"I would wish only to say this further, not with reference to that particular treaty alone, but with general reference to all the various international arrangements and agreements which during the last 130 years have been entered into between the statesmen of Great Britain and those of the United States, that while it seems to be rather the fashion, or to have been the fashion in this country to take the view that in the greater number, if not all of these international arrangements, the United States has succeeded in getting the better of it, and that there has been in perhaps most instances on the part of British statesmen some sacrifice or some failure to recognize sufficiently the rights and interests of the British colonies in North America, I for my part, speaking certainly after considerable study of the matter and with some knowledge of it, do not in the least degree share these views. I think it is no more than simple justice that I should say with respect to the arrangements which from time to time have been entered into with regard to the various matters of difficulty which have arisen between the United States and Great Britain, that the general interests of the Empire at large have been well conserved by the representatives of the British Crown in those negotiations."
