

SEPTIC POISON FOUND CAUSE OF WOMAN'S DEATH

Fall From Hospital Bed Declared to Have Hastened It

SUGGEST GRADUATE NURSES IN WARDS

Evidence in Matter of Death of Mrs. Archibald Farris

That Mrs. Mary Maud Farris died in the General Public Hospital on Jan. 8, 1927, from septic poisoning, as revealed by the post mortem examination, hastened by shock caused by a fall from a hospital bed, and this jury recommends that in addition to a student nurse, a graduate nurse be also in attendance in each public ward at all times.

Such was the verdict rendered last night by the jury summoned to inquire into the cause of the death of Mrs. A. Farris. The jury, after listening to the evidence of 10 witnesses, was out 55 minutes. The inquest was held in the court room by Coroner H. A. Porter. Dr. A. E. Macaulay, the first witness, stated that he had been attending the deceased before her admission to the General Public Hospital on Jan. 7. It seems that she had caught a cold and he advised her removal to the hospital, where she would get good care. The deceased was admitted to the hospital on Friday, Jan. 7, at 1 o'clock and at 2 p. m. her temperature was 102.

DR. STRAPP In his evidence, Dr. G. A. Strapp, an interne at the hospital, stated that the deceased had been admitted to the hospital on Friday, Dec. 7, at 1 o'clock and he had examined her. At 5:30 p. m. he saw her again and she appeared somewhat better. At 8 o'clock he saw her again and noticed that her temperature was rising. She died at 10:45 p. m. on Saturday, Jan. 8, at 2 p. m. In company with the assistant superintendent's room and found a cut over her right eye about an inch long. He dressed the wound.

CROSS-EXAMINED Cross-examined, he stated that he did not think the wound on the head contributed to death. The deceased was very weak and at 1:30 a. m. Dr. Macaulay came. In his opinion an operation would not have saved her life. Questioned still further as to what time an operation would have been better, he stated that the afternoon of the very latest.

MISS LETA WILSON Miss Leta Wilson, assistant supervisor, sworn, stated that she had gone on duty at 6 p. m. She stated the history of the case to the point where Miss Beacom, a student nurse, reported the injury to deceased at 10:55 when she had gone to the room in company with Dr. Strapp.

MISS M. G. BEACOM Miss M. G. Beacom, sworn, stated she was a student nurse and had gone on duty at 7 p. m. the night in question. She stated that she had been conversing with the deceased about two minutes before the accident. She had remarked that she was feeling better. She left her to attend to some other patients and about two minutes later heard the fall. On returning deceased had thrown herself face down across a chair. She went to her assistance, and while she lifted her head back on the bed, deceased had thrown herself bodily from the bed. She (Miss Beacom) broke her fall and noticed the cut over eye. She went for assistance and reported the matter to Miss Wilson, who came with Dr. Strapp. Witness and another nurse in the meanwhile, placed the deceased back in bed.

MRS. JENNIE ATCHISON Mrs. Jennie Atchison, sworn, stated she was a sister of the deceased. Accompanied by the deceased's mother-in-law, Mrs. W. A. Farris, she had gone to the hospital with deceased at 10 o'clock. Deceased had remarked to them before they left, that she felt better and was looking forward to a good night's sleep. Deceased had five children, the eldest being 14 years and the youngest, nearly eight years. Deceased had a nervous breakdown last summer, when Dr. Curran had attended her. Cross-examined as to whether the deceased had informed her of her condition she said "no."

ARCHIBALD FARRIS Archibald Farris, sworn, stated he was the husband of the deceased. He stated that his wife had never complained to him when feeling sick. She visited her cousin, Mrs. Siegel, on Monday, January 8, and got her feet wet. She had come from Mrs. Siegel's before coming home. Tuesday she was not feeling so well and Wednesday she complained of severe pains across the shoulders. He applied hot towels and this eased the pain somewhat. He was home in the day time as he was working at night. Thursday she was calling for her sister, Mrs. Atchison, and Dr. Macaulay was summoned. He came the next day again and advised her removal to the hospital where she would get good care. Witness consented to her removal to the hospital. He went to work that

KELLOGG GIVES DOCUMENTS ON NICARAGUA

Says Reason to Fear Bolshevik Hegemony Being Set Up

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 13.—Doctory evidence of why the Government is concerned with the spectre of a Mexican-fostered-Bolshevik hegemony intervening between the United States and the Panama Canal was set out today by Secretary Kellogg.

Extensive quotations from declarations by Soviet leaders in Russia; resolutions adopted by the Communist party in Russia, the United States and Mexico; proceedings of the executive committee of the Communist International and the Red International, all proclaiming that Mexico and Latin America are the basis of Bolshevik attack to be led on the "Imperialistic United States," composed the principal part of Secretary Kellogg's statement. The statement was presented to the committee in the course of a detailed legislation of the administration's policy regarding Nicaragua.

READS DOCUMENT Reading portions of the document Mr. Kellogg emphasized that the concern of the United States government over conditions in Central America was not confined to the situation in Nicaragua. After a session of the foreign relations committee which was so prolonged that it necessitated a recess, and after having heard the secretary's statement, a nervous breakdown, but treated her for indignation. Montreal Woman Asks Annulment MONTREAL, Jan. 12.—A petition was presented to Mr. Justice Codrington in the Court here today to annul the marriage of Dame Mary Ellen Porter, a Roman Catholic, wife of the Montrealer Samuel Lapowitz, member of the Jewish faith. The marriage was performed by a Presbyterian minister. The petition made by Dame Porter states that no dispensation had been granted to her by the authorities of the Catholic Church to enable her to marry a non-Christian. Further, bans were not published as required and in addition the marriage ceremony by a Protestant minister was illegal, she contended.

STRUCK BY ENGINE FERNIE, B. C., Jan. 13.—Michael McNeil, brother of His Grace Archbishop McNeil of Toronto, was accidentally killed on the railway track of the Corbin Coal Company at Corbin, according to word reaching here. Mr. McNeil failed to see the approach of a heavy coal train, and was struck by the locomotive.

INVITE PREMIER BRUCE VICTORIA, B. Bruce of Australia by a chamber of commerce delegation yesterday. The delegates pointed out to Mr. Bruce the importance of the conference to all countries bordering on the Pacific.

Teachers In Russia Receive Pay of \$15 to \$20 Monthly

LONDON, Jan. 13.—Teachers and other intellectual workers in the professional classes in Russia received an average salary of between 80 and 40 rubles (\$15 to \$20) monthly, which is lower than the average wage for manual workers in industry, according to the latest issue of the official publication of the International Labor Office, just received here.

The report also discloses the threat by M. Tomsy of the Labor Commissary that the central council of the Russian Trade Unions would "proceed with severity" against labor organizations that attempt to obtain "excessive increases in wages," and that failed to comply with the decisions of the council and the government. The cost of living as shown by index figures (1913 equals 100) stood at 187 in September, 1925, and rose to 239 last May. There was a fall to 222 last September, the report says, but since then there has been another rise. Wages also have diminished 15 per cent in purchasing power within the past 18 months.

Meanwhile the Soviet government has approved the proposals of the committee providing relief for workers whose wages are below the average. These contemplate a disbursement of 200,000,000 rubles increase of wages in the twelve months from Oct. 1, 1926, to Sept. 30, 1927. It is stated that this "will allow only of a readjustment of wages in the case of those workers who are farthest below the general average, particularly miners and workers in certain branches of manual labor, on the railways and in the postal, telegraph and telephone service."

OVER MILLION PASSENGERS CROSSED OCEAN DURING 1926

Largest Increase Was Between Canada and the Old Country

MONTREAL, Jan. 13.—Over a million passengers were carried eastbound and westbound across the North Atlantic during the calendar year 1926 by the steamship companies represented in the North Atlantic Passenger Conference. Between January 1 and December 31, both dates inclusive, 1,090,588 persons were transported by these lines and landed at their destinations. This is an increase of 82,412 over the previous year, when the same companies carried 1,008,176 passengers across the Atlantic, according to available figures.

Dorothy Dix

The First Duty of Unhappily Married Wives is to Their Children—Mothers Have Many Sacrifices to Make and Among Luxuries That They Should Deny Themselves is That of Divorce," Says Dorothy Dix.

A WIFE, very much in love with her husband and totally unsuspecting of him, has accidentally discovered that while he was absent on a business matter in a distant city he became entangled in a peculiarly indiscreet affair with an odious woman.

OUTSIDE of this, he is a model husband and father. He is devoted to his attentions to his wife, kind, generous and considerate to her, a good provider and father who adores his four children and is worshipped by them.

THE wife, however, finds it impossible to forgive her husband's fault. She has brooded over it until it has wrecked her health and until the one idea of being revenged upon him has become a monomania with her.

She writes me a letter in which she sets forth the tragedy that I have briefly outlined here and asks me if I do not think that she will be justified in ruining her husband, both professionally and socially, by publishing the story of his wrong-doing to the world.

Perhaps, in strict justice, under the hard law that demands an eye for an eye, a tooth for a tooth, she would have the right to ruin her husband's life as he has ruined hers, to break his heart as he has broken hers.

BUT this woman forgets, as many other women in the same hard circumstances also forget, that when a man and woman marry and have children, they have no right to consider solely themselves. There is something far more important than their own happiness or their own well-being to take into account. It is the good of their children.

THOSE who bring children into the world have given hostages to fortune and, to my way of thinking, they are bound morally to do everything, to endure everything, to suffer everything that makes for the welfare of these helpless souls on whom they have thrust life.

PERSONALLY, I am not opposed to divorce when a couple have no children and they find it impossible to get along in peace together. I think they are a thousand times better off to separate and go their different ways. But when there are children in the family, the case is completely altered. Then divorce becomes a crime unless it is absolutely certain that the children will be contaminated by the association of an unworthy father or mother.

IT is a terrible thing to break up a home and to deliberately make children half-orphan. It does them the deadliest wrong that can be done to them, for no man, no matter how hard he tries, can take a mother's place to children, nor can any mother, however devoted, supply a father's loss to them. It takes both parents in the atmosphere of a home to properly rear boys and girls and give them the right start and chance in life that is their due.

SO, FOR the children's sake, husbands and wives should be unselfish enough to declare a truce and make the best of a bad bargain and keep the home together. At least until the boys and girls are grown.

THERE is also a practical side of the question, and any woman whose husband is a liberal provider should think a long time before she deprives her children of this support and the advantages which their father can give them. A woman's family may sympathize with her ever so deeply in her marital wrongs, but she will find out that they will not accept with very good grace the burden of her support when she divorces her husband and comes back home to live.

AS TO the wife revenging herself upon her husband by publishing his shame to the world, she forgets that she cannot disgrace him without disgracing her innocent children. His name is their name, and every shame upon it reflects upon them just as much as it does upon him. So long as they live her boys will bear that name, and if there is any stigma attached to it it will be a handicap every time they attempt to go into business or aspire to any position of honor or influence.

EVERYWHERE her daughters go people will whisper the secret that she made public and people will glance at them with that pitying contempt that cuts a sensitive soul to the quick. Can any revenge be worth such a price? Could children ever forgive a mother who had brought this shame upon them for the sake of getting even with a man who has wronged her?

THIS view of the divorce question is not intended to condone men's infidelity, but to urge women who are unhappily married and who have children to remember that their first duty is to their children. Mothers have many sacrifices to make and among the luxuries that they should deny themselves is that of divorce.

He spoke for the first time since his return from London, where he was in the French Canadian district to aid in the last few days of the campaign, having addressed the Antigonish branch of the party here last week in the two counties. Hon. Lucien Cannon, solicitor-general in the federal cabinet, is billed to address two meetings starting Friday.

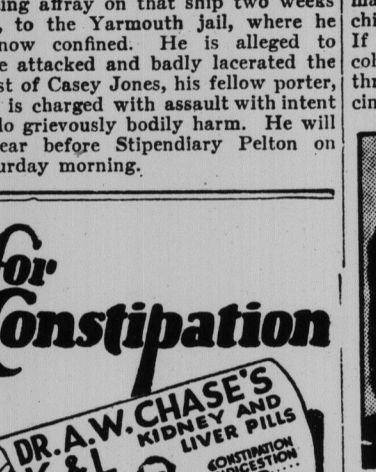
LONDON PARADE OPPOSE CHANGE

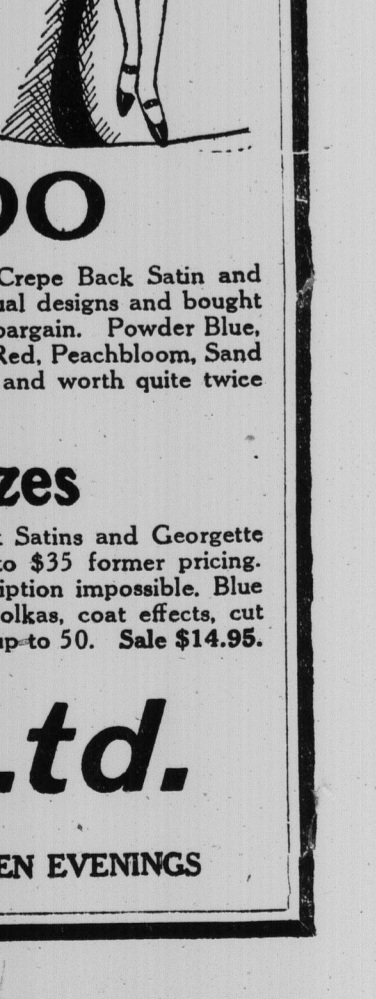
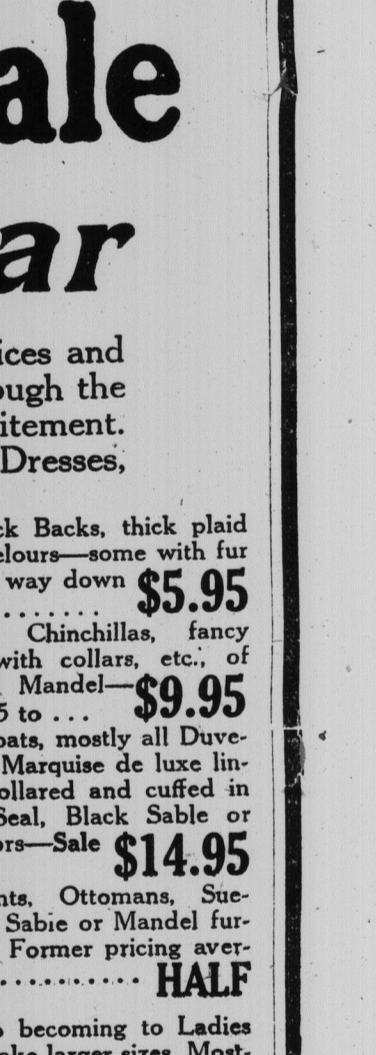

WIVES SCARCE IN TURKESTAN

Moslems Have Trouble Now Even Getting One for Harem

SAMARKAND, Russian Turkestan, Jan. 10.—With the men of Turkestan outnumbering the women three to one, polygamy is fast disappearing and men who once had as many as nine wives are now having a hard time getting one.

The Soviet census, just completed, shows the great disproportion of men to women in Turkestan. Indeed there is a virtual famine of women, especially those of marriageable age, which the local officials believe can only be met by the importation of women from other parts of the Soviet Union.

Turkestan's 10,000,000 population decreased last year nearly 20 per cent because of a sharp drop in the number of marriages and in the birthrate. The consequence of this is that the price of women and of marriages of 5,000 roubles which is quite beyond the reach of the poor man.

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(This is the eighth of a series of articles on his daily life and work by Benito Mussolini, as told to Thomas B. Morgan, Rome manager of the United Press. This series has been personally reviewed, corrected and approved by Premier Mussolini.)

ONE very useful assistance in pushing forward the day's work has resulted from our efforts to reduce the amount of talk to a minimum. The government offices were formerly the abode of babbling talk, with people dwelling on political gossip or hearsay from morning till night, commenting and recommending, forecasting and adjudicating, taking up the government's time and impeding the business of state. From my office down, this prevalence of wasted discourse is now at an end. Government employes cannot engage in protracted political chatter on the government's time. I am, severely and pre-emptively, no exception to a premier's time under the old regime. Some of them made it their principal activity. They devoted days and days to a single speech, copying and recopying, changing and adjusting, so as to make a great display before the people. Some even based their capacity to hold the office of premier on their ability to make a speech. Their administrative functions were subordinated to their oratorical reputations, and the government itself suffered for the lack of a thorough administrative policy. There is none of that today. Speech-making has been relegated to the background.

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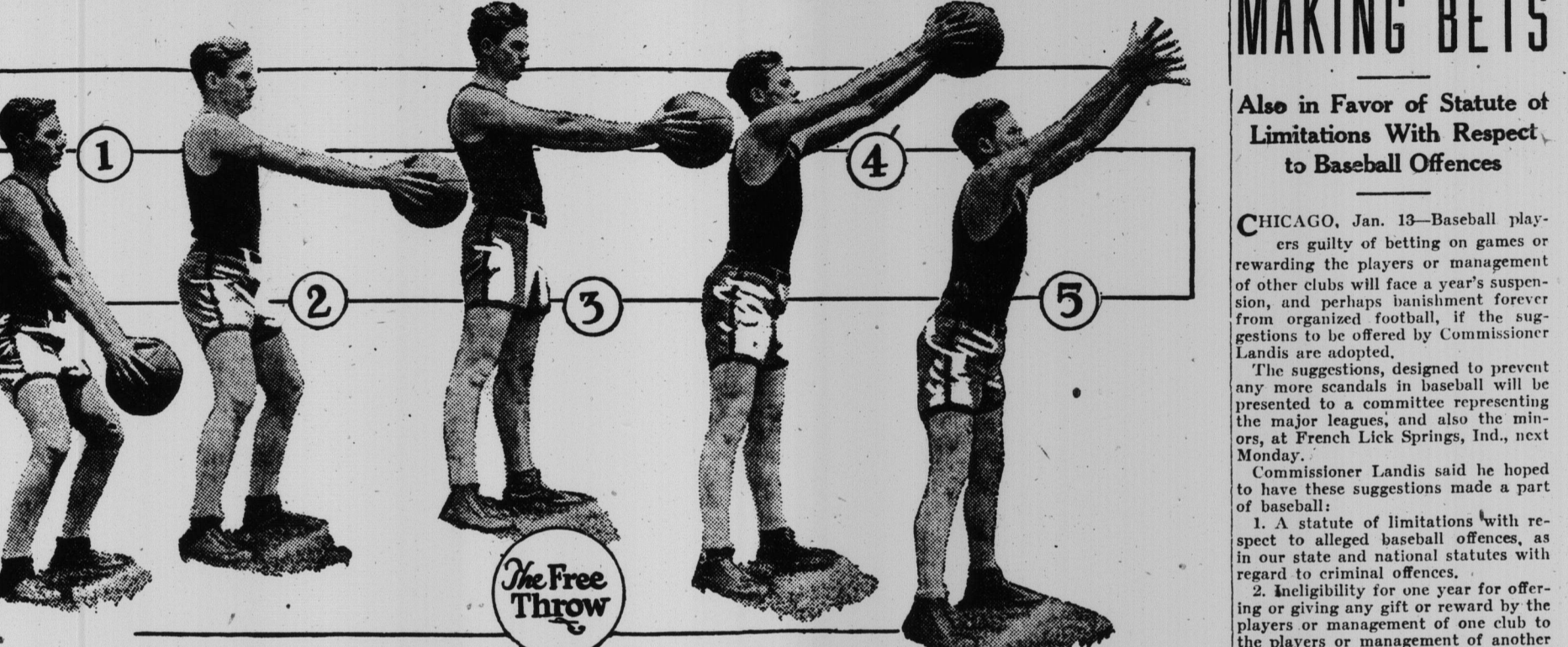
