SET ASIDE 325 ACRES FOR A PRISON FARM

Spokane, Wash., March 21.—Three hundred and twenty-five acres of agricultural land near Spokane will be set aside as a municipal farm, where violators of the city code can earn money while working out jail sentences, if an ordinance carrying an appropriation, to be introduced by Z. H. Hayden, commissioner of public safety, is adopted by the city council.

Commissioner Hayden thinks the farm can be placed upon a self-sustaining basis at the beginning. George W. Stocker, police judge, said in endorsing the plan: "I shall go through the city jail now and pick out many men I have sentenced for vagrancy and drunkenness who could be placed on the farm upon their honor. There they could rid themselves of the alcohol and the drugs which are destroying their bodies and minds, and at the same time earn money for themselves and dependents. I am also in favor of the authorities of Spokane county securing a tract near the proposed city farm to operate a similar institution for reclaiming delinquents."

Judge Declines to Go On Montreal, March 21.—In the superior court yesterday, Mr. Justice Headin, after presiding at the opening of the hearing of a case, stepped down from the bench, announcing that he had recognized in a witness one who had formerly consulted him on the case, and that thus he preferred that the matter should go to another judge.

British Parliamentarians Figuring Out Possibility of Defeating Government

Balfour to Lead Opposition to Coal Bill—Meanwhile Distress is Acute and Conditions Grow Worse—Starving Men Appeal to Mayor for Help

(Canadian Press) London, March 21.—The political possibilities dependent upon the coal bill are overshadowing the main question in the lobby of parliament. The resignation of the government became the paramount topic and it was reported by the Daily Mail that agents of the liberal party in the country had been hurriedly warned to prepare for a general election. It is said that if the government resigns the Unionists are prepared to take office.

The liberal papers admit the gravity of the political crisis, and flatly accuse official conservative members of making proposals to the laborites for a joint attempt to wreck the minimum wage bill. They still believe, however, that a compromise is possible on the basis of the government consenting to include in the bill five shilling minimum for men, women and two shillings a day for boys, but in no case will they insert in the bill the miners' schedule as demanded by the miners' conference. If the government is unable to get a majority without inserting this schedule, it will abandon the bill, let the strike continue, or resign.

The vital division on the bill will, it is expected, be taken about midnight. The present state of the parties is as follows: Unionists 78, Liberals 298, Labor, 42.

Canadian Families Seek Part of Big Holland Fortune

Geoph, Ont., March 21.—A fortune, estimated at five millions sterling, awaits the next of kin of Peter Taylor, an Amsterdam millionaire, formerly a native of Falkirk, Scotland. A firm of Scottish lawyers is now sifting the credentials of several hundred applicants.

When Taylor migrated to Holland, he engaged in the grain business and became a prominent merchant, accumulating a fortune which he left in trust for 100 years. In Fergusa, a few miles from here, are several families who say they are relatives.

DOUBLE MURDER AS RESULT OF JEALOUSY

Vienna, March 21.—A horrible tragedy, the result of jealousy, is reported from Vienna, where the Silesia Circus was giving performances. Two German artists, Josef Kramer and Franz Kann, appear in a tragedy act. Kramer's sister, who was in love with Kann, but whose affection was not returned, as the artist preferred her sister, loosened a rope before the beginning of the performance. As the result of her act both performers fell from a great height to the ground, being killed on the spot.

ALFONSO MUST UNDERGO ANOTHER OPERATION

London, March 21.—There are disquieting reports in London in regard to the health of King Alfonso of Spain. There has been according to these reports, a recurrence of his neural and nasal troubles, and two operations have already been performed, while a third is likely to be necessary immediately.

A Bordeaux specialist who was consulted by the Spanish king declares that this third operation is imperative. It is said that there is apprehension no danger from the operation.

PEASANTRY SUFFERING FROM DEPRIVATION

Famine Stricken People of Lower Volga Region Living Under Fearful Conditions

Moscow, March 21.—An appalling account of the sufferings of the famine-stricken peasantry of the lower Volga comes from Tsaritsin. To give but one instance, in the village of Gariyoff an official inspector discovered that most of the inhabitants were in a state of terrible emaciation; many were affected with cholera and their teeth were falling out.

Several families were living in one house, and the abandoned cottages had been pulled down in order to use the wooden walls for fuel. Bread this supply was almost exhausted. In some houses there were scalded on the top of the stove. Twelve hundred pounds of corn and several cartloads of fat were sent to the village.

The consequences of the present widespread famine are most serious. The government is attempting to deal with the evil by supplying food, but the corn for sowing in the spring had been long ago exhausted and the peasants were being obliged to sell at very low prices or to kill off their cattle and horses on account of the lack of fodder.

It is to be feared that the discontent bred by the famine may result in excesses during the next harvest. The revolutionaries of the proposed bill are being imprisoned at Saratoff for bringing down the house of a nobleman and cutting down his trees.

New York, March 21.—While many of the operators believe that there will be a suspension of work in the anthracite region on April 1, they expect that the mine workers will, within a few days, submit a proposition containing modified demands which will lead to further conferences. Vice President Loomis of the Lackawanna Railroad, has just returned from the hard coal region, and says: "The position of the operators is the same as it was when the last conference ended. The operators are ready to meet the miners, when they have any modified proposition. We hope for peace, but we cannot candidly say that we do not expect any suspension of work after the April 1 holiday."

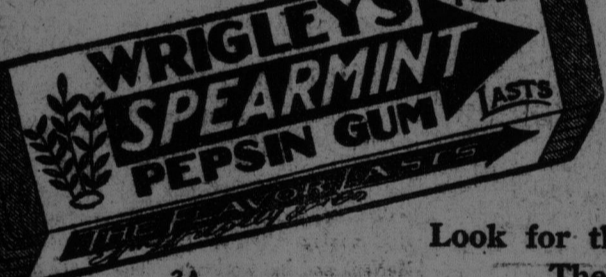

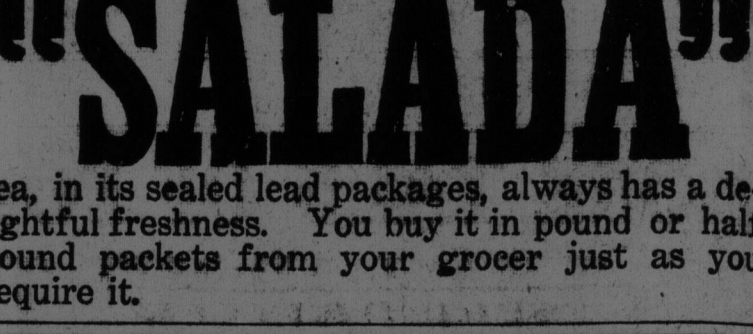

The British coal strike was the subject of a very interesting address by Mr. Harry Phillips, a former president of the Coal Workers' Union, before the Toronto Canadian Club this week. The present unrest in the labor world is thus explained by Mr. Phillips.

The St. Andrew's Beacon says:—"The myriad voices of Spring are speaking and there is no mistaking their note. Spring is here!"

The Toronto Globe says:—"Have the British-born views on Mr. Borden's failure to draw up a naval programme? Do they think a few kind words from a Tory premier as effective in defending the Empire as the squadron of cruisers and destroyers Sir Wilfrid Laurier was arranging to build?"

The Fredericton Herald says:—"It is not an exaggeration to say that Hon. Mr. McLeod's budget was the latest exposition of provincial finances heard in the legislature for many a day. He failed utterly to give the information the people have been looking for and have a right to expect from those in charge of provincial affairs."

The Ottawa Journal, Conservative, gives Mr. Borden these words of warning in regard to the tariff and the steel business: "We have before us figures which show that Canadian steel mills were sold in Australia in 1910-11 at a lower price than in Canada. If these figures are at all reliable, and with the present tariff on iron and steel, and the added protection of transportation, it would seem as if at least an investigation should be conducted into the entire industry before any further protection for which the people would have to pay is granted."

Of the provincial situation in politics the St. Andrew's Beacon says:—"There is every reason to believe that a provincial election is to be sprung immediately after the close of this session. In Charlotte county there may be two tickets in the field. Many Conservatives are disgruntled over the manner in which Messrs. Grimmer and Clarke have trampled upon their party friends, and they talk of putting up a coalition ticket, to be composed of two Conservatives and two Liberals, to fight any ticket that the government members may bring out. Since a coalition in New Brunswick has the approval of the government, they cannot see how there could be any objection to a coalition in Charlotte."

HEAR MR. MONK

Minister of Public Works Addresses Engineers in Chicago

Chicago, Ill., March 21.—F. D. Monk, minister of public works of Canada, told members of the American Railway Engineering Association, gathered here last night, at their annual banquet, that Canada was outstripping the United States in utilization and conservation of its natural resources, and said that reciprocity was refused because of economic reasons which the progress to which he referred would accommodate as the years went by.

Brookline, Mass., March 21.—Origen H. Merrick, assistant treasurer of the Merrick Thread Company of Holyoke, Mass., and a former director of the Home Market Club, died late yesterday, aged 55 years. He is survived by his wife and one son.

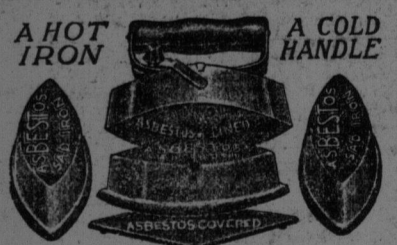

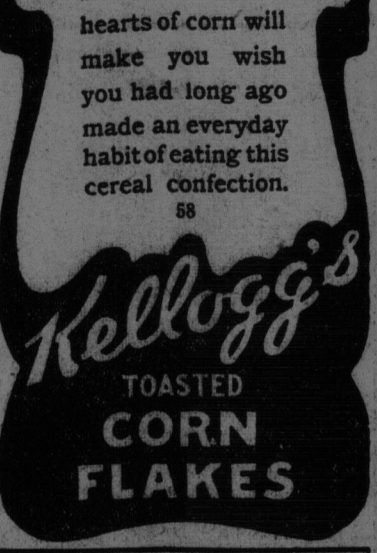

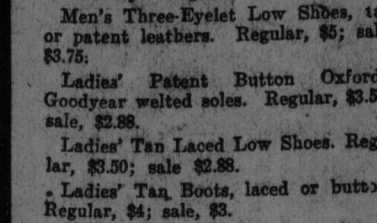

BOURASSA TALKS AT HIBERNIAN BANQUET



HENRI BOURASSA

To a highly enthusiastic audience of 3,000 people, most of them Irish or of Irish descent, in Massey Hall, Toronto, on the occasion of the annual St. Patrick's Day concert given by the Ancient Order of Hibernians, Henri Bourassa, the eminent Nationalist of Quebec, who was invited to deliver the address of the evening, delivered a stirring address of one and one-half hours' duration, in which he made an impassioned defence of the French-Canadian people, separate schools and bilingualism.

He mildly derided Ontario for its "provincialism," scolded certain Toronto newspapers for their attacks on him and the bilingual schools conditions as revealed in Doctor Merchant's report, and warned his hearers against the Americanization of Canada. There was the skilled gesture of the orator, and the nicely-timed and minutely-blended smile. Many of the French orator's statements were greeted with loud and prolonged applause. Mr. Bourassa was on the programme to deliver an oration, and his oration was the subject of "Canada."

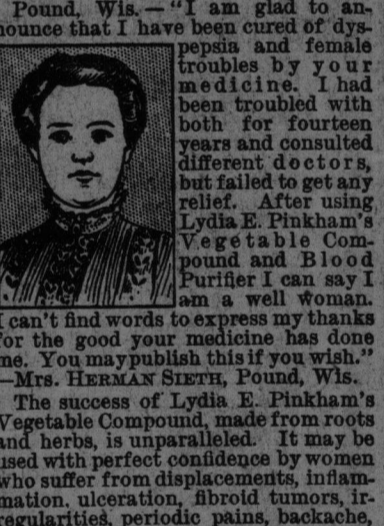

EARLY MORNING FIRE DRIVES OUT FOUR FAMILIES; MAN IS INJURED; WOMAN MAY DIE

St. James Street Blaze Give Brigade Four Hours' Combat—Falling Woodwork Strikes Haynes—Mrs. Ord Seriously Ill

A disastrous fire, which caused damage to the extent of several thousand dollars, and which may eventually result in loss of life, occurred in the large three-story house at 20-20 St. James street at an early hour this morning. The building is owned by the Sterling Realty Company, and is occupied by seven tenants. The fire occurred in the portion of the house occupied by L. Phillips, John S. Malcolm, H. G. McBeath and Zacharias Larsen. The part occupied by Malcolm, W. Stewart and P. Rising was practically undamaged. All the flats occupied by the first four were badly gutted and much furniture and household goods destroyed. The heaviest loss will be Mr. Larsen, who had no insurance, and whose flat was more badly burned than the rest.

As a result of the fire George Haynes, aged 18, German street, is lying at his home quite badly hurt, having been struck on the head with an outside window which fell from the upper story while he was helping some of the people to move out. There is an ugly gash in his head and the blood flowed profusely. He was carried to his home and medical aid summoned. It required several stitches to close the wound. Mrs. John Ord, an invalid in Mr. Larsen's flat, is in a critical condition this morning. Mrs. Ord was more seriously injured from the top floor of the burning building on a mattress and it is feared that the shock may prove too great for her. Much difficulty was experienced in removing her from the burning building, as the fire had secured quite a head before it was seen. She was taken to a house nearby and was reported as being quite low this morning. The fire was seen about three o'clock and an alarm was rung in from box 41. When the department arrived the whole end of the house was in flames. The fire was first noticed by Mrs. Ord, who was lying awake in her room. She called out to Mr. Larsen, who found several of the rooms at the back of the house filled with smoke. He notified the people on the lower flats and then rang in the alarm. The fire had evidently started on the ground floor and followed the chimney all the way up, as the walls around the chimney in all of the flats were ruined. Mr. Phillips, who lived in the basement of the house, was not aware of the fire until the firemen burst in his door. He saved practically nothing. It was with difficulty that he was able to get his family out of the house. Besides his furniture he lost a valuable mosaic which he prized highly. Mr. Malcolm and Mr. McBeath, who lived in the middle flats were able to get some of their goods out, but nearly all of Mr. Larsen's effects were burned. The firemen did excellent work in confining the blaze to the one end of the building, as it is wholly a wooden structure. The fire worked its way into the walls and it was not until about seven o'clock that the all out bell was sounded. The insurance on the building amounts to \$9,000, and is carried jointly by companies of which White & Calkin are the agents. It is divided as follows: Hartford Company, \$1,000; Ontario Company, \$2,000; Equity Company, \$2,000; Royal Company, \$1,000; Atlas Company, \$2,000; St. Paul Company, \$2,000. Harry G. McBeath carries \$800 on his furniture with William Thomson & Co. L. Phillips is also insured with the same company for \$200. S. Malcolm is insured with the Queen for \$300. Mr. Larsen had intended putting on insurance next week, but had some other business arrangements. Although the building is about fully insured, several of the tenants are not insured, and the loss sustained by the fire. The night was bitterly cold and as some of the occupants of the house escaped in their night clothes they suffered from the cold.

LOCAL NEWS

STILL KEEP AHEAD. The bank clearings for the week ending today were \$1,448,948, corresponding week last year, \$1,322,391.

CAR OFF TRACK. Four cars of a P. E. train from the west left the rails last evening about eleven o'clock owing to a bent axle on one of the engines. The accident occurred in the I. C. R. yard near the master's office. The Halifax train, due to leave at half past eleven, did not get away until three o'clock this morning.

TRAFFIC DELAYS. A sloven owned by Alexander Day and headed with scrap iron, broke down in Water street yesterday afternoon and delayed traffic there for a while. Traffic was also delayed considerably in Mill street this morning on account of an empty freight car running off the tracks. A crew of men soon replaced the car.

DIED IN BROOKLYN. Friends in St. John will regret to learn of the death of John Long, which took place last week in Brooklyn. He was a former citizen of St. John, but left here some years ago and had been employed in several years as a master boiler maker with the United States government. He had acted in that capacity in Panama for the last three years. His wife and three children survive. Michael Long, of this city, a well known ball player is a brother.

POLICE REPORTS. Robert Armstrong has been reported by the police for employing George Matthews, Robert Coffey, Walter Connell and William Matthews in his home as being contrary to the law, they being minors. The report was made by Acting Sergeant Ross and Policemen Marshall and Shortliff. Robert Pendleton, Silvanus Pendleton and Malcolm Somerville have been reported by Constable Shanks for driving a horse and team across the Suspension Bridge faster than a walk on Sunday last.

FISHERMEN SUFFER LOSS

Twenty Seven Nets Carried Away in Storm on The Kennebecasis

The profits of a whole season's fishing from the time of ice-making last fall until the present, on the Kennebecasis River, were sadly diminished last evening when the strong wind blowing from the northwest broke up the under shelving of ice between Ragged Point and McCormick's Cove, and tore away twenty-six fishing nets valued at about \$20 each, which will be a serious loss to the men engaged in fishing in those waters. All during the winter the fishing had been fairly above the average and the men who set up a little colony of fishing shanties about the shores of McCormick's Island were feeling very well satisfied that they had been getting good returns for their days and nights of hard work, but their present disappointment will easily be realized.

The Messrs. Morrow and Charles McCormick of McCormick's Island owned the greater number of nets, while Frank Irvine of Millidoville and his father had seven swept away in the windstorm. Some of the owners narrowly escaped with their lives, as the heavy gate soon broke up the ice beneath them and only with difficulty were they able to make their way to the shore. They were in great danger of going under almost at any moment. The men engaged in fishing at one or in other spots near the island did not suffer any loss, as they were more protected. The owners of the nets were assisted as far as possible by their fellow fishermen, but it was difficult to do anything as the ice was fast morning out to open water and breaking up. Reluctant to lose their source of income the fishermen made brave efforts to save the nets which became jammed and entangled in the breaking ice, but their endeavors were futile and they risked their own lives in vain attempts to prevent the loss. It is believed that the ice and nets are still jammed together about the Narrows.

STRUCK BY TRAIN AT PETITCODIAC, TWO MEN ARE HURT

Moncton, March 21.—(Special)—Reports from Petitcodiac this morning see that a west bound way freight struck a team at that place about nine o'clock and two men named Wright and Jones were injured. The conveyance was destroyed. The horses escaped uninjured. R. G. Lee, of Fredonville, is in Moncton completing arrangements for rebuilding the store destroyed by fire in December. Mr. Lee and E. B. Collette, a local stationer, are planning to construct a building to occupy the site of the Elliott building and the Boston five and ten cent store.

ABSOLUTE DIVORCE IS GRANTED HURDER

Court Includes Permission to Marry Again—Criminal and Civil Business Before Judge Forbes

His Honor Justice McKeown in the divorce court this morning delivered judgment in the case of Leslie Hurder vs. Emma Esther Hurder. An absolute divorce was granted the plaintiff with the liberty to remarry. The plaintiff is a St. John man and married the defendant in Boston. The evidence in the case was taken in Fredericton.

Criminal Cases. Several criminal cases were before His Honor Judge Forbes this morning. That of the King vs. May Tapley, charged with stealing watch and some money from Harry Burchill; the King vs. Milford Ferris, with indecently assaulting Mary Vall; and the King vs. Mary Thorne, adultery. All the prisoners pleaded not guilty and elected to be tried under the Specialty Trials Act, but the depositions were not sent down the case were adjourned. County Court Chambers. Before Judge Forbes the matter of the Natural Bank of St. Louis vs. Milford Ferris et al was heard. A summons had been taken out by H. H. Pickett for the defendants calling upon the plaintiffs to show cause why the commission issued to take evidence in St. Louis some eighteen months ago should not be cancelled. His Honor said that he would not cancel the commission now, but would require the plaintiffs to give proper notice of the taking of evidence and proceed with the same without delay or the commission would be cancelled. Weldon G. McLean are for the plaintiffs, and Mr. Pickett and Dr. L. A. Currey for the defendants.

THE LATE MRS. PITT. The funeral of Mrs. Annie F. wife of Wilmot T. Pitt, took place at Greenwell Hill, on Wednesday afternoon at two o'clock. Service was conducted by the Rev. W. B. Murray, of Westfield, at the home. Mrs. Pitt leaves, besides her sorrowing husband, one son and one daughter; three sisters, two of whom live in St. John, and one of Boston. Mrs. Pitt was formerly Miss Stevens of this city.
