to work in a foreign field by Christian usefulness at home.

3. She must declare her intention to make foreign missionary work the service of her effective years, and agree to give at least five of these years of continuous service, as a single woman, to the work of the Woman's Missionary Society, unless prevented by ill health; she must also assert her willingness to labor in any field, though her preference is always to be taken into account.

4. She must furnish satisfactory testimonials in regard to scholarship, and we regard some experience in teaching and a knowledge of medicine and nursing as desirable qualifications.

5. The age of a candidate must not be less than twenty-two years, nor more than thirty. A thorough intellectual training, with a facility in acquiring languages, and a remarkable ability for Christian work, may be considered as a sufficient reason for deviation from this rule.

6. Financial and executive ability, and power of adaptation to circumstances, are essential qualifications.

7. She must present a certificate of health from a competent physician, and give satisfactory answers to medical questions.

8. Resolved, That every missionary candidate be required to sign the following contract :---

1st. I, ——, agree to conform to the above requirements and conditions while in the employ of the Woman's Missionary Society, and failing in this, to refund the amount of outfit and passage money.

2nd. After the adoption of a missionary candidate, she shall be regarded as under the direction of the General Executive Committee.

9. That missionary candidates be recommended by the Branch in which they reside, before their testimonials are considered by the General Executive, that there must be a personal interview with at least two members of the Executive before final acceptance.

4. Have you an earnest desire to win souls for Christ, and how has this desire been manifest in the past?

5. Do you believe in the doctrines of the Methodist Church, as set forth in the Book of Discipline of said Church?

6. Have you a thorough English education ?

7. Have you studied Latin or any modern language; what proficiency have you made, and do you readily acquire the same?

8. In what schools have you taught, and with what success?

9. Have you a knowledge of music, either vocal or instrumental.

10. What is the condition of your health?

11. Have you ever been married? If so, is your husband living?

12. Will you answer by testimonials to each of these questions?

INSTRUCTIONS TO MISSIONARIES.

They shall incur no expense during the year to be met by this Society for which estimates have not previously been submitted to, and approved by, the Board of Managers at its Annual Meeting, or by its Executive Committee.

They shall credit to the Society all donations received for the support of their work, and annually report the same with their financial statement.

All solicitations for funds for special work must be made through the proper official authorities, and missionaries are requested not to apply to private sources for aid for support of their work.

A medical missionary shall keep an itemized account of all receipts and disbursements. Such receipts may be used for necessary expenses in the medical work, and any surplus shall be credited to the Woman's Missionary Society. We recommend that, when practicable, such arrangements shall be made for the duties of our missionaries, during their first year's service, as shall allow them considerable time for the study of the language.
