THE BRITISH CONTEST

By a vote of five to one, the House of Lords took the very bold step of rejecting the budget of the Asquith administration. Whether the House of Lords has the constitutional right to reject the budget is a mere incident now in the consideration of the whole matter, for what will now happen will be an appeal to the constituencies of the United Kingdom to decide whether or not their Lordships are to be sustained by the people in rejecting this particular budget at this time, as well as any budget at any time. If the peers are sustained by the popular vote their branch of parliament will have won an important victory, one which will increase their power and strength to an almost unlimited extent. For their right to interfere against the popular branch will have been established by vote of the people. It is almost impossible to conceive of such a result. If they are not sustained, the consequence will be a very great diminution of their house as a branch of the national legislature, and possibly its entire abolition if they are sustained there will be said evidence of the progress of the once sturdy British to a decline and fall. It is not necessary, however, to speculate. We may expect a very bitter contest in the mother country, an uprising of hostility against the peers, against which they have been duly warned by the more moderate of their fellows.—Globe

The Canadian police are having trouble with the Indians along the Skeena River, the cause being the oncoming winter and dissatisfaction over the game laws. As long as the hunt continues between them and their antagonist, the white man, it is probable that the late E. H. Harriman disposed of more money in fewer words than any man ever did before, but there have been some short cuts in England. Lord Mansfield took half a sheet of note paper to dispose of his large fortune, and Sir James Stephen used just 13 words in his will. Lord Russell left \$1,000,000 with a dozen lines, and Lord Brampton disposed of much more with 400 words.

Sir Christopher Furness, the distinguished English shipowner, lately complained that Great Britain is over-steamed. Always leading upon the ocean, the British shipyards are continually turning out vessels, and the British tonnage is estimated to be five hundred thousand tons greater than is needed. It exceeds the requirement of trade by twenty per cent. An American newspaper the other day stated that British merchant vessels—almost new—could be purchased in the markets of the world for less than cost.

The routine marriage of a former workhouse girl who emigrated to Canada was the subject of an interesting letter sent by her to one of the lady guardians at Tonbridge, and quoted by the latter at a recent meeting of the board. It appears that the girl sent to Canada and placed in a good situation in Alberta. Her prospective appearance and charm of manner captivated one of the officials of the Canadian Pacific Railway, who fell in love with her, and recently married her. The bride in her letter spoke of the excellent prospects of industrial emigration to the colony. After cordially thanking the lady guardian for the interview she had taken in the writer's future, the girl mentioned that she had been taught to read and write by her fiancé, and was now extremely happy in her new home.

N. B. BIG GAME SEASON IS CLOSED

FREDERICTON, Dec. 1.—The hunting season in New Brunswick was brought to a close last evening. The number of non-resident sportsmen has been quite up to the average, but owing to unusual weather conditions, and the entire absence of snow in many sections, fewer big game have a chance on wild cats the officials of deer killed. The largest moose head brought to this city was secured by a boy named Phillips, at Little Lake, St. Mary's County.

The attention of Surveyor-General Jenner was today called to the fact that, although the game laws provide the crown land office has so far this season refused to recognize claims of this kind. He has directed that the bounty be paid upon applicants producing the necessary certificate from a game warden.

DISASTROUS GALE SWEEPS CAPE BRETON COAST

Enormous Damage to Shipping; Fears for Safety of Steamer Maud, Bound to North Sydney.

NORTH SYDNEY, N. S. Dec. 1.—The most disastrous storm since the memorable gale of 1872 raged on the Cape Breton coast last night, resulting in immense damage. It followed a series of heavy fogs which has prevailed for over a week.

The steamer Bruce, for Newfoundland, which was obliged to remain in port, broke away from the terminus wharf and as a result three men who were on the gang-way going aboard, were thrown into the water, narrowly escaping death.

There is much anxiety for the safety of the Norwegian steamer Maud, which left St. John's for North Sydney, and has not been heard of since. The steamer, Kumborg, which left St. John's at the same time, arrived here yesterday. It is feared here that she was caught in the big gale. She is a steamer of 1,351 tons net register, and is owned in Toronto. She was built in 1907 and carries a crew of about twenty-five men.

The schooner Helena, from Bonaventure (N.B.) for Halifax, with a cargo of 2,000 quintals of fish has put into Channel (N.B.) in a sinking condition. She was caught in a gale last Friday.

DEATH PENALTY FOR FLYING NEAR ST. PETERSBURG

An Edict Announces That Any One Found Within Ten Miles of the Capital, or Near Any Fortress, Will be Shot.

ST. PETERSBURG, Nov. 28.—An imperial edict published today forbids the flying of any aircraft of any description within a radius of ten miles of the city of St. Petersburg, or near any fortress in Russia. Venturesome aviators who transgress this edict will be shot without warning.

Thus the czar puts the official taboo on aviation. The note, however, has never found favor in Russia, and various repressive measures regarding it have been adopted.

Then follow short stories and sketches by Augustus Bridle (illustrations by T. G. Greene), Vera Sheppard Ward Fisher (illustrations by J. W. Beatty), E. M. Yeoman (illustrations by Estelle M. Kerr), Thomas Stanley Moyer, L. M. Montgomerie (illustrations by Albert H. Robson), Rene Norcross, Madge MacBeath, Edwin Dowseley and poems by Isabel Ecclestone Mackay, Duncan Campbell Scott, John Gray, Marjorie L. C. Pleckhoff, Jean Blouet, George Herbert Clarke, and Estelle M. Kerr. There are series of full-page reproductions of western photographs on tinted paper by Newton MacFarlan, and the reproductions of paintings by J. W. Morrice, are unusually fine. Altogether the number is an excellent Christmas Souvenir, with a fine cover in colors by T. M. Marten.
