BRAVED DEATH IN ZEAL FOR SCIENCE.

Sixty Medical Students Deliberately Exposed Themselves to Smallpox in

Exposed Themselves to Smallpox in Toronto.

MONTREAL, March 17.—Sixty University of Toronto medical students have in the interest of science been deliberately exposed to smallpox. The university authorities first obtained permission from the board of health for final year medical students to attend Dr. Sheard's clinics in the contagious diseases' hospital. The students attended a few at a time.

Before being admitted all of them were vaccinated, and when they came to the hospital they were required to remove their underclothing and their outerclothing, except trousers and shoes, and put on rubber bathing caps and long linen dusters securely fastened at the throat and wrists. Then they were ready for admittance to the ward. On leaving each was required to take a carbolic bath, so strong, that in some cases, it took the skin off. This was followed by a soap and water bath.

pired and none of the students has contracted the disease.

Dr. Sheard regards the work as a distinct achievement in the interest of medical science in Ontario. During the past five years much of Toronto's trouble has resulted from the professions' lack of knowledge of smallpox. Time and again cases have escaped detection by doctors, and, being allowed to travel, have come to Toronto, spreading the disease on their way. Dr. Sheard himself, when there is a case of smallpox in the hospital, daily visits' the patient during the dangerous state of the disease. Four days a week state of the disease. Four days a week he inspects the diphtheria and scarlet fever patients in the isolation hospital.

POLICE WANT MORE PAY.

A policeman, according to the present method of paying wages, gets \$1.40 a day for his first three years of service, and after that \$1.50 a day. Officers get \$1.60 a day after the first three years. The men work longer hours than the policemen of other cities and get smaller pay. The policemen of St. John, besides, have to provide themselves with their own uniforms.


