# Gallantry and Determination of The Canadians Save The Situation, Says War Office, But Losses Are Heavy Major Frank Magee's Guns Lost But Brilliantly Re-taken

Four Guns Left When Retirement Forced But, In Bril-GERMANS' SECOND DRIVE liant Charge, The Boys Gain Them Again **And Capture Many Germans** 

"Their Conduct Has Been Magnificent," is Tribute of Highest Military Circles -- Specially Commended by the British Commanders -- Were in Thick of it, Evidently at Famous Hill No. 60

London, April 24—The War Office today gave out the following official note:

"The fight for the ground into which the Germans penetrated between Steenstraate and Langemarck still continues. The loss of this part of the line laid bare the left of the Canadian division, which was forced to fall back in order to keep in touch with the right of the neighboring troops.

"In the rear of the latter had been four Canadian 4.7 guns, which thus passed into the hands of the enemy. But some hours later the Canadians made a most brilliant and successful advance, recapturing these guns and taking a considerable number of German prisoners, including a colonel.

"The Canadians had many casualties, but their gallantry and determination undoubtedly saved the situation.

'Their conduct has been magnificent throughout."

MAJOR FRANK MAGEE'S GUNS Ottawa, April 24—The 4.7 guns with the Canadian division are part of the heavy artillery brigade. They are 60 pounders from Montreal under the command of Major Frank C. Magee, of the heavy artillery battery of Montreal. The officers are Major F. C. Magee, of St. John; Capt. G. E. Hall, Montreal; Lieut. W. A. Irving, Quebec; Lieut. J. A. Ryan, Montreal; and Lieut. W. H. Robb, Montreal.

London, April 24—Discussing the I atest German effort to break through the British lines at Ypres, the military correspondent of the Daily Mail says:—

"The critical moment has arrived. he immediate object of the Germans is the capture of Ypres, which they regard ed as the key to Calais. For this movement picked troops have been transported to the Flanders front as evidenced by reported reports from Holland and the elaborate troop mements in Belgium. The British blow at Hill No. 60 was an effort to strike first.

"If the German report of the capture of four heavy guns is true, the enemy must have made an advance of at least two or three miles, as heavy guns are never placed near the front, and often are four or five miles behind the advanced trenches.

"The Germans still are bringing up large reinforcements, throwing every available man into the gap. They have p robably half a million men available, without depleting the eastern front, and many men might be spared from Poland where the roads render military o perations impossible for thet present." London, April 24—The Dail Mail's correspondent in northern France, in a despatch describing the British attack on Hill No. 60, southeast of Ypres, says:

"The British success was due largely to the speed of the tunnel engineers, for the explosion of the British mines a nticipated by only a short time a similar move of the German engineers. Hill No. 60 is only 200 yards long. The fighting here has been more terribly concentrated than in any spot in history. The whole hill is mined, trenched, sandbagged and covered. # TO CALAIS BEGUN; SET

Retreat Admitted By General French And Paris War Office

Russians Again on Move Under General Tactical Plan of Allies and Fighting is Reported Along Almost Entire 800 Mile Battle Line

London, April 24—German troops have renewed their drive for Calais. This is the construction placed by British m ilitary experts upon the sudden offensive of the Kaiser's army in Flanders. Their assaults directed against Ypres and the allies' forces on the west bank of the Y pres Canal have resulted in victory for the time being, at least. That the allies have been forced to retreat is admitted by both Field Marshal Sir John French and the French War Office, though they attribute the Germans success to the use of asphyxiating bombs.

It is apparent that Germany, though possibly terribly weakened by the burdens placed upon her army in the west ern and eastern theatres of war, is still able to fight vigorously. The German t roops in Flanders are believed to number 506,000 and more are steadily arriving. The opinion of the military experts here is that the German general staff has withdrawn great forces from the eastern theatre and transferred them to F landers, as recent despatches from Berlin have reported no late levies, though they assert that there are still five million men in the empire who can be deaw n upon if necessary.

RUSSIA STRIKING

With the Germans on the advance in the west, the general scheme of operations laid down by the allies is again being carried out. Russian hosts are again on the move. Late despatches fr om Petrograd report action along almost the entire 800 mile battle line extending from the Baltic to Bukowina.

If the Germans have weakened their forces in the east to strengthen them in the west, it is almost a certainty that the vulnerable spot will be found by the Russian leaders. Interest outside of that as regards Flanders is directed again to the Carpathians and the Vistul a front. The British believe that in one of these regions the next great Russian blow will fall.

While the belief still exists that a naval battle is soon to be fought in the North Sea, attention previously given to that situation, and to the Dardanelles has been diverted to the more important land operations almost at England's door.

GERMANS RUSH TO FRONT New York, April 24—A special to the London Daily Express and New York Herald from the Belgian frontier, says:

The entire area west of the Bruges--Courtral road is said to be literally flooded with Germans. The Germans appear to be staking everything on this tremendous effort.







One cable says that the entire area west of the Bruges-Courtral road is said to be literally flooded with Germans. Another says that picked troops have been transported to Flanders, and every available man is being thrown into the gap, and that the Germans have probably half a million men available for the struggle. One correspondent says that they appear to be staking everything in a tremendous effort to capture Ypres. Perhaps the most desperate battle of the war in the western theatre has already begun. The Canadians will be in the thick of it, and it may be hoped that, having knowledge of the situation, the British, French and Belgians will be able to show the numcircal superiority which has been claim—

But we are also told that all Britain is watching the North Sea for signs of a great naval conflict which is believed to be imminent, although no definite information as to the scene of the expected battle has been given out. AEROS STROVE FOR TWO HOURS OVER VALLEY


Bird-like Machines Manoeuvred and Countered in Determined Struggle For Advantage-Germans Were Worsted

London, April 24—Peaceful residents of the Rhine Valley from the Swiss frontier to Muelhausen were enthrailed one evening recently by the awe-inspiring spectacle of one of the most determined aerial engagements which this war has developed, according to a despatch from Geneva.
