CAREFULNESS, PROMPTNESS AND

"THE value of the report to the City of Saint John will depend on the carefulness with the promptness and thoroughness with which those nmendations which meet your judgment are put in practice." Thus wrote Dr. Horace L. to His Worship the Mayor, when submitting the survey of the Citizens' Research Bureau a month ago. It will be noted there are three points emphasised, carefulness, promptness and thoroughness. Doctor Brittain had finished the work he contracted to perform, and put it up to the Mayor and Council with a threefold

The month that has elapsed since the Brittain report was presented has produced other important issues in the form of harbor nationalization. and it is realized that the urgency of this latter possibly transcends that of civic reform and reconstruction, in that the draft bill must be ready for the Dominion Parliament when, or soon after, it reassembles following the Christmas recess. The city and county estimates also must be prepared, and these two matters may have necessarily diverted from the Brittain report attention it would otherwise have received. Nevertheless a Council is so constituted and its work is so arranged that a variety of matters can be, and necessarily are, granted concurrent attention.

The Brittain report has undoubtedly been reauthor. The Mayor and each Commissioner must Tommy Mitchell, the Canadian lightweight, lost certainly know by now how each intends to vote his title to Cliff Graham after boxing six rounds on the points raised. It must be remembered that if certain recommendations be adopted a bill must be prepared for submission to the Provincial Legislature, and for that there is need for speed without haste. Beyond these matters requiring legislation there are other far-reaching recommendations in the Brittain report which, if adopted to influence this year's tax bills, will have to be put in opera-

Doctor Brittain advised carefulness, promptness and thoroughness. The month has passed since the submission of the report plainly indicates the careful consideration it has been accorded. MR. CHAPLIN AND CHARLIE

THAT there was a world of difference between Mr. Charles Chaplin, private citizen, and Charlie Chaplin, the purveyor of mirth-none the less welcome because tinged with undeniable vulgarity-anyone who took the trouble to think about it must have known. Whether the gulf between the often sentimental buffoon of the screen and the husband and father who is Chaplin be so wide as Mrs. Chaplin asks the idol-worshipping public to believe is another matter. When one is playing for millions the best-or the worst and blackest case, so far as the opponent is concerned -is hardly good-or bad-enough. Certainly Mrs. Chaplin paints Mr. Chaplin as a double-dyed

Of course, with the withdrawal of charges gainst Mrs. Annie Semple McPherson, Los Angeles needed something of this sort—and Los Angeles has got it. But Mrs. Chaplin appears to be nowise averse to laundering some far from spotless linen in public. Her admission that she compelled her husband to marry her under threat of the penitentiary-presumably from what is already known for infringement of the Mann Act-and that she refused the offer of half a million dollars to release the film star, either indicates an amazing lack of comprehension of marital relationship or calls forth wonder whether the half million was inadequate. One can understand a girl whose fault has been too great a trust spurning the offer of money. It is more difficult to comprehend a girl marrying the man who sought to buy her off-not only marrying him, but compelling him to do so with threats. The man was willing to part with half a million to be free of her; what possible chance of happiness lay in marrying such? One would have imagined that a girl of this sophisticated century would have known that any disgrace were preferable to the hell she was laying up for herself. Either Lita Grey was abysmally ignorant or else she was then after more than half a million—as

It is a wretched, sordid business; and, except as a warning to other girls, its airing can do very little good. In times past the aphorism of false men and frail women was accepted with less reservation than it is today. The vamp is now an acknowledged type, and all the wrong-doing is not laid at the man's door in 1927. Mr. Chaplin may-or may not-have been all the brute Mrs. Chaplin says he is, and worse. Reading only Mrs. Chaplin's version, one is inclined to wonder what sort of wife she was to have about the house. Whther all this will affect Charlie Chaplin in the same way as scandal reacted on Fatty Arbuckle remains to be seen.

CANADIAN MAGAZINES

THE January number of The Canadian Magazine which, incidentally, is replete with fiction and special articles of the best, carries a particularly thought-provoking editorial. Contrasting the colorful romance of Canada's story with the drab presentation of Canadian history, the editor says: "No work on earth would give me more satisfaction than editing for young Canada a magazine that would gain their interest, inspire their hearts and teach them a patriotism founded on knowledge of the achievements of their forefathers. Such a magazine, however, is not commercially possible in Canada as long as similar periodicals edited for foreign children are dumped on the Canadian

fight with the foreign." If Canada is to remain essentially Canadian in spirit there must be Canadian literature, not for the book-reading public alone, but for the magazine-reading public as well. Canadian magazines are essential to Canadian development, commercial and intellectual, and Canadian advertising is essential to Canadian magazines. Because of the forces explained by the editor of The Canadian Magazine, our indigenous publications struggle against unfair competition in the form of United States magazines that sell Americanism, not Canadianism, and advertise American, not Canadian, goods. For the sake of Canada something must be done to foster Canadian magazines.

At the meeting of the Cumberland County farmers' Association at Amherst last evening one of the speakers said the farmers had become discouraged, and this had resulted in half-hearted farm-work. The farmers of the Maritimes have not been as fortunate as those in the Central Provinces, where steadily growing industrial centres provide a continually larger market for produce. ONE single important factor is lacking in the general well-being of the country at the present time—population. The work which must be undertaken is too great for the human capital which is at our disposal. But even in this respect there has been some progress. Immigration is increasing. It is certain to go on increasing much more in subsequent years. If we are only ready to advertise the country in a satisfactory manner and to make an intelligent selection of the settlers we intend to adopt, Canada will before long be the richest country in the universe.







The First Duty of Unhappily Married Wives is to Their Children-Mothers Have Many Sacrifices to Make and Among Luxuries That They Should Deny Themselves is That of Divorce," Says Dorothy Dix.

A WIFE, very much in love with her husband and totally unsuspicious of him, has accidentally discovered that while he was absent on a business matter in a distant city he became entangled in a peculiarly disreputable affair with an odious woman.

She writes me a letter in which she sets forth the tragedy that I have briefly outlined here and asks me if I do not think that she will be justified in ruining her husband, both professionally and socially, by publishing the story of his wrong-doing to the world.

Perhaps in strict justice under the hard

Perhaps, in strict justice, under the hard law that demands an eye for an eye, a tooth for a tooth, she would have the right to ruin her husband's life as he has ruined hers, to DOROTHY DIX

BUT this woman forgets, as many other women in the same hard circumstances also forget, that when a man and woman marry and have children, they have no right to consider solely themselves. There is something far more important than their own happiness or their own well-being to take into account. It is the good of their children.

THOSE who bring children into the world have given hostages to for-tune and, to my way of thinking, they are bound morally to do every-thing, to endure everything, to suffer everything that makes for the welfare of these helpless souls on whom they have thrust life.

PERSONALLY, I am not opposed to divorce when a couple have no children and they find it impossible to get along in peace together. I think they are a thousand times better off to separate and go their different ways. But when there are children in the family, the case is completely altered. Then divorce becomes a crime unless it is absolutely certain that the children will be contaminated by the association of an unworthy father or mother.

IT IS a terrible thing to break up a home and to deliberately make children half-orphans. It does them the deadliest wrong that can be done them on earth, for no man, no matter how hard he tries, can take a mother's place to children, nor can any mother, however devoted, supply a father's loss to them. It takes both parents in the atmosphere of a home to properly rear boys and girls and give them the right start and chance in life that is their due.

SO, FOR the children's sake, husbands and wives should be un-selfish enough to declare a truce and make the best of a bad bargain and keep the home together. At least until the boys and

THERE is also a practical side of the question, and any woman whose husband is a liberal provider should think a long time before she deprives her children of this support and the advantages which their father can give them. A woman's family may sympathize with her ever so deeply in her marital wrongs, but she will find out that they will not accept with very good grace the burden of her support when she divorces her husband and comes back home to live.

AS TO the wife revenging herself upon her husband by publishing his shame to the world, she forgets that she cannot disgrace him without disgracing her innocent children. His name is their name, and every shame upon it reflects upon them just as much as it does upon him. So long as they live her boys will bear that name, and if there is any stigma attached to it it will be a handicap every time they attempt to go into business or aspire to any position of honor or influence.

EVERYWHERE her daughters go people will whisper the secret that she made public and people will glance at them with that pitying contempt that cuts a sensitive soul to the quick.

Can any revenge be worth such a price? Could children ever forgive a mother who had brought this shame upon them for the sake of getting even with a man who has wronged her?

THIS view of the divorce question is not intended to condone men's infidelity, but to urge women who are unhappily married and who have children to remember that their first duty is to their children. Mothers have many sacrifices to make and among the luxuries that they should deny themselves is that of divorce.

TEXTILE INCREASES

MONTREAL, Jan. 12—The rise of Doninion Textile Company's stock to a new high around \$109 a share calls attention to the high investment value inherent in the holding of this company's stock during the past few years. Back in 1921 there were only 50,000 shares of common stock outstanding, which at the current value of around \$100 a share, represents a paper value of \$5,000,000. In November, 1922, 25,000 shares were offered to shareholders at par, in the ratio of one new share for etch two held. This new stock, then, represented a cost to the shareholders of \$2,500,000, making the total "cost" to them \$7,500,000. In January, 1923, new no-par stock was issued in the ratio of three shares for each share of the old stock, thus increasing the number of shares from 75,000 to 225,000. At the current market value referred to above, this stock would be worth \$24,-525,000 as compared with a "cost" in 1922 of \$7,500,000, showing a gain in the four years or so of \$17,025,000.




