Riparian Rights Acknowledged.

In the month of February last, in the Exchequer Court of Canada, argument was heard in the petition of right of Robertson vs. the Queen, in reference to the question of the extent of Government control over inland fisheries, and tested the validity of a lease issued by the Government of Canada.

Mr. Robertson claimed that he was interrupted in the enjoyment of a fishery lease on the Miramichi River by persons who claimed the right to fish on their own land. The Supreme Court of New Brunswick upheld the intruders and denied the right of the Crown to grant the license.

Mr. Robertson appealed to the Supreme Court and asked to be indemnified for the loss sustained by him. Mr. Halliburton, Q. C., appeared for the applicant, and Mr. Lash for the Crown.

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Mr. Halliburton made a similar motion, although the decision was in favor of the claimant, but he might have been further test the constitutional question as to the Dominion Government over the fisheries.

Bathurst Notes.

BATHURST, N. B., Oct. 6, 1880. The steam dredge St. Lawrence is at work in the harbour.

There are at present seven vessels loading at Bathurst. Three of these are being loaded by Messrs. Temple & Co., Messrs. R. A. & J. Stewart, the barkes Gunthild, Canada, and Spruce, and four by Messrs. K. F. Burns & Co., the barkes Jenny and Diana, and briggs Wellington and Lempio.
