Effective Statement by French Marine Minister

STEADILY DECLINING

Terpedoed Diminishing but More and More U-Boats Are Being Destreyed

Paris, Saturday, May 13—The effectiveness of the German submarine campaign is declining. The German government is aware of this fact, declared Marine Minister Leygues before the naval committee of the chamber of deputies on Saturday, but has made the greatest efforts to conceal it. He said the situation was most favorable and that the sinkings of submarines in the first three months of 1918 was greater than the number built by the enemy.

Minister Leygues referred to a statement made in the Reichstag on April 17 by Vice-Admiral Von Capelle, German minister of marine, in which he said that 600,000 tons of Allied shipping were sunk monthly. This figure, the minister said, was incorrect.

It was reached and passed in April, May and June of 1917. In July it declined and in November it fell below 400,000 and since had diminished continuously. The minister gave the following comparative table of the tonnage claimed to have been destroyed by Germany and the tonnage actually lost in the last five months:







## What It Costs Just To Live A Trifle Sporty

\$20 a Week is Needed For Average Canadian City Family

for Household Expenses Alone

The Labor Department at Ottawa has for years been keeping tab on the prices which Canadian consumers are paying for various commodities. It has, for instance, a family budget for food, fuel, rent, light and laundry starch which in March of 1914, before the war clouds had broken, averaged \$14.39 per week. This was the average figure for sixty cities of Canada. Today the figure is \$20 flat. And that figure includes no clothing, no gifts to charity, patriotic objects, or the church, no upkeep on the home, no boxes for overseas, no railway journeys, no carfare, no doctors' bills. It is the amount which the Labor Department calculates will keep a family alive and warm; that is, if there is a further amount expended for clothing. Here is the official record covering retail prices in sixty cities of Canada for a weekly family budget of food, fuel, rent, light, and laundry starch:






