FIFTEEN MINUTES OF RADIO EACH DAY

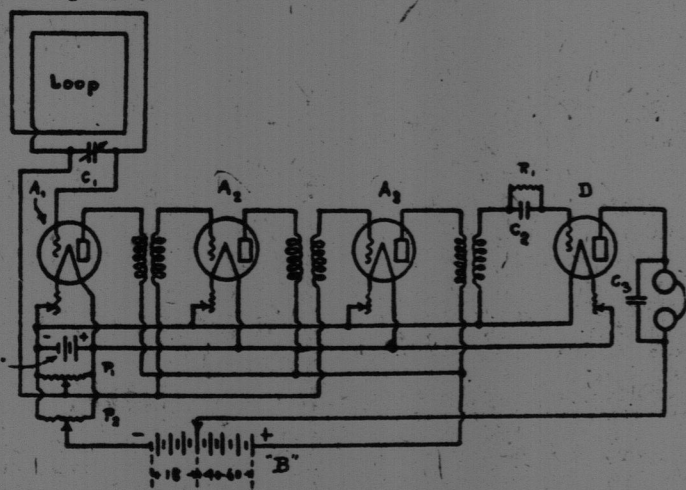

THE LOOP ANTENNA AND RADIO-FREQUENCY AMPLIFIER.

When conditions are not suitable for the erection of an outdoor antenna, a range of reception of several hundred miles may be obtained by employing a loop antenna for interception of the radio waves and then magnifying the minute amounts of energy, contained in the waves, by several stages of radio-frequency amplification before they are impressed upon the detector and converted into an audible frequency.

The combination of loop antenna and radio-frequency amplification offers several decided advantages. In the first place, the loop antenna permits a considerable reduction in interference from unwanted stations due to its directional characteristics whereby the strongest signals are obtained when the coil is rotated so that its plane points in the direction of the transmitting station from which the desired signals are radiated.



The accompanying diagram shows the arrangement of circuits for three stages of radio-frequency amplification and a detector, in combination with a small loop antenna. This antenna may be constructed by winding six turns of No. 14 B. & S. lamp cord on a frame three feet square, the turns being spaced approximately three-quarters of an inch apart with a tap to each turn.

denser (C-3) having a capacity of approximately .0025 to .0035 microfarads. Separate filament rheostats are utilized for the control of the respective amplifier and detector filament currents, these rheostats having a maximum resistance of approximately six ohms. Two potentiometers (P-1) and (P-2), each having a resistance of 200 to 400 ohms are connected across the terminals of the "A" battery. One of these potentiometers (P-1) is utilized as a "stabilizer" for the radio-frequency amplifier tubes, while the potentiometer (P-2) is used to give proper plate voltage variation for the detector tube.

SOME DEMANDS OF THE ALLIES IN LAUSANNE PACT

Draft Treaty to be Presented to Turks Tomorrow

Judicial Guarantees Which the Turks Refuse to Accept—Mosul Dealt with in a Few Words, to be Referred to Decision of the League of Nations.

(Canadian Press)

Lausanne, Jan. 30.—The draft treaty which the Allies will submit for Turkish signature on Wednesday bears the caption: "Project of the Treaty of Peace," thereby bearing evidence that the document is not necessarily definitive.

It provides that for at least five years Turkey will organize a corps of legal advisers. The Turkish Government will appoint a commission composed of two Turks and three justices of the Hague tribunal which will submit a list of foreign advisers.

The project for a convention for the administration of the Straits is a separate document. It stipulates that the Straits Control Commission may include a representative of the U. S.

The mysterious guarantee of non-aggression which Turkey demanded is found to be that, in case of any act of war or menace to the security of the demilitarized zones, the high contracting parties, and in any event, France, Great Britain, Italy and Japan, will hinder them conjointly by every means that the council of the League of Nations may lay down.

The treaty fixes the entire frontier of Turkey except that of Mosul. It gives Eastern Thrace to Turkey.

The financial clauses many of which Turkey has refused to accept are set forth in great detail.

DESIGN A SHIP THAT WILL FLY

It has a bow suggestive of speed and power with tapering lines, while sternward it finishes with a sea rudder. It has an engine and water screw for moving along the surface of the sea."

PRUNING THE CITY ESTIMATES

Council Decides to Increase No Salaries—Also Makes Substantial Cuts in Grants and Department Budgets.

Last evening at the committee meeting of the Common Council the matter of cutting the estimates to keep the tax rate down was discussed. It was decided to increase no salaries, to cut down the amount of civic grants, to pare the Public Works estimates, to wipe out harbor assessment and to cut down the lighting estimates.

At the opening of the evening session, Commissioner Wigmore's motion was put and carried without a dissenting voice. This settled the salary question and the council next took up consideration of the estimates in an endeavor to cut down the assessment.

The next items considered were those of the public works department and here a saving of \$20,775 was effected. \$5,000 was cut from the street cleaning estimate of \$85,000; \$18,100 was cut from the new street work estimate of \$23,000; \$208 was cut from the salary item, which had included salary increases voted at Saturday's committee session; and \$500 was cut from the \$2,000 estimate for the new West St. John playgrounds. Added to the \$1,250 cut Saturday night from the asphalt estimate, it makes a total of \$20,775.

Commissioner Bullock declared he was of the opinion that the harbor would support itself and, therefore, he was ready to fall in line and wipe out the \$10,400 estimate. This carried. There is no assessment being made for the water and sewerage department, so no reduction was possible here. Commissioner Thornton's item for \$42,671 for lighting called from Commissioner Bullock a query if he had counted on the cheaper price from the Musquash current. Mr. Thornton replied that he had not received any assurance that there would be any reduction.

Commissioner Bullock appealed to Mayor Fisher as a member of the Civic Power Commission. His Worship replied that the engineers could not exactly tell. The experience in Ontario towns had been that no saving was effected. However, that was because more lights were used and for one thing, in Ontario, they are not paying such high prices as are here. St. John paid \$93.75 per month.

"In Vancouver, they pay \$87 per light," remarked Commissioner Bullock. He went on to declare that if Musquash could not give the city cheaper light, then it was a myth. He hoped it would make a reduction and asked Commissioner Thornton if he could not make a reduction of \$5,000. Mr. Thornton declared his willingness to comply with the council's wish on the matter. He said he would mark it on the estimate as "less allowance for reduced price after May 1, \$5,000."

The grant to the Exhibition Association was placed at \$2,000 with a guarantee of \$2,000 in case of a deficit. The estimates of the school board also were adopted. Although a communication will be sent to the trustees requesting reduction.

VICTORY BONDS VALUABLE PAPER Rather Than Money, Decision of Judge.

Vancouver, B. C., Jan. 30.—"Victory bonds are valuable paper," rather than money, Mr. Justice McDonald declared in Supreme Court here in settling a dispute over the disposition of the \$13,000 estate of Honore La Roche of Victoria, who bequeathed "any and all valuable papers in my possession at the time of my death to St. Joseph's Orphanage." The estate was composed of 180 real estate and some worthless stocks.

The Cabinet will authorize the Minister of the Interior to adopt strong measures to suppress gambling.

TALK NEW SERVICE ON INDIANTOWN LANCASTER ROUTE

At a meeting yesterday afternoon of the finance committee of the Municipal Council a motion was put to discontinue the ferry service from Indiantown, but failed to pass. Finally a motion presented by Mayor Fisher that the contract with the present operators be not renewed and that tenders be invited by the Ferry Commission for a service after May 1, tenders to submit their own specifications, which must conform with government regulations, was passed unanimously.

The question of continuing the service was gone into thoroughly again with Councillors Thornton, Wigmore and Fisher expressing themselves as opposed to continuing the service. Councillor Frink thought that if a subsidy were granted a more satisfactory service might be obtained in addition to relieving the Council of any worry over the matter.

A financial statement was presented by George Mullin, secretary for the Ferry Commission, showing bills unpaid amounting to about \$700. Mr. Mullin also said that \$100 would be required for his salary and \$1100 for the present operators, making a total of \$1,900. The city, province and Lancaster parish will bear equal portions of this, making each share \$633.33. Lancaster already had provided for this in this year's assessment, as was pointed out by Councillor O'Brien. The city and province are to vote their share.

These significant facts were laid plainly before about three hundred commissioners, managers and engineers of the Hydro municipalities province by Sir Adam Beck last night at the annual banquet of the Association of Municipal Electrical Utilities of Ontario, held in the Prince George Hotel.

GOVERNING IN THE OPEN

(New York Tribune.) Governor Pinchot has started governing at Harrisburg with the lack of privacy which a humorous member of the environment of a goldfish. A big sign on the door of his workroom reads: "Governor's Office—Walk Right In." There are no formalities. Visitors may simply go to wait their turn while the Governor, in full view, receives all comers, answers the telephone and dispatches business as it piles up at his desk.

No hardened prevaricator is employed to ward off citizens at the outer portal with the formula: "The caller can see for himself what occupies the Governor. There has never been, we judge, a freer opportunity to see the Governor, steering his ship of state. Mr. Pinchot is getting as close to the people as he can. He is not an isolationist.

IRON, STEEL, METAL AND MACHINERY

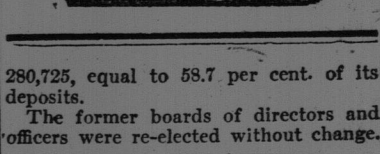

Scotland's Ain Game

(S. B. in Toronto Globe) For two, at least, of the finest outdoor sports in this world we are indebted to Scotland—golf and curling.

Curling, or an elementary form of the game, must have been played in Scotland not many years later than the discovery of America. It was introduced into Canada by some of the Scottish colonists—they had no objection to the name in those days—about the beginning of the nineteenth century.

Until recent years curling in Scotland was practiced under what Canadians would consider almost insuperable difficulties. Playing in the open on natural bodies of water or ice, the game was at the mercy of the weather, and usually could not be played during the daylight hours.

The game is also played to a certain extent in the United States, and from Minneapolis have won many laurels at Winnipeg bonspiels. The first club, on the other side of the line was formed in Michigan, as early as 1830.

Switzerland curling has come into great favor of recent years, and is more interesting still to scrutinize the names of some of the players. Two brothers named McGeogh, together with Gray, Macdonald, Rae and Kerr, were some of those who represented the rosette and the hearts of oak of old England; and of the Swiss players, three bore the fine old Scottish names of Craig, Lawson and Campbell.

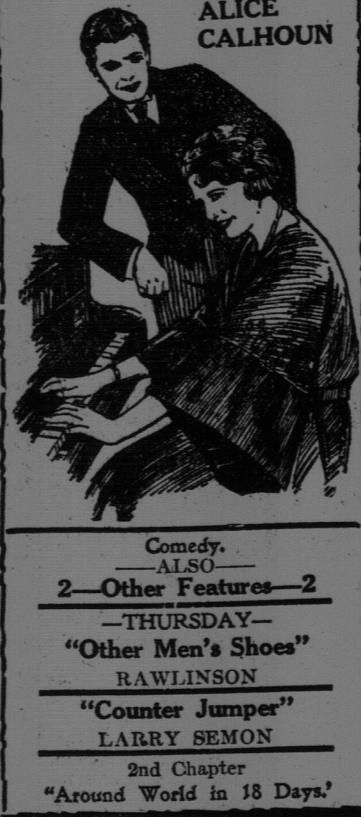
