BATHURST CORNER'S INQUEST

Jury's Verdict Blames Defective Bridge for E. J. Roy's Death

THE VERDICT

An inquest on the body of E. J. Roy, who was drowned last week, was held on Thursday at Bathurst by Coroner Dr. McEahan.

From the evidence led it was shown that Roy had left the village where he kept a restaurant, to go to the hospital with oysters for a patient. At that time about 8 p.m. it was blowing a gale, accompanied by a heavy down pour of rain. He was returning to his home when he met his tragic end. Search had been made all night, but it was not until noon the following day that his bicycle was seen in the water at the span next the village, and near it the body. On being taken to the undertakers no marks of violence were noticed.

A jury having been empanelled, a great deal of evidence was given, showing that the protecting rail at that span had been off for more than a year and that the bridge, half a mile long, was insufficiently lighted, there being at the public water one light and a poor one at the end.

The evidence also showed that the roadway of the bridge was a mass of mud and that probably Roy was crossing on the sidewalk. As to how the accident occurred there was no evidence. The jury brought in the following verdict:

Accidental drowning, and found that the top rail, ten feet long, under the arch of the first span on the north end of the bridge leading from Bathurst town to village, was off and had been for over a year, as proved by the evidence, also that the bridge was inadequately lighted, there being only one light on it, which showed extreme slackness on the part of the officials who were supposed to look after the lighting and repairs of the bridge.

Fredericton, Oct. 15.—The annual law examinations commenced this morning in the Supreme Court Chambers and law library at the Parliament Buildings. The first intermediate and the admission as student examinations commenced this morning; also the oral examinations for those taking the final examinations will commence this afternoon. The board of examiners are Dr. T. C. Allen, and Mr. J. D. Phinney, K. C., of this city, and Mr. J. B. M. Baxter, K. C., St. John.

Those writing the examinations are: Final examinations for attorney: Ivan Rand, B. A., LL. B., (Harvard), Moncton; Frank M. O'Neill, LL. B., (Dalhousie), Fredericton, and J. J. Hayes, Doon, St. Mary's. Those taking the second intermediate examinations for attorney are: Charles J. Jones, Woodstock; M. A. Kelly, Campbellton, and A. M. Furnisham, Bathurst. First intermediate for attorney: J. L. Ryan, Andover; H. H. Stuart, Newcastle, and R. L. Simms, Florenceville.

During his illness at the time of the regular examinations in August, Arthur L. Cyr, of St. Hilaire, is now writing the examinations for admission as a student at law.

THE AXE FALLS AT EEL RIVER

Postmaster Levesque is Disposed for Election Partizanship

DISSATISFACTION.

Coun. J. Levesque, who has held the position of postmaster at Eel River for a number of years, was removed from that office on the first of October. Mr. P. J. Golden has been appointed to the position and the people have not taken kindly to the change. As this is almost entirely a French district, a great deal of inconvenience is caused by the inability of the new official to speak or write French and much dissatisfaction has been expressed. It is understood that two investigations were held on Mr. Levesque's conduct during the last election, but so far we can learn nothing of the findings of the commission.

As this is an important place in the county, it would have been well to have appointed someone who was able to serve the public and in a place of this kind the knowledge of French is of vital importance.

NEW SETTLERS FOR NEW BRUNSWICK

Farm Settlement Board Places Many.

Over a dozen new settlers arrived on Friday from the Old Country, having been sent out by Mr. Browder the provincial representative in Great Britain. They were taken in charge by the provincial superintendent of immigration. One member of the party who has a family of five went to Kings county to work on a farm of James Gilchrist. Another will be sent to Westmorland county.

A meeting of the farm settlement board was held on Friday and considerable business disposed of. The board has recently sold three farms under the provisions of the farm settlement act. One of the purchasers was Thomas Mantell an Englishman, in the province a short time. He took up a farm at Benton, Carleton county. Another man named Perkins, who has been living in Lawrence, Mass., for some time, has decided that he can do better farming in New Brunswick, and has taken up a farm in Charlotte county. The third man to avail himself of the opportunity of acquiring a farm was James K. Paisley, who has taken a farm near Bathurst, Gloucester county.

The board has made arrangements to purchase five farms at West Scotch Settlement, in Kings county, and will have them improved. Arrangements have been made to purchase farms in other parts of the Province. Applications from parties who wish to take advantage of the farm settlement plan are coming steadily.

DOINGS OF THE RIFLE ASSOCIATION

Good Scoring in the Late Competition for Dominion Trophy

LAST MATCH

The fighting spirit dies hard in the bosoms of the members of the Restigouche Rifle Association.

A competition was recently held for the Dominion Trophy, an engraved salver which is presented by the Dominion Government to all rifle clubs throughout Canada.

The local shootists took a keen interest in the match and the excitement was well maintained right up till the end.

During the last day of the shoot a tricky fish tail wind was blowing down the range and the result was in dispute until the last few shots were fired.

The final issue lay between P. W. Hamilton of Charlott and A. H. English of Campbellton. Hamilton finished first and when English went to the mound at 600 yards there was every possibility of his drawing ahead but owing to the wind he did not immediately get into his stride. When he did at last locate the bull he stayed right with it until darkness set in and with his last four shots he could count nothing better than inners and finished a close second 4 points behind Hamilton.

The competition was run on each member making four shots and a few of the leading scores are appended.

Several other members shot well in the opening stages but did not finish too good. The trophy will be on exhibition with the other prizes for the Merchants match on Thanksgiving Day.

A feature of the competition was the scoring of 101 out of a possible 105 by Hamilton on the first days shooting.

The season will be wound up with the annual "Merchants Shoot" on Thanksgiving day. The liberality of the local merchants as on previous similar occasions will be an important factor in making this event a success, and as competitions of all kinds well be on the card a large turnout is confidently expected. All the competitions are on N. The club rifles will be used and ammunition will be furnished on payment of 5 cents per round. The ranges will be 200 yards commencing at 40 a. m., and 500 yards commencing at 1.30 p. m. The prizes will be on exhibition at R. A. Mowats.

LARGE INCREASE OF SPIRITUOUS LIQUORS

New Brunswick for a Dry Province Certainly Helps Along the Revenue

The blue book just issued containing the reports, returns, and statistics of the Inland Revenues gives some interesting reading. These official reports are for the year ending 31st March 1912, and in the amount of spirits entered for consumption Ontario heads the list of provinces with the enormous total of 1,822,449.78 gallons a large increase from the year 1911 the figures for that period being 1,716,378.48.

For a province which is taking a strong stand on the prohibition question New Brunswick does not show up too well having the dubious record of spirits entered for consumption to the amount of 96,310.34 gallons an increase over the previous year of thirteen thousand gallons the figures for the year ending 31st March 1911 being 82,458.11 gallons.

Officials Notified That No Change Will be Made Until Then



FLAG INCIDENT WILL NOT DOWN

Case of Former St. John Boy who Refused Allegiance Goes to British Consul

New York, Oct. 15.—According to the New York Herald the school board of Cedar Grove, N.J., is on strike. Alonzo Jacobs, president, and Floyd G. Stebens, clerk of the board, refused yesterday to call a special meeting to consider the suspension of Leoric Temple from the High School because he refused to pledge allegiance to the American flag.

Under the school law the board must meet at its earliest convenience, and either approve or disapprove the actions of principals in suspending pupils, but in this particular case Arthur Cowie, who is postmaster, and also a member of the board, declares there isn't going to be any earliest convenience.

"I don't think we will have any meeting at all on that matter," Mr. Cowie said. We settled it last Friday when Mr. Hutchinson reported that the boy had refused to pledge allegiance to the flag.

Mr. Frederick L. Temple, the boy's father, has referred the matter to Mr. John J. Broderick, acting British Consul, who has asked Governor Wilson, of New Jersey, to take up the case.

"There will be no international complications, no exchanges of notes," said Mr. Broderick with a smile. "I have asked the Governor of New Jersey to look into the matter. I have no doubt that the question will be settled by him should the local board persist in keeping the boy out of school, which I think is hardly likely.

"Personally I consider it a matter of courtesy to salute the flag of a friendly nation, but to swear allegiance in another matter, and should be left to the individual judgment of each person. This is a clear-cut case. The boy is without doubt a British subject. A similar case in Perth Amboy a year ago that of Catherine Audsley, was not so plain as to citizenship. I believe it was ended by admitting the girl to school.

"I know nothing about the merits of the boy's position except what I have read in the papers. Possibly he was arrogant and defiant, and perhaps the school board is merely attempting to enforce discipline that is necessary to the well-being of the school."

DEATH OF FORMER CHIEF SUPERINTENDENT

Dr. Jas. R. Inch Succumbs After Operation at Amherst Hospital

Amherst, N.S., Oct. 14.—Dr. James R. Inch, formerly chief superintendent of education of New Brunswick, died at 7 o'clock last evening at the Highland View Hospital, Amherst. Dr. Inch had recently undergone an operation at Amherst which had been taken to his home in Sackville, but another operation was deemed advisable and this was performed on Friday at the Highland View Hospital by Dr. McDougall, of Amherst assisted by Dr. McQueen, of Amherst, and Dr. Secord, of Sackville. He passed away as the church bells were ringing, and when asked if he heard them, nodded his head in the affirmative.

Mrs. Sydney Hunton, wife of Professor Hunton, of Mount Allison University, and only daughter of Dr. Inch, together with his grandchildren were at the death bed. The body will be taken to Sackville today.

James Robert Inch was the youngest son of Nathaniel and Annie Inch, of Ireland, who immigrated from Enniskillen to New Brunswick, and settled at Petersville, Queen county, in 1824. He was born at Petersville, April 29, 1835, and entered Gagetown Grammar school, and Mount Allison University. In 1864 he graduated B. A., in 1867, M. A., and in 1878 he obtained his LL.D. In 1909 he received from the University of New Brunswick the honorary degree of LL.D.

His marriage took place in 1864, when he married Miss Mary Alice, Dunn, Keswick (N.B.), who died in April, 1904. Dr. Inch was engaged as a first class teacher, and spent some years in early life in public school service. From 1878 until 1891 he was president of New Brunswick University, and preceding his tenure of office there, was principal of Mt. Allison Ladies' College from 1864 until 1878.

Since 1891 he has been superintendent of education, and president of New Brunswick University, the two offices being amalgamated by legislation. In 1909 he resigned both offices.

He was president of the senate of the University of New Brunswick, fellow and senator of Halifax University, elected local vice-president of American Institute Christian Phil., 1886, and vice-president, Dominion Educational Association, 1896; appointed a member of the Geographic Board of Canada, 1905; a delegate Imperial Educational Conference London, England, 1906.

Dr. Inch was an active adherent of the Methodist church, and has been a member of all the general conferences of that body since 1878. He was also a member of the church union committee of 1906, and of the executive of the committee of the Canadian Bible Society.

As an educationist he has been an able and experienced one, and has been the means of conferring many important services, not only on the several institutions with which he has been connected, but on the whole school system of New Brunswick.

CREAMED CORN

Cut corn from the cob, chop very fine and press through a sieve. To each pint of this pulp add one beaten egg yolk, a level tablespoonful of flour, one tablespoonful of melted butter, salt and pepper to suit, and the stiffly beaten white of the egg. Drop by tablespoonfuls into shallow hot fat to cook brown on both sides, and serve as soon as cooked.

BAKED-BEAN SANDWICHES.

Press one-half of a cupful of baked beans through a potato ricer and mix in thoroughly one tablespoonful of butter, one level tablespoonful of celery and parsley minced fine, one-half teaspoonful mustard.—Spread this between thin slices of buttered whole wheat bread.

SEVEN LIVES WERE LOST IN DISASTER

Evidence That Yacht Bernadette Went Down—One Body Recovered

Rimouski, Que., Oct. 12.—With the discovery late yesterday afternoon of the body of F. X. Proulx, all hope was abandoned to-day for the safety of the seven who formed the crew of the missing sailing yacht, Bernadette.


Proulx's body had been washed ashore at Cape Ala Baleine, about twelve miles below Matane, and parties of anxious searchers are to-day scouring the shore on both sides of the river seeking for bodies of other victims of the disaster.

When found the body of Proulx bore a life belt, and it is thus believed that those who are supposed to have perished whilst cruising on the waters of the St. Lawrence were not overtaken by a sudden storm, but had time to equip themselves for a fight in the water before their craft went under.

The government steamer Lady Evelyn and the steamer Laurentian are heading today's search. A flotilla of small craft in charge of residents of the vicinity will also aid in the search. A close watch is being kept on the shore in case any wreckage or other indications of the missing men are washed in with the tide.

SCOTTISH GIRL HAS VANISHED

Mysteriously Disappeared on Way to Work in City Factory.

Miss Gertrude Vallance, 138A Colonial avenue, Montreal, has vanished from sight, and in spite of the efforts of her brother George, Detective Demers and Ald. Blumenthal, not a trace of her can be found. She left her boarding place about 12.40 on Monday afternoon to go to her work in the T. Eaton Company factory on St. Catherine street, but never reached that place. Her brother searched all night for her, and made a complaint to the police office about midnight, but nothing was done. The next morning he enlisted the aid of Ald. Blumenthal, who had Detective Demers detailed to investigate the mysterious affair.

The young girl came to Canada on Oct. 6, on the SS. "Grampian," from Scotland, and went to a room where her brother was living at 138A Colonial avenue. On Monday morning she went to work at the Eaton factory, her first day's work since arriving here. She came home for dinner and left the house to return to her work. Since then not a trace of her has been found. She was about five feet in height, slender, dark hair, pointed features, weighing 105 pounds. She wore a purple hat with a white feather in the side, a dark slate-colored suit with a fine stripe in it with pearl buttons, and her shoes were black. She spoke with a distinct Scotch accent.

She was a stranger in the city, and found difficulty in locating her boarding house after leaving her work. It is feared that she lost her way in returning to it, and fell into the hands of designing white slavers. If so, it is likely that she was sent out of the city, across the boundary, early on Tuesday.

The girl had not a cent with her, and only the street car tickets to carry her to her work. To a 'Witness' reporter Ald. Blumenthal said he feared that she was lost as the slavers, he said, were watching for friendless, strange girls on the streets. Only a few days ago he had rescued a 14 year old girl from their clutches just as she was being sent to a United States city.

ASTOR ESTATE IS LESS THAN THOUGHT

Tentative Appraisal of Real Estate Amounts to Sixty-Two Millions.

New York, October 16.—The total estate of the late Col. John Jacob Astor will appraise at many millions less than has been supposed. This was indicated Saturday when a messenger from the office of Canter, Ledyard and Milburn, attorneys for the executors, went to the State Comptroller's office at Albany, with a cheque for \$3,150,000, representing the transfer taxes of the value of the estate by the executors.

This amount of tax indicates that the executors have computed the net value of the estate, after all debts, commissions of executors, and other deductions have been eliminated, at \$77,826,000.

Previous estimates of the value of the estate have ranged from \$75,000,000 to \$150,000,000, with the Astor real estate frequently appraised at \$100,000,000.

The tentative appraisal of the Astor real estate made by the experts agreed upon by Lewis C. Dedyard Jr., counsel for the estate, and John Quinn, counsel for the State Comptroller, is \$62,650,000.

This does not include the elaborate country place at Rhinebeck, which has not yet been appraised by representatives of the State Comptroller.

WILL LEASE NORTH SHORE LINE TO C.N.R.

Power Will Probably be Given For Running Rights Over I. C. R.

With regard to the present line of the Intercolonial, it is a well known fact that MacKenzie & Mann have for some time past wanted running rights over it as the maritime link for the new C. N. R. transcontinental. A 'adjustment by which running rights or a lease might be granted to the C. N. R. over this line would dispose of the question as to what the government would do with the two sections which the taking over of the Levis-Mocton portion of the transcontinental would place upon its hands.

The government would thus only be called upon to operate the new line, leaving the present line of the C. N. R. to operate and still maintain running rights over the latter.

The policy outlined above is, in the main, in line with what Mr. Borden argued while in opposition. It is in line with recent hints in the government press in closest touch with the premier and his minister of railways, and it is apparently to be the government's chief card to solace the west in regard to its freight rate and transportation problems.

A government-operated railway from Winnipeg east with the proposal for practically a further extension via running rights on the G.T.F. to the Pacific coast, would undoubtedly improve a popular appeal especially in western Canada and is apparently the only thing the government will have to offer as an offset for the demand for lower tariffs and wider markets.

The announcement and detailed formulation of the policy will, of course be delayed until the opportune moment, prior to the next general appeal to the electors. But in a general way that is the policy which the government now has in view.

THREE NEW ISLANDS OFF THE CHILEAN COAST

Valparaiso, Chili, Oct. 14.—Three new islands without vegetation, supposed to be the result of a recent marine upheaval, were discovered sixty miles to the southwest of Juan Fernandez, by the captain of the steamship Glenalvon, who reported them on his arrival here.

SCOTCH GIRLS' FRIEND
Mrs. Radford Undertook Big Task at Advanced Age

Mrs. Jane Radford, founder and principal of the Women's Canadian Employment Bureau of Montreal, has been elected for encouraging the best type of Scotch immigrant girls to come to Canada.

Mrs. Radford is considerably over the allotted span of years, and an interesting story she had to tell of her work among girls who forsake the Old for the New World. Her public life commenced by her appointment to the Selecting Committee of an agency which was bringing girls out to Canada by the hundred. Her experience in this capacity gave her an idea of the great injustice done by the system under which these girls were sent out. Promises were made that never could be realized, with the result that disappointment and despair invariably made miserable the existence of girls who left the Old Country full of high hopes and ambitions. Realizing all this, Mrs. Radford, although seventy-four years of age, went to Canada and asked to be permitted to put her scheme into operation. That was to tell the truth with regard to the wages domestic servants would receive; to give opportunity to girls to select whom they should work for and see that the particular work of a domestic servant was made clear to her before any contract was closed; and to provide amusement and social intercourse for the girls during their free hours. This was rather a big undertaking for a woman, but the Women's Canadian Employment Bureau was organized as the result of Mrs. Radford's efforts, and part of its activity consists in bringing the girls into touch with ministers of their own denomination, whether Protestant or Roman Catholic; and giving them the advantage of a home at a very low rate for at least twenty-four hours after their arrival—a rest being desirable after the fatigue of their passage. To perform all these obligations, Mrs. Radford arranged a system of work which does her credit.

Ottawa, Oct. 15.—Canada will be visited next year by several of the most distinguished officers in British military life, and according to the Quebec Telegraph it is announced that Field Marshal Earl Roberts, accompanied by Countess Roberts and her two charming daughters, Lady Evelyn and Lady May Roberts, will renew their acquaintances with the Dominion. Cannot Lose Gold Watch

John Knox's Birthplace

Mr. David Loudon, who died at St. Andrews was a teacher at Morham, near Haddington, for some twenty-seven years, and championed the claim of the little parish to being the birthplace of the great Scottish Reformer, John Knox. He obtained many concrete pieces of high antiquarian standing. The exact location of the birthplace are the village of Gifford, some four miles south of Haddington, and Giffordgate, on the outskirts of Haddington.

MANXLAND'S MILLIONAIRE

The Lieutenant-Governor (Lord Raglan), as Provincial Grand Master of Freemasons, in the Isle of Man in opening the new hospital provided for by the late Mr. Henry Bloom Noble, said the institution was the best hospital of the size in the world.

As a lad of sixteen, in 1837, Noble landed at Douglas from Whitehaven and found employment at a few shillings a week. He early started business for himself, and was founder of a company which provided Douglas with water, and also of the Isle of Man Bank, and became chairman of many companies.

He died a few years ago, the richest man by far in the island, and left his fortune of nearly \$1,500,000 for charity.

The hospital cost \$125,000, and there is an endowment of \$100,000.

CAPTURED BY NELSON

Old Line-of-Battle Ship Implacable Goes on Her Last Cruise

After lying in the Hamoaze at Devonport for over a century, the two-decker line-of-battle ship Implacable one of the trophies which Nelson won for the British Navy, was moved to Portsmouth, where she is to be preserved as a national monument.

The Implacable was originally the French battleship Degues, captured by the British in 1795, and was in the service of over a century ago, recaptured by the French, and again recaptured by the British at the battle of Trafalgar. Retained the Implacable she was for many years employed at Devonport as a training ship for boys.

She was restored to her original state, and will be moved at Portsmouth to the site of the present site of the national monument.

CROSSED BARREN ICE

Swiss Expedition Performed Notable Feat in Traversing Greenland

Greenland was crossed for the first time from west to east over the barren ice by the Swiss expedition under Dr. DeQuervain, who arrived at Reykjavik, the capital of Iceland and told the story of his interesting trip.

The expedition started from Jakobshavn, in Danish North-west Greenland, and marched for three months over the ice wastes. They made the east coast ten miles from Angmagalik, which was their goal. Many valuable scientific results were achieved. The greatest height of the inland ice measured 2,500 metres, but they saw higher peaks and discovered mountains on Christian Ninth Land, nearer the east coast.

Maintaining the Home Language

Lord Sheffield, speaking at a meeting in connection with the Angles Education Committee, of which he is chairman, said anyone who went about to recognize that the language of the home, the language of thought, and the language of the daily life was the Welsh language. They must therefore, in their schools cultivate that language so that it would not be degraded to the level to which Dutch was done in South Africa. Although Welsh was the language of the home, English was the language of business and prosperity. It was, therefore, very essential for the children, if they were to go beyond the narrow rostron of Wales, to be well equipped in English also.

Death of Noted Antrim Man

The death took place at Cheltenham, Ireland, of Mr. John Macaulay, D.L., a well-known County Antrim man, in his ninetieth year. He was a native of Crumlin, but for very many years resided at Redhall, Ballycarry. At one time he was probably the largest and best-known miller and flour merchant in the North of Ireland, and controlled immense mills at Inver, Larn, and the Steam Mills, Belfast.

Robert Fowler, a gamekeeper on the Garthland estates, Lochwinnoch, who was arrested on the charge of shooting and killing a tramp, who had trespassed on the Garthland estates, was liberated by the Crown authorities. Fowler stated that it was a pure accident.

MORRISON WON IN THE BYE-ELECTION

Government Candidate in MacDonald Had Over 800 Majority.

Winnipeg, Man., Oct. 14.—By a decisive majority of 847 the electors of Macdonald on Saturday returned the Government candidate, Alexander Morrison, over K. L. Richardson, who ran on the independent liberal and grain growers' ticket, in which he put reciprocity and an increased British preference to the front. The figures will be subject to a slight revision. The entire vote cast is heavy and runs over six thousand, as against 5,751 cast in the last general election when Staples, conservative had a majority of 161. The vacancy was caused by Staples' appointment to the Dominion Grain Commission. Conservative supporters acclaim the victory as the last nail in the coffin of reciprocity, while the Liberals make charges of impersonation, plugging and bribery.

Several cabinet and ex-cabinet ministers were engaged in the campaign on one or the other side. The Conservative majority in the general election last year was 161.

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7,000 MILE MOTOR TRIP TO HALIFAX

Los Angeles Party Arrived From California

Halifax, N.S., Oct. 15.—After having auto-motored 7,050 miles through the United States and Canada, H. O. Vogel, accompanied by his wife and daughter, H. A. Stone and the latter's wife, arrived in the City on Saturday. The arrival of the car, covered with mud and dust, and with a driver on the side announcing the fact that it had travelled from Los Angeles to Halifax, attracted a number of people on Smith Street.

Campbellton was the next big town arrived at, and the final journey to Halifax was made in three running days via Bathurst, Richibucto and other seaport towns.

Unauthorized and Self-styled "Dominion Organizer" Given Warning to Cease Activities—Has Travelled Extensively.

Winnipeg, Oct. 15.—H. Maxwell Clark, who has lately written on several occasions during the past twelve months, representing himself as Dominion Organizer for the Canadian Highway Association, has no connection with that body, according to a statement made at a meeting of the Manitoba Good Roads Association, Friday night by Mr. W. J. Kerr, President of the Canadian Highway Association.

Members have been accused by Mr. Clark, not only in Winnipeg, but in many other cities from Halifax to the Pacific Coast, by advancing the argument that he was working in the interest of the Canadian Highway Association, although his connection ceased on January 3, 1912, as approved by a statement signed by him and read at the meeting.

Mr. Clark was present at the gathering and was given an opportunity to present his side of the argument. After listening patiently to his explanation Mr. Clark was advised to cease from his activities and warned that his presence would not be tolerated at the Canadian Highway Association's convention, to be held here this week.

In the opinion of several who have in the past come in contact with Clark, his interest in the cause of Good Roads has become an obsession and it was considered advisable to publicly repudiate the self-styled Dominion Organizer.

While acting as unauthorized organizer Mr. Clark has done a great deal to prejudice the cause of the Highway Association in many quarters, and has, because of his hasty utterances, created antagonism in high quarters. The action taken on the initiative of the Manitoba Good Roads Association was hastened because Clark had promised a program for the convention. He has two speakers for the four-day session.

The men were taking a horse and buggy across, and all three were seated in the buggy when the horse took fright at the waves and backed the trio into the water. Searching parties have been organized, but without result so far.

FRENCH GAME POACHERS

Constant Warfare Waged Between the Guards and Peasants

The guards in the Forest of Compiègne, in northeastern France, are ever on the watch for both wood-stealers and poachers. Indeed, a series of minor engagements is always taking place between peasants and guards, and those predilections which the officials are powerless to prevent are forced to "tolerate."

Sometimes, however, a guard is hoisted. "The rich hunt the deer and the peasants," said one guard, "and pay the Government for the right, but I hunt the women, and the Government pays me. For it is twice as easy to catch a woman as it is to catch a deer." A stranger will frequently see women chopping down small trees, their faces hidden in their mufflers and their outposts of children ranged at intervals near by. When one of them catches sight of the intruder a signal is given, the woman stops chopping and holds on to her head as though she were suffering, while the children squat silently like a group of rabbits.

Game poachers are constantly being caught and sent to prison. Some of them are as famous as great hunters, and there was one, not long dead, whose chronicles appeared in French journals. For his constant poachings he had 140 suits brought against him and spent fully 30 of his 55 years in a cell. Both his wife and his children live to carry on his work; but the glory of the house is departed.

Of the three ways of poaching, with the gun, the ferret, and the snare, the last is the most simple enough for a child. All one has to do is to carry to a given place a piece of wire readily concealed in one of these paths, cover it with leaves, fastening the free end of the wire securely to the ground. When game of any kind once sets foot in this trap every effort to free itself only draws the wire tighter. Many hundreds of these snares are yearly found by the guards.

MANUEL STILL HOPES

Exiled King of Portugal Asks His Supporters to Trust Him

Former King Manuel, of Portugal, issued from Paris a manifesto for circulation in Portugal in which he declares the report that he has abandoned the cause, or deserted those who have devotedly served him in his fight for his lost throne.

"I cannot leave these stories un-denied," the deposed King declares in the manifesto; "and I repudiate them in the most formal and categorical manner. The false reports are profoundly injurious to my character as a man, my patriotism as a Portuguese, and my honor as a King."

Manuel goes on to say that he will always remain at the post of duty. "Monarchism is not dead, and Portugal is dominated only by republicanism, which is the republic's sole force. He refers to the two years of revolutionary anarchy which followed his downfall and assures the Portuguese exiles and those still in Portugal who are faithful to him that the flag of monarchy is still waving in his hands.


