

Sept. 19—A block of B6,000 shares of stock of the Canadian Pacific Railway Company. formerly held by the Imperial German Govern-ment, has been sold in the New York market according to information ob-tained. The block was part of a total of 58,000 shares held by Germany, the shares having been taken over by the Canadian Government under the terms of the treaty of Versailles. The sale was understood to have been effected by a banking group composed of Hay-den, Stone & Company, Dominick & Dominick, the Chase Securities Cor-poration, and Blair & Company, Inc. While the bankers said they did not care to discuss the operation. preferring that such information came from the Dominion Government, it was reported in a despatch from Germany that the offering was made at \$145 a share.
